David Pettigrew & Jana Muller Awarded Rotary Scholarships

David Pettigrew and Jana Muller have been named recipients of the CISCO ROTARY CLUB CITIZENSHIP AWARDS for 1990, according to an announcement by Eris Ritchie, Chairman of the annual awards program.

The two Cisco High School graduating seniors were chosen by a selected committee from the Cisco High School faculty. The award is based on meritorious conduct in some dozen traits of good citizenship as demonstrated by the two during their four years at CHS.

David and Jana will be honored at the Rotary Club's annual Citizenship Awards Luncheon on Thursday, May 17, at 12 noon at Traditions Restaurant. Speaker for the occasion will be Peggy Carpenter, News Director for Television Station KTXS in Abilene, and former journalist with the Abilene Reporter-News.

David is the son of Rev. and Mrs. Gary Pettigrew of Cisco. While a student at Cisco High, he has participated in band, qualifying for the state contest, as well as choir, senior play, junior coronation, library staff, Drama Club, National Honor Society, Key Club, French Club, and Physics Club. He was designated as one of the "Loboes with Class," and he received the Chamber of Commerce Award for best academic grades for a senior young man. In University Scholastic League activities, he was in All-Region Choir and qualified for Regional Solo and Ensemble Contest in choir. He was also in U.I.L. Debate and Persuasive Speaking. Additionally, David was honored by selection to "Who's Who Among American High School Students."

Jana is the daughter of Dr. and Mrs. John Muller of Cisco. She has received numerous honors and designations during her four years as a CHS coed. She has served as a class officer, has been chosen as class favorite, and was a nominee for Queen Lobo, Homecoming Queen, and Band Sweetheart. Like

David, she also was a "Lobo with Class" and recipient of the Chamber of Commerce Award for academic excellence. Jana was a National Merit finalist and also selected for "Who's Who Among American High School Students." Additionally, she has participated in band, flag corps, junior coronation, senior play, student council (Vice-President the year), National Honor Society, choir, basketball, cross country, track, tennis, Lobo Howl Staff, French Club, Physics Club, Pre-Calculus Club, and Literary Club. In U.I.L. Academic competition, she has been in all levels of competition in Calculator and Literary Criticism, and has been district and regional champion in both events. In Literary Criticism she placed 4th at state last year. In Calculator she was 5th in state in '89, and at last week's state meet in Austin she placed 3rd.

The Citizenship Awards Program is an annual project of the Cisco Rotary Club, begun in 1966. Mr. Ritchie was president of the club at that time, and he has been chairman of the program each year since. Quite a number of well known speakers have been featured at the annual luncheon, including two congressmen, a lieutenant governor, the Texas Attorney General, state senators and representatives, state and county judges, several university presidents, and well-known television newsmen. Last year's address was given by Mary Scott Nabers, State Commissioner of the TEC.

New Chief Of Police Hired; Will Assume Duties June 4

Douglas Fairbanks of El Paso has been hired as Cisco Chief of Police, according to an announcement by Michael Moore, Cisco City Manager.

Mr. Fairbanks will assume his duties here Monday, June 4.

He served for over 22 years with the El Paso Police Department in various duties and responsibilities, Mr. Moore said. These duties included patrol officer in the traffic division, supervisor in the traffic division and in the patrol division. He also served as a detective and was a supervisor in the forgery and theft division.

Mr. Fairbanks was instrumental in setting up the El Paso Police Department Crisis Management Team and served as its commander. The team was organized to handle potential suicides, hostage situations and other crisis.

The new chief of police is 44 years old and he and his wife are the parents of three children. The oldest, Doug Jr., is a police officer with the

El Paso Police Department. Walter is serving with the U.S. Coast Guard, and Jennifer will be a freshman at Cisco High School next fall.

Mr. Fairbanks has an advanced certificate in law enforcement and received an associate degree in law enforcement from El Paso Community College.

In announcing the hiring of Mr. Fairbanks, City Manager Moore said, "Mr. Fairbanks comes highly recom-

mended by everybody who knew him in the El Paso area. They couldn't recommend him highly enough. He and his wife have visited Cisco and look forward to their move here. They like Cisco very much."

The position of Cisco Chief of Police became open with the resignation of Billy Rains a few months ago. Mr. Rains is attending the Department of Public Safety School in Austin. Larry Jernigan has been interim chief.

City Council Discusses Changes In Garbage Pick Up & Landfill

In response to substantial increasing costs in operating the municipal landfill due to new state and federal environmental regulations and escalating maintenance requirements, the City Council discussed at length and approved on first reading an amended ordinance regarding garbage pick up and landfill operations at their meeting on Tuesday, May 8. In presenting the amended ordinance, City Manager Mike Moore explained "The ordinance is divided into two basic sections with the first part covering garbage pick up requirements and establishing sanitation rates, while the second part covers the landfill operations and user charges. It is the landfill portion that has to be substantially revised."

As a prime example of how new state and federal regulations have already affected the cost of landfill operations, Moore stated that last fiscal year the City had to pay \$466 to the Texas Health Department as its annual fee for inspections. Now, under the new regulations, the City must pay on a quarterly basis fifty cents per ton for all garbage brought into the landfill. This has resulted in the City already paying over \$1,600 to the state in just the first six months of the current fiscal year. The City Manager estimates that the city's total annual fee will exceed \$2,600 for 1989-90.

Proposed amendments to the first part of the ordinance that deals with

sanitation pick up are relatively minor with only a very few commercial customers being effected by the revisions. Moore indicated that any and all sanitation customers that may be effected by the amended ordinance will be contacted by individual letter. However, to help make the landfill operate more cost-efficiently and to be able to better comply with new solid waste disposal requirements, three significant changes are being proposed in the landfill section of the ordinance.

If approved, the following changes for use of the landfill will become effective July 1st. First, all users of the landfill will be required to pay an entrance/user fee. For city sanitation customers, the rates will be \$1.00 per load for an automobile and \$2.00 per load for a standard pickup bed. Loads larger than a standard pickup bed will be charged the standard commercial, non-resident rates. However, because the City does not bury limbs and brush now, there will be no charge to resident sanitation customers for brush, limbs or grass trimmings.

The second major revision to the ordinance is that all landfill users, whether a resident sanitation customer or not, who are hauling debris or trash for hire or for a commercial establishment, will be charged the established commercial rates. And finally, the proposed ordinance increases the rates for non-resident,

commercial users to bring them more in line actual costs.

In their discussion, the City Council realized that landfill operations, uses and costs are in a difficult state of transition now, with the end result undoubtedly being the closing of the City's existing landfill because it will simply become cost-prohibitive to operate. However, it was the consensus of the Council that as long as we must operate this landfill, these additional costs should be passed on to the actual users of the service, instead of raising everyone's sanitation rates at this time. And in view of the prohibitive and extremely costly solid waste disposal regulations being proposed by the Environmental Protection Agency and that are expected to come into force by the end of this summer, the Council is continuing to study the alternatives of participating in a regional landfill or contract with a private company for sanitation services as most small cities have already done.

The proposed amended ordinance will be considered by the City Council for its second and final reading at their meeting on May 22.

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Clean Properties To Help Control Mosquito Problem

As you know the "mosquito season" is upon us and the muchly needed rain Cisco has received will result in an infestation of mosquitoes. There are several things that can be done to reduce the mosquito infestation. Some of the things that can be done around your home and community are keeping the weeds and grass cut and properly disposing of all trash, litter and debris. Everyone needs to look at their property and see how they can clean it up to make a safe, clean and attractive community in which to live and work. The City has already started a program of regularly "fogging" to help control mosquitoes, and plans to continue

the program as long as possible throughout the summer. Also, the City is now in the process of sending out letters to people with high grass, weeds, trash, junk and debris. If these conditions exist, thereby creating health and safety hazards, the City is asking the property owner/occupant to be responsible for cleaning it up. Those failing to comply will be cited to Municipal Court, which, upon conviction, could result in a fine of up to \$1,000 per day of violation. Please help keep Cisco a clean and attractive community by mowing regularly and cleaning up and disposing of unsightly and unsanitary debris.

Cisco AARP To Meet On Thursday, May 17

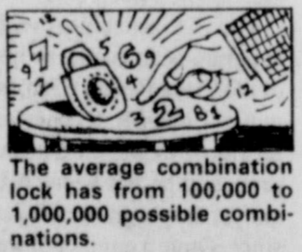

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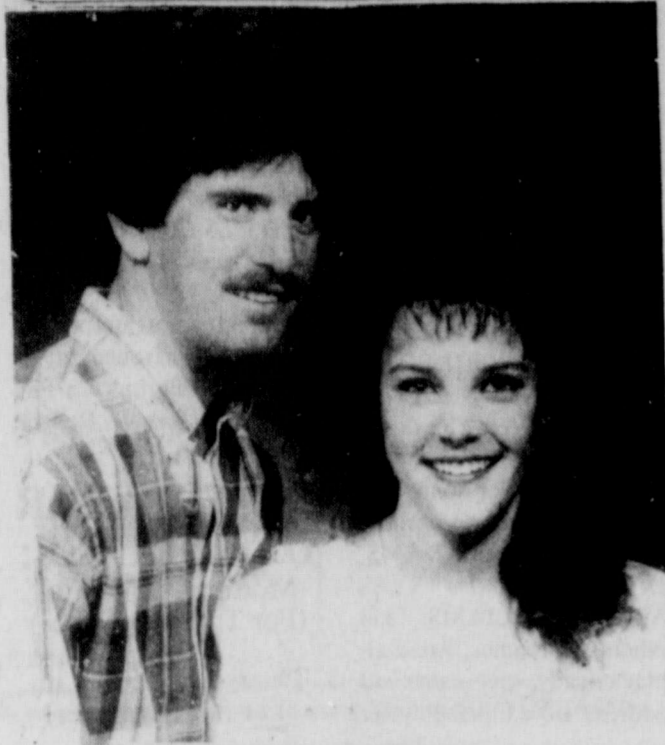

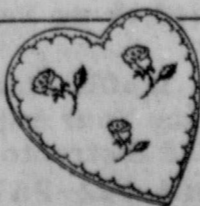

At times my mother would look up from her work and quietly share a thought. Even now as I recall them, I find comfort, direction and encouragement. One such thought comes to my mind. It is relevant to our day. "Everything changes," my mother told me. "Someday you will more fully understand."

My mother was right. Gone are the days of constantly

peeling potatoes, ironing starched shirts, and trudging to school on foot.

"Yes, mother, I understand. You possessed such modesty. You were unaware that you gave freely of yourself. Everything in this world changes, mother. But you failed to realize as the things of this world change that one thing never changes, and that is a mother's love."

"Because of your love, I'll be seeing you again. Look for me! I'm coming."

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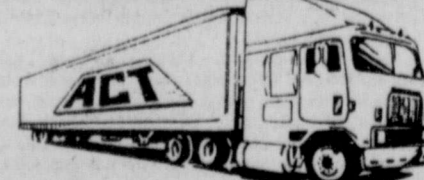

Fishing Outdoors

By Terry L. Wilson

'A ROD FOR EVERY JOB'

Have you ever wondered why a tournament fisherman has eight, ten or even 12 rigged rods in the boat? Well there's a dozen reasons. Just as a serious golfer wouldn't try to drive with a putter or putt with a driver, a serious

fisherman wouldn't try to flip with an ultra light spinning outfit. If the fish are tight to cover, a flipping stick and technique allows the angler to make a pinpoint presentation. The length and heft of a flipping stick and heavy line allows the angler to control fish and

quickly work them from heavy cover.

Why not use a flipping stick all the time? Well, if the fish are spooky or in ultra clear water or reacting to cold front conditions, the angler needs a much more fine tuned presentation. A small lure and light line may be the only way to overcome those conditions. A light or even ultra-light spinning rig would best fit the bill.

What about active, aggressively feeding fish? A me-

dius action baitcast outfit would allow you to cast and retrieve a fast moving crankbait. You catch a few fish, but the action slows. Switching to a medium heavy baitcast outfit you begin throwing a surface buzzy bait. The fish are swirling at the bait but sticking short. Time to switch back to a medium outfit and a plastic worm to quickly reach that same fish with pinpoint accuracy. If you take the time to re-tie the other medium weight outfit, the fish will have probably changed location. The extra rigged medium outfit with a different lure presentation was the answer, the right tool for the job.

A few months back I reported to you that the Honey Hole BCA Top Six event would be held at Lake Granbury in October of 1990. Well it appears the last Texas pressure factor has once again deprived central and West Texas anglers a break. Word from Honey Hole officials is that due to the possibility of there being 400 boats at this year's event, it will be moved to Lake Whitney. The key word here is 'possibility,' officials have not count of entries as of yet to base this on. And even if 400 boats did show up, Granbury stretches for many miles and I feel could host this number. Sure there would be some congestion, but remember even Sam Rayburn had some congested areas last year. If you feel this event should be staged at the original site of Granbury, please write or call Honey Hole officials and let them know. Only if West Texas anglers begin pulling together can we gain the ear of the fishing industry and the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

June 23 and 24 are the dates set for the annual Breckenridge Big Bass Classic at Hubbard Creek Lake. This

year's event promises to be the biggest and best yet with first place guaranteed \$7,500; 2nd \$1,750; 3rd \$1,000, Big Bass Sunday \$1,000 and hourly big bass of \$75. Remember the more entries the more the prize money will increase.

- People who choose direct deposit must be sure to keep Social Security informed of their current address. This

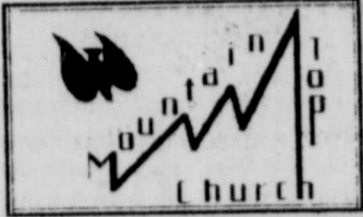

Relaxation techniques can improve glucose tolerance in diabetics, researchers at Duke University Medical Center found. Results were better than with drugs and education alone.

Women who are overweight are at greater risk of developing gallstones, according to a study reported in the New England Journal of Medicine. Risk can be six times greater for the obese female than a slim one.

A modest amount of sugar added to the diet of a Type 1 diabetic seems to have no negative effect, say researchers at the University of Illinois in Peoria.

Australian researchers are working on a natural sunscreen made by algae that live in coral. Chemical copy is expected to be effective and non-irritating.

Taking multivitamin pills early in pregnancy sharply reduces the risk of having a baby with serious neurological defects according to a study at Boston University's Center for Human Genetics. The study recommends multivitamins containing folic acid for at least the first six weeks of pregnancy.

Alli McCoy, niece of the bride, presided at the registry table.

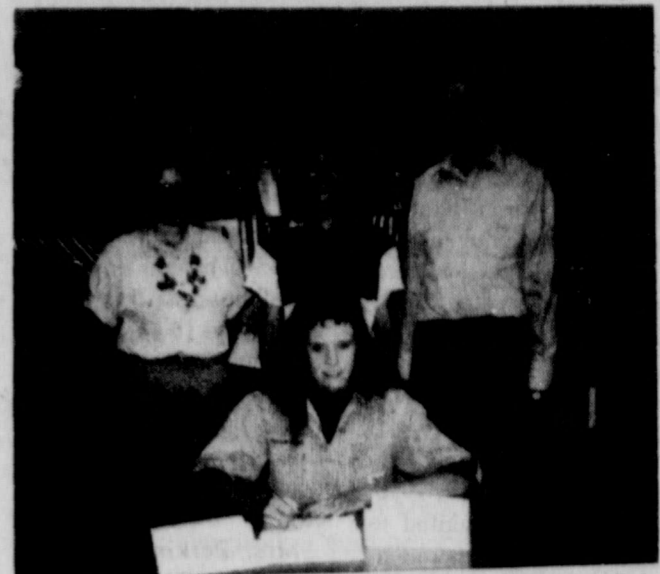

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Eastland County Declared Disaster Area; Now Eligible For Assistance

Eastland County and eleven more Texas counties have been added to the original four counties - Brown, Comanche, Erath and Parker - which have been approved for Disaster Assistance by the Texas Division of Emergency Management and Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). The Federal Agency released this announcement May 5 with the approval of President George Bush.

The time period for which disaster assistance is available has also been enlarged, and will cover damages suffered beginning on April 15. Residents and businesses damaged by severe storms, flooding and tornados occurring on April 15 and after may apply for assistance that includes temporary housing, low interest loans or grants. Assistance has also been approved for repair and replacement of publically owned facilities such as roads, buildings, bridges and equipment.

In an effort to speed relief to the people in the 16 counties approved for disaster assistance, a toll-free telephone number 1-800-782-6661 will be operational 8 a.m. - 6 p.m. daily until further notice, adds Graham Nance, appointed Federal Coordinating officer.

County Judge Scott Bailey received word on the declaration of Eastland County from the office of Senator Phil Gramm in Washington, D.C. This designation of the county as a disaster area followed a request from the Commissioners Court for funds to help repair rural roads and bridges. These were severely damaged by heavy rains during the last week in April and the days of May 1 and 2. The Commissioners estimated that it would take around \$698,000 to repair the county roads and bridges.

On Thursday, May 10 Judge Bailey said that Federal Disaster Teams were

currently looking over the situation in the county, and that disaster money was expected to be available shortly. Other counties besides

Eastland in the latest declaration were Palo Pinto, Lime-stone, Bosque, Wharton, Denton, Wise, Collin, Tarrant, Dallas, Cook and Hill.

Emergency Road Repair Money From Soil Conservation Service

The Soil Conservation Service may furnish additional Federal Assistance to Eastland County for emergency work on county roads and bridges.

This was the word at an Emergency Called Meeting of the Eastland County Commissioners on Tuesday, May 8. The Commissioners discussed emergency road and bridge repair with Ron Bailey of the Soil Conservation Service in Eastland, and Gary Batte of Brownwood, Area Supervisor of the Soil Conservation Service.

The Commissioners told these A.S.C.S. directors that extensive damage had occurred to rural roads, especially in the southeast part of the County, Pct. 2. Norman Christian, Commissioner of that Precinct, had pictures with him of caved-in roads and huge washes across roads. Some families in his area that been isolated during the storms last week, and can barley get out now.

Other Commissioners reported damaged bridges and roads in bad shape.

Gary Batte told the Court there was a good chance that the county could get A.S.C.S. funds for emergency repairs, especially on mail routes, school bus routes and truck routes. He said this money could be used for temporary by-passes, for rock to fill up big washes, and other emergency purposes. He asked each Commissioner to identify his needs and estimate the costs.

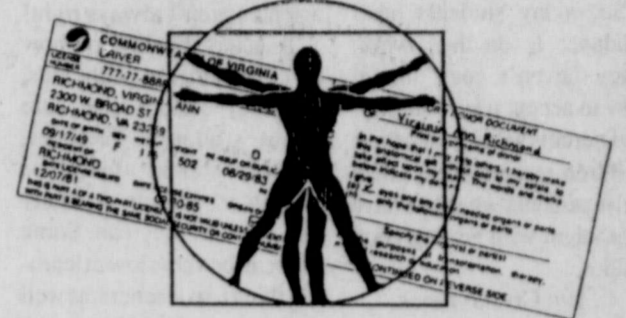
L.T. Owen, Commissioner of Pct. 3, said he had already made most emergency repairs

in his Precinct, so didn't think this program would do much good. His work now would involve more permanent type of road building.

The other commissioners spent part of the afternoon working on estimates.

Two days later, on Thursday, May 10, Judge Bailey said it looked as if things were moving swiftly in the A.S.C.S. Emergency Department. He said he felt certain the County would get at least \$100,000 from this office on emergency repairs.
