## Blood Drive Set At Hospital Wednesday

The Cisco Blood Drive has been set for Wednesday, June 6, at E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital. A team of laboratory technicians from Meck Blood Bank of Hendrick Medical Center of Abilene will be present from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. and from 2 until 6 p.m.

In order to insure an adequate blood supply and to gradually reduce the Cisco blood bank's debt, it is mandatory for every Cisco citizen's effort in this most worthwhile effort.

Due to Federal Drug Administration legislation, there are no longer "paid" donors, therefore, we must depend on voluntary blood donations.

Blood donors should be aware of the following when preparing to give blood:

1. All donors must be age 18 or older; there is no age limit, only that each donor is healthfully able to give blood.
2. Blood donors should eat normally, and are encouraged to do so before giving blood.
3. No medication should be taken 18 hours prior to donating blood, however no

medication should be deleted without checking with the prospective donor's own doctor.

4. Any person who has been sick or had a cold within the last seven days prior to donating blood should not donate blood.

5. Any person who has had ears pierced within the last six months at any place other than a doctor's office should not donate blood.

6. Any person who has been in Southeast Asia in the last three years should not donate blood due to malaria possibilities.

7. Any woman who has menstruated in the last three to four days prior to donating blood should not donate.

8. A woman who is pregnant, or suspects pregnancy, should not give blood, and should not do so until six weeks after termination of pregnancy.

9. Persons can donate blood every two to three months, with no foreseen problems, although it is hopeful to not have to call on the same donors nearly this often.

## Medicare May Stop Payments To Hospital

June 14 has been set by Medicare as the cutoff date for payments to the E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital. Don Henry, hospital administrator, said deficiencies found in a recent inspection have been corrected.

A legal notice published in an area newspaper said Medicare payments would be terminated because the hospital "does not meet minimum health and safety standards required for Medicare program participation."

Mr. Henry said, however, he believes the problems have been solved and that he is requesting the Texas Department of Health and the Health Care Financing Administration to respect the hospital.

The administrator said a complaint was filed with the state from an individual who was transferred to another facility and was not satisfied with the care he received at the Cisco hospital. "Some procedural aspects were not followed" during the transfer, Mr. Henry stated.

The Texas Department of Health investigated the complaint and conducted an unannounced inspection May 17, Mr. Henry said. The department found the hospital not in compliance with standards set for quality assurance and medical staff credentials, he said.

Hospital officials have been working weekends and evenings to document medical staff credentials and bring other areas into compliance with Medicare standards. Henry said the hospital

should be inspected before the Medicare cutoff date. Like the previous inspection, it will be unannounced, he said. If inspectors find "substantial compliance" with Medicare standards, the order to terminate Medicare payments will be rescinded, he said.

Between 50 to 55 percent of the hospital's patients are covered by Medicare, as well as some of those treated in the emergency room.

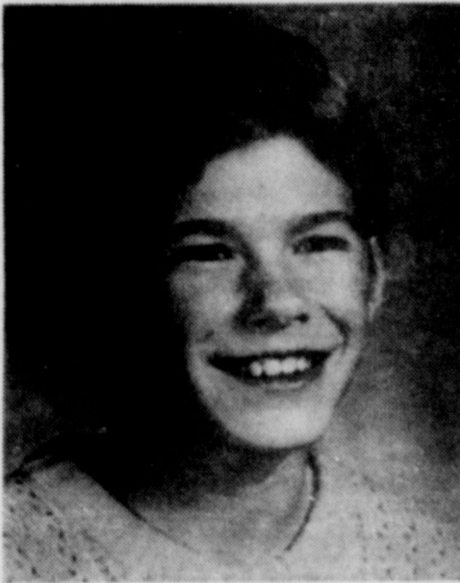

## Cable TV System Officials Announce Rate Change

Officials at TCI Cablevision of Texas, Inc. announced today that the monthly rate for Basic cable service will be lowered to \$17.35 effective July 1, 1990 as the system unbundles charges for equipment and cable guides.

Citing a need to adapt rate structures and billing practices to changes taking place within the cable television industry, Robert Moore, System Manager, announced that the system would implement a \$2.00 per month converter rental charge on the primary outlet effective July 1, 1990. 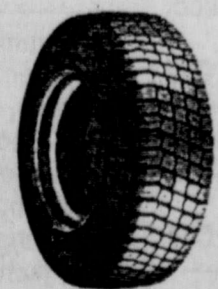

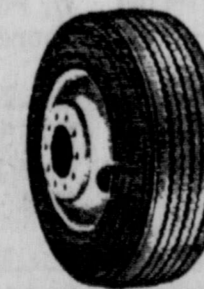

## Gordon Spot

By DeMarquis Gordon, County Agent—

We have had a number of calls this spring concerning problems with fleas in and around the home. The unusually wet spring is causing rapid increases in flea populations, which were already larger than usual because so many survived the winter.

Fleas tend to be more of an itching nuisance than threat to human health, primarily because the worst diseases they carried have been eradicated.

The chief sources of flea infestation in the home are family pets, but once indoors fleas thrive in floor cracks, carpets, unholstered furniture and pet bedding. Fleas, of course, are abundant outside; larvae burrow into the top surface of the soil.

If flea problems are occurring in the house, the yard, and on the pets, all three must be treated at the same time.

Use only approved products for treating animals. Dusts are preferred because they are generally effective

longer. The newer products containing an insect growth regulator can reduce subsequent egg and larval production and can be applied directly to the animal.

Outdoors, treat areas that pets frequent. Use only approved products to thoroughly cover and saturate soil and grass areas. Make sure that application equipment is carefully calibrated to measure dosages exactly.

In the house, thoroughly vacuum or sweep carpets, rugs, furniture, cracks and crevices. Be sure to reach under furniture and along baseboards. Discard the vacuum bag afterwards.

Use a coarse spray (large droplets) in treating likely infested areas. It is always more effective to treat all carpets, furniture and baseboards at one time. After spraying, use total-release aerosol applications to reduce adult fleas.

Methotrexate, an anti-cancer drug, is being used to treat ectopic pregnancy without major surgery at the University of Tennessee College of Medicine. Early diagnosis is vital.

Baking soda, dissolved in liquid anesthetic, can reduce the stinging pain that an injection may cause, says an anesthesiologist in the Pain Management Center of the University of California/San Francisco.

First aid for a burn: cold water for about 15 minutes will clean the wound and ease the pain.

Some researchers have suggested that cruciferous vegetables such as cabbage and broccoli reduce the chance of developing cancer. Researchers at the University of Nebraska Medical Center now suggest that they may also slow the spread of cancer once it's started.

Active vitamin D-3 may be effective against psoriasis, according to a new study at Osaka University Medical School in Japan. Vitamin D-3 -- usually made by the kidney -- can be delivered orally or topically.

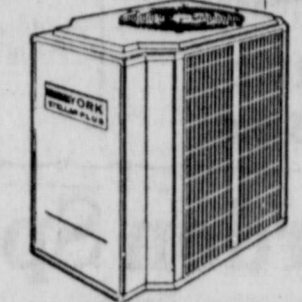

# Roads Again A Topic At Commissioners Court

County road conditions and damage from recent flooding were again discussed at the County Commissioners Court meeting Tuesday, May 29.

At the meeting May 14 R.E. King of the Nimrod/Sabanno area of Pct. 3 told the Court that a county road and his driveway were flooded with water diverted from a Big M Oil Company lease.

On Tuesday Miles Moore of the Big M Company and Hershell Wagley, consultant and Dozer Co. operator, came to Court to review the matter.

Moore told the Commissioners that he had not diverted the water from his lease — that he had built two tanks and spent a lot of money to keep the area from flooding.

He stated there were several things he felt caused the problem: There were no ditches on the County road between his oil location and Mr. King's house, and the natural contours of the land caused excess rainfall to run into the area of the King home.

In early May an eight in. rain fell there on top of wet ground, creating an unusual situation, the oil operator said. 'I don't feel like it was my fault the water ran down Mr. King's road,' he added.

Moore also stated that his Company was not running salt water and oil onto the road.

L.T. Owen, Commissioner of Pct. 3., said he really didn't want to get the county involved in a private dispute between the Oil Company and Mr. King. But he was concerned about anything that might affect the County road in the area, he stated.

'We didn't have that problem (of flooding) until a fence row was pushed down,' Owen told Moore.

Moore replied that it also hadn't rained a lot at one time in a long while. He said he thought a ditch along the

county road would solve the problem.

Owen said he would dig a ditch on the west side of the road, but it might take a 'tin-horn' to channel water through the opening to the lease.

After this discussion Judge Scott Bailey brought out a letter from the office of District Attorney Emory Walton. This was in reply to a May 14 request from the Court asking Walton to advise on whether there are state laws pertaining to water diversion on private property.

The letter stated that the laws of Texas regarding the diversion of water have been reviewed, and 'I am unable to locate any law prescribing a criminal penalty.'

The letter further stated: 'In addition, I have contacted an Attorney from the State Water Commission in Austin, who has advised me that they are unaware of any provisions of law making it a criminal offense . . . . .'

'I have enclosed the law that I believe does cover the situation you described to me . . . . . Please note that in 11.086 (b) of the Water Code, there appears to be a possible remedy of law to recover damages caused by an overflow . . . (you may) consult an Attorney in civil matters to determine if there exists a cause of action . . . . .'

Another road matter surfaced during the morning. Several people who live east of Romney Cemetery, about 12 miles south of Cisco told of the condition of a stretch of County road in Pct. 4. Among this group were Malcom Williamson, Pat Williamson, Aileen Gipson Lane, Gerald Maynard and Cisco ISD School Bus Driver Melinda Bailey.

The spokesman said they really didn't blame Commis-

sioner Billy Bacon for the roads in that area — he had 'inherited' them. He had made some improvement, they said, but conditions were really terrible right now.

They said the school bus cannot pick up children, and then they are counted absent. The mail is often delayed, sick people cannot get to the Doctor, and emergency service personnel cannot get in.

Bacon said he agreed the road was bad, but it would take all of his budget for 165 miles of road in Pct. 4 just to fix the worst part of the road they were talking about.

'We've helped it some, but it's not fixed,' the Commissioner said. 'When I took over three or four years ago, you could fish in the road — there were perch in it!'

Bacon said he would bring equipment to the washed-out roads as soon as water stopped running down the ditches.

This discussion naturally led to talk of the need for more funds and equipment to take care of the damaged county roads. The Commissioners said they were afraid they wouldn't get near what they needed in Federal Disaster Funds, although Eastland County has been declared a Disaster Area.

They made plans to go to Mineral Wells on Wednesday, May 30 to meet with Federal Disaster authorities and let local needs be known. County Auditor Ray Pruitt and personnel from his office also planned to attend this meeting.

On another item, Commissioner Billy Bacon reported that 15 inmates were presently in the County Jail. Five of these were State prisoners, and one out-of-county making nine inmates for the County. The jail, he said, was clean as always.

As the meeting concluded Judge Scott Bailey announced that a formal public hearing on the 1990-91 budget would be held on June 25. County officials are requested to submit budgets from each of their offices for approval at the next Commissioners Court meeting, which will be held June 11.

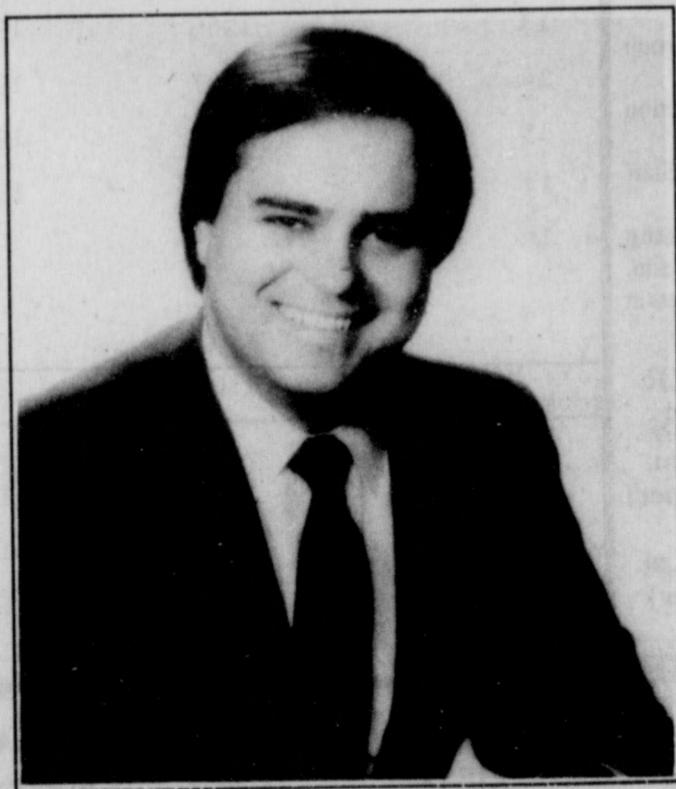

Q. What can I do to protect my teeth from injury?  
A. The most important protection you can provide for your teeth is to refrain from using them as a "tool". Don't open bobby pins with your teeth. Don't bite thread from the spool; use scissors. Never crack nuts between your teeth, or bite down on hard candy. Avoid holding items such as nails, straight pins, pens or pencils with your teeth. Use dental floss or a toothpick with a rounded end to remove food stuck between your teeth; never use a pin or other sharp object! Any of these "don't's" can result in chipped or fractured teeth or fillings, and that means a visit to your dentist, and a repair bill.

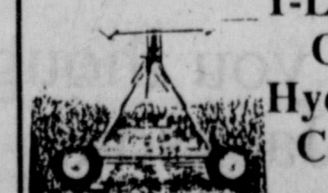
