### VIDEOTAPERS... THE HILTON NEEDS YOUR HELP!!

Persons in or around Cisco who have had videotape recorders over the past few years, and have taped certain programs, could be of valuable assistance to the Hilton Community Center, Board President Eris Ritchie has stated.

Ritchie said that the Hilton board is now in the process of completing programming work on a permanent video exhibit that will become a part of the Hilton's attractions in late summer or early fall. The project has been made possible by grants totalling nearly \$14,000 from the Hilton Foundation in Los Angeles, the organization that funded the rehabilitation project which converted the old Mobley Hotel into the Conrad N. Hilton Memorial Park and Community Center.

Videotapers can provide absolutely invaluable assistance to the project if they have good, sharp recordings of any or all of the following programs, in a normal or standard speed:

1. The "Big Country Reporter" program about the Mobley/Hilton project, done approximately late summer or fall of 1984, broadcast by KTAB-TV, Abilene, Channel 32.
2. The "Big Country Reporter" program about the "Santa Claus Bank Robbery" done in November or December of 1984, broadcast by KTAB-TV, Abilene, Channel 32.
3. The CJC Wrangler Band and Belles in the Macy's Parade in New York in 1977, broadcast by NBC Television.
4. The CJC Wrangler Band and Belles in the Macy's Parade in New York in 1981, broadcast by NBC Television.
5. The CJC Wrangler Band and Belles in the Macy's Parade in New York in 1984, broadcast by NBC Television.
6. KTAB-TV news coverage of Hilton Community Center dedication on October 13, 1986.

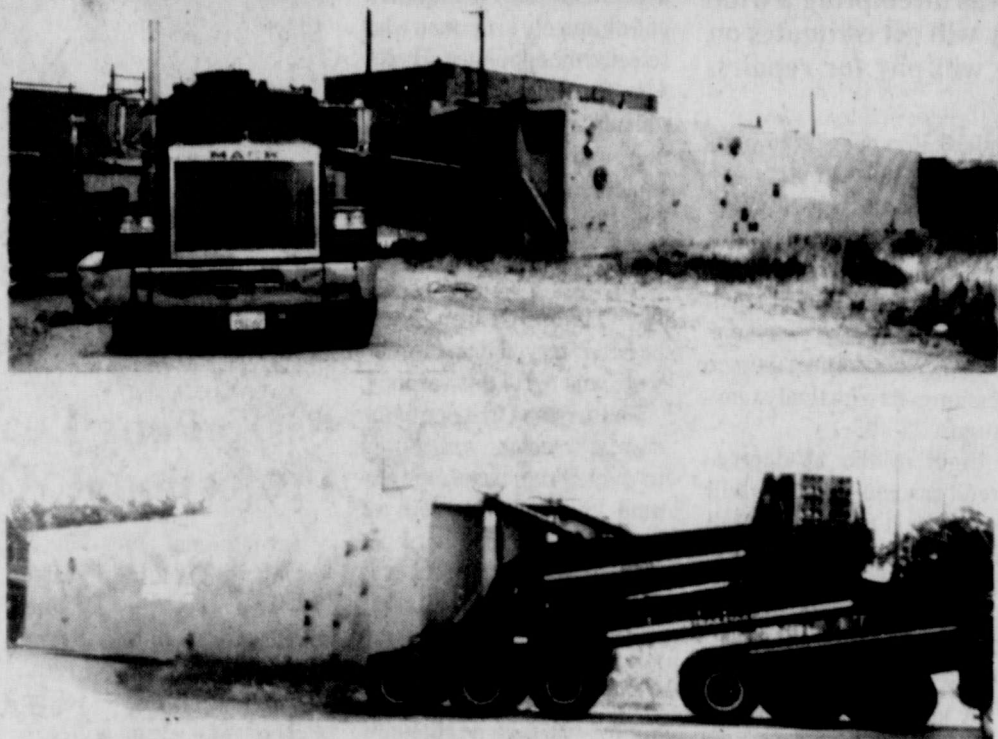
Mr. Ritchie stated that he has all of the above videotapes in his possession, but most of them are recorded at extended play (very slow) speeds. For purposes of the video permanent exhibit, tapes are needed that are recorded at normal speed. The tapes are also dated so far back that the Abilene television stations do not have them on file.

"Anyone having one or more tapes of these programs could be of tremendous assistance to us in the development of this project," Ritchie said. We need only to borrow the tapes, and they can be returned to the owner unhampered in anyway. ### Huge Tractor-Trailer Rig Damages Sidewalk In Tuesday Night Incident

A 19-axle tractor-trailer loaded with a "box" which measured 94-feet long, 16-feet wide, 14-feet high and weighed 200,000 pounds, created problems when it tried to come through Cisco Tuesday night.

The truck and its load were enroute to Kansas from Pennsylvania by way of Houston when it tried to turn onto East 6th Street from Conrad Hilton Avenue. In attempting to make the wide right turn, the truck crushed several feet of sidewalk in front of Dixon's Auto Supply.

The rig was parked behind Reynolds Manufacturing Co. while Cisco police and Department of Public Safety officers investigated.

The box was a helium cold box used to separate crude helium from natural gas and was being transported from Houston to Liberal, Kansas, on a 19-axle tractor-trailer by Vose Moving of Waterloo, Iowa. The movers said the box was made by Air Products and Chemicals Inc., of Wilkes-Barre, Pa., from where it traveled by barge to

Houston. Cisco Police Officer Donald Wiley was on duty and standing on the corner of the sidewalk when the incident occurred. The movers intentionally drove on the sidewalk to make the turn, according to Wiley, and seemed upset because the sidewalk didn't hold up.

The movers told Cisco Chief of Police Douglas Fairbanks that they had scouted the route in April and also had made a bad turn in Rising Star.

The city will get estimates on the damage and the moving company's insurance will pay for the repairs.

The movers, who did have a permit for the huge load, were able to leave Cisco around noon Wednesday, continuing north on Hwy. 183 toward Oklahoma enroute to Panhandle Eastern's National Helium Facility near Liberal, Kansas. The load was too wide for rail shipment and was traveling at a maximum speed of 40 mph.

### Cisco Junior College Regents Adopt Budget For 1990-91

The Cisco Junior College Board of Regents adopted the budget for 1990-91 at its June 21 meeting. The projected budget amounted to \$5,494,933.

"for the third consecutive year, no tax increase for local property owners is anticipated," stated CJC President Dr. Roger C. Schustereit. The rate will be officially adopted at a later date.

Tuition was increased by \$2 per semester hour, and other fees were raised to add revenue to cover such cost increases as medical insurance. The budget included salary increases for college employees.

A bid for the pond at the B.B. Owen demonstration farm was awarded to Prater Equipment of Comanche. A bid to re-roof the Science Building was awarded to Crawford Roofing of Abilene.

David Trussell was hired as history/government instructor to replace Dr. Monte Lewis, who will join the faculty of Howard Payne University. The Board also approved the employment of Steven Vincent to temporarily replace Carroll Brown as drama instructor while she is on a one year leave of absence.

In other business, the Board as follows:

- Heard a report on the status of off-campus programs, especially Abilene academic

offerings.

- Received an enrollment report on the first summer session and class load reports for the 1989-90 school year.

- Learned that CJC has received a Literacy Program grant and a gift from the Rockwell Foundation to help fund a study skills center.

- Authorized Dr. Schustereit to negotiate with E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital for the use of the Fitness Center by rehabilitation clients.

- As previously reported, did not select a new Board member to replace the late Billy Reynolds with no nominee receiving the required five votes.

- And dealt with other routine matters.

The next meeting of the Board of Regents will be July 9.

### Teacher! Farmer! Actor?

Computer teacher by day, farmer/rancher by night — and now, an actor? This description applies now to Jerry Davis who made his non-speaking debut as the Wino in **LITTLE SHOP OF HORRORS**.

"Caught up in the excitement of it, I agreed when Scott (Taylor, the director of **BROADWAY MAGIC**) asked in I'd take a speaking role in the next play," Davis says he hesitated only briefly and then decided he'd "enjoyed watching others — including my wife, Lou Jane — long enough. I wanted to see if I could do it."

Davis, a native of Rising Star, graduated from Rising Star High School in "I won't tell when." Then he received a Bachelor of Science degree in chemistry and math from Howard Payne University and went on to earn a Master of Science from East Texas State. He now teaches computer science and computer literacy at Cisco Junior and Senior High.

Jerry and Lou Jane (who is the librarian at Cisco Junior-Senior High) have four children — Sharla Qualls of Newcastle, Patrick Qualls of Lubbock, Greg Qualls of Dallas and Leslie Boyd of Anson.

Laughing, as most people do about "what free time?", Jerry's hobbies include computer programming, camping and travel. "I can now say one

of my hobbies is theatre because the more you do the more you want to do."

Jerry appears in **BROADWAY MAGIC** as the Setter — a fictional character who acts as the narrator and sometimes actor of the story.

"There are several different types of musicals we've chosen — ones based on fairy tales, ones based on famous novels, and ones based on famous real-life people — for example, My role is to link them all together — the script is great fun."

Davis also has the rare pleasure of being onstage with his wife. They're in scenes from **OKLAHOMA!** and **FIDDLER ON THE ROOF**. "But the best fun is our duet from **HIGH BUTTON SHOES**. Scott even has me dancing."

Taylor reveals how well the Davises worked together when they performed at a local civic organization recently. "They were nervous before they started, but one look at Lou Jane and Jerry was off! They were very fun and funny together."

Davis feels the most interesting part of theatre is "to be around people who are creating a show, putting their talents together. If you ever say "I can't do that—," several people will chime in to convince you you can. And never say it in front of Tom or Carol

**Cisco Junior College Will Begin Classes In Abilene On July 17**

Cisco Junior College will offer a limited number of classes in Abilene the second summer session, the first such classes it has ever offered there.

The schedule for the term starting July 17 includes 13 sections and eight different classes of academic courses for degree credit, plus four non-degree credit develop-

mental education classes for students who need work in basic reading, writing and math skills.

Academic classes offered are both halves of freshman English composition, plus English literature, Texas government, the second half of American history, intermediate algebra, general psychology and public speaking.

Registration for classes taught either at Abilene or Clyde starts July 9 at CJC's Abilene center, 209 N. Danville Drive.

The academic classes scheduled here are the first public undergraduate academic classes ever offered in Abilene, a center of private higher education for all but 10 years of its existence.

The day schedule will include classes offered Tuesday through Thursday, because on Monday and Friday the classrooms will be occupied by nursing classes, said CJC President Dr. Roger Schustereit. Day class hours will be 8 a.m. - 10:15 a.m.

and 10:30 a.m. - 12:45 p.m. three days a week.

Evening classes will meet Monday - Wednesday and Tuesday - Thursday, 6:15 p.m. - 10:05 p.m., with breaks during the nearly four-hour long periods. The summer session ends with final exams August 22 - 23.

Eight of the 13 degree-credit academic sections will be taught at night, as will all four developmental courses. The nucleus of the teaching staff will be people already on the CJC faculty, said Clois Purvis, dean of instruction.

A student may enroll for classes at both Clyde and Abilene the same academic term - for instance, by scheduling a day class at Abilene and an evening class at Clyde.

A bill signed into law by Gov. Bill Clements recently repealed a 15-year-old law that prohibited junior colleges from offering academic courses at branch campuses in counties that have 97,500-plus population and only private colleges and universities.

I believe the voters of the CJC Taxing District would be better served if an election were held to fill this vacancy.

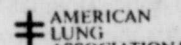

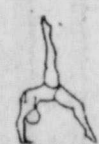

Boerne, TX 78006 needs help  
with information about some  
of her family who lived in or  
near Desdemona, also called  
Hogtown, TX, as well as some  
of the buildings, customs and  
happenings in the area during  
the time her family lived there.  
She writes: I am in the pro-  
cess of writing a book about  
my families who came to  
Desdemona ("Hogtown") TX  
in 1878, and am seeking in-  
formation about the LEE,  
YANDELL and O'REAR

families. Great grandparents  
were Columbus Addison LEE  
and Parmelia Caroline  
(YANDELL) LEE. Some of  
the YANDELL families came  
to Eastland/Comanche/Erath  
County areas at the same time  
in 1878. Additionally, Cap-  
tain Jack O'REAR, whose  
family came to "Hogtown"  
area around 1878 was an uncle  
of my grandfather, William  
Ira SCUDDER (whose  
mother was a sister to Jack  
O'REAR). Columbus Ad-  
dison LEE and family lived  
just across the county line in  
Comanche County, but  
Hogtown was the town they  
lived nearest. Captain Jack  
O'REAR his wife and four of  
their children are buried in  
the Desdemona Cemetery.  
The entire family was active  
in a church there and I would  
like to know which church  
and something about it.

The Columbus Addison  
LEE family moved to Sey-  
mour, TX in 1891. LEE chil-  
dren included: ROBERT (or

BOB); GEORGE; CORA;  
MARY TENNESSEE;  
DORA; AMOS; and LUNA.  
At least six possibly seven  
got their entire education in  
schools near Hogtown Bob &  
George possibly were out of  
school when they came to  
Hogtown, the others were  
definitely of school age. I  
would especially like to de-  
termine what school they at-  
tended.

Columbus Addison LEE  
(C.A. LEE) was a music mas-  
ter, which was what music  
teachers were called in the  
old days. He was also a  
rancher. In 1890 my grand-  
mother wrote letters that  
spoke of my father leading  
singing at church and other  
musical gatherings, and de-  
scribed "singing conven-  
tions" that the family at-  
tended. Frequently included  
at the gatherings was the play-  
ing of a hammered dulcimer  
that C.A. LEE bought in  
Sedalia Missouri in 1859  
which he brought with the  
family to Hogtown in 1878.  
All the LEE children were  
proficient playing the instru-  
ment and my Grandmother  
(Dore Lee SCUDDER) told  
of musical gatherings that  
took place while the family  
lived near Hogtown.

I now have Addison LEE's  
hammered dulcimer. I play  
the instrument and sing the  
songs I learned from my  
grandmother. This same in-  
strument has been heard at  
the Texas Folklife Festival in  
San Antonio (for the last ten  
years), the Texas Folklore  
Society (April 1990), the  
Texas Historical Commission

and other such groups.

I have recently heard of  
music that the LEE family  
played while traveling from  
Missouri to Texas, which  
included a folk dance called  
"Stepping Over The Line". I  
am told this was a "favorite  
in the area" This is the one that  
Grandma didn't teach me.  
Is there anyone with knowl-  
edge of this tune?

I would like any informa-  
tion about the music and sing-  
ing that went on in Hogtown  
area during the late 1800's  
and if there are historical  
societies or groups that might  
have information, either about  
the LEE and O'REAR fami-  
lies in particular, or about the  
Hogtown area. Is there a  
newspaper which might have  
files from the time period?

EDITOR'S NOTE: In the  
book, "Were You In Ranger"  
by Boyce House, Chapter V,  
Desdemona has information  
of Captain A.J. O'Rear hav-  
ing been Desdemona's post-  
master for nearly thirty years.  
Also, other books by House  
may be checked. (J.P.)

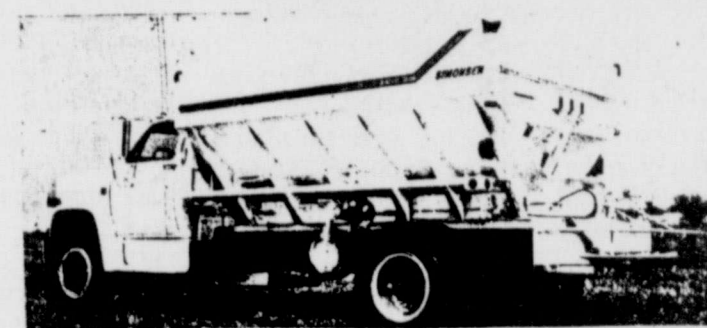

The mild summer we experienced here in Eastland County in 1989 apparently will not be repeated in 1990. It has really been hot. It's summer time, and more folks are heading for the parks, lakes and beaches.

"But as you heed the call of the wild you should also watch out for being bitten by animals, wild or otherwise," said Dr. Bruce Lawhorn, veterinarian with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Animals bites may cause rabies," he warned, explaining that human beings and all warm-blooded animals are susceptible to rabies, a virus disease of the central nervous system that without treatment is invariably fatal.

Rabies can be controlled if you understand the problem and know what to watch out for.

You should watch out for these situations:

\* Bold, "friendly or apparently tame" wild animals.

\* Night animals such as skunks or foxes that are seen during the day.

\* Pets that have difficulty walking, eating or drinking.

\* Signs of excitement or viciousness in normally quiet animals.

A veterinarian should be consulted immediately, if any of these signs are noted.

If a person is bitten by an animal, treat the bite as if the animal were rabid and follow these steps:

\* Identify the animal - by kind, size, color, and location.

Caution children to seek the help of a policeman or other adult.

\* Have the animal caught, and immediately report the incident to animal control officials or police. Keep the animal in sight until it is

apprehended. Trying to catch the animal without professional help means added risk.

\* Cleanse the wound immediately and thoroughly by washing with soap and water. Rinse well and disinfect with alcohol, iodine, or other disinfectants. This lessens the chance of contacting the rabies virus.

\* See a doctor immediately after washing the wound. The physician will decide on the need for treatment to prevent rabies.

\* If possible, have the biting dog or cat tested for rabies or placed under observation. If it is alive and normal after 10 days of observation, the animal was not infected at the time of the bite. A veterinarian should be consulted concerning all aspects of this

confinement period. The 10 day observation period is not valid for animals other than dogs and cats. Wild animals such as skunks, bats, foxes, and raccoons should be immediately submitted by a veterinarian for laboratory rabies examination.

Major steps toward community control of rabies can be achieved by: 1) Immuniz-

ing all dogs and cats over three months of age annually. 2) Registering and licensing all owned dogs and cats. 3) Impounding all stray dogs and cats. 4) If there is no animal control officer, appoint one and provide pound or shelter facilities. 5) Testing all biting dogs and cats or quarantining them for observation for a period of 10 days.

Effective therapy against premenstrual tension: two-hour daily doses of bright light, given the week before menstruation. Researchers at University of California/San Diego used the equivalent of eight 40-watt bulbs.

Beta-carotene, the precursor of vitamin A, may reverse pre-cancerous growths in the mouth. Beta-carotene seems to be less toxic than the vitamin itself. The American Society of Clinical Oncology in San Francisco did the testing.

New device to drain excess fluid from the eye in glaucoma is an acrylic tube implanted near the iris. The fluid pumped out is later absorbed by the body.

Nursing mothers who drink alcohol may slow the motor development of their babies, a University of Washington study found. To keep breast milk safe, researchers recommend a varied diet, limited caffeine, and avoidance of medications where possible.

Biologist Bob Howells of the departments Heart O' the Hills Research Station at Ingram said the fish exceeded all expectations and are now fairly abundant in the San Antonio river Authority, reservoir just southeast of the city.  
We stocked the hybrids in Braunig partly because we knew there were no white or

black crappie in the reservoir," Howells said. "That makes it easier to judge their success for failure since there is no identification problem."  
Howells said the introduced fish obviously had a high survival rate, since a cove rotenone survey found almost three pounds of crappie per acre. He said anything over one pound of crappie per acre is generally regarded as a good crappie population.  
The best part, Howells noted, is that virtually all the fish are over the 10-inch minimum length limit that will be going into effect statewide on September 1. There currently is a 25-per-day bag

limit on crappie on Braunig. "These crappie have grown faster than either white or black crappie normally grow, which is often the case with hybrid fish," said Howells. "Another good feature about them is that they obviously spawned this year, since we picked up some young-of-the-year crappie in our survey."  
"Right now I don't think many fishermen realize crappie exist in Braunig, although some probably have been caught by anglers fishing for other species," he said. Howells said it might be more difficult to locate schools of the hybrids right now than it will be later. "I think fisher-

men will be able to catch them easily during the fall and winter when the fish likely will move into deep water around the dam and close to the power plant outlet."  
Lake Braunig is located adjacent to interstate Highway 37 just south of Loop 410. An entrance fee is charged.

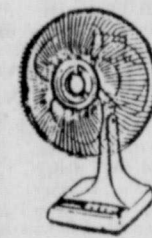

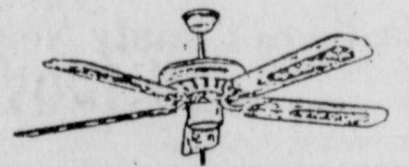

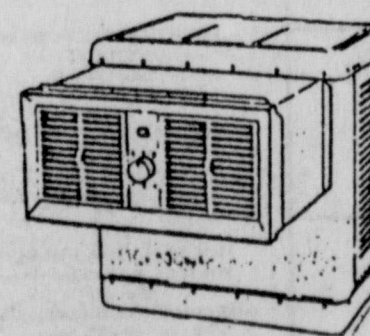

# State Begins Collecting New Tax Rate on Sunday, July 1

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Tuesday reminded everyone who collects or pays sales tax there will be an additional quarter percent sales tax collected on all taxable purchases beginning Sunday, July 1.

"The change means we'll all be paying a little bit more to help fund education and human services in Texas," Bullock said.

The new rate of 6 1/4 percent was approved by the Texas Legislature after a fourth special session on the issue ended in early June. The increase brings the maximum sales tax rate in Texas to 8 1/4 percent when optional local sales taxes are included.

Bullock's office estimates that a family of four making \$35,000 a year will pay an additional \$24.65 a year in the state sales tax.

The Comptroller's Office has sent almost half a million postcards notifying sales tax permit holders across Texas of the change.

"Business owners with retail sales outlets will have to reprogram their cash regis-

ters virtually overnight," Bullock said. "This is a heavy burden we tried to lighten a little by giving as much advance notice as possible."

Bullock said new 6 1/4 percent and 8 1/4 percent rate cards are available at the 33 Comptroller offices in Texas. Also available is a new listing of the combined state and local sales tax rates for every city in the state.

"We've sent out over 55,000 of the new rate cards but there are plenty more free of charge for anyone who asks," Bullock said.

Next meeting for the VFW will be July 3, all members are urged to attend. New officers will hold the meeting.

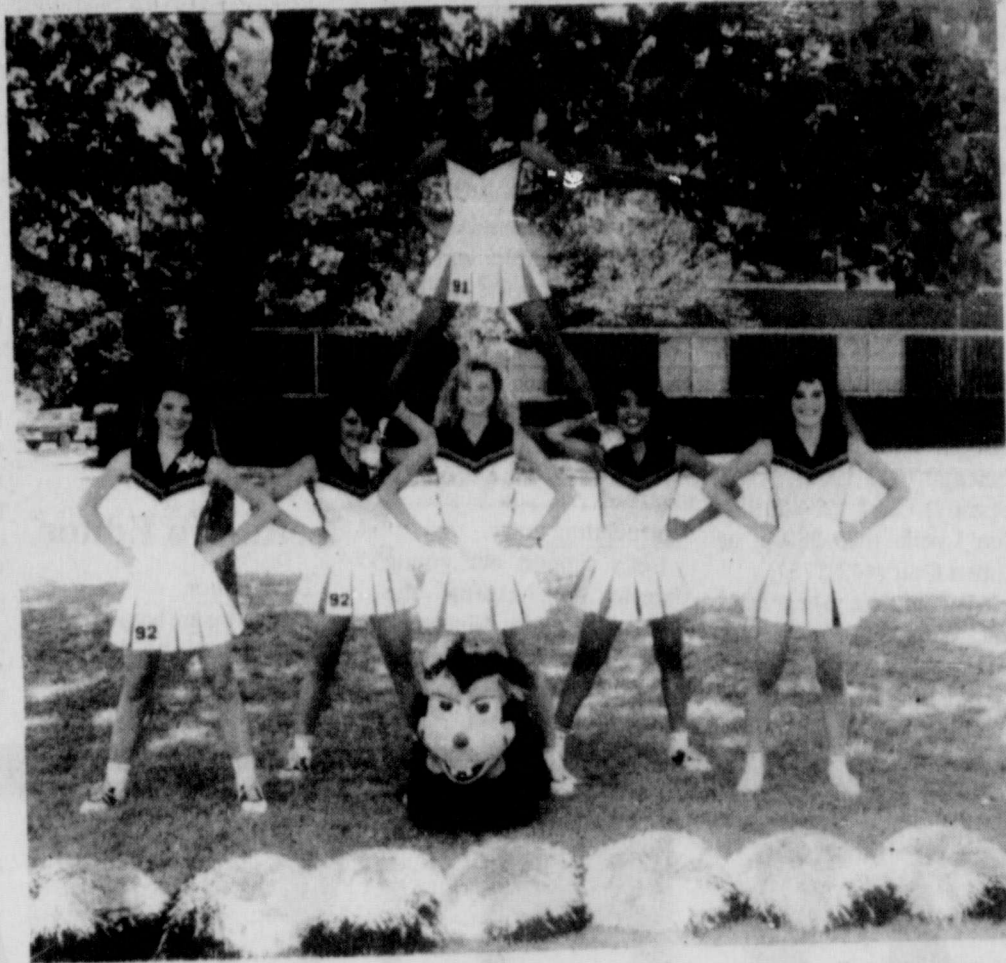
## Donham-Reed Reunion Held

## Cisco Post Office Announces Changes In Mail Schedules

Effective July 1, 1990, the arrival schedule for the incoming mails truck for the Cisco and other local Post Offices, is being revised in an effort to maximize the amount of mails available daily, according to Postmaster Melvin Wende.

This change will necessitate minor delivery time and adjustments of approximately 20 minutes for city and rural delivery routes, and will require the Post Office box unit cut-off time to be set at 8:30 a.m. instead of the current 8 a.m. time, Mr. Wende said. An 8:30 a.m. cut-off time will enable the Cisco Post Office to provide a more reliable,

consistent availability of all preferential mails, and parcels, for the box customers.

Outgoing mails schedules will remain the same, with the exception of Saturday. Saturdays outgoing mails will be extended an extra hour from the outside drop box, with a cut-off time of 5:10 p.m., Mr. Wende said. Normal hours of operation for the window will not be effected, he added.

Medicine For The Layman: PMS: Facts and Myths

Depression, anxiety, irritability, sadness, paranoia, difficulty with concentration and decision making, lethargy, food cravings, bloating and weight gain have all been associated with the condition known as PMS.



An ancient problem may help scientists to new insights.

This premenstrual syndrome is a menstrually related mood disorder with recurrent, usually predictable symptoms. Though the name is fairly new, descriptions of the disorder date back to Hippocrates. Over the years, confusion, anecdotes, myths, conflicting explanations, historical prejudices against women and its numerous symptoms have made PMS difficult to study. The cause is still unknown. It's unclear why some women are affected and others not and a variety of treatments have proven ineffective.

What is certain is that the effects are real and have been documented. Researchers hope that as their understanding of this disorder improves, they'll learn more about the relationship between biology and behavior.
