# **Blood Drive Set At Hospital Wednesday**

The Cisco Blood Drive has been set for Wednesday, June 6, at E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital. A team of laboratory technicians from Meek Blood Bank of Hendrick Medical Center of Abilene will be present from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. and from 2 until 6

In order to insure an adequate blood supply and to gradually reduce the Cisco blood bank's debt, it is mandatory for every Cisco citizen's effort in this most worthwhile effort.

Due to Federal Drug Administration legislation, there are no longer "paid" donors, therefore, we must depend on voluntary blood donations.

Blood donors whould be aware of the following when preparing to give blood:

1. All donors must be age 18 or older; there is no age limit, only that each donor is heathfully able to give blood.

2. Blood donors should eat normally, and are encouraged to do so before giving blood.

3. No medication should be taken 18 hours prior to donating blood, however no

# **Legal Notices**

An Ordinance of the City of Cisco, Texas amending Chapter 10 "Garbage and Trash" of the City's Code of Ordinances; and establishing an effective date.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS THAT: PART I:

ARTICLE I. IN **GENERAL** 

Sec. 10-1 Prohibited deposits of trash, garbage, etc.

It shall be unlawful for any person to throw, place or deposit in any street, alley, public way, lot or ground, or in any gutter, ditch or basin, or near or in any inhibited place, any trash, garbage, filth, or other waste substance or any substance exhaling noxious odors. Such deposits shall be considered a public

nuisance. ARTICLE II. COLLEC-TIONS

Sec. 10-16. Type, size of

(a) Containers for residential collection shall be plastic

bags. (b) Containers for commercial collection shall be plastic bags, impermeable containers not in excess of thirty (30) gallons, or City approved garbage bins.

Sec. 10-17 Preparation of boxes and brush for collec-

In order to be collected, boxes shall be broken up and brush shall be neatly piled in bundles that can be easily handled by one person and stacked by the curb.

Sec. 10-18. Master meter customers to provide central collection bins.

Multiple residential sanitation customers who are served by a master water meter (i.e. apartments, mobile home parks) shall provide a central collection bin or wire cage in appropriate locations to serve all tenants."

Property owners shall be responsible to maintain said trash bin in good repair, and keep it in a clean and sanitary

square feet..... 5.00 Sec. 10-20. Charges to be part of water and sewer bill-

Monthly charges for solid waste removal shall be billed with water and sewer charges which shall be paid as a single, inseparable bill.

Sec. 10-21. Frequency of collections.

Frequency of solid waste collection for residential, public and commercial customers, shall be determined by the City Manager, with the approval of the City Council through minute action.

ARTICLE III. CITY LANDFILL

Sec. 10-36. Hours of op-

(a) The hours of operation of the City Landfill shall be established, amended and maintained by the City Manager at the direction of the City Council. Said hours of operation shall be posted and available to the general pub-

(b) The City Manager shall be authorized to revise the hours that the sanitary landfill is open to the public to accommodate later hours of usage during daylight savings

(c) the sanitary landfill may be closed by direction of the City Manager, or his representative, due to unsafe conditions resulting from inclement weather or other conditions that may create a hazardous or unacceptable situation and during normal City

holidays.

Sec. 10-37. Rates (a) Any City residential sanitation customers or outof-town metered water customers of the City may use the City Landfill at the following rates for the disposing of residential refuse during the hours the landfill is open to the public by presenting to the gatekeeper the water bill stub from the previous month indicating a sanitation charge or an out-of-town surcharge

and a valid driver's license. (1) For passenger cars or any vehicle smaller than a pickup truck, the charge shall be one dollar (\$1.00) per load.

(2) For pickup trucks, up to and including three-quarter (3/4) ton with standard bed, single axle trailers, vans, panel trucks or passenger vehicles with interior space and trunk space equivalent to a pickup truck, the charge shall be two dollars (\$2.00) per load.

(3) Limbs, brush and/or grass trimmings for users as indicated in paragraph (a) above, no charge. (To qualify, grass trimmings in plastic bags or other containers must be emptied and all containers disposed of properly.)

(4) Vehicles or trailers larger than indicated in paragraph (1) and (2) shall be charged the rates as established in subsection (d) of this

(b) Any resident of the City who is not paying a monthly sanitation charge or any individual who is leasing or renting property within the City for residential purposes and not paying a sanitation charge, may utilize the landfill in the same manner and cost as City residential customers upon the payment of a charge of ten dollars (\$10.00) per month. All such customers shall be billed quarterly, and the minimum payment shall be for three (3) months. Payment shall be prorated on the first quarter only and shall be nonrefundable.

(c) All individuals using the landfill and hauling trash, debris, etc. for hire, or from or for commercial establishments, whether City residents or not, shall pay the commercial rates established in subsection (d).

(d) Except for the users established in subsections (a) and (b), the following schedule of fees and rates shall be charged users of the sanitary landfill:

(1) For passenger cars or any vehicle smaller than a pickup truck, the charge shall be three dollars (\$3.00) per

(2) For pickup trucks, up to and including three-quarters (3/4) ton with standard bed. single axle trailers, vans, panel trucks or passenger vehicles with interior space and trunk space equivalent to a pickup truck, the charge shall be five dollars (\$5.00) per load.

(3) For trucks or trailers containing 3 to 6 yards, the charge shall be twelve dollars (\$12.00) per load.

(4) For trucks or trailers containing 6 to 11 yards, the charge shall be fifteen dollars (\$15.00) per load.

(5) For trucks or trailers containing containing 12 to 20 yards, the charge shall be twenty dollars (\$20.00) per load.

(6) For compactor trucks, twenty (20) cubic yards or less, the charge shall be fifty dollars (\$50.00) per load.

(7) For compactor trucks, between twenty-one (21) and thirty-nine (39) cubic yards, the charge shall be seventyfive dollars (\$75.00).

(8) For compactor trucks, forty (40) cubic yards or larger, the charge shall be one hundred dollars (\$100.00).

(9) Charges for vehicles not specifically indicated above will be at a rate set by the City

(e) The amounts prescribed in this section as landfill rates shall be charged and collected per load from vehicles not owned or operated by the City for dumping refuse at the sanitary landfill, and the charges shall be paid in legal tender prior to the dumping of the refuse, unless otherwise directed by the City Manager.

Sec. 10-38. Scavenging, loitering prohibited.

(a) It shall be unlawful for any person, without first obtaining permission from the City Manager, to scavenge or carry off waste, garbage, refuse, or any other items or materials from the sanitary landfill so as to violate the regulations and rules of the Texas Department of Health.

(b) It shall be unlawful for any person to loiter at the City's sanitary landfill unless unloading garbage or refuse. Sec. 10-39. Revisions.

Except for solid waste collection fees and landfill user charges, the City Manager shall have the authority to revise the rules, regulations, operations and procedures of the City's solid waste collection and landfill uses within the parameters of this ordinance to comply with state regulatory requirements and promote efficiency in the operation of the indicated

services.

PART II: Upon final Council approval, this ordinance shall become effective on July 1,

# **Gordon Spot**

#### By DeMarquis Gordon, County Agent-

We have had a number of calls this spring concerning problems with fleas in and around the home. The unusually wet spring is causing rapid increases in flea populations, which were already larger than usual because so many survived the winter.

Fleas tend to be more of an itching nuisance than threat to human health, primarily because the worst diseases they carried have been cradicated.

The chief sources of flea infestation in the home are family pets, but once indoors fleas thrive in floor cracks, carpets, unholstered furniture and pet bedding. Fleas, of course, are abundant outside; larvae burrow into the top surface of the soil.

If flea problems are occurring in the house, the yard, and on the pets, all three must be treated at the same time.

Use only approved products for treating animals. Dusts are preferred because they are generally effective may be needed about three

longer. The newer products containing an insect growth regulator can reduce subsequent egg and larval production and can be applied directly to the animal.

Outdoors, treat areas that pets frequent. Use only approved products to thoroughly cover and saturate soil and grass areas. Make sure that application equipment is carefully calibrated to measure

dosages exactly. In the house, thoroughly vacuum or sweep carpets, rugs, furniture, cracks and crevices. Be sure to reach under furniture and along baseboards. Discard the vacuum bag afterwards.

Use a coarse spray (large droplets) in treating likely infested areas. It is always more effective to treat all carpets, furniture and baseboards at one time. After spraying, use total-release acrosal applications to reduce adult fleas.

# Roads Again A Topic At **Commissioners Court**

damage from recent flooding were again discussed at the County Commissioners Court meeting Tuesday, May 29.

At the meeting May 14 R.E. King of the Nimrod/Sabanno area of Pct. 3 told the Court that a county road and his driveway were flooded with water diverted from a Big M Oil Company lease.

On Tuesday Miles Moore of the Big M Company and Hershell Wagley, consultant and Dozer Co. operator, came to Court to review the matter.

Moore told the Commissioners that he had not divereted the water from his lease - that he had built two tanks and spent a lot of money to keep the area from flooding.

He stated there were several things he felt caused the problem: There were no ditches on the County road between his oil location and Mr. King's house, and the natural contours of the land caused excess rainfall to run into the area of the King home.

In early May an eight in. rain fell there on top of wet ground, creating an unusual situation, the oil operator said. 'I don't feel like it was my fault the water ran down Mr. King's road,' he added.

Moore also stated that his Company was not running salt water and oil onto the road.

L.T. Owen, Commissioner of Pct. 3., said he really didn't want to get the county involved in a private dispute between the Oil Company and Mr. King. But he was concerned about anything that might affect the County road in the area, he stated.

'We didn't have that problem (of flooding) until a fence row was pushed down.' Owen told Moore.

Moore replied that it also hadn't rained a lot at one time in a long while. He said he thought a ditch along the problem.

Owen said he would dig a ditch on the west side of the road, but it might take a 'tinhorn' to channel water through the opening to the

After this discussion Judge Scott Bailey brought out a letter from the office of District Attorney Emory Walton. This was in reply to a May 14 request from the Court asking Walton to advise on whether there are state laws pertaining to water diversion on private property.

The letter stated that the laws of Texas regarding the diversion of water have been reviewed, and 'I am unable to locate nay law prescribing a

criminal penalty.' The letter further stated: 'In addition, I have contacted an Attorney from the State Water Commission in Austin, who has advised me that they are unaware of any provisions of law making it a criminal offense .....

'I have enclosed the law that I believe does cover the situation you described to me . . . . . Please note that in 11.086 (b) of the Water Code, there appears to be a possible

remedy of law to recover damages caused by an overflow ... (you may) consult an Attorney in civil matters to determine if there exists a cause of action . . . . . ' Another road matter sur-

faced during the morning. Several people who live east of Romney Cemetery, about 12 miles south of Cisco told of the condition of a stretch of County road in Pct. 4. Among this group were Malcom Williamson, Pat Williamson, Aileen Gipson Lane, Gerald Maynard and Cisco ISD School Bus Driver Melinda

The spokesman said they really didn't blame Commis-

roads in that area - he had 'inherited' them. He had made some improvement, they said, but conditions were really terrible right now.

They said the school bus cannot pick up children, and then they are counted absent. The mail is often delayed, sick people cannot get to the Doctor, and emgerency service personnel cannot get in.

Bacon said he agreed the road was bad, but it would take all of his budget for 165 miles of road in Pct. 4 just to fix the worst part of the road they were talking about.

'We've helped it some, but it's not fixed,' the Commissioner said. 'When I took over three or four years ago, you could fish in the road — there were perch in it!'

Bacon said he would bring equipment to the washed-out roads as soon as water stopped running down the ditches.

This discussion naturally led to talk of the need for more funds and equipment to take care of the damaged county roads. The Commissioners said they were afraid they wouldn't get near what they needed in Federal Disaster Funds, although Eastland County has been declared a Disaster Area.

They made plans to go to Mineral Wells on Wednesday, May 30 to meet with Federal Disaster authorities and let local needs be known. County Auditor Ray Pruitt and personnel from his office also planned to attend this meeting.

On another item, Commissioner Billy Bacon reported that 15 inmates were presently in the County Jail. Five of these were State prisoners, and one out-of-county making nine inmates for the County. The jail, he said, was clean as always.






