Made Eastland Mav'ricks yield."

lish class, several students became involved in a spitball battle that grew quite fierce till the teacher finally whirled about from the chalkboard and angrily demanded those responsible stand up.

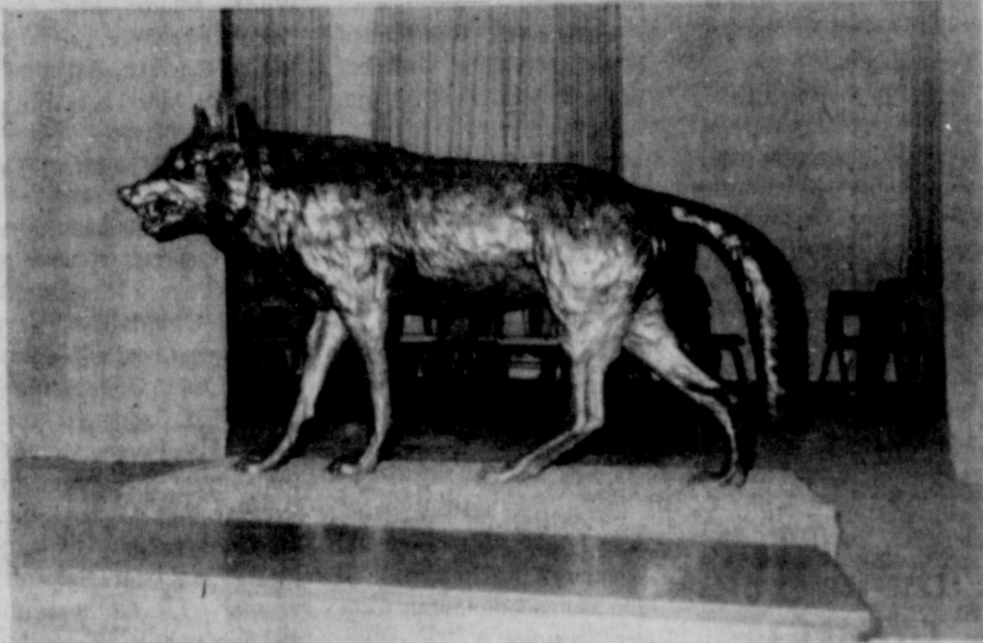
"So everyone in the class stood.

### Swimming Lessons Will Be Given At Cisco City Pool

Swimming lessons will be given at Cisco City Pool this summer, according to an announcement by Shirley Darr, pool manager.

Three two-week sessions have been scheduled: June 18-22 and 25-29; July 2-6 and 9-13; and July 16-20 and 23-27. There will be six age divisions, Mrs. Darr said.

The age divisions and times for each are as follows: Infant, toddler and preschool—11 a.m. to 12 noon. Beginner skills—10 to 11 a.m.

Advanced beginner skills—10 to 11 a.m. Intermediate skills—9 to 10 a.m.

Swimmer skills—8 to 9 a.m.

Advanced swimmer skills—8 to 9 a.m.

Cost will be \$35 per session. Registration will be at Cisco City Hall or at the city pool, according to Mrs. Darr. Instructor will be Iris Tipton. For more information contact Ms. Tipton at 442-3816, Beverly Starr at 442-4872, or the city pool, 442-9944.

Again this year the pool will be open for adult swimmers 6 to 7 p.m. Tuesday through Friday evenings. Admission will be \$1.

Water aerobics and exercise classes for ladies will be held 7 to 8 p.m. Tuesdays through Fridays, Mrs. Darr reported. Cost will be \$30 a month.

### Mobile Breast Cancer Detection Unit Is Accredited By Radiology Program

The Mobile Breast Cancer Detection Unit of Odessa, which services Cisco, has received the certification of the American College of Radiology Mammography Accreditation Program.

Mammography is an x-ray examination of the breast, which the American Cancer Society and other medical experts see as the best means for the early detection of breast cancer.

The program is voluntary and is designed to insure that women receive optimum quality mammographic examinations. The process is done through a peer review evaluation of the facility's staff qualifications, equipment, quality control and quality assurance programs, image quality, and breast dose. The accreditation must be renewed every three years. The accreditation program

### Lisa Reynolds Enjoys Theatre Appearances

to pilot test the Accreditation Program.

Breast cancer will strike on in 10 American women. The American Cancer Society predicts that about 41,000 women will die of breast cancer this year. As there is no way to prevent the disease, early detection and treatment offer the greatest hope for survival.

The American Cancer Society recommends that women do monthly breast self-exams and have regular physical breast exams by a doctor. It further recommends mammography on the following schedule:

A baseline mammogram (for reference) between age 35 and 39.

A mammogram every one or two years between age 40 and 49.

An annual mammogram from age 50.

Lume worked for Lone Star Gas Company at the Pueblo Plant from 1943 until 1968.

Lume was a man of many talents - licensed barber, carpenter, electrician, rancher, plumber, farmer, musician, and a dedicated family man. One of his happiest moments was when he became "Grandpa" and he took pride in his two grandchildren.

His love for music remained with him throughout his life. During his later years at home he could pick up his fiddle and play from memory for hours. During the depression of the late 20's and early 30's he would redo his bow by using the hair from a horses tail. He played for many occasions during the depression and enjoyed every minute of it. He owned and was the master of the violin, banjo, mandolin, french harp, and the clarinet. He first learn to

play by "ear" and later took music lessons. To be able to read music was one of the goals that he wanted to accomplish.

Lume had a sense of humor and always looked on the brighter side of life. He was not a practical joker but enjoyed good clean humor.

He was a member of the First Methodist Church in Moran and served it well as long as he was physically and mentally able. There was no doubt that he was a man of God by the life that he lived. He treated people fairly and expected the same from others. Lume died on May 26, 1990 after a long illness. It is hard to give him up but we know that he deserves the everlasting peace that he is now enjoying. Those that knew him will miss him and those that loved him will mourn their loss.

**Dental Dialogue**

**The Best Toothbrush**

Q. What is the best type of toothbrush for an adult?

A. There are many kinds of toothbrushes available on the market. The A. D. A. recommends a soft, bristle brush with rounded ends, a flat brushing surface, and a straight handle. Try to select a brush that has a small enough head to fit into your mouth without causing injury, yet still reach all your teeth easily. If you have a particularly small mouth, you may want to purchase a child-size brush. Another feature to look for is whether the handle will fit comfortably in your hand. Some brushes have a rubber tip to clean between the teeth, but if you are brushing and flossing properly, such an option isn't necessary.

**A Thought For The Day....**

Although Father's Day was not officially proclaimed a national holiday until former President Richard Nixon signed a congressional resolution in 1972, fathers have been honored in June since the early 1900's. Mrs. John Bruce Dodd of Spokane, Washington is generally thought to have done more to originate Father's Day than any other American. She became known as the "Mother of Father's Day." The idea occurred to her in 1909 when she was living in Spokane. In June, 1910, the first observance was held in Spokane and slowly the day came to be recognized in other cities, some thinking they were the first to do so. Many Presidents through the years helped observe the holiday and The National Father's Day Committee furthered the holiday when it was created in 1935. They dedicated the day "to building a democratic world through wholesome child upbringing." Through the years Mrs. Dodd was approached many times to endorse many gifts and products for Father's Day, but she refused. She had very definite ideas how the day should be observed. "It should include family attendance at church, a little gift for Dad and some tender words you've always longed to say to him," she said in 1953.

Fifty-six 4-Hers from across Texas arrived at Texas A&M University on June 4-5, for the State 4-H Food Show. These 4-Hers had won their division at the previously held District 4-H Food Shows across the State. There are four divisions: Fruit and Vegetable, Main Dish, Breads, Snacks and Desserts.

The State 4-H Food Show was sponsored by the Morrison Milling Company, and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Kathy Thomas, Eastland County 4-Her, represented District 8 in the Fruit and Vegetable Division where 14 contestants competed for State honors. The contestants are interviewed by a panel of

judges on: 30% leadership and menu analysis, 15% on the actual dish of food exhibited, and 55% on knowledge of nutrition.

Kathy Thomas placed third high point and was a blue ribbon winner. Cathy was in the 'Parade of Winners' at Rudder Auditorium on the last night of Roundup activities where the top three winners in over 40 contests were individually recognized. The 1990 4-H Roundup activities had 2,200 4-Hers participating.

Cathy's entry in the Fruit and Vegetable division was: **SPINACH LASAGNA**  
2 pounds cottage cheese  
2 eggs, beaten  
1 tbs. chopped parsley

Pepper and garlic salt to taste  
1/2 cup butter, melted  
8 lasagna noodles, cooked according to package directions

3 10 ounce pkgs. frozen spinach, cooked and drained  
1 pound Monterey Jack cheese, shredded

1 cup grated Parmesan cheese

Mix together cottage cheese, eggs, parsley, pepper, garlic salt and melted butter. Generously butter a 9x13 inch baking dish. Place 4 lasagna noodles in bottom of dish. Top with half of cottage cheese mixture. Sprinkle with half of Monterey Jack cheese, followed by half of Parmesan cheese. Dot with half of spinach. Repeat layers with remaining ingredients. Bake at 350 degrees F for 30 minutes.

### Homemaking Hints

#### FAKE FATS

As improbable as it sounds, fake fat made its American debut earlier this year.

The same people who brought you NutraSweet now offer Simplese, the first of what promises to be several fat substitutes designed to be used in prepared foods. Simplese, a blend of egg white and milk proteins, eventually may be used in a host of foods that ordinarily might be laden with fat, including salad dressing, margarine, yogurt and processed cheese. The substitute has fewer than two calories per gram, compared with fat's nine calories.

A frozen dessert called 'Simple Pleasures' is the first marketed product containing the fat substitute. Simple Pleasures has about 120 calories and less than a gram of fat per 4 oz. serving, compared

with 250 and 15 for a typical premium ice cream.

Simplese's major limitation is that it can't be baked or fried. Proctor & Gamble hopes to fill that void when it gets government approval to start selling olestra, a product made from sugar and vegetable oil. Olestra adds no calories to foods because it passes through the body without being absorbed. Oils or shortening made with the fat substitute should have about 75% fewer calories than the regular products. (Information from: University of Texas Lifetime Health Letter.)

#### SAVING MONEY CAN BECOME A HABIT

Some people control their money by making deliberate, conscious decisions about how much will be spent. They consciously plan what the money will be used for, and what portion of income will be set aside for unexpected expenses, retirement security and planned goals. Other people are controlled by their money. Before it is earned, the money is already directed toward credit payments, and random, impulsive purchases. These people just hope they will have enough to cover their necessary living expenses.

The habit of saving some of the money you earn is a major step to having control over your finances. Tips to move you along the savings path are:

\*Pay yourself first. Make savings a part of the fixed 'expenses' of your spending plan - much like your rent, mortgage or utility payments.

\*Use payroll deductions if you receive a paycheck. Ask your employer to deduct a certain amount from your pay and have it deposited into a savings plan.

\*Pay installments to yourself. After you have paid off a debt, such as a car, furniture or electronic equipment loan, continue to budget the installment payment, but put it into your savings account so you can pay cash for your next purchase.

\*Try being frugal. Cut out or cut back on consumption and put the money you don't spend into your savings account. Frugal does not mean being stingy; it means not being wasteful - being conservative with resources.

\*Breaking a spending habit. Each time you don't buy that soft drink or decide not to spend money on a trinket, put that amount of money into your savings.

#### CREAMY PEACH ICE CREAM

1 1/4 cups sugar, divided  
1 1/2 teaspoons unflavored gelatin  
4 cups half-and-half, divided

1 egg, slightly beaten  
1 teaspoon vanilla extract  
1/4 teaspoon almond extract

dash of salt  
3 cups mashed ripe peaches

Combine 1/2 cup sugar and gelatin in a saucepan; stir in 2 cups half-and-half. Cook over low heat until gelatin dissolves, stirring constantly. Gradually stir a small amount of hot mixture into egg; slowly stir egg mixture into remaining hot mixture. Cook about 1 minute, stirring constantly, or until mixture thickens slightly. Chill.

Add remaining 2 cups half-and-half, vanilla, almond, and salt to chilled custard. Combine peaches and remaining 3/4 cups sugar; stir into custard. Pour into freezer can of a 1 gallon hand-turned or electric freezer. Freeze according to manufacturer's instructions. Let ripen about 4 hours. Yield: 2 quarts.

#### TONY WELLS WINS AT CISCO

Ten members of the Eastland County Bass Club met at Lake Cisco for a hot day of 'Fishing Outdoors.' Lots of small bass were reported being taken on worms in the newly flooded vegetation.

The top catch of the day went to Tony Wells with four fish 4.88 pounds. Tony made this catch using a four inch worm. Second place Butch Willingham three fish 4.54 and third with three fish 4.41 Tom Maynard. Big bass of the day was a real lunker going 1.96 caught by Terry Wilson. The small weights were a bit surprising with the recent reports received from Cisco on the black bass.

A total of 17 fish were weighed in with an average of 1.35 per fish. That's pretty slim for a 14 1/4 inch black bass. An abundance of bait fish were present in all areas of the lake so maybe by fall this lake will once again be one of our areas big bass producers.

Wednesday evening jackpots are back on folks. June 14 will be the first one at Lake Leon. Starting time will be at 6:00 p.m. and all entrants must

sign in prior to fishing. If you are going to fish but cannot arrive prior to starting time, you should contact Tom Maynard at 629-3550. This event is open to anyone wishing to enter. Rules will be set prior to fishing, so grab a friend and let's all meet at the State Boat Ramp at Chock-o-Block.

June 23 and 24 the Breckenridge Chamber of Commerce and the Breckenridge Bass Club will be hosting the annual Big Bass Classic at Hubbard Creek Lake. Entry fee for this event will be \$40 per day until June 15 at 5:00 p.m. After this time it will raise to \$50 per day. This will be big fish format not a stringer weight.

Guaranteed monies are: 1st \$7,500; 2nd \$1,750; 3rd \$1,000. Big Bass Sunday \$1,000. Plus each hourly big fish will be worth \$75, and don't forget the more entries the larger the prize money will grow. Last year's event paid \$15,000 through 15th place. For more information you may call (817) 559-2301.

The following piece was furnished by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department:

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission has adopted changes in regulations that will affect both fresh and saltwater anglers beginning Sept. 1.

The commission, meeting in a public hearing in Austin last week, set a statewide 10 inch minimum length limit and 25 per day bag limit on crappie in all public waters of the state except Lakes Toledo Bend and Caddo pending adoption of the same regulations on the Louisiana side of the lakes.

Officials said the length limit, which has been in effect on a number of Texas lakes, eventually will increase the number and poundage of crappie anglers can harvest while allowing more fish to spawn before being removed from the population.

The crappie limits will become effective Sept. 1, 1990. Commission action increasing the minimum length limit for saltwater spotted seatrout (speckled trout) from 14 to 15 inches is expected to take effect sometime in June, as soon as legal posting requirements are met. No change was made in the daily bag limit of 10 spotted seatrout, and possession limit of 20.

Dr. Gary Matlock, fisheries director for the TPWD, told the commission the longer minimum length limit will allow more trout to reach spawning age before being harvested.

The commission also authorized a prohibition on the use of saltwater trotlines between the Saturday of Memorial Day weekend and Labor Day each year. However, commissioners voted to implement the prohibition in the summer of 1991.

The commission also prohibited the use of nets in Wright Patman Reservoir and the Sulphur River in Northeast Texas and in the fresh waters of Galveston and Chambers Counties, but moved the effective date of

the regulations to Sept. 1, 1991. A reduction in the legal length of minnow seines in fresh water from 60 feet to 20 feet also will become effective Sept. 1, 1991.

Also adopted was a 14-inch minimum length limit for gafftosail catfish, for both sport and commercial fishermen, and a nine inch sport and commercial minimum length limit for pompano. The bag limit for snook was set at three per day with a possession limit of six, and only snook between 20 and 28 inches in length may be retained.

Several changes were made in bag and length limits of freshwater fish, including a bag limit of three largemouth

bass per day and an 18-inch minimum length limit for Ray Robert, Bastrop, San Augustine City, O.H. Ivie and CCalaveras Reservoirs, and a reduction in the bag limit of black basses at Lake Texoma from 10 per day to five.

The commission also set a daily bag limit of five flathead catfish, with a 24 inch minimum length limit, for Texoma and Bastrop. Also approved was a minimum length limit of 14 inches and a daily bag limit of five in the aggregate for channel and blue catfish in Lake Bastrop and all other lakes in state parks. Trotlines will be prohibited in Lake Bastrop.

# Cancer Patient Conference Successful

A Cancer Patient Conference had never been held in the Eastland County area before—but some dedicated people decided to try it on June 6. The Anderson Network—a patient support group of the M.D. Anderson Cancer Center, Houston, hosted the "Living With Cancer" patient conference at the First Baptist Church in Eastland on that date.

Staff, physicians and Networkers from Houston were presenters and co-hosts for this day-long event. But Judy Gerner, Program Coordinator of Anderson Network, says the success and smooth flow of the Conference can be attributed in great part to the involvement of people in Eastland and surrounding communities.

Local coordinators included Becky McIntire, R.N., Director of Quality Assurance/Inservice Education at Eastland Memorial Hospital, Mary Anne McCloud, Pole on the Prairie Co-Chairman, Pole on the Prairie Committee members, and American Cancer Society members from Eastland County and the Stephens County Chapter. Karol Hoffmann of Eastland was in charge of the beautiful decorations for the luncheon.

Persons from a wide area attended the Conference. Houston, Eastland, Cisco, Abilene, Granbury, Anson, Millsap, Breckenridge, Coleman, Albany, Stephenville, South Bend, Ranger—all were represented.

The Conference began with a hearty welcome and introductions by John Gardner of Houston, the Network Chairman, and proceeded into a discussion led by Judy Gerner on resources available to the cancer patient within the MDACC and each county.

Lesla Oswalt, President-elect of the Eastland County Chapter of the American Cancer Society, told of the many services available through this group. Dr. Eva Singletary and Pam Willson, MSN, RCN, then led respective sessions on Cancer in Women and Cancer in Men. Marcia Carr, administrator of Eastland Memorial Hospital, introduced Dr. Singletary and welcomed the group on behalf of the medical community of Eastland.

"I am always concerned about the availability of medical care for cancer in a rural community," Mrs. Carr said. "This meeting is very important for us."

The presentations by Dr.

Cancer, led by Sister Alice Potts and an extremely enlightening hour on Insurability/Employability/Job Rights pertaining to the cancer patient. This was led by Dr. Wayne Dorris, also from MDACC.

The response most often heard from those in attendance was one of gratitude for the opportunity to learn of their disease, to reach out and be supported by others who have walked down that same path, and to be able to freely ask questions from expert in the field. It was a memorable day for many.

The day came to a close with sign-ups by those interested in forming support groups in their home community. Physicians and staff from M.D. Anderson gave of their time and expertise in presentations and interactions. It truly was a day of joint caring and interest - one that can happen again as long as so many people are involved and are concerned about a better life for all cancer patients."

She adds that the Anderson Network offers many avenues of support for the cancer patient, especially those who are being referred to M.D. Anderson Cancer Center or who are presently patients at the Center. ## Pharmacy Topics

One key to adult-onset diabetes, says a biochemist at the United States Department of Agriculture, is a deficiency in chromium, the mineral that augments insulin activity. To increase chromium uptake, eat more whole grains, meats, fruits and vegetables and less sweets.

New technique to repair brain aneurysm has been developed by a doctor at the University of California/San Francisco. Balloon-tipped catheter is threaded through the groin artery to the brain, then a quick-hardening polymer is injected into the balloon to form a plug which remains in place after the catheter is removed.

To reduce the stress that may accompany dental appointments, a University of Cincinnati study offered an eight-minute tape that described what would happen at the next visit, and taught how to replace negative thoughts with pleasant ones.

New protection against poison ivy is in the works. A spray-on clay (it doesn't show) is said to be 95 percent effective and will be available in two years. Current barrier creams offer 60 percent protection.

# Help Available For Expecting Singles

When an unmarried woman, often a teenager, suspects that she is pregnant, to whom does she turn?

An effort supported by area churches and staffed by volunteers is providing answers. It is the Pregnancy Counseling Service of Abilene, with an active arm in Eastland County.

Pregnancy testing and counseling are offered to the

women and girls who are needing to make decisions, decisions which will affect them for the rest of their lives. They often feel that they can't turn to relatives and may even fear that relatives will reject them.

The possibility of a baby in their lives raises questions and problems for the women, who often feel that they don't want or can't provide for a child.

Pregnancy Counseling Service offers the women choices, and tries to encourage the women to make up their own minds. The women are informed about adoption agencies, and assisted in arranging for counseling.

The Service may assist the women in obtaining medical care, and women with limited finances who choose to keep their babies may be helped with some of their needs.

Celia Shackelford, wife of a minister, is the Eastland County representative for the Counseling Service. Richard

Watson, Pastor of the New Hope Baptist Church has also been involved as have others in the county.

Women may call to arrange for counseling, and many do. In March 180 women, 30 under age 18, and in April 179 women, 20 under age 18 utilized of the Service.

## Update With Bob Bullock

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday that Texas businesses will have very little time to prepare for the quarter percent sales tax increase approved by the Legislature to pay for public education and human services pro-

grams. "We will do everything possible to help businesses and merchants with this rate change," Bullock said. "The short amount of time puts a very heavy burden on the 467,000 businesses that collect sales tax from their customers."

The sales tax increase, signed by Governor Clements on Thursday, takes effect July 1. It raises the state sales tax from 6 percent to 6 1/4 percent. With local sales tax added, the new maximum will be 8 1/4 percent.

Bullock is mailing a post-

card notice to all sales tax permit holders Friday to notify them of the change. New 6 1/4 percent and 8 1/4 percent rate cards have been printed and will be available in all 33 Comptroller offices throughout the state next week. A new listing of the combined state and local sales tax rates for every city in the state will be available by June 18.

"Unfortunately businesses will have to make this change almost overnight," Bullock said.

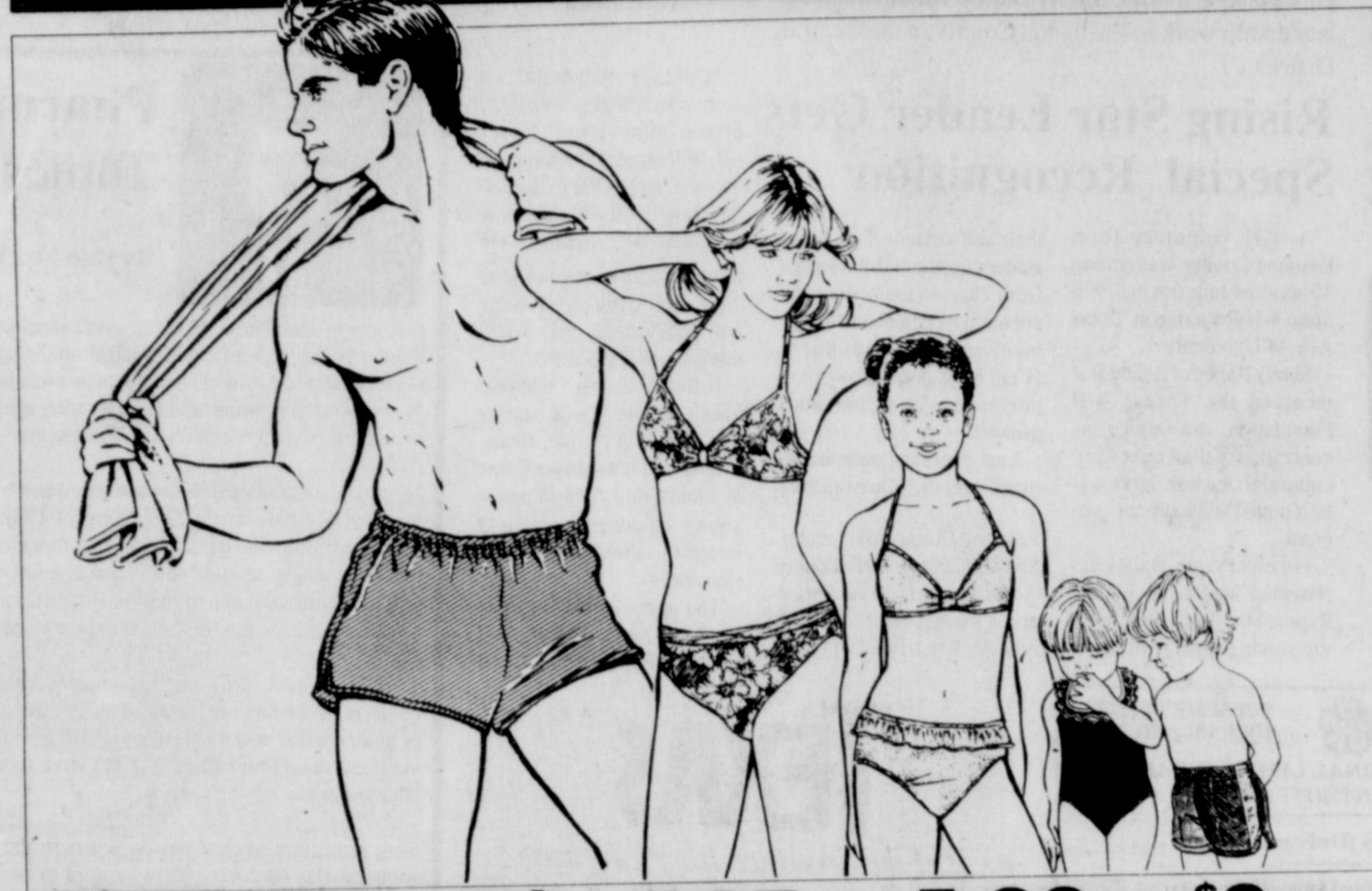

## TDA Releases The 1990 'Texas Hunter's Clearinghouse Directory'

"Hunting has always been a way of life for many Texans. The sale of hunting leases is helping many Texas farmers and ranchers make a living, and the publication of the 1990 edition of the 'Texas Hunter's Clearinghouse Directory' will assist a growing number of rural Texans in making use of this valuable source of extra income," Deputy State Agriculture Commissioner Mike Moeller announced today.

The 1990 directory, along with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's Deer

Hunting Lease Register, lists 956 available leases covering a total of 4.3 million acres in every region of Texas. The 118-page directory, which is available free of charge, is a joint project TDA and the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. Interested hunters and rural landowners will receive copies of the directory upon request.

"More than 200 listings in this year's edition of the directory are new, and a large number of these listings have never been hunted on a lease basis before," Moeller said.

"The directory listings are arranged by county in alphabetical order, and the directory includes a wide range of fish and game. Hunters can find leases to hunt and fish for wild turkey, bass, catfish, javelina, and whitetail deer. We've also got listings for exotic game species like axis deer and blackbuck antelope. The listings also include useful information such as the location of the nearest airports and hotels, as well as services and amenities provided on leases.

"The four-year-old Clear-

inghouse program has become popular with hunters and rural landowners alike. More than 1.3 million Texans hold hunting licenses, and land capable of producing huntable wildlife is limited. The directory puts hunters in contact with rural landowners who need the additional income generated by hunting leases. In previous years, farmers and ranchers who leased their land through the clearinghouse program added an average of \$2,200 to their income. Hunting leases generate about \$146 million each year for Texas farmers and ranchers. As the demand for hunting leases increases, many rural landowners are putting more emphasis on

wildlife management practices in order to satisfy this demand," Moeller said.

Farmers and ranchers with land available to lease may apply to the Texas Department of Agriculture for a free listing in the directory. Applications for inclusion in the directory are accepted throughout the year. **Oil & Gas Drilling Permits Issued Increased In May**

A total of 1,265 drilling permits were issued by the Railroad Commission in May, according to RRC Chairman Kent Hance. In April, the total was 1,242. May 1989's total was 1,244.

permits to drill new oil and gas tests, 51 to re-enter existing well bores, 40 to deepen existing holes, 168 to plugback existing holes, and 99 for other wells. Operators were also issued 156 amended drilling permits.

Hance said permits issued for new oil and gas holes in May included 51 in the San Antonio area (District 1), 44 in the Refugio area (District 2), 43 in Southeast Texas (District 3), 60 in Deep South Texas (District 4), 18 in East

Central Texas (District 5), 51 in East Texas (District 6), 80 in West Central Texas (District 7), 76 in the San Angelo area (District 7C), 130 in the Midland area (District 8), 81 in the Lubbock area (District 8A), 97 in North Texas (District 9), and 20 in the Panhandle (District 10).

In the first five months of 1990, the Commission has issued 6,318 drilling permits, a 14 percent increase from the 5,418 issued during the

same period of 1989.

The 1,265 permits issued in May included 600 oil permits, 215 gas permits, 391 oil and gas permits, 24 injection permits, seven disposal permits, and 28 other permits.

**Railroad Commission Assesses \$3600 In Penalties**

The Railroad Commission assessed a total of \$3,600 in administrative penalties this week to six oil and gas operators for problems under Commission well plugging

rules.

Barn-Co Production, Inc. of Levelland was ordered to pay a total of \$1,000 for five inactive and unplugged wells on the Clark lease in Young County; South Plains Petroleum of Brownfield was assessed \$600 for one well on the C.M. Lyons lease in Scurry County; Trilex Energy Corporation of Austin was penalized \$500 for one well on the Davis Heirs Gas Unit lease in Wharton County; Jatt Petroleum, Inc. of Crane was ordered to pay \$500 for one well on the Heagy-Myrick lease in Pecos County; and, Atkinson and Frasier of Abilene was penalized \$500

for one well on the R.B. Weddington ("C") lease in Eastland County.

In addition, one operator agreed to pay a penalty without admitting any violation of Commission rules. Deen Drilling Company of Archer City was assessed \$500 for ten unplugged wells on the

Cowan and McKinney lease in Archer County.

To date in 1990, the Commission has levied more than \$411,000 in pollution and well plugging penalties. Last year, the Commission assessed a total of \$1,125,000 in such penalties.
