County Commissioners: Public Hearing On Grant Proposal

In a Called Meeting Monday Eastland County Commissioners held their second and final hearing on a Grant Application for assistance in repairing an earthen dam and spillway on Eastland Lake. This Grant Application is a joint one between the City of Eastland and the County.

County Judge Scott Bailey called the meeting to order, and Cindy Helton, Coordinator for the City, detailed the Proposal. She said the Grant Request was for \$360,000, with \$115,000 more expected to be spent by the City. The repair would include raising the dam 5.2 ft. and widening the spillway up to 400 ft.

Helton said the State of Texas Department of Commerce will consider this Grant Proposal sometime in October. The meeting will be held in Abilene.

The Commissioners designated Eastland City Manager Paul Catoe as a representa-

tive. Richard Robinson, Comm. of Pct. 1, was designated as a representative of the County during the previous meeting.

County support of this proposal was listed as "crucial," with the Grant request having a good chance of approval this year. The same request was sent to the Department of Commerce last year, but was passed by.

Eastland Lake was involved with the Oct. 13, 1981 flooding of the North Fork of the Leon River through Eastland. About 13 inches of rain fell in one night on the

Two Inches Of Rain Fall; July Temperatures Cooler

Four Injured In Accident Near Cisco Sunday Morn

Four people from Fort Polk, La., were injured when their westbound car overturned about 7:15 a.m. Saturday, July

14, a mile east of Cisco on Interstate 20.

Aaron Butler, 20, was driver of the 1990 Ford, and Adrian Ford, 22, was the front seat passenger. Danial Ford, 3, and her 2-year-old brother, Blair, were asleep in the back seat, according to DPS officer Steve Foster, who investigated the accident.

Butler told Foster he was pulling off the highway to the right, preparing to stop. Adrian Ford, who was asleep, awoke to see the car was leaving the highway and thought Butler had gone to sleep. She grabbed the steering wheel to keep the car from going off the highway, causing Butler to lose control.

The car turned over, landing on its top. Danial Ford was ejected through the back window. The adults were wearing seat belts but the sleeping children were not restrained. The car was destroyed.

The four accident victims were taken to E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital. Relatives came from Big Spring Saturday afternoon to transport the people there by private vehicle.

In-Home And Family Support Program

Individuals with physical disabilities that substantially limit a major area of activity such as self-care, economic self-sufficiency, mobility, learning, or independent living or who have a record of such disability are potentially eligible for the In-Home and Family Support Program.

The IH/FSP program provides direct grant benefits to individuals with disabilities and their families for the purchase of equipment and/or services that enable the person with a disability to live independently in the community.

An eligible applicant may qualify for either or both of the following benefits:

—A \$3,600 one-time grant for purchase of equipment or architectural modifications.

—A \$3,600 annual subsidy for purchase of on-going services.

Individuals may live alone, with caretakers, or a spouse. Individuals served are age 4 and above. Eligibility is based on assessment of financial needs, need for services, and functional and physical disability. There is no resource limit. Recipients of SSI and who meet the definition of having a disability are automatically income eligible.

Pharmacy Topics

Cutting blood pressure really does reduce the risk of heart disease, an international study found. For every five to six points that blood pressure is reduced, the risk of heart disease goes down 20 to 25 percent and the risk of stroke by 30 to 40 percent.

New drug regimen against colorectal cancer combines common anti-cancer agent, 5-fluorouracil, with levamisole, an animal deworming drug. Combination therapy improves survival rates following surgery for advanced colon cancer, according to National Cancer Institute studies.

Bonding fillings in teeth with a special plastic resin cement may prevent later tooth fractures, say researchers at the UC/San Francisco School of Dentistry. Clinical trials are expected soon.

Most women can deliver a baby vaginally, even if they've had a Caesarean section, the American College of Obstetrics and Gynecology says. In an Illinois study, only four out of 66 women who'd previously had C-sections needed surgical delivery.

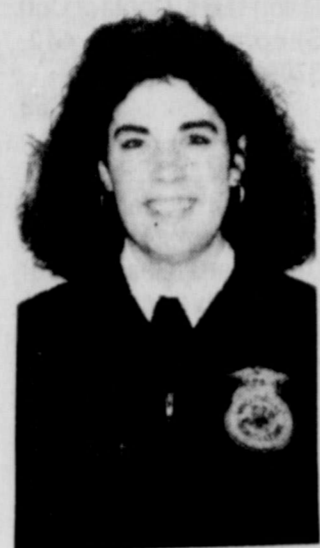

Airship Shamu, a black and white airship painted in the likeness of one of America's most recognized characters - Sea World's Shamu, the killer whale - arrived July 4 at its Sea World of Florida home base.

Airship International assembled Airship Shamu in its Elizabeth City, N.C., hangar. The lighter-than-air craft will make a series of goodwill appearances in Florida through August. In September, Airship Shamu embarks on a goodwill tour to the northeast with special visits to key cities and sporting events.

True to Sea World's commitment to entertain and educate the public about marine life, Airship Shamu may be made available to assist in marine mammal population and behavior studies along Florida's east coast. The airship will also be used in educational programs.

Texas Coalition for Safety Belts

Some People Should Avoid Eating Uncooked Shellfish

Health officials have reminded the public that it can be hazardous for some people to eat raw seafoods or to expose injuries to the salt water of the Gulf of Mexico. By doing so, susceptible people risk serious infection and illness.

Already this year, at least two deaths in Texas have been linked to consumption of uncooked seafoods.

Richard Thompson, director of the Texas Department of Health's (TDH) Division of Shellfish Sanitation Control, said that the source of danger to some people is a microorganism which concentrates in Gulf waters during the warmer months. Its scientific name is *Vibrio*, particularly the bacteria's subgroup *Vibrio vulnificus*. When eaten uncooked, usually in shellfish such as oysters, mussels, and clams, *Vibrio* can cause serious illness, even death.

Persons most at risk of illness from *Vibrio* are those with existing health problems, such as liver disease and weakened immune systems, and people recovering from stomach or intestinal surgery. Since *Vibrio vulnificus* and some related bacteria also can cause wound infections,

people with open wounds or sores should not expose them to seawater. Anyone who is cut or otherwise injured at the seashore is warned to wash wounds immediately, liberally apply an antiseptic, and call a physician if signs of infection appear.

Thompson said, "Wound infections, while they can be quite serious, are more obvious to the victim from the outset than are food-borne illnesses. A person with a cut or puncture stays aware of the injury, while a person preoccupied with dining and entertainment may be taken by surprise, possibly after ingesting dangerous amounts of *Vibrio*-contaminated seafood. Therefore, most of our warning is aimed at the unsuspecting person who might be tempted to try raw seafoods."

Thompson explained that *Vibrio* bacteria occur naturally. The freshest seafood may contain the organisms, just as other meats or poultry contain other harmful bacteria if served raw, improperly cooked or mishandled.

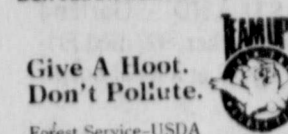
Thompson said that normal cooking procedures easily kill *Vibrio*, and re-contamination of the seafood after cooking can be prevented with the same cleanliness

precautions (hand and utensil washing) necessary to avoid other food-borne contaminants.

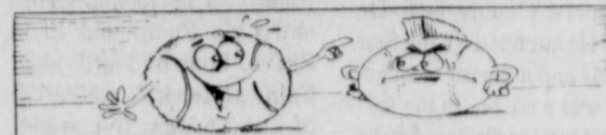
Thompson added that eating raw seafood species other than oysters, clams, and mussels is not generally popular in Texas. "But our growing ethnic populations, some preferring raw or lightly cooked seafood, have increased our concern about possible illness outbreaks," he said.

Beware Of Direct Mail Solicitations

Many people in the Big Country area have reported to me that they have received solicitations in the mail that offer to do many things — provide information about the Social Security death benefit, obtain a Social Security number for an infant, help a new bride change her name in Social Security records, to name a few.

All of them have one thing in common — they all ask money to perform the same services provided free by Social Security. Please read these solicitations very carefully and if you have any questions about them, call us. Usually we can give you the information you need over the telephone, and it won't cost you anything.

Use our toll-free telephone number — 1-800-234-5772. You can get the best service if you call between 7 and 9 a.m. or 5 and 7 p.m.

If you use one of these firms to get a Social Security number for your child or to change your name in our records, the best thing that could happen is that the process will be delayed. At the worst, you could lose your money and have nothing in return.

These firms cannot get a number for you. All they do is

send you an application for a Social Security number card, tell you to fill it out, and mail it to the Social Security office serving you. You can do this yourself and save money by just calling us. You will get your number card about 2 weeks after you send us your application and supporting evidence.

We are concerned that you may needlessly pay for services that the Social Security Administration provides free, and that these businesses promote their services by fostering a false impression that either Social Security will not provide these services or it is difficult for the public to obtain them.

Hidden Sugar

Q. What foods (besides the obvious ones) contain sugar?

A. Sugar, of course, is a major cause of tooth decay. Some foods that contain "hidden" sugar are: ketchup (some brands contain more sugar than ice cream), pickles, peanut butter, salad dressings, non-dairy creamer, saline crackers, mayonnaise, cottage cheese, canned vegetables, processed cheese, instant breakfasts and frozen entrees. Remember, removing sugar from the mouth takes away the food that bacteria feed upon. Limiting the exposure time of sugar to the teeth to three times a day or less (mealtimes) can keep decay to a minimum.
