Eddie McMillan Is Named To CJC Board Of Regents

Cisco insurance agent Eddie McMillan was unanimously selected by the Cisco Junior College Board of Regents to fill the Board vacancy of the late Billy Reynolds. The selection came during the Board's July 9 meeting.

Joe Cooper, Board member who nominated McMillan, said, "I know Eddie will be an asset to CJC and the Board. His knowledge of insurance will be particularly helpful in this time of rapidly increasing insurance costs, especially health insurance." McMillan stated, "I am honored to be named to the Board. I hope my background and experience will be of help to all."

The Board also approved an administrative reorganization. Chuck Lawrence, CJC football coach, was named Dean of Students. Dr. John Muller became Dean of Administrative Services.

"We are reorganizing to fill the administrative duties of Robby Robinson," said CJC president, Dr. Roger C.

Schustereit. "Dr. Muller will cover the planning and evaluation areas Robby so ably performed, and Dean Lawrence will take on the student life areas vacated by Dr. Muller," said Schustereit. Lawrence will continue to coach football, but will be relieved of teaching duties.

In other business, the Board did the following:

—Unanimously re-elected Dick Woolley and Brad Kimbrough as Board President and Vice President respectively. Carolyn Page was elected Board Secretary.

—Adopted a state required English Language policy.

—Awarded the athletic insurance bid to low bidder, National Sports Underwriters.

—Named Kenneth D. Parker, CPA, of Eastland to do the annual financial audit.

—Created a Board committee chaired by Kimbrough with members Page and Charles Preston to study the

City Of Cisco Signs Contract With BFI For Solid Waste Collection And Disposal

At their meeting on Tuesday, July 10th, the Cisco City Council voted to accept the contract for solid waste collection and disposal with Browning-Ferris Industries (BFI). According to the contract BFI will start picking up all residential and commercial trash on Monday, September 3, 1990. BFI is also providing several large 6-yard dumpsters for a convenience station which will be operated by the City.

City Manager Michael Moore stated that the City Council has spent many, many hours over the last year considering the problems confronting the City's landfill, investigating alternatives, trying to determine real and potential long-term costs, and reviewing private service proposals before deciding on BFI's proposal. The contract calls for the same type of residential pick-up the City has now and containers and hand pick-up for commercial customers. Moore further said "The Council believes that BFI can and will be a good reliable service provider, and in the long run, be a lot more cost effective, meaning cheaper, for our residents."

The basic residential rate for sanitation services will be \$8.85, a \$1.85 increase over the current \$7.00 rate. Because of the new containers, commercial rates under the new service will vary greatly depending on the service the customer requests or requires. The new rates will become effective September 1st, and will be on the water bill received on October 1st.

Mayor Joe Wheatley stated that "BFI's proposal this time was significantly different, and better, than the one we reviewed last September. This proposal provides for BFI to

have an area office here and to build a regional solid waste transfer station and truck maintenance facility in Cisco. This will add to the City's tax base and provide a few more jobs for our citizens."

While the City's rapidly aging sanitation and landfill equipment have become a major financial concern, the primary reason for going to a private provider of solid waste collection and disposal are the upcoming Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and Texas Health Department regulations that make owning and operating a landfill totally cost prohibitive for a small community. These new regulations have created a virtual solid waste crisis in Texas, literally forcing the closing of dozens of landfills across the state.

Subtitle D of the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act passed by Congress requires EPA to establish and implement regulations that control the development and operations of landfills. (EPA then passes these regulations and requirements on to the Texas Health Department for enforcement.) Some of the regulations EPA has developed under Subtitle D include:

1. Daily cover required on all sites.
2. Control of explosive gases (methane) will be required.
3. Strict water drainage control will be required.
4. Closure and post-closure plans for all sites must be submitted for approval, and new sites must have these plans at the time of permit application.
5. Post-closure maintenance periods of at least 30 years will be required.
6. Financial assurances for proper closure and post-closure maintenance will have

to be provided for the life of the landfill and for the 30-year post-closure period.

7. New landfills and new trenches in existing landfills must meet groundwater carcinogenic (cancer) risk levels; most will be required to have either natural or synthetic liners and leachate collection systems.

8. Completed sections of existing landfills may be retrofitted for liners and leachate collection systems.

9. Groundwater monitoring wells will be required on the site to assure that leakage does not pollute water supplies. The sampling requirements will be intense and will extend through the 30-year post-closure maintenance period.

"All these new requirements are going to be extremely costly; especially the lining requirements, either natural or synthetic, the monitoring wells, and the 30-year post-closure maintenance period requirements," Moore said. "And when you consider we only have 4 or 5 years left at our landfill site, and add on the tremendous costs of acquiring, permitting and developing a new site, we have no choice but to close the landfill and get out of the business." It is expected that the current landfill will stop accepting trash and close its gate permanently on Saturday, September 1st.

The situation and sense of urgency was compounded when the City learned late last month that the Texas Health Department is rewriting its existing landfill rules to require a 30-year post-closure maintenance period for landfills instead of the current 5-year monitoring period. In order to avoid this new and immediate substantial cost, the City must close its landfill very quickly.

Moore stated that the new service through BFI should prove to be a benefit to Cisco's sanitation customers. While residential pick-up will be done on the same manner, BFI's newer and better equipment will make the service more reliable. Also containers that the City could not provide before will be available now for commercial and industrial customers. And a convenience station will be available to accommodate those residential who occasionally need to haul off and dispose of a load of trash.

Beginning the week of July 23rd representatives from BFI will be in Cisco contacting commercial and industrial sanitation customers. These representatives will detail BFI's different service levels, the City's sanitation requirements, and answer any questions about the transition from the City's current operation to BFI's. The City requests and appreciates the cooperation of its commercial customers with BFI's representatives.

My doorbell rang the day before the reunion. I opened to find Mr. and Mrs. Jack Waters, Granbury, standing there.

"Wanted to have a little visit with you before the big 'Shindig' begins tomorrow. Needed to find you less rushed so you could autograph a book for us."

I autographed one of my Hilton books explaining that it would be counted as one of the sales for Project Lobo.

Our conversation reverted to the 30's when Jack was one of my students at Cisco Grammar School. That year, Lucille Gragg and I had written a pageant entitled "Texas, Our Texas" for our Centennial year and graduation. We had planned a grandiose af-

fair at the football field with cowboy scenes, Indians, horses, the whole nine yards. The rains began falling 3 days before our gala pageant and continued for 3 more days after, forcing us to move inside, without horses and other outdoor settings. Besides the group scenes, we had individuals showing the Texas flower, tree, bird and motto. Jack, a 12-year-old, was the mockingbird because he was the best whistler we could find and could imitate any bird call. His mother made him a mockingbird suit with a long tail which he could manipulate with wires as he hopped around on the stage giving various bird calls while a hidden pianist played "Listen to the Mockingbird."

Two Men Electrocuted In Accident Thursday

Lawrence Ingram and Billy Steelman were electrocuted Thursday afternoon when a television antenna they were working on fell on power lines.

Ingram, 56, and Steelman, 50, died around 5 p.m. when a metal television antenna they were taking down fell and struck electrical power lines. The accident occurred at 1104 Avenue J.

A third man, Robert Haley, who was helping remove the antenna escaped injury when he let go of a wire attached to the antenna as it started to fall.

He said he yelled a warning to the two men when the antenna started to fall, but the men apparently couldn't let go before it struck the power lines.

The men were found lying on wet indoor-outdoor carpeting. No effort to resuscitate the men was made because of this situation, Shipman said. "We didn't know if the power was on or off," he said.

The accident caused a power outage in the area for some 20 minutes.

Funeral services for Ingram were pending at Cisco Funeral Home. Services for Steelman were pending at Kimbrough Funeral Home.

Drug Interactions: Be Aware

This is not uncommon when taking some ulcer, high blood pressure or asthma medications. It's particularly important for people who are taking multiple medications to talk with their physicians about any possible interactions. There may be alternative drugs available to your doctor which have a lower risk for interaction.

Whitehorn Candidate For Master's Degree From Hardin-Simmons

A 73 year old Eastland County minister and retired Veterans Administrator chaplain will be the oldest candidate for a master's degree at Hardin-Simmons University's August 17 summer commencement exercises.

He is the Rev. T.D. Whitehorn, pastor of the Nimrod Baptist Church, Cisco Baptist Association.

He is completing requirements for the master's degree in counseling and human development, with plans to join a son in Alabama in counseling work upon completing the degree at HSU.

Whitehorn, who lives on a farm three miles east of Carbon in Eastland County, has commuted to Abilene during the past year "to sharpen my skills."

The 1953 graduate of HSU (BS degree in Bible and sociology) "had a distinguished career" as a chaplain at Veterans Administration hospitals in St. Louis, Mo., and Fayetteville, ARK, according to Dr. Robert C. Barnes, head of the department of counseling and human development for HSU's Irvin School of Education.

Following graduation from HSU he attended Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, Fort Worth, where he earned the bachelor of divinity degree. He was the pastor of the First Baptist Church of Booker, TX immediately before going to work for the VA hospitals, serving until 1976.

His career has been varied as he served as a highway patrolman for 10 years before enrolling in HSU because he felt "a call to the ministry." Student pastorates have included the Admiral Baptist Church in Callahan County and the Sabanno Baptist Church near Cross Plains.

His experience also includes serving as a safety director for an oil field trucking firm "even while attending HSU."

After his retirement from the VA, he and his wife, Lavelle, initially moved to Eastland to a home they owned there and subsequently to the farm near Carbon.

Why go back to school? He said that in his role as minister and chaplain he felt a need for specialized training in counseling.

Does he feel comfortable in classes at HSU? "Yes. Very much so," he replied.

He said that entered the program "with some apprehension" because of his advanced years. "I didn't know whether I could be able to keep up. It has been a very enjoyable experience. I missed coming to classes during (the last) spring break."

He says that counseling classes are different from some other classes. "Counseling classes are almost like a counseling session."

He is such a good student that he was chosen as recipient of the Drs. Robert and Dorothy Barnes Endowed Scholarship.

"Few students have enriched our classes and endeared themselves to their fellow graduate students the way Chaplain Whitehorn has," said Dr. Barnes.

Following his graduation from HSU, he plans to qualify for licensure by the State of Texas as a professional counselor. He and his son, Dr. Michael A. Whitehorn, who currently is employed at Alabama State University, plan to establish a private practice in gerontological counseling. His son is director of the institutional resource center, at Montgomery, Alabama.

Oryx Energy Reveals Horizontal Drilling Results In Austin Chalk

In a hearing before the Texas Railroad Commission (TRC) today, Oryx Energy Company compared the production history of seven horizontal wells in the Austin Chalk with typical vertical wells from the same South Texas formation, indicating the sustained, increased production supports its position that temporary field rules on horizontal drilling in the Pearsall Field provide a reasonable framework for development and should be made permanent. The typical proved reserves from these wells have been estimated at approximately 450,000 gross barrels per well.

Cumulative production from the seven horizontal wells is nearly 800,000 barrels over the past one to three years. The J.B. Baggett #13, as an example, has produced 206,000 cumulative barrels since May 1988, compared with a nine-year production of 126,359 barrels from the J.B. #7, a vertical well on the same lease and one of the better wells in the field. The seven wells currently produce about 3,000 barrels of oil per day (BOPD).

Since January 1989, Oryx Energy's Pearsall Field production has increased from 160 BOPD to more than 16,000 BOPD while the cost per horizontal well has been reduced from 2.7 million. Lateral displacement has increased from less than 1,000 feet to an average of more than 3,000 feet, with some wells topping the 4,000-foot mark.

The Dallas-based independent also cited the increase in average number of rigs

operating in District 1, which includes the Pearsall Field, since the TRC issued the temporary field rules on horizontal drilling last fall. In June, 92 rigs—10 percent of the U.S. total—were in the Austin Chalk. This compares with 12 rigs in November 1989, when the temporary rules went into effect, and eight in August 1989, when the TRC heard the petition. Oryx Energy has completed 46 wells since the August hearing, 21 in the first quarter of 1990.

The temporary rules provide for a fourfold increase for horizontal allowables, to 1,312 BOPD from 328 BOPD, based on a horizontal displacement of 2,431 feet on 320-acre spacing. In April, the TRC applied a similar reasoning for a statewide horizontal drilling rule.

"Credit should be given to the TRC for prompt, innovative and effective regulation of horizontal drilling in the Pearsall Field," said James E. McCormick, president and chief operating officer. "We plan to be in the Chalk for a long time and will continue to acquire acreage and drill wells as long as the play is attractive."

McCormick said the technology appears applicable elsewhere, citing a horizontal well used for steam injection in California's Midway-Sunset Field and the company's activities in the Ellenburger formation in Nolan County, Tx, the Bakken Shale formation in North Dakota and the Niobrara formation in Colorado.

"These are just some of the domestic provinces conducive to horizontal drilling. We have successfully completed a horizontal well in the North Sea and see an application for this technology elsewhere overseas," added McCormick.

Gordon Spot

There has been good production of fruit in Eastland County this year. One fruit that is well adapted in this county is the blackberry. If properly cared for, the blackberries will produce an abundant crop of delicious fruit.

Summer, not winter, is the time to get serious about blackberry pruning.

For most varieties, the blackberry harvest has ended. Blackberries are an unusual plant in that they have a perennial root system but a biennial or two-year top.

New vegetative canes known as primocanes emerge from below ground each spring. This growth has large leaves and is strictly vegetative for one year. In the second year, the primocanes bloom and fruit and are floricanes. As soon as the berries are mature, the floricanes die immediately. Summer pruning is important for both the primocanes and floricanes.

Some of the best blackberry varieties, including Roseborough, Shawnee, Cheyenne, Womack and Brazos, produce erect free-standing primocanes.

As soon as these new primocanes are 3 feet tall or above the height of the fruiting canes, they should be topped to force lateral branching.

If left unpruned, these canes become excessively tall and willowy and protrude in a way that grabs anyone or anything within reach.

Top the primocane one, two or more times, depending on the vigor of growth from May to early September. Each time the blackberries are topped, cut them a bit higher until finally by early September, they have been pruned into a box hedge about 4 feet tall and 3 feet wide.

Pruning in this manner will develop a hedgerow of thick, multi-branched primocanes.

A well-pruned hedgerow will not only be more produc-

tive - it also will be easier to pick next spring.

The fruit buds that make next year's crop are formed in September and October, thus it is best not to resort to heavy winter pruning of primocanes, because this will cause removal of some of the fruit buds for next year's crop.

Semi-erect varieties like the thornless Hull or Black Satin should be topped in a similar manner to encourage branching.

These varieties will need a trellis to keep them erect.

Primocanes of trailing varieties like boysenberry, thornless boysenberry or Dorman red raspberry are best left to run on the ground under the trellis during the summer and fall and then twined onto the trellis in late winter, after the danger of hard freezes is past.

The fruiting floricanes die when the last berries mature. The chief problem with dead canes is clogging of the hedgerow, causing a serious hindrance to berry pickers in succeeding years.

Because selective removal of dead canes is slow and tedious, many producers simply shred the bushes to the ground after harvest and hope for sufficient primocane regrowth through the summer and fall to yield a good crop the following spring.

Instead of shredding canes to the ground, it is better to cut them from 1 to 2 feet above the ground to allow for better regrowth.

Peach ripening has almost "stopped" in many areas of Central Texas. Some of you recall a similar situation in 1980. In most situations heat tends to speed up the maturation process especially in many vegetable crops. However, the ripening of many fruit crops can essentially be shut down from super hot temperatures. The heat interferes with the metabolism of the plant forcing it to try to stay alive rather than attempt

Texas Legislature's Committees To Conduct Public Hearings On New District Lines

The Texas Legislature's committees on redistricting will conduct public hearings in Fort Worth on July 13 and in Dallas on July 14 in preparation for the drawing of new district lines for seats in the U.S. Congress, in the Texas Legislature, and on the State Board of Education.

The legislature is required to redistrict after publication of the 1990 United States census. Districts drawn in 1991 are to be in effect for the next 10 years. The public hearings are to gather information about how district lines should be drawn.

Redistricting in the past two decades has resulted in significant increases in legislative and congressional seats held by Blacks, Hispanics, and Republicans. Urban areas have gained population and legislative seats while rural areas have lost.

The 1990 census is expected to reveal the continuation of population trends that have shown increases in the percentage of the state population that is Black or Hispanic, as well as a shift in population away from the rural East and West Texas and metropolitan central city areas toward suburban communities.

A study by the Texas Legislative Council indicates that the state is predicted to have grown by about 20 percent between the 1980 and the 1990 census, increasing in population from 14.2 million to 17.11 million. Collin, Denton, Ellis, Hood, Parker, and Rockwall counties are projected to have grown by more than 50 percent, with Rockwall County showing the largest growth rate in the

state, with 98.4 percent.

Dallas County, with a 21.6 percent increase in population, is projected to have approximated the state rate of growth. Tarrant County's projected growth rate of 35.9 percent is substantially higher than the state rate and appears to be great enough to give the county an additional seat in the Texas House of Representatives. Growth in both Tarrant and Dallas counties appears to have occurred outside the urban centers in the surrounding suburban areas.

As a result of these uneven population changes, the census is expected to show that about half of the current Texas house districts in the hearing region have more population than that required for the "ideal" size of a district (114,100). Although districts 90, 100, 103, and 111 are all 20 percent or more below ideal district size, district 93 is projected to be 38 percent above ideal size. Senate dis-

tricts also show a wide range of variation in projected growth rates, from 19 percent below the ideal district size (552,000) in district 23 to 40 percent above in district 10.

The public hearings will be conducted jointly by the House Redistricting Committee, chaired by Representative D.R. "Tom" Uher (D—Bay City) and the Senate Select Committee on Legislative Redistricting, chaired by Senator Bob Glasgow (D—Stephenville). Senate committee members from the North Texas area include Senator Temple Dickson (D—Sweetwater), Senator O.H. "Ike" Harris (D—Dallas), Senator Eddie Bernice Johnson (D—Dallas), Senator Ted Lyon (D—Rockwall), and Senator Bill Ratliff (R—Mt. Pleasant). Representative Kent Grusendorf (R—Arlington) and Representative Patricia Hill (R—Dallas) are the North Texas area members of the house committee.

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

Hard-to-identify cases of Lyme disease may be found more easily with an experimental test reported in The Lancet, a British scientific journal. Researchers are studying the test in New York and New Jersey.

To top off the summer, Rev. White said that an area wide Back to School party and concert is being planned for all Jr. and Senior High Students on August 24th at Camp Inspiration.



A. Last time we mentioned the language of love - creating emotional word pictures. These are stories or objects to activate simultaneously the emotions and the intellect of a person. In so doing it causes the person to experience our words, not just hear them.
We use word pictures to
-increase the clarity of our conversations
-rivet a person's attention
-capture someone's emotions
-cause others to remember our words
-replace black and white conversation with living color
