Billy Bacon Is Write-In Candidate

I, Billy Bacon, Jr. Commissioner of Precinct 4, announce that I will be a write-in candidate for reelection in the Nov. 6 General Election.

I have been asked to run as a write-in candidate for several reasons. For one, there are more than 2800 registered voters in Pct. 4, yet only 860 voted in the Party Primaries. That is less than one-third of the voters, and I would like to see a larger majority decide who is to serve as Pct. 4 Commissioner.

I have lived in Eastland County since 1935, and spent over 37 years repairing and working on telephone and lines in the Cisco area. I have been your County Commissioner for the past four years, and feel like I have done a good job.

The office of County Commissioner is very important. The Commissioners deal with a \$3 million dollar County Budget each year. I feel like I have saved the County some money on these budgets.

Besides finances, the Commissioners need to keep up with changes in State and Federal laws and environmental regulations. During the past four years I have attended eight Seminars dealing with these things and other items involved with County Government.

An important part of the job of County Commissioner is the miles of rural roads to keep in repair. Pct. 4 has approx. 154 miles of dirt roads. I have repaired many of these roads and a number of inhomns and bridges. There is much more work to be done, and I have been donated material to help complete it.

Early in my term I was appointed by the other Commissioners to make reports on the County Jail. I have been assisting Sheriff Dee Hogan in supervising the jail. It is clean, well-run, and in compliance with the State Jail Standards Commission.

I feel that my job as County Commissioner is not complete, however. I would like to complete more bridges on the county roads, and finish repairing rural roads - all of this as money is available. It will take several years to do this.

I ask that you consider my record as Commissioner, and give me your vote for reelection in the Nov. 6 election. Remember that you have to write in my name in the place provided on the ballot.

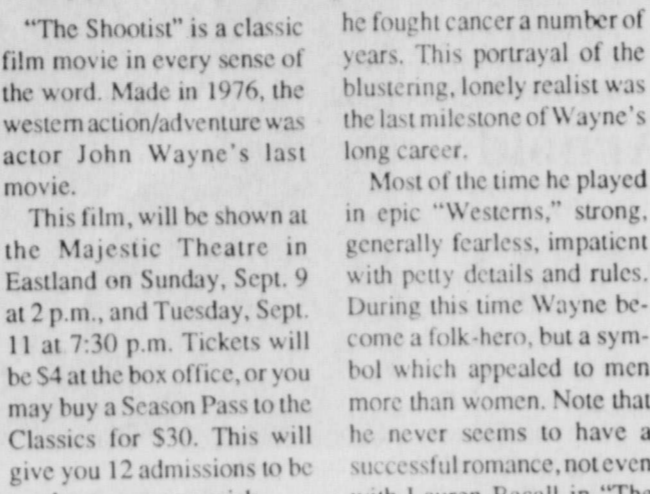
Fans of the Old West as well as John Wayne well want to see this special classic movie.

Ann Richards GOVERNOR MEET CLAYTON WILLIAMS

Utility ratepayers in San Antonio and Corpus Christi may be paying higher bill because of a Clayton Williams business deal that has resulted in a lawsuit accusing him of fraud and coercion.

Revelations concerning the lawsuit come on the heels of recent news stories linking Williams to junk bond deals, leveraged buyouts and pollution violations resulting in fines.

"Once again, we find Clayton Williams manipulating his companies for his benefit at the expense of the taxpayers of Texas," said Bill Cryer, a spokesman for the Ann Richards for governor campaign. "When you get to know Clayton Williams, you know you can't afford him."

In the latest case, Williams is being sued by Champlin Exploration, Inc. which sold gas to Williams' companies. Williams, in turn, then sold the gas to Valero, which supplies utilities in San Antonio and Corpus Christi. The suit alleges that Williams forced Champlin to reduce its gas prices while at the same time Williams was increasing gas prices to Valero and hence to the ratepayers of San Antonio and Corpus Christi.

"Williams, by buying gas on the cheap and selling it at inflated prices, was price gouging the ratepayers. It looks like Williams was robbing Peter and Paul to pay Clayton," Cryer said.

The suit further alleges that Williams' gas companies "threatened to shut in Champlin's wells and unilaterally reduce its prices if Champlin didn't accept major proposed price reductions."

The suit says that Williams did not reduce the contract price for gas that was sold to Valero. Champlin says that by manipulating gas prices, Williams was able to inflate the apparent worth of his company by 75 percent. Williams then sold his company in a leveraged buy out for \$213.5 million.

"Clayton Williams needs to come clean on his business deals. Voters are entitled to get to know the real Clayton Williams. He must divulge the details of this deal and open his personal income taxes for inspection," Cryer said.
