City Council Hears Proposal From BFI Waste Systems

"New proposed EPA regulations and prohibitive costs involved dictate small cities must get out of the landfill business," City Manager Michael Moore has told the city council.

Cisco has additional problems of needing a new landfill site within four to five years; and replacement of costly landfill equipment within two years, if not before, Mr. Moore said.

The city council has reviewed alternatives over the last several months to find the best and most cost-effective alternative, Mr. Moore said.

The council met in a called meeting Tuesday, July 19, to hear and discuss presentation for private sanitation service by BFI Waste Systems of Houston. Lynn Lyons of the BFI Fort Worth office made the presentation.

BFI currently services Breckenridge, Gorman, Cross Plains, DelLeon and Comanche in this area.

The BFI proposal was for comprehensive services to include curbside residential and commercial pickup, commercial containerization, and a city-wide convenience point.

Mr. Moore said the reason for the presentation and consideration of the proposal

from BFI at this time was because BFI is also willing to construct and operate a regional transfer station in Cisco which will also include a regional BFI office and eventually a truck maintenance center.

The city manager reported that residential rates under this proposal would go up approximately \$2.00 per household, with increases in commercial rates varying from \$2.00 upward depending whether or not they want or require containers.

The city manager and council believe these increases are minimal and definitely would substantially be higher if the city was to try to continue to operate the landfill under the new regulations.

Mr. Moore estimates that under current operations, garbage rates would have to at least double within the next two to three years.

After substantial discussion, questions and answers concerning BFI's proposal and performance experience, the council voted to put consideration of a contract with BFI on the agenda for the July 10 regular city council meeting.

Council members are soliciting comments and questions from Cisco citizens

regarding the solid waste disposal situation and BFI's sanitation service proposal. Citizens are encouraged to attend the July 10 meeting to ask questions. The meeting will be at 6 p.m. Tuesday, July 10, at the Hilton Community Center.

Cisco Post Office Announces Changes In Mail Schedules

Effective July 1, 1990, the arrival schedule for the incoming mails truck for the Cisco and other local Post Offices, is being revised in an effort to maximize the amount of mails available daily, according to Postmaster Melvin Wende.

This change will necessitate minor delivery time and adjustments of approximately 20 minutes for city and rural delivery routes, and will require the Post Office box unit cut-off time to be set at 8:30 a.m. instead of the current 8 a.m. time, Mr. Wende said.

An 8:30 a.m. cut-off time will enable the Cisco Post Office to provide a more reliable, consistent availability of all preferential mails, and parcels, for the box customers.

Outgoing mails schedules will remain the same, with the exception of Saturday. Saturdays outgoing mails will be extended an extra hour from the outside drop box, with a cut-off time of 5:10 p.m., Mr. Wende said. Normal hours of operation for the window will not be effected, he added.

Governor Signs Bill; CJC Can Offer Classes In Abilene

Governor Bill Clements signed a bill Wednesday giving Cisco Junior College permission to offer academic classes at its Abilene location, 209 South Danville Drive.

Dr. Roger Schustereit, president of CJC, said the classes could start in its second summer session, which begins July 16.

He said some summer classes originally planned for the CJC Clyde campus will be switched to the Danville location, which now offers only vocational-technical courses. He said it has not been decided how many courses will be offered initially.

Dr. Schustereit wouldn't predict how many academic students would enroll at CJC's

Abilene campus. The Clyde campus enrolled 349 students in the second summer session in 1988.

Most students who take classes at the Clyde campus are Abilene residents who are expected to welcome classes at CJC's Abilene campus, Dr. Schustereit said.

"Our first priority is going to be quality," he said. If that means offering few classes at first, that's the way it will be, he said.

CJC's enrollment in Abilene would be limited to 1,000 full-time equivalent students unless Taylor County residents were to vote to levy a branch campus maintenance tax.

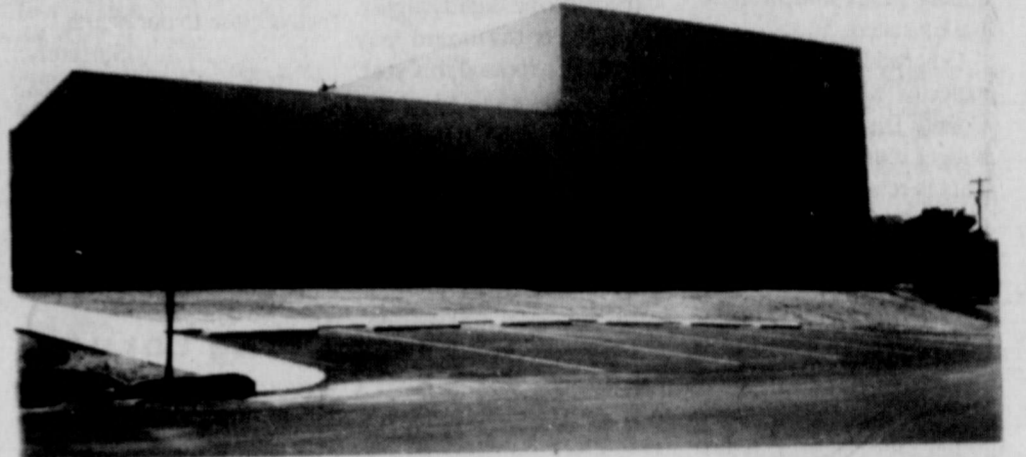
Schustereit said CJC plans to offer both day and evening classes in Abilene in the sec-

ond summer session, but will stress evening classes in the fall due to lack of space.

The first summer classes of the day will start at 8:15 a.m., with evening classes starting at 6:15 p.m. Day classes will meet Monday through Thursday for an hour and 50 minutes each day, he said. Each evening class will meet for 3 hours and 50 minutes two nights a week. Final exams will be held August 20-21, Dr. Schustereit added.

Summer II registration for both the Abilene and Clyde campuses will probably be held in Abilene, he said, but plans aren't final.

Cisco Junior College Fitness Center Dedication Is Sunday

Senator Bob Glasgow will be the special guest of Cisco Junior College when it dedicates its new Fitness Center on Sunday, June 24, at 2 p.m. The public is cordially invited.

The Fitness Center will house three racquetball courts and a 2000 square foot weight room. The weight room will feature Nautilus exercise equipment. The new facility is located on the north side of the campus to the north of the gymnasium.

"This is the first major construction project at CJC since the early 1970's, and we're very proud of it," said CJC President Roger C. Schustereit. "We are also very glad that Senator Glasgow can join us; he's been a real friend of higher education and Cisco Junior College," Schustereit added.

Senator Glasgow received the 1989 Distinguished Service Award from the Texas Chamber of Commerce for his work during the 71st Legislature. His selection was based on his voting record on

such issues as education, worker's compensation insurance reform, economic development, health care, and crime.

Senator Glasgow's current Senate committee assignments include chairmanships of Jurisprudence, Legislative Oversight on worker's compensation, and the Interim Committee on Redistricting. He is vice-chairman of the Senate Finance committee and a member of the powerful Legislative Budget Board. Jim Yates, minister of the Cisco Church of Christ will

offer the invocation. Eastland County Judge Scott Bailey will introduce Senator Glasgow. Schustereit will give a welcome and introduce the Board of Regents and other special guest.

"We hope the many friends of Senator Glasgow and Cisco Junior College will be able to attend the dedication of our Fitness Center," said Dick Woolley, president of the CJC Board of Regents. "We know our Fitness Center will be a fine addition for our community," concluded Woolley.

praisal District, so it was "difficult to predict an effective County tax rate at this time."

The Judge indicated there might be a \$150,000 - \$300,000 shortfall in the proposed budget, so some adjustments would have to be made. The Commissioners have worked long and hard on this budget, Judge Bailey added.

Some of the problems inherent in the current budget include the cost of repairing roads and bridges damaged by storms in late April and early May. There will be some money coming back from Federal Disaster Funds, but not full reimbursement.

"We've had around \$500,000 damage to the county roads and bridges," Bailey stated.

Other additional expense is expected when the Eastland County Dispatch brings in a budget request for the year. This is related to the setting up of the 9-1-1 Emergency System. Another expense of the System will be the mapping of the County. The 9-1-1 Service is supposed to be operational in Jan., 1992.

On health-related matters, 10 percent of the gross gen-

eral revenue of the County must be set aside to pay for indigent health care and the cost of the county-subsidized ambulance service is expected to come up at the budget hearing.

The possibility of a raise in postal rates is another item the Commissioners have to take into account. The County does much of its business by mail. On June 11 the Commissioners passed a resolution against this proposed raise.

One bright spot, says Judge Bailey, is that enough money has been set aside to make the final payment this year on the Jail debt. With the jail clean and in state compliance, the County expects no heavy expense on the jail any time soon.

The current County budget is around \$3 million dollars, and the proposed budget is expected to be slightly higher. No across-the-board pay raises are expected this year.

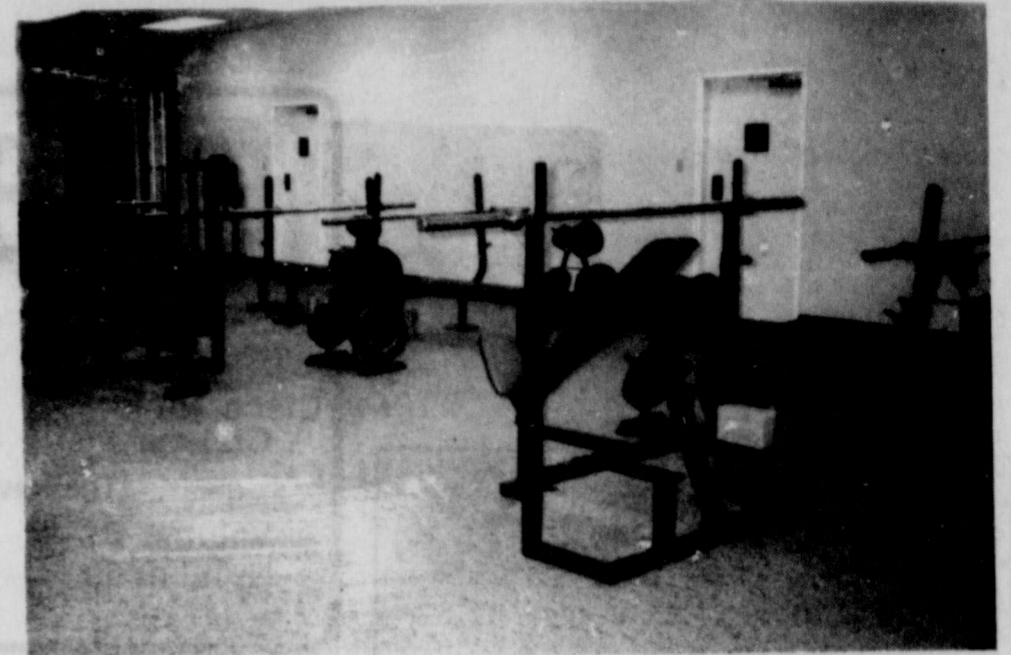
The V.F.W. will participate in the July 4th flag raising ceremonies at the City Park. Everyone is invited to be

**Drug Shipment
Is Intercepted;
Three Arrested**

As the result of weeks of investigation jointly conducted by the West Central Texas Interlocal Crime Task Force and the San Angelo area Rio Concho Drug Task Force, officers were in the right place to seize 79 pounds of marijuana and make three arrests following an illegal drug transaction, according to a Task Force representative.

A Colorado City man and two Dallas men were arrested at a Ranger motel, and along with the marijuana with an estimated street value of \$126,400.00, the officers also seized two pistols and more than \$30,000.00 in cash. The arrests were made around 8:30 p.m. Wednesday with the task force officers being assisted by the Eastland County Sheriff's Office and the Ranger Police Dept.

Apparently the marijuana was being shipped through the county and didn't involve local people.

The three men were arraigned before Cisco J.P. J.V. Heysler on charges of investigation of organized crime, aggravated possession of marijuana, and illegal investment. Bond was set at \$450,000.00 for each man.

Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor,
In response to the article in June 17th paper entitled "Long Trip To Church Is Worth It."

I read the article with quite frankly shock and disbelief. To the four men who drove 130 miles to catch a plane at 7 a.m. and took an hour and half taxi ride to go 15 miles, I would like to say you are on a longer trip than that to reach the Truths of God much less to reach—church. It says in James 3:5-6 "See how great a forest how little a fire can set alight, and the tongue is a fire; in the midst of our members the tongue stands for the whole wicked world, for it defiles the whole body and sets on fire the ever-recurring cycle of creation, and is itself set on fire by hell."

Do any one of you remember John 8? Jesus made the claim that if anyone keeps his words, he will never know death. It shocked the Jews. It was the literal mindedness of the Jew which blocked their intelligence. It is not physical life and physical death of which Jesus is thinking. Meaning that, for the man who fully accepts him, death has lost its finality; he goes, not from life to death, but from life to life; death is only the introduction to the nearer presence of God.

From the Jesus goes on to make a great statement—all true honour must come from God. It is not difficult to honor ourselves, it is easy, in fact fatally easy to bask in the light of one's own approval. I received the feeling of self-righteousness of these four men referred to in the article of June 17th. I received the claim that all other people at the SBC not thinking as they do are going astray from God. I feel these four men will only hear what they wish to hear (at home and at the SBC), and if long enough they keep their ears to their own ideas and to the wrong inner voices, in the end they will be unable to tune in at all to God. Fishing Outdoors

Food Supply Excellent At Leon

Leon's black bass fishing is picking up all over the lake, with the best bite coming in around 1 to 3 feet of water. A recent Wednesday evening jackpot saw some good solid 2 1/2 pound average fish caught. Don Flowers had a three fish limit with 7.77 for first. Jimmy Johnson took second 2 fish 7.03, and Gary Horton 1 fish 3.12 for third. The catfish also seem to be increasing in the river section on willow hooks and trotlines. Shad, perch and jumbo grasshoppers seemed to all be working well.

And speaking of shad, Leon once again this year has produced a bumper crop of shad of spring. It seems the entire lake has turned to shad schools the size of number 3 wash tubs. Wouldn't it be nice to see the parks and wildlife department stock some Florida bass and maybe a bunch of smallmouth with this huge food supply?

As expected, fishing pressure was intense on Joe Pool Reservoir during its first few months of being open to the public last year.

To offset the effects of this sudden and intense fishing pressure, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission authorized the department to establish a daily limit of three bass and a minimum length limit of 18 inches.

Parks and Wildlife Department Creel surveys indicate 52 man-hours per acre were spent on the lake during the first week it was opened, according to biologist Bobby Farquhar of Fort Worth. "When you add those hours

to the 139 man hours per acre expended during the next three months ending November 30, you get a total of 191 man hours per acre. For comparison nearby, Lake Lewisville had only 98 man-hours per acre of pressure for the entire year of 1989," said Farquhar.

Farquhar estimated that anglers caught approximately 17,670 largemouth bass during the first week of fishing, with only 635 or 3.6 percent being retained. During the following months, about 52,000 bass were caught and 850 retained. Anglers also caught about 142,000 crappie retaining some 51,700.

Here is the weekly fishing report as compiled by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department for June 14:

Central

Brownwood: Water muddy, 70 degrees, 3 feet above spillway; black bass are slow; all fishing slow; few fishermen out midweek.

Northeast

Fork: Water clear, 82 degrees, lake full; black bass are good to 10.97 pounds on black and blue Crawfish in 18 feet of water; crappie are good with some limits to 2.23 pounds on minnows; catfish are fair in number to 5 1/2 pounds on minnows.

Joe Pool: Water clear, 1 foot above normal level; black bass are good to 4 pounds on minnows and spinners; crappie are good to 2 pounds in 10-12 feet of water; catfish are slow; carp are slow to 5 pounds with dough bait. Boat ramps are open.

Richland-Chambers: Water clear, 84 degrees, normal level; black bass are fair to 4

1/2 pounds on jigs and worms in the brush; white bass are beginning to school with good catches on slabs; crappie are good with many limits to 2 1/2 pounds each on minnows; catfish are slow.

Southeast

Rayburn: Water murky, 85 degrees, 3 feet above normal level; black bass are good to 5 pounds on Irish Whiskey Worms; crappie are good with many limits on minnows; white bass are schooling off points, best bait is a silver slab; catfish are good to 8 pounds on Catfish Charlie 10 turns off the bottom in 30 feet of water.

Toledo Bend: Water clear, 85 degrees, 6 inches low; black bass are fair to 10 pounds on worms, Rogues and jigs; striper are good on jigs, deep running Redfins and minnows in the rivers; crappie are slow on jugs and live bait in 16 to 20 feet of water; white bass slow; catfish are food on trotline to 16 pounds in the channels.

South

Amistad: Water clear, 80 degrees, 24 feet low; black bass are fair to 5 pounds on spinners, some topwaters early, worms are good later in the day in 15 to 20 feet of water; striper are good in 30-40 feet of water around the dam to Marker 5 on live bait or 2 ounce green and white Bananahead jigs; crappie are slow; white bass are slow; catfish are fairly good in 2-5 feet of water early, fish are moving into 20 feet of water in the middle of the day on shrimp and cheese stinkbait.

Falcon: Water clearing on the lower end near the dam, muddy on the upper end; 24 feet low; black bass to 7 3/4 pounds are fair on worms and cranks; striper are fair near the dam, mostly trolling jigs; crappie are slow; white bass are good in number but small

in size; catfish are good on frozen shrimp, most are small.

West

Fort Phantom Hill: Water murky, normal level; black bass are fair to 3 pounds on spinners and jigs; hybrid striper are fair on spinners and jigs; crappie are fair to 10 fish per string on minnows; white bass are beginning to run on minnows and jigs; catfish are good to 3 pounds.

Hubbard Creek: Water muddy, 8 inches low; black bass are slow; striper are slow; crappie are slow; white bass are slow; catfish are fairly good on large worms, yellow catfish to 40 pounds on trotline with live bait.

Oak Creek: Water clear, 75

degrees, 7 feet low; black bass are slow; crappie are fair on minnows to 12 fish per string; white bass are slow; catfish are fair to 4 pounds.

Possum Kingdom: Water murky, 78 degrees, 18 inches above normal level; black bass are good to 4 pounds with limits on topwaters and Rat-L-Traps near shoreline in 6 feet of water; striper are beginning to pick up on top-water jigs with trailers; crappie are good with many in the larger sizes on live bait and yellow jigs; white bass are picking up; catfish are good on rod and reel to 11 pounds on minnows and stinkbait; catfish are good to 25 pounds on trotlines with live bait.

Spence: Water clear, 72 degrees, 34 feet low; black bass are good to 8 pounds on spinners; striper are good to 20 pounds on large shiners; crappie are slow; white bass are slow; catfish are good to 6 pounds on nightcrawlers and shrimp.

Stamford: Water murky, 78 degrees, normal level; black bass are fair to 6 pounds on white spinners; striper are slow; crappie are fair to 1 pound each to 10 fish per string on live bait; catfish are good to 30 pounds on trotline baited with goldfish; channel catfish and blue catfish are good to 10 pounds on liver.

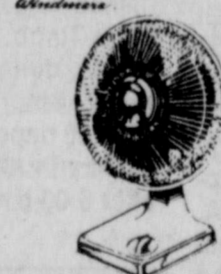

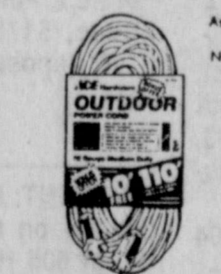

I am doing some family research and I would greatly appreciate any information you can furnish regarding the following events that took place in our lives while living in Eastland, Texas, November 1926 to November 1928.

About Thanksgiving time, after we had moved into the Methodist Parsonage, members of the church arrived and held an old fashion "Pounding", that is, presenting food and other items that would be useful during the day by day living of this family. I have wondered if there was ever any mention of this in the local paper?

Another event has to do with the Eastland County Courthouse, the taking of Old Rip from the corner stone. I

was there that day with my father, Rev. Frank E. Singleton and I saw him hold the toad in his hand and proclaimed that the toad was alive. If not mistaken, one of the news service recorded the entire event?

Then the Santa Claus bank robbery in Cisco, Texas. As a boy I would go across the street to the court room, in the old red high school building, and attend some of the hearings that took place.

The final event happened

some time in 1932 when my father returned to Eastland to attend to some church business. He left his Nash auto in the garage across from, I think, Texas hotel. At about one p.m. the Saturday morning, the garage blew up. The car was a total loss.

Any information you can furnish me regarding these events will be greatly appreciated. If there is any charge, let me know and I'll send you a check.

Pharmacy Topics

Oldsters do lose some memory skills as they age, says a neuroscientist at University of California/Irvine—but they keep improving verbal reasoning skills and semantic memory used in complex decision-making.

New automated eye test for infants has been invented by a neurologist at MIT. Doctors recommend vision testing at six months for preemies and babies with family history of lazy eye or eye misalignment.

Doctor at the University of Missouri in Kansas City used a balloon catheter to dilate clogged brain arteries of patients at risk for stroke. Blood vessels stayed open up to five years in most patients.

Expectant mothers at risk at Magee Women's Hospital in Pittsburgh were trained to recognize early warning signs of premature labor. Result: early births dropped from 14 percent to 9 percent.

Shock waves within the body, delivered via endoscope, are shown to be effective against gallstones, doctors at University Hospital, Boston University School of Medicine, report. Procedure takes about an hour.

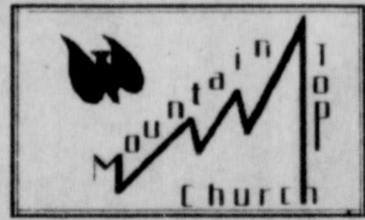

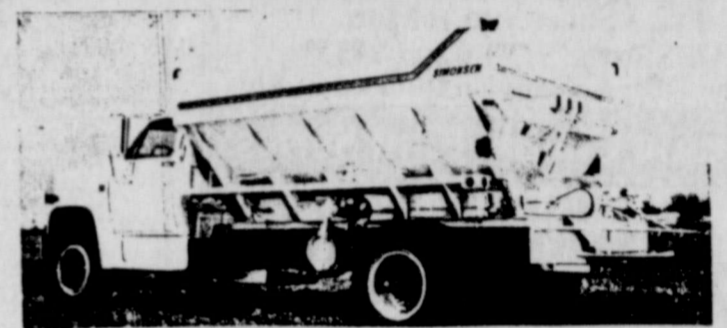
of the state have worked with the local members in building the beautiful new brick building.

Ruth Cartee, director of the Senior Center presented the family a framed copy of a Resolution Proclaiming June 11, at the Senior Center as "Diehm Day."

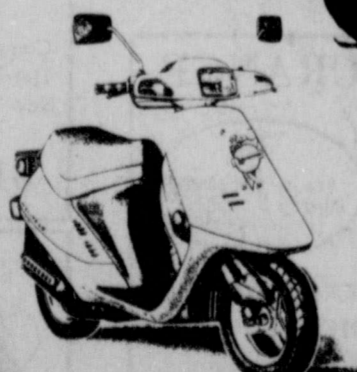

County Commissioners Against Postal Increase

At Monday's Commissioners Court meeting the Commissioners and County Judge Scott Bailey signed a Resolution stating that they are against an increase in postal rates. The resolution reads as follows:

WHEREAS, the United States Postal Service has filed notice for an increase in postage rates to be effective upon the approval of all appropriate bodies, and

WHEREAS, such a postal increase will mandate a significant financial impact on local county governments who provide such essential local services as voter registration forms, jury duty summonses and pay, tax notices, payments for JTPA and other Federal or special service programs, and

WHEREAS, in essence, such a postal increase will thus be a form of 'double taxation' on local taxpayers, for required governmental services, and

WHEREAS, the United States Postal Service and local county governments should be working toward the mutual benefit of local taxpayers

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Eastland County Commissioners' Court does hereby urge the United States Postal Service to create a 'local government postal rate' as part of its current rate filing in an effort to eliminate a potential federal mandate to increase local tax rates due to an increase in postal rates.

Judge Bailey reported that the Texas Association of Counties has sent copies of this Resolution to all 254 counties in the state. Commissioners Courts which pass the Resolution are being asked to forward it to Postmaster General Anthony M. Frank, Washington, D.C.

During the May 24 meeting of the Texas Association of Counties Board of Directors a Resolution was also passed requesting that the Postmaster General establish a 'local government postal rate' for county governments.
