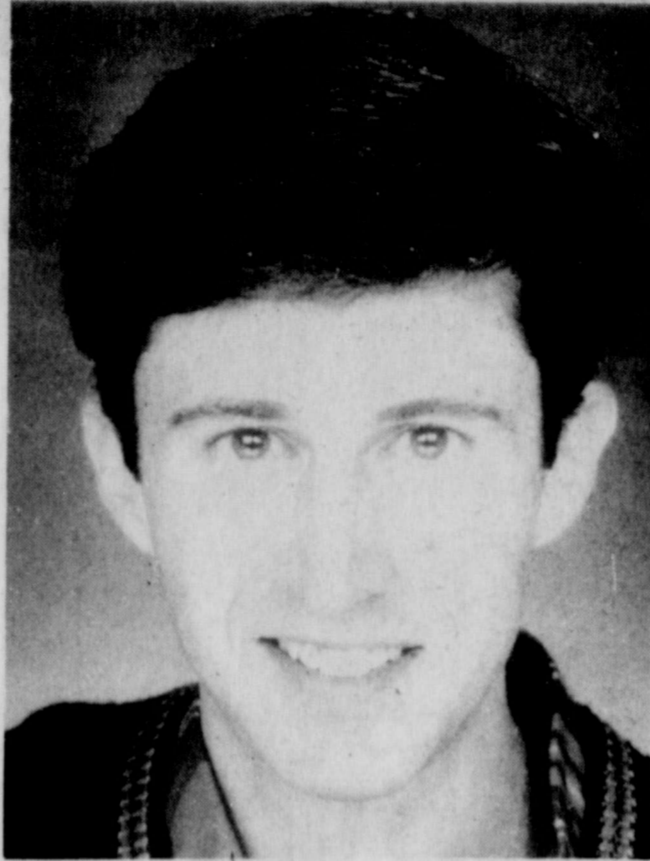

## Scott Taylor Returns For Another Summer

After eight months in the Big Apple, local dinner theatre favorite, Scott Taylor, was filled with excitement as his plane landed at DFW last week. "Even though I had been at a party in Manhattan just the night before with Liza Minelli and Kim Basinger, I looked out the window and saw that Dallas skyline and could hardly wait to get back to Cisco."

Area theatre goers will remember Taylor for his many and varied appearances over the last five years. "Although I first worked with Carroll and Tom in the summer of 1986, I first met them when Carroll was directing her graduate project at Texas Tech in the summer of 1985. Carroll was working with a university production of THE MIKADO with which I was involved and I would leave those rehearsals and sit in on her rehearsals of THE DINING ROOM. I watched her and Tom make magical things happen on a shoestring and knew that I was in the presence of great talent. We three have been fast friends ever since."

Taylor was musical director for THE QUILTERS, played Jonathan Harker in COUNT DRACULA, and Rooster in ANNIE in the summer of 1986. He returned two summers later to play Lun Tha in THE KING AND I. In the summer of 1989, just after graduating from Texas Tech University with a degree in music and theatre and with a teaching certificate in theatre education, Taylor arrived in Cisco as choreographer and musical director for THE SOUND OF MUSIC, played Paul Bratter in BAREFOOT IN THE PARK and was musical director and choreographer for OLIVER!

After a brief respite from theatre, Scott left Texas and went to give "it a whirl" in New York. "I was more fortunate than most, I suppose. My mother had a life-long friend who lived in a suburb who let me stay with the family while I looked for a place to live. Finding housing in New York is discouraging and frightening. The same goes for finding a job.

Jana Muller of Cisco has been awarded a Merit Scholarship by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation. She

was one of 2,500 winners announced.

The college-sponsored scholarships provide between \$250 and \$2,000 for each year of undergraduate study. Winners were chosen by officials of the sponsor institution from merit program finalists who will attend that college.

The daughter of Dr. and Mrs. John Muller, Jana plans to begin studying at Texas A&M University for a career in medicine. She is valedictorian of the 1990 graduating class of Cisco High School, and a member of National Honor Society, Student Council, Physics Club and Pre-Calculus Club. She finished second in the state in the Class 2A UIL calculator applications contest, and has competed in the state UIL literary criticism contest.

More than one million students in over 19,000 U.S. high schools entered the 1990 Merit Program by taking the 1988 Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test, which served as an initial screen of the large volume of participants. In the fall of 1989, about half of one percent of graduating seniors in every state were designated semifinalists, forming a pool of some 15,000 able students who had an opportunity to advance in this year's competition. Every semifinalist had to become a finalist in order to be considered for a Merit Scholarship.

Requirements for finalist standing included meeting extremely high academic standards, being endorsed and recommended by a school official, confirming earlier test performance on a second test, and providing information about activities, interests, and educational goals. All Merit Scholars are chosen from the finalist group on the basis of their exceptional abilities and accomplishments, and winners are candidates judged to have the strongest credentials and greatest potential for success in rigorous college studies.

"We have come from a time when artists were the core of Society to where they are often on the fringes of Society, Art plays a minimal part in modern life," he said.

Why Cisco at this time? Why leave New York just when things were on a roll? Taylor contemplated this question and replied "Carol and Tom were giving me an opportunity to participate in this summer's season in a larger, more demanding manner than ever before. Taylor will be seen in **LITTLE SHOP OF HORRORS** as Seymour, will direct **BROADWAY MAGIC**, an original composition, and appear as Cornelius Hackl in **HELLO, DOLLY!** with Donna and Robert DeLuca, two more of "my favorite people".

**Plaque Is Guilty**

Q. What is the number one cause of tooth decay?  
A. The major cause of decay is a sticky, filmy substance known as plaque. Because our mouths harbor bacteria, almost everyone suffers from some degree of plaque build-up throughout their lives. The plaque clings to the enamel of the teeth, and when food particles and sugar are fermented by the bacteria, they form an acid. This acid, if not removed regularly, will cause a pit to form. Then more bacteria accumulate, and eventually the pit becomes a hole that allows bacteria to invade the interior of a tooth. Thus, a cavity is born. The only way to stop this destruction is to remove the villain, plaque.

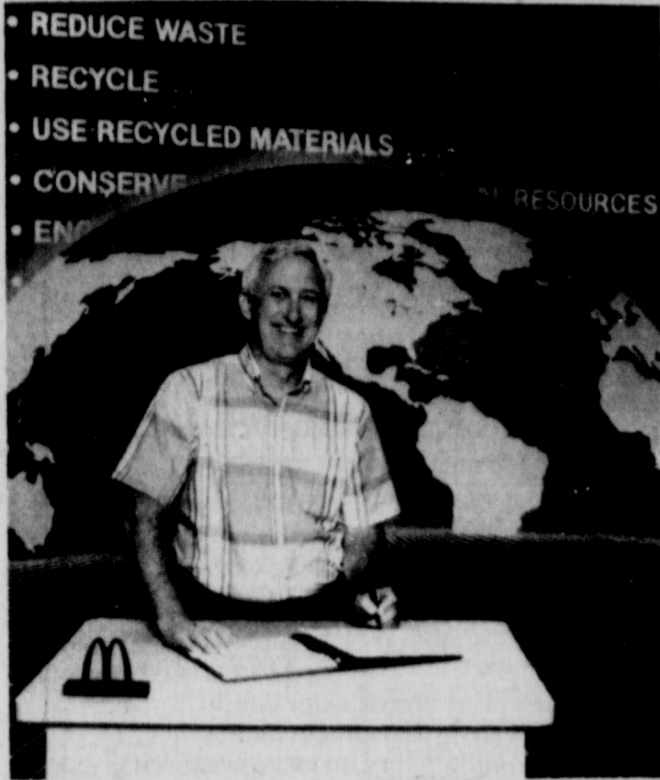
**A Thought For The Day....**

## Taxation Without Representation

Unfortunately, the power to tax gives the power to control, and even more unfortunately, the Legislative branches of our State and Federal governments have become drunk on this power. ## Pharmacy Topics

Chest pain is not the only indication of a heart attack in people at high risk. Doctors at the University of California/Los Angeles found that any unusual pain -- in the jaw, teeth, neck, wherever, may be a warning for high risk people.

New Recommended Dietary Allowances have been announced by the National Academy of Science's Food and Nutrition Board. They call for more iron for women, more calcium for men and women up to age 24, more vitamin C for smokers, and less sodium for everyone.

Experimental vaccine uses cowpox virus together with strains of melanoma cells to fight cancer recurrence in people who've had melanomas. Testing is coordinated at M. D. Anderson Cancer Center and six other centers are involved.

Lyme disease continues to spread across the country, and more people are using insect repellents to ward off the ticks that carry the disease. However, the products should be used strictly according to directions to avoid toxic reactions, especially among youngsters.

### Girl Scout Resident Camp Is Not Just For Girl Scout

As summer approaches, both parents and children will be thinking about what to do with the long school vacation time. Heart of Texas Girl Scout Council, which covers 19 counties in Central Texas,

operates Camp Wood Lake, on Lake Brownwood, as a Resident Camp Program for girls ages 7 through 17 during the summer months. Program opportunities cover a wide variety of activities such as: campcraft skills, the arts, crafts, hiking, stargazing, nature exploration, swimming, sailing, canoeing and singing. One-week sessions offer girls a chance to try a little bit of almost everything at camp, while two-week sessions are more specialized. Regardless of the length of the session, activities are designed so that the girls have lots of fun, while learning skills they might not have the opportunity to develop outside of the camp setting.

Some of our specialty sessions include: "Reach For The Stars," in which girls explore the arts, "Dreamers," in which girls further their campcraft skills, "Make Your Own Magic," in which girls explore a variety of areas including basic canoeing, "Outdoor Adventurers," in which girls learn about Backpacking and advanced campcraft skills, and "Paddles and Sails," in which girls learn how to canoe, sail, and about water safety on a lake. Each of these specialty units is designed for a specific age

Younger girls (grades 1-3) live in cabins with 5 to 6 girls per cabin, while older girls (grades 4-11) live in tents with 2 to 4 girls per tent. The cabins and tents are grouped into units which hold 14 to 30 girls each. Each unit has a unit building, shower and toilet facilities with electricity. A Junior Olympic-sized pool is used for swimming lessons as well as free-swim activities for each girl who attends camp. Nearby hiking trails provide opportunity for nature exploration and hiking.

The Camp Staff are screened carefully to ensure the best people available are working with the girls. The Staff are selected based on skills, maturity and ability to relate to children. An overall ratio of one program staff member per six girls is maintained to ensure safety and adequate supervision for the campers. Our Co-Directors for 1990 are Pam Lindsay and

Kay Hutton. Mrs. Lindsay operates a day care facility for the Cooperative Alternative Program in Coleman County. Ms. Hutton is Program Services Director for Heart of Texas Girl Scouts, a position she has held for five years. Both grew up in Girl Scouting, are experienced campers and administrators, and share a love the outdoors and working with children.

Meals are served family-style in a centralized dining hall. The camp is inspected by the Brown County Health Department and the State of Texas to ensure that regulations regarding safe operations are maintained. Heart of Texas Girl Scout Council is committed to quality program for all of its camping operations, and resident camp is no exception. Summer camp is an experience your daughter will remember for a lifetime!

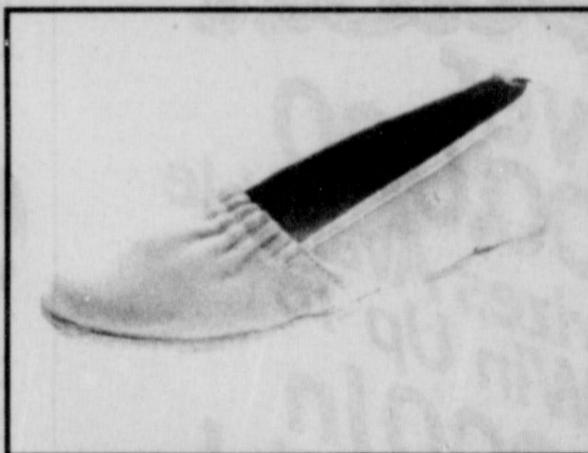

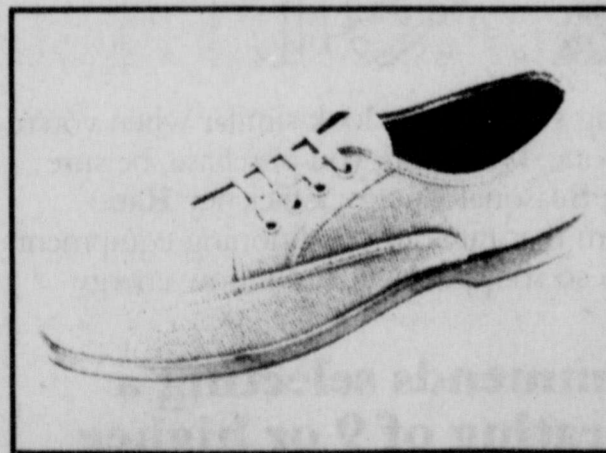

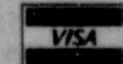
