If you saw the sports section of the Thursday edition of The Abilene Reporter News, you saw the picture and nice article of Cisco's Jana Yowell, written by Bill Hart, senior staff writer of the AR-N.

We'd like to reprint the article, which was entitled "Yowell Has Improved Despite No Challengers."

"CISCO- For the most part, Jana Yowell of Cisco has been running by herself at track meets this spring.

"But that's something she's become accustomed to, especially in the 3,200 meters. She's lost one 1,600 meters race this year, but in doing so, ran her best time ever.

"The lack of competition has hurt some, but I've been able to overcome it," she said. "I'm a lot stronger this year and I've also worked a

lot harder. Running cross country has helped me improve, too."

"The two-time Class 2A cross country champion is also the defending Class 2A champion in the 3,200 meters. She also placed fourth in the 1,600 at the state meet, but she's been impressive enough that colleges wanted her to continue running for them.

"Yowell, who signed with Texas A&M Wednesday night, said she chose the Aggies over the University of Texas-Arlington because 'I like their tradition and they have a good program.'

"She said she was recruited for cross country, but that she also plans to compete in track.

"There's been no decision on what events I'll run," she said. "I prefer the 5,000 and the 10,000, and I think I can handle that."

"Yowell ran an 11:55.2 to win the 3,200 last year in Austin. Her best time this year has been 12:03.09, although she hasn't been pushed yet. Her best time in the 1,600 is 5:30.63, which she ran three weeks ago at the Wall regional qualifiers meet. That's five seconds faster than she ran at last year's state meet.

"She won both events at the Region II-2A meet in Stephenville last week to qualify for next week's state meet.

"Yowell is scheduled to run in the state qualifiers meet at Abilene Christian University Friday against some of the top distance runners in West Texas."

## Damage Caused By Rains To County Roads: \$698,000

Eastland County Commissioners estimate that it will take a total of \$698,000 to repair county roads and bridges damaged by recent rains and flooding. They have applied for Disaster Relief Assistance to make these repairs.

County Judge Scott Bailey and the Commissioners met Wednesday with August Koerning of the Emergency Management Division of the Texas Department of Public Safety. Koerning complied information on the damage in each Precinct. He gave out questions about washed out roads, debris that needed clearing, structural damage to bridges, and other types of

damage. It appeared that Pct. 2, on the east side of the county, received the most damage of any part of the county. Norman Christian, Commissioner of this Precinct, estimated that it would take \$345,000 to repair roads and bridges and other damages.

Commissioner Richard Robinson of Pct. 1 reported the least damage of any area of the County. He estimated it would take \$63,000 to put his roads back in shape.

L. T. Owen of Pct. 2 - south side of the county - listed considerable damage to roads and bridges. He estimated it would take \$215,000 to repair them and clear debris.

in his Precinct. Billy Bacon, Comm. of Pct. 4, estimated it would take \$75,000 to put roads and bridges back in shape. He had one bridge washed out, and considerable washing across roads.

These Disaster requests will be carried to the office of Gov. Bill Clements, and hopefully passed on from there.

The Commissioners say it will take a lot of work as well as money to get the many miles of rural roads back in shape. Extreme caution should be used in traveling these roads until they are fixed.

## Plans Being Made For Exciting Fourth of July Fireworks Show

Plans are now underway for an exciting Fourth of July fireworks display in Cisco, according to Ivan Webb, Chamber of Commerce committee chairman.

Ciscoans are being asked to purchase a display shell to help make this the best fireworks display ever. "It will take 120 3, 4 and 5 inch shots to have a professional first quality show," Mr. Webb said. Sixty 3-inch shells, costing \$14 each; 30 4-inch shells at \$20 each; and 30 5-inch shells at \$27 each are needed. These prices include shell and insurance cost, he added.

"You may purchase one or more shells from any chamber board member for

the annual Fourth of July fireworks display. Purchases may also be made at the Chamber of Commerce office," Mr. Webb said.

According to Mr. Webb, "We will not settle for less than a first class professional show. If we should not reach our goal of 120 shots we will not have a fireworks show and a refund for all

shells purchased will be made."

The Cisco Press will help keep you informed about sales by publishing a status report until our goal has been reached. Let's get behind it and make it a show we can all be proud of, Mr. Webb said. "Thank you in advance for your support."

## Governor Is Expected To Declare Part of 22nd District Disaster Area

Paperwork that would have parts of the 22nd Senatorial District declared a disaster area due to recent heavy rains and flooding are expected to be signed this week by the Governor, according to State Senator Bob Glasgow (D-Stephenville).

"The recent rains, as heavy as 19 inches in some areas I represent, have caused a tremendous amount of flooding and other damage," said Glasgow. "I want to make sure my constituents receive any aid that they might qualify for, and that the process is as easy and quick as possible."

Once the Governor officially declares a disaster has occurred, then the President can declare the area a disaster area and federal aid will be

come available. "If anyone has trouble filing for disaster relief, or if they might have any questions about possible assistance or experience any difficulties I hope they will contact my Austin office so that we may assist them," Glasgow said. "The recent rains have devastated some areas, and I want to help those in the 22nd Senatorial District in the process of rebuilding."

\*\*\*FOUNDERS AND PATRIOTS OF AMERICA INDEX: a compilation of Founders and Patriots listed in the thirty-four volumes of lineages of the members of the National Society of Daughters of Founders and Patriots of America. The publication of lineages was begun in 1909 and contains 9,275 Founders and Patriots.

The National Society lineage books are in many state and county libraries located throughout the country as well as in a number of historical society libraries.

Lineage is of a Founder ancestor who arrived in one of the Colonies between May 13, 1607 and May 13, 1687. Patriot ancestor who gave military service, civil service or other aid in establishing American independence in the period from 1775 to 1784.

In addition to name Founder and Patriot, the index lists, for each, his date of birth and death, date of

marriage and the name of his wife, except in a few instances where this data is unavailable, and the volume and page where the full lineage record showing descent to the "Daughter" is set out. (The Founder and Patriot of a given lineage are linked by volume and page number) So in this volume there is the thread linking the Founder ancestor to the Patriot ancestor and a reference to the lineage record showing descent from both.

Due to the fact requirements for membership in the National Society of Daughters of Founders and Patriots of America are strict, this publication should be especially useful to descendants of these Founders and Patriots who are interested in becoming members of this unique and beloved patriotic society. Although, in some of the early lineages the proof was not retained by the National Society and "unless" these lineages were "proved by



Notice is hereby given that Brazos Electric Power Cooperative, Inc. ("Brazos Electric"), a wholesale generation and transmission electric utility, and the following Brazos Electric member retail distribution electric utilities ("Members"), Bartlett Electric Cooperative, Inc., Bellalls Electric Cooperative, Inc., B-K Electric Cooperative, Inc., Comanche County Electric Cooperative Assn., Denton County Electric Cooperative, Inc., Dickens Electric Cooperative, Inc., Erath County Electric Cooperative Assn., Fort Belknap Electric Cooperative, Inc., Gate City Electric Cooperative, Inc., Hamilton County Electric Cooperative Assn., Hill County Electric Cooperative, Inc., J-A-C Electric Cooperative, Inc., Johnson County Electric Cooperative Assn., McLennan County Electric Cooperative, Inc., Mid-South Electric Cooperative Assn., Navarro County Electric Cooperative, Inc., Navasota Valley Electric Cooperative, Inc., Tri-County Electric Cooperative, Inc., and Wise Electric Cooperative, Inc., have filed a Petition for Waiver with the Public Utility Commission of Texas ("PUC"). In the petition, assigned Docket No. 9453, Brazos Electric requests waiver of the obligation to sell retail power to qualifying cogeneration and small power production facilities ("QFs") and the Members seek a waiver of their obligations to purchase power directly from QFs. These obligations are contained in PUC Substantive Rule 23.66(d)(1)(A) and 23.66(d)(2), as well as 18 C.F.R. 292.303(a) and (b).

The proposed waivers will not impair the ability of QFs to sell electric capacity and energy or to purchase electric capacity and energy. In the territory served by Brazos Electric and its above-listed Members (63 counties throughout Texas), Brazos Electric will assume the obligation for all purchases of QF generated electricity and the Members will assume all obligations for sales to QFs of capacity and energy. Only duplicate obligations which would otherwise be applicable to both Brazos Electric and its above-listed Members are proposed to be eliminated.

Reciprocal waivers of the type requested by Brazos Electric and its above-listed Members have recently been granted by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission. The proposed waivers will not discourage cogeneration and small power production. Members' avoided cost can never be more than Brazos Electric's avoided cost because the Members purchase all of their wholesale power requirements from Brazos Electric.

The proposed waivers are subject to approval by the PUC. An Original Petition for Waiver specifying in detail each proposed waiver, the reasons waivers are being requested, and the effect of waiver is available at the general offices of Brazos Electric in Waco, Texas, and at an office of each of its above-listed Members.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the PUC as soon as possible. The deadline for intervention is June 18, 1990. **XT Solar Win At Leon**

Congratulations are in order for the 2nd Annual Eastland Volunteer Fire Department Open Bass Tournament held at Lake Leon April 29. Despite very poor lake conditions and worse fish catching conditions this event has gained a spot on area anglers calendars. 144 contestants attended this years events short of the 283 entrants of 1989. But for those who did attend the good folks from the E.V.F.D. made them feel at home.

Of the 144 anglers entered only 38 fish were brought to the scales. This years winner with 3 fish 10.78 pounds Trilene Ambassador and local businessman James Fullen. Congratulations not only to Mr. Fullen but to all the contestants who chose to but heads with mother nature in her court.

The Eastland County Bass Club would like to thank everyone who helped in this years fund raising event. \$120.00 was raised this year for the Sept. 9, 1990 Youth Division of the Annual E.C.B.C. Invitational. And the recipient of the \$300.00

Wal-Mart Gift Certificate was Rick Roark from our neighbor city to the west.

Wouldn't it be nice to have a fishing bait that actually arouses fish feeding behavior. Well thanks to the friendly folks at Berkley just such a bait is now available to fisher persons. Berkley researchers in Spirit Lake, Iowa have developed a unique and effective new concept in soft lures. As I'm sure most of you recall James Fullen and myself were on hand during the E.V.F.D. tournament spooling line for all paid contestants. And one of our more popular request during this event was one of the newer additions to the great Trilene line family.

Berkley XT Solar is a line watchers dream come true. Peak fishing periods like early morning, evening and night sometimes make line watching tough. The unique "solar

collector" fluorescent additives actually gather light. Fished under a black light, XT Solar takes on a vivid green neon glow you can see from the rod tip to water's surface. XT Solar's fluorescent green color is tuned to those color wavelengths that are most sensitive and visible to the human eye. And even though quite visible to the angler, I have found it to blend well in rather clear water of about 2 feet visibility.

You ask, does it work?, well why not ask James Fullen this years E.V.F.D. Open Tournament winner. I'm sure he can give you a \$1,500.00 smile and answer since he was using the line watchers line, Trilene's XT Solar, available in 2-30 pound test. Pick some up at your local tackle store, who knows you could be the next big winner whether fun fish or tackling tournaments.

Lake Fork is unchallenged as the big-bass producer of Texas reservoirs, but it has been shunned by some bass tournament organizations because of its special bag and length limits.

One national organization, however, figured out a way to have "slot" fish count in the tournament standings without having to haul them to the weigh-in. Bass'n Gals, a women's bass fishing organization, recently held a major invitational tournament on Fork, where anglers are al-

lowed to keep only three bass per day, and those retained must be either shorter than 14 inches or longer than 21 inches.

In order to have the traditional tournament limit of five fish per contestant, tournament officials allowed participants to measure bass between the 14-21 inch slot size and return them to the lake. At weigh-in, each contestant was allowed to count the two largest slot fish they recorded for the day.

Sugar Farris, founder and president of the 26,000-member organization, said "I believe we are going to see more and more slot-limit rules imposed by fish and game departments around the country, and this kind of measuring system will give anglers a chance to fish slot lakes and still have a five-fish limit for

the tournament." Department officials said the Bass'n Gal Tournament was not the first to use a measurement system, but it may have been the largest. With area lakes heavily flooded few fishing reports are available. Channel cots at Leon continue to bite very well on night crawlers near Chock-O-Block and Staff bridge.

I fear many of our bass fry for the 1990 raising year are lost. A few females have been reported over the past couple of weeks that were cleaned had began absorption of their eggs. For this reason if not many others lets remember its no longer catch and release but catch and live release.

# Emergency Response – Because Your Life May Depend on It

## RECOGNIZING MEDICAL EMERGENCIES

Serious bleeding, unconsciousness, choking and signs of a heart attack are all obvious reasons to call EMS. Broken bones and head, chest, abdominal, or neck/spine injuries present less obvious injuries, but should be treated by EMS for transport to the hospital. Trauma is the leading killer of people age 44 and younger and must be treated promptly.

## CALLING EMS

Try to be calm or have a calmer person make the call – give whatever information the dispatcher asks for. That will probably include the address, a nearby cross street, your name, a call back number, the name of the victim, and what is wrong with the victim. **STAY ON THE LINE** until the dispatcher tells you to hang up – this is important! Then have someone wait out near the street or in the parking lot to direct the emergency medical technicians to the victim. And teach your children how to call EMS. They may need to make the call for you someday.

## FURTHER TRAINING

EMS training and certification has four levels – First Responder Emergency Care Attendant (ECA), Emergency Medical Technician (EMT), EMT-Special Skills, and Paramedic. Contact your local EMS or your Texas Department of Health Public Health Region office for more information on EMS training. Phone numbers and addresses are listed on the back of this brochure.

## EMERGENCY CARE

This is a guide to management of common emergencies in the home, workplace and streets of your community. Using the simple guidelines in this pamphlet may enable you to save the life of an ill or injured person. Your intervention, before EMS arrives, may mean the difference between life and death for a friend, relative or fellow citizen.

## GENERAL EMERGENCY CARE RULES

1. Do not move the person unless they are in a burning car or other immediate danger.
2. Call EMS immediately. Send someone else to call for help if you can, so that you can stay with the person.
3. Do not give the person anything to eat or drink and do not allow them to smoke.
4. Keep the person calm and still.
5. Apply the following emergency care measures until the ambulance arrives.

## HOW TO CHECK BREATHING AND HEART BEAT

If someone is not breathing or their heart is not beating, they may die or suffer permanent damage before EMS arrives. Always check for breathing and heartbeat (pulse) in a medical emergency, and be sure to give that information to EMS when you call.

1. If the person has collapsed, try to wake them up by shaking their shoulder and shouting at them.
    - If they do not respond, gently lay them flat on their back, on a firm surface.
    - Call for help or send someone for help.
    - Gently lift the person's chin with one hand while pushing down on the forehead to tilt the head back.
  2. Put your ear to the person's face and listen for breathing sounds; feel for warm breath on your cheek. Also, watch for rise and fall of chest.
    - If the person is breathing, their heart is beating.
    - If the person is not breathing, begin rescue breathing.
    - Pinch the nose, cover the entire mouth area with your mouth, and blow 2 deep breaths into the mouth. After checking pulse, continue giving two breaths every five to ten seconds.
  3. Check for pulse. Put two fingers on the person's neck in the groove just to the side of the Adam's apple; feel for a pulse for 10 seconds.
    - If you are sure there is no pulse, begin CPR if you are trained.
    - If there is a pulse, but still no breathing, continue rescue breathing.
- Remember: Your care may make the difference between life and death.

## Bites or Stings

- Insects – remove stinger if possible. Apply cold compresses. If there is any reaction, such as breathing problems, call EMS immediately.
- Snakes – keep the person calm, have them sit quietly, avoid excessive movement, call EMS immediately. Try to identify or describe the snake without endangering yourself.

## Bleeding

- Call EMS immediately for serious or spurting bleeding.
- Have the person lie down.
- Apply firm, direct pressure over the wound to stop bleeding. Use the cleanest available pad. Use cloth, handkerchief, clothing, or bare hand if necessary. If pad becomes blood soaked, leave it on and put another one on top of it.
- Maintain the pressure until EMS arrives. Elevate the injured limb.
- Raise the person's feet higher than the head.
- DO NOT use tourniquets.

## Broken Bones

- Keep the injured limb from moving. DO NOT move the person unless they are in immediate danger.
- Apply ice packs to minimize swelling.
- If a broken bone protrudes through the skin, cover it with a dry dressing, but DO NOT try to push it back in. If there is excessive bleeding, use direct pressure over the area to try to stop the bleeding.
- If there is reason to suspect multiple broken bones, or when the neck, back, pelvis, or thigh might be broken, DO NOT attempt to move the person. Call EMS immediately.

## Burns

- Remove the person from danger.
- Extinguish and remove burned clothing.
- Keep the burned person in a comfortable position.
- Raise burned arms or legs higher than the person's heart.
- Cover burned area with a cool, wet cloth, but do not over cool.
- DO NOT break blisters or remove burned skin or clothing.
- DO NOT use butter, ointments, or other home remedies.
- For small or minor burns, immerse in cool water.
- For serious burns, do not treat, but call EMS immediately.
- Keep the patient covered lightly to preserve normal body temperature.

## Choking

If the person can speak or cough, then they are able to breathe, and the airway is not totally blocked.

- Encourage the person to cough out the object. DO NOT interfere with efforts to do so.

If the person cannot speak or breathe, but is still conscious, you must quickly dislodge the object that is blocking the airway by using the Heimlich maneuver if you are trained.

If the person cannot breathe or has already collapsed:

- Call EMS immediately.
- Place the person on their back, turn the head to one side, open the mouth and look for and remove any visible foreign material.
- Use the Heimlich maneuver to dislodge the object if you are trained.

If an infant chokes:

- Place the child face down over your arm; with the baby's head down, rest your arm over your thigh; with the heel of your hand give four quick, hard blows between the shoulders.
- If the object does not dislodge, turn child over, support with your arm resting on your thigh, and with the baby's head down use two fingers to press its breastbone four times.
- Repeat the procedure as often as necessary until EMS arrives.

## Convulsions/Seizures

- Call EMS immediately.
- Protect the person from further injury-remove obstacles.
- Turn the person onto one side.
- If the person has fallen or shows evidence of head injury, they should be assumed to have a broken neck and should be treated accordingly (see Neck or Back Injuries).
- DO NOT force anything into the person's mouth.
- DO NOT try to restrain the convulsive movements.

## Eyes

- For an object in the eye, try to wash it out by flushing the eye with lots of clear water.
- If the object cannot be easily washed out, call EMS.
- If either eye is injured, cover both eyes with a cloth, keep the person quiet, and call EMS immediately.
- DO NOT use drops or ointments.
- For exposure to chemicals, gently flush eyes with clear water. Continue flushing until EMS arrives.

## Fainting/Dizziness

- If a person reports "feeling faint," have the person lie down on their back until feeling better. Raise the person's feet higher than the head.
- Check breathing and heartbeat.
- Apply cold compresses to the person's forehead.
- If fainting is associated with chest pains, convulsions, or severe headache, or if it lasts more than one or two minutes, call EMS immediately.

Fainting is a relatively common problem, but it may be caused by a serious condition.

## Head Injuries

- Call EMS immediately.
  - DO NOT move the person until EMS arrives.
  - Severe, deep cuts should not be cleaned, cover with a clean cloth.
- DO NOT apply heavy pressure to bleeding areas.

## Heart Attack

The person may have pain or feel very heavy pressure in the chest area or in the jaw, shoulder and arms. The person may have a feeling of indigestion. They may sweat, vomit, or have trouble breathing.

- DO NOT wait to see if the pain/discomfort goes away.
- Call EMS immediately. Assure them that help is on the way, and do not leave them.
- Have the person sit or recline, whatever is most comfortable for them.
- Make the person as comfortable as possible.
- Loosen the clothing at neck, chest and waist.
- Keep the person warm, but not hot.
- If the person suddenly collapses and loses consciousness, try to awaken them. If the person cannot be awakened, and if there is no breathing and no pulse in the neck, begin CPR if you are trained.

## Neck or Back Injuries

- Call EMS immediately.
- DO NOT move the person at all unless absolutely necessary to save their life.
- DO NOT prop up the person's head.

## Poisoning/overdose

- Call EMS immediately.
- Then call the Poison Control Center and describe the product, the amount swallowed, and the time it was taken.
- Give water or milk to someone who has ingested a poison, unless the person is unconscious or having convulsions.
- Look inside the person's mouth for burns that might indicate the ingestion of an acid or alkali. Also, smell the person's breath to see if it smells like a petroleum product (gasoline or kerosene). If either sign is present, DO NOT induce vomiting.
- Loosen clothing at the person's neck and waist.
- Keep the person quiet and warm.
- Take the container of the suspected poison with you on the ambulance. Every household should have syrup of ipecac on hand. The poison center will tell you when to use it.

## Unconsciousness

- Call EMS immediately.
- Check for breathing and a heartbeat.
- If the person cannot be roused, but is breathing well and has a good pulse, they should be placed on their side unless you suspect a neck injury.
- If there is no breathing and no pulse in the neck, begin CPR if you are trained.
- If drug overdose or poison is suspected, the container of the suspected toxin should be taken with the patient on the ambulance.
- DO NOT give the person anything to drink.
