Hunters Must Complete Texas Parks & Wildlife Dept. Course

As of Sept. 1, 1990 hunters whose date of birth is during the period Sept. 2, 1971 through August 31, 1974 must have successfully completed this course to hunt in Texas. Any person 12 years or older may take this class. Effective Sept. 1, 1993 any hunter whose date of birth is on or after Sept. 2, 1971 must have successfully completed this course to hunt in Texas. The course cost is \$5.00. The dates for this class will not be set till we have some idea on how many will participate and to make sure we have enough material ordered from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department for those participating.

Visitors' Dream Comes True

Going through the American Embassy and People to People International, Etienne Engles of Belgium became a pen pal of Lloyd London of Cisco in 1984. Since that time a friendship has solidified and after much planning and anticipation Engles and his wife, Therese, have bridged the thousands of miles and are visiting in the home of London and his wife, Vera, making a dream come true.

Engles has been an enthusiast of America's many facets of life, her people, mode of living, terrain but always more fascinated by the western lore, and they are delighted to be here.

Coming from Ghent, Belgium, a city of 280,000 population one might wonder if he and his wife weren't just a little shy of being thrilled when their journey ended in Cisco. Not so, however, they simply radiate their joy at being in Cisco, Texas. "It's just wonderful," he exclaimed, adding "it is a beautiful country and the people are all so friendly."

In an interview with the couple, Engles did the talking as she does not speak English. He was lavish with appreciation for Mr. London, saying the only way they might repay their hosts is for them to visit the Engel home.

Through the local couple, the visitors had become friends of some other Ciscoans, especially Mr. and Mrs. Tony White and felt a closeness as Mrs. White's late parents, Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Standaert, made their home in Eckloo, Belgium. The Engles are currently visiting in Corpus Christi in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Tommy Copenhaver, son-in-law and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. White.

In response to a number of questions about life in Belgium, the visiting man began by telling about the family. They are parents of two married children and one at home, Viviane, Ronny and Erwin, Ronny having wed only three weeks before their trip.

Of their home town he was quick to boast of the beautiful edifices, cathedrals, castles

and belfreys, some dating back to early centuries.

Engles is an employee of the Public Garden Service of Ghent (park maintenance) and she is a part-time employee of a fish shop.

His love of his work was evidenced in his telling about Ghent's fame for azaleas. "They are the most beautiful in the world," he said, and spoke of much study going into their care, fertilization and crossing of species.

Called 'The Flower City of Belgium,' the vicinity is a favorite tourist attraction. A large steel factory and a coffin factory also boost the economy of the area.

In speaking of everyday life, Engles stated that the prime religion is Catholic, and that the country had for the last 30 years been converting to the English language, having no particular language of their own.

He said the Honda and Volvos are the most popular automobiles there, the Ameri-

This notice concerns 1990 property tax rates for Cisco Hospital District. It presents information about three tax rates. Last year's tax rate is the actual rate the taxing unit used to determine property taxes last year. This year's effective tax rate would impose the same total taxes as last year if you compare properties taxed in both years. This year's rollback tax rate is the highest tax rate the taxing unit can set before taxpayers can start tax rollback procedures. In each case these rates are found by dividing the total amount of taxes by the tax base (the total value of taxable property) with adjustments as required by state law. The rates are given per \$100 of property value.

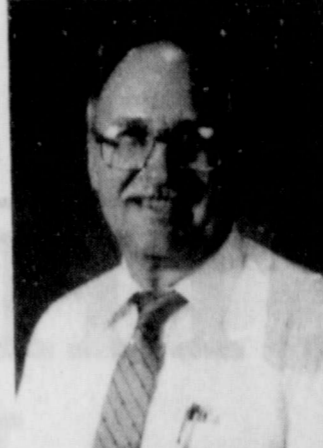

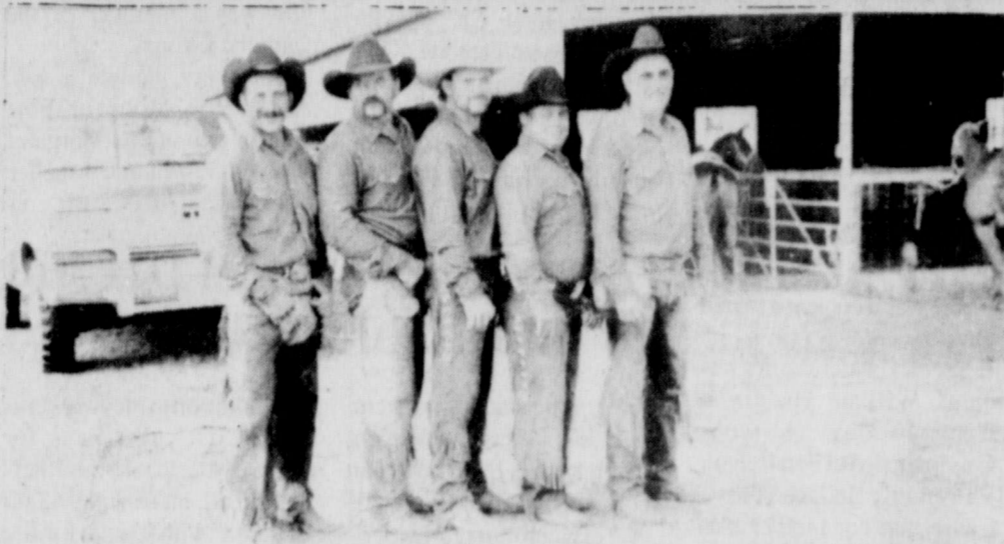

CJC Plans For Expansion In Abilene Put On Hold

Cisco Junior College's plans for expansion in Abilene have been put on hold following a report Tuesday by the Taylor County Higher Education Task Force to the board of directors of the Abilene Chamber of Commerce, according to Dr. Roger C. Schustereit, CJC president.

The task force recommended that Abilene support CJC on a short-term basis but consider a locally controlled junior college in the next three to five years.

CJC began offering academic classes in Abilene during the second summer session and will expand those classes this fall. CJC had hoped to offer a full-range university transfer program by next summer, according to Dr. Schustereit.

Classes will continue as planned this fall but CJC will postpone some of their im-

provement and expansion plans because of the report, according to Schustereit. "I made it clear to members of the task force that it would not be prudent for me to commit to capital expenditure until we got a green light from the task force committee," he said. "We didn't get exactly a red light, but it was certainly amber."

Schustereit said plans to buy equipment for the new science lab will be put on hold, as will plans for physi-

cal education equipment.

Schustereit also said plans to buy or lease a facility in Abilene and remodel it also will be postponed. He said CJC can't invest that kind of money for only three years.

"If Abilene opts to create its own junior college district, there will be a tax and in my opinion it would be a pretty significant tax," the CJC president said. "We have a long history with the people of Abilene. We'd hate to see it come to an end."

Lawmakers Fund TDH Aid To Ill, Disabled Children

With the state lawmakers' help, the Texas Department of Health (TDH) now can continue its aid to thousands of Texas children with serious medical problems.

Until the Texas Legislature in special session provided the department with \$10.9 million in special funding, the TDH program for Chronically Ill and Disabled Children (CIDC) was threatened with having to suspend its services for the summer.

John Evans, director of the program, explained that an unexpected increase in applicants, plus spiraling medical costs, had almost depleted the program's funding by the end of May. TDH had been preparing for the worst—suspending the program until the beginning of the new fiscal year on Sept. 1—if the Legislature did not allocate new funding.

"If we had had to begin cancelling services," Evans said, "the timing couldn't have been worse. The summer months often are the busiest for the CIDC program. Many families plan their children's surgeries for when the youngsters are not in school and the parents have vacation time."

In addition to medical services, CIDC also pays for braces, wheelchairs, and therapy. In all, more than 16,000 children with spina bifida, cancer, AIDS, cystic fibrosis, cerebral palsy, leukemia and other disabling conditions rely on CIDC annually.

Evans said that the legislation supplying the emergency funding (S.B. 11) not only ensured CIDC's continuity through the summer, it also allocated an additional \$13 million for the next fiscal year. "We can never say that our money troubles at CIDC are over," he said. "But we can say that without these additional funds, some families already living with tragedy would have lost the only help available in Texas."

Aspirin-a-day dose reduces the risk of stroke by 80 percent in patients with atrial fibrillation, a nationwide study found. Doctor's care is vital, say researchers, because aspirin may raise other risks.

"Band Aid surgery" for gallbladder removal is done with a laparoscope. Pain and postoperative limitations are reduced, say doctors at the Scripps Clinic in LaJolla, California.

The longer an alcoholic stays away from drink, the easier it gets, says a psychologist at Johns Hopkins University. The relapse rate lowers with time, down to almost zero after five years, a study found.

New drug, flucanazole, has received approval from the Food and Drug Administration. It's used to treat fungal infections common in people with AIDS and other conditions that weaken the immune system.

Vitamin C supplements were given to ease the discomfort of allergic dermatitis in a test at UC/San Francisco. Result: both severity and number of symptoms were reduced.

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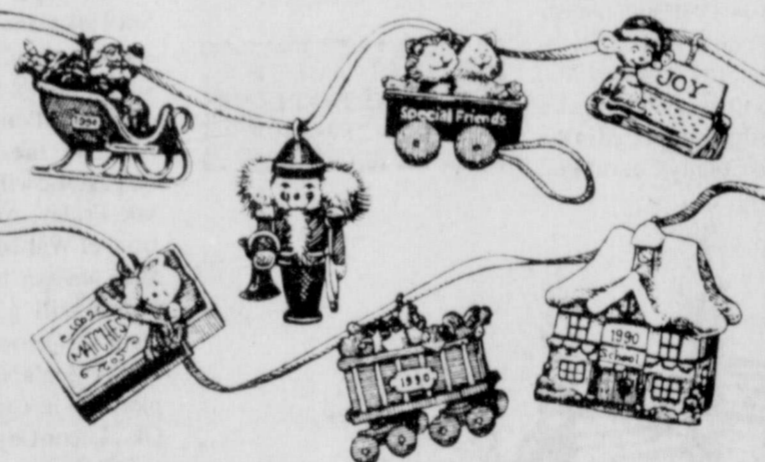
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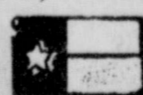

This has been a most unusual August. I don't think I can ever remember having this much soil moisture on August 12th. Normally we can predict that the pecan weevil will emerge from the ground and start puncturing pecans in last August or early September, usually after a good fall rain. However, with the wet soil and cooler than normal temperatures the pecan weevil has been fooled. Two different pecans growers have called to report seeing a pecan weevil on a pecan tree during the first week of August.

This means that control of the weevil should begin now. Pecans punctured now will fall and the eggs deposited by the weevil will not hatch. After the pecan matures from the water stage to the dough stage the eggs will hatch and the white grubs will feed on the kernels.

The pecan weevil can be one of the most devastating pests of pecans in some areas where chemical control is neglected.

Adult weevils emerge from the soil underneath the trees. The adult weevil is 3/8 inch long and is dark to medium brown in color. It has a snout as long as its body. With its snout it punctures a hole all the way through the pecan shell and deposits eggs in the pecan kernel. Creamy white grubs with reddish brown heads hatch and feed inside nuts during late summer and fall, completely consuming the kernel and ultimately attaining a length of about 3/5 inch. Upon reaching maturity, grubs chew a hole about 1/8 inch in diameter in the shell, emerge from the nut and drop to the ground in the fall or winter. The grub spends one or two years in the ground before emerging as an adult

weevil.

Weevils must be controlled in the adult stage. Preferably, control is obtained before the adult weevil has laid eggs in the nuts. Once the eggs have been laid the grower has lost his chance to control that portion of the population until 2 or 3 years later.

Weevils may be seen on the nut cluster, but it is necessary to examine many clusters. Another method of de-

tecting the weevils is to jar limbs with a padded pole or hook and catching the weevils that fall from the tree on a light colored ground cloth spread underneath the limb.

Sevin is still the most effective insecticide to control the adult weevils. Repeated spraying may be necessary if weevils continue to emerge from the ground. It is important to read and follow the label on the insecticide.

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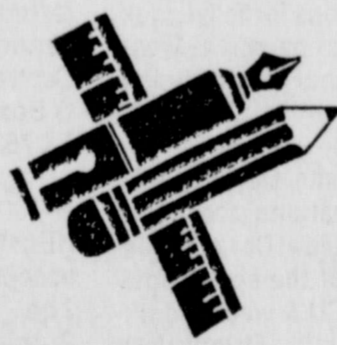
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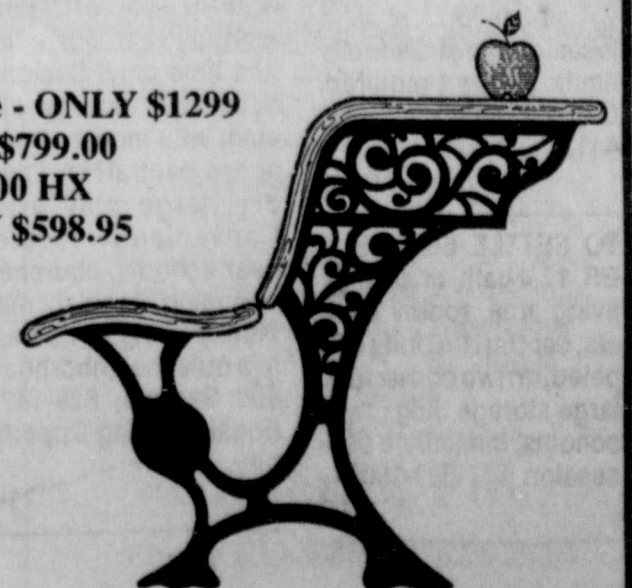

Closing Lakes In Spawn Doesn't Protect Bass

A recent report published by the Sport Fishing Institute quotes Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission research that closed seasons or spawning refuges on Florida lakes did not increase largemouth bass populations. increase fishing pressure on many lakes in recent years has concerned anglers and conservation groups appealing to the commission for closed seasons and refuges to protect largemouth bass from being overharvested during the spawning season. Commission research, though, reveals that these measures don't work, the report said. Studies did show that under normal conditions the number of adult bass has little bearing on the number of

young bass produced each year. In fact, spawning refuges on the St. Johns River did not yield any positive effect on reproductive rates, bass produce success of bass.

The report said that since a pair of bass can produce 5,000 to 10,000 young or more during a spawning season, it only takes two of the offspring to replace a spawning pair that is removed by an angler.

Florida fishery biologists reported that only a small fraction of the bass population is caught during the spawning season and, therefore, does not reduce their numbers from one year to the next. It is believed that because of their high reproductive rates, bass produce far more fingerlings each year than the habitat can support.

Because of these reports, biologists believe that closed fishing seasons will not

enhance the spawning of bass at current levels of fishing pressure. Moreover, studies from Tenoroc State Reserve near Lakeland, Fla., show that catch rates are higher for several weeks following the opening of a lake that has been closed and then receives high fishing pressure.

Biologists believe bass become conditioned to angling practices with a continuous fishing season and are less vulnerable than bass in a lake that has been fished for a few months.

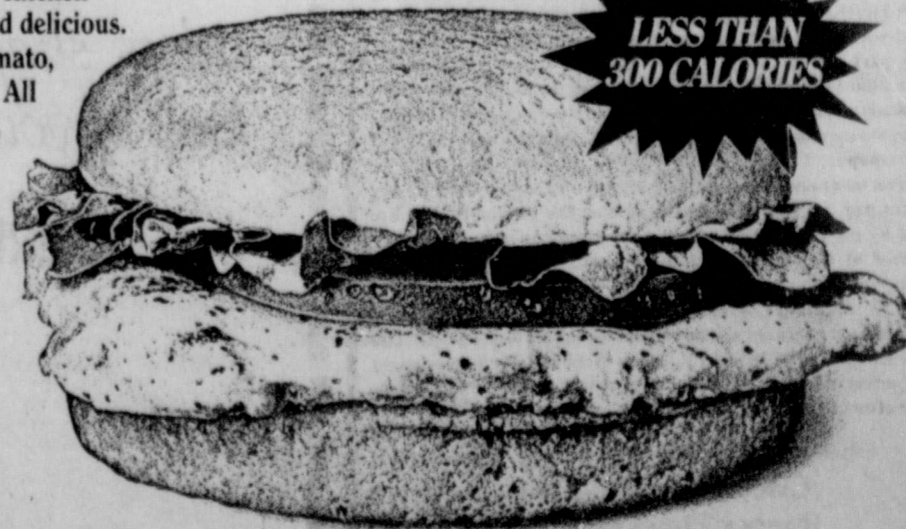

...FOR TEXAS RESEARCHERS! The two following publications are excellent source of records of about 8,000 early settlers of Mexican Texas.

(1) STEPHEN F. AUSTIN'S REGISTER OF FAMILIES, edited by Villamae Williams.

In 1811 Mexico declared its independence from Spain and established itself as a republic. The new government made contracts with Empresarios (contractors) to bring specific numbers of families into the state of Coahuila and Texas. Stephen Austin was the first and most successful of the Empresarios, and he began granting land to settlers in 1824.

Austin, from 1824 to 1836 granted land to settlers in the Texas division of Mexico. For each he kept records showing the name, marital and family status, place of birth or last place of residence, and occupation. These records cover about 3,000 Anglo-American settlers of Mexican Texas.

STEPHEN F. AUSTIN'S REGISTER OF FAMILIES # 6415, 186 pp., indexed. (1984) Reprint 1989. \$20.00.

(2) CHARACTER CERTIFICATES in the GENERAL LAND OFFICE, by Gifford White.

Under the Mexican Colonization laws between 1825 and 1835, an immigrant to Texas had to meet certain requirements before he could receive land. He had to prove his good character with credentials from his place of origin, marital status, occupation and size of his family.

Assembled from local land office records after Texas got its independence from Mexico, the Character Certificate files in the General Land Office in Austin have all of the loose papers relating to the admission process. Information from these files, arranged here in the form of abstracts, provides unique information of about 5,000 early Texas settlers. WILLIAMS died 12 Feb. 1946)

It has also been understood by my family that James Milton CARROLL, brother of Dr. B.H. CARROLL had worked on the history of the family.

John Durham CARROLL also had a sister, Charity Marie, who went to Texas, and I believe she may have lived and died in Baird, TX. Charity married first Joseph McGOWEN. Joseph died and she married Hardy MOORE (from family info.)

Parents of Benajah, Charity and John D. CARROLL were John CARROLL and Ann HOLLINGSWORTH of Sampson and Duplin Counties, North Carolina. John was the son of JESSE CARROLL, Revolutionary soldier. There were several children of John and Ann CARROLL, all but Benajah and Charity remained in North Carolina. It is believed that Benajah (1st) had twelve children. Disabled Social Security Beneficiaries May Earn More

"Disabled beneficiaries can earn more without affecting their Social Security benefits as a result of a new regulation which became effective January 1, 1990." Glyn Hammons, Social Security Manager in Abilene announced. "The rule increases from \$300 to \$500 a month the amount which demonstrates the ability to engage in 'substantial gainful activity'."

The Social Security Act defines disability as "the inability to engage in any substantial gainful activity by reason of any medically determinable physical or mental impairment which can be expected to last for a continuous period of not less than 12 months." The amount of earnings indicating substantial gainful activity is set by regulations issued by the Secretary of Health and Human Services.

Also, under the regulations, the amount of monthly earnings that triggers a trial work period has been increased from \$75 to \$200 a month, and from 15 hours a month of self-employment to 40. A disabled beneficiary gets 9 months of trial work (not necessarily consecutive), during which benefits continue regardless of the amount of earnings. After completion of the trial work period, the work is reviewed to see if it constitutes substantial gainful activity.

The level of earnings considered substantial gainful activity affecting blind people is set by law and is currently \$780 a month. This is not affected by the regulation, Hammons stated.

The substantial gainful activity level does not affect people receiving Supplemental Security Income (SSI) payments, although it is used in determining disability. SSI income limits are set by law.

These include an extended period of eligibility during which cash benefits may be reinstated without an application for any month a person does not perform substantial gainful activity; extended Medicare coverage which provides Medicare benefits for at least 39 months beyond the trial work period; and deduction of impairment-related work expenses when counting earnings for substantial gainful activity purposes.

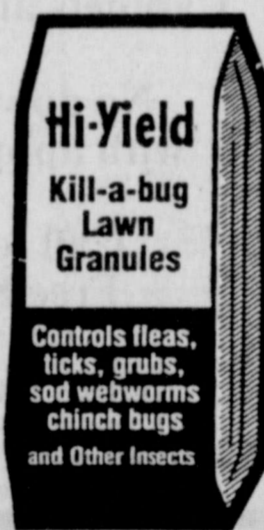

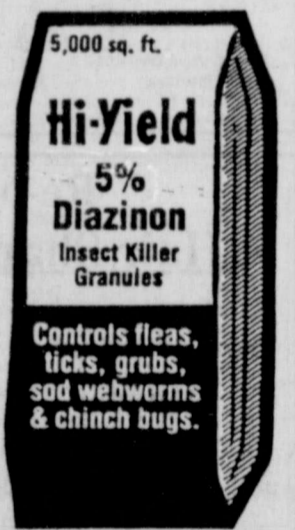

Nutrition Program

Did you know that plastic bowls and plastic food-storage containers should not be used in a microwave unless the label on the dish says otherwise. Food inside such containers may get hot enough to cause harmful chemicals to leach out of the plastic. The best containers are: glass and "dual oven" containers meant for microwave and conventional oven. Single use microwavable paper containers that come with frozen foods should be used once only. Also, keep plastic wrap from contacting food, or choose a wrap that is labeled "specifically for microwaves." Of course, we do not use aluminum foil in microwaves!
