Pastor Clark To Teach Book Of Revelation

Dental Dialogue
by Cone C. Rice, D.D.S.
Protective Cap Useful

Q. What is a pulp cap, and why is it necessary?
A. When the pulp chamber (nerve) of a tooth is in danger of becoming infected, it needs a pulp cap for protection. The pulp cap is a non-irritating, soothing medicament (usually calcium hydroxide), which is placed directly over the portion of the nerve affected. The nerve of a tooth can be affected by decay or trauma, or even be nicked by routine operative procedures. To avoid a more lengthy and costly root canal procedure, the dentist may try a pulp cap. The therapy offers a 50% chance of allowing a tooth to continue to develop, as with a baby tooth, or remain healthy and infection-free, as with an adult tooth.

But unless the teachers visit Eastland this Saturday, they will miss out on the special one-day prices around town for them.

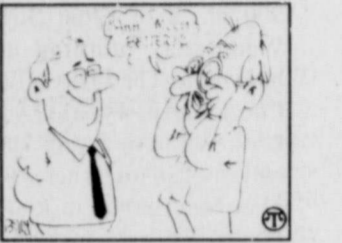

Presbyopia is not an exotic tropical disease, but simply "aging eyes," say experts at the Better Vision Institute. Thirty million Americans, 12 percent of the population, are older than 65. As the 76 million baby boomers age, it's estimated that in forty years, 21 percent or 65 million people, will exceed 65. Common age-related vision disorders can be expected to be on the rise.

We cling stubbornly to inherited or self-evolved opinions... 'believing' they are right. There is a test we can take...the test that will tell us in a hurry whether what we are sounding off about so loudly is a conviction or simply a prejudice. "How does the opinion we hug to our bosom jibe with the Golden Rule?" We think the question has significance? Don't you?

Potential for a worse result is building in Odessa with the Odessa-Permian cross-town rivalry sputtering along a fuse which is apt to set off dynamite when the teams confront each other.

Newspaper accounts of the situation seem to downplay the simplicity of the issue: Was a rule broken? In a word, "Yes."

That "Yes" seems to be much clearer than the affirmative that stubbed Eastland's toe-which was bad enough to go through. I can almost understand the reasoning that delayed reporting the ineligible player on the EHS team. It was an obscure condition.

But a summer workout? That's anything but obscure. Surely, in a climate as football conscious as Odessa's, some of the parents knew the UIL rules. I expect some of them played by them.

Even if parents and players were abysmally ignorant, all coaches hired by any district are expected to know the rules as well as the score.

The same responsibility that has the player hitting the books to comply with "No Pass-No Play," should dictate that the coach do all his homework, too. In my book, this fellow let down his players, his fellow teachers, and the future spectators of the games his teams play. There is no fair competition unless all contestants follow the same rules.

There may be a question of "fair" anyway, if one team has a decided weight advan-

tage or can run faster, or jump higher than the other. But when rules are broken to give one team an edge over others-nope!

"Everybody does it" is a cop out. Untrue. "The other coach could have done it, too." In math two negatives make a plus, but in morals, two wrongs do not make a right.

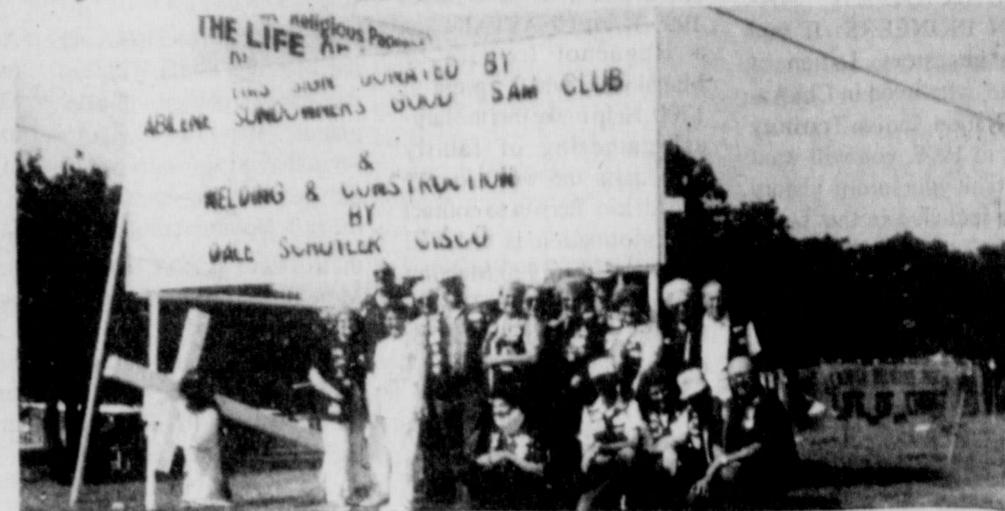
What kind of impression is this training going to leave with the youngsters caught up in it?

Is the message, "Don't get caught," or "Be sure you're right?"

Life doesn't come with any guarantees. "You win some; you lose some," applies long after the "some" refers to a

game. In life after school, isn't it a more practical preparation for that life to know how to live with an honorable loss than with a cheating win?

If schools can't live with UIL rules, change them for everyone. Until then, know the rules and follow them.

Homemaking Hints

SAVE NOW FOR COLLEGE EDUCATION

Next to buying a house, a college education is the most expensive big-ticket item facing the average family.

Nancy Granovsky, a family economics specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, suggests that if you have a 10-year-old child, plan on saving roughly \$29,000 by 1998 to cover such costs as tuition, books and room and board.

The estimate assumes that you'll be paying half the costs, and that your child will go to a state university in Texas. But you'll need to save much more if your child doesn't receive any scholarships, doesn't pay part of the college bill, or goes to a private school where tuitions usually run higher.

That amounts to an annual savings goal of about \$2,200 per year, assuming you can get 6 percent on your money after taxes.

If your child is 1 year old, you have 17 years to save, but college costs are expected to be even higher—roughly totaling \$54,000 for parents planning to pay half the expenses.

These figures, based on an estimated inflation rate of 7 percent for college costs, illustrates how important it is to start saving now. College costs of \$7,400 per year in 1990 will be \$16,700 per year by the year 2000.

Today, people use a combination of loans, savings and work-study to pay for college. Many parents pay educational costs out of their current income—some taking additional jobs.

Government bonds are one type of investment that guarantee complete safety. The United States Series EE Savings Bonds for College are good choices for financing education. They can be tax-free and purchased at market

rates. Interest rates for the bonds vary with the market rate, but go no lower than the market rate set at the time of purchase.

Stipulations for these bonds include:

- * When you use EE bonds to pay for higher education and your taxable income is below \$60,000, bond income is tax free, but the federal tax break phases out at a joint income of \$90,000.

- * They must be redeemed in a year the owner pays qualified educational expenses (tuition and fees, but not room and board).

- * Interest is fully exempted only if the qualifying tuition and fees paid during the year are equal to, or more than, the redemption proceeds. Otherwise, exemption is proportional to the percentage value used for tuition and fees.

- * Certain records must be kept for income tax purposes.

Other options for financing college education include zero-coupon securities, mutual funds, children's custodial accounts and insurance policies. However, there are risks and limitations involved, and a prudent investor should check with a professional who specializes in financial planning for college.

Becoming better informed is part of the financial planning process for college education. Parents and students, especially those who think they can't afford college, need to know what financial aid is available and how to qualify for such options as loans, work-study programs and grants.

High school guidance counselors have a wealth of reference material on college programs and costs. Most public libraries keep current references on U.S. colleges and universities.

The saying that "education pays" is still true. Figures from the U.S. Census Bureau show that what people earn is a direct reflection of their level of education.

In 1987, census figures indicated that high school graduates earned an average income of \$12,000, while college graduates earned \$22,400, and those with master's degrees earned \$30,600.

RECIPE FOR THE WEEK:

Today we look for foods that are not only good, but good for you. Pears measure up on both counts. High amounts of natural sugars, fructose and glucose, are present in pears. At the same time, a 166 gram pear, with skin, provides 2.32 grams of crude fiber, of which 41% is pectin.

Another very important nutrient is potassium, and the same 166 gram pear contains 208 milligrams. Potassium is necessary for maintaining heartbeat, muscle contraction, nerve transmission, and carbohydrate and protein metabolism. With only 98 calories in a 166 gram pear, this fruit provides a calorie light, delicious and health snack.

Fresh Pear Cake

2 C. sugar
3 eggs, well beaten
1 1/2 cups salad oil
3 C. all-purpose flour
1 t. soda
1 t. salt
1 t. vanilla extract
2 t. ground cinnamon
3 C. thinly sliced, peeled pears

Powdered Sugar Glaze
Combine sugar, eggs, and oil; beat well. Combine flour, soda, and salt; add to sugar mixture, 1 cup at a time, mixing well after each addition. Stir in vanilla, cinnamon, and pears.

Spoon batter into a well-greased 10-inch Bundt pan or tube pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour. Remove from pan, and allow to cool; top with Powdered Sugar Glaze. Yield: on 10-inch cake.

Powdered Sugar Glaze:
1 1/4 cups sifted powdered sugar
2 to 4 T. milk

Combine ingredients, blending until smooth. Yield: about 1/2 cup.

Handicap Awareness Month

October is Handicap Awareness Month as well as being National Down Syndrome Month. I would like to take full advantage of the public awareness that these offer.

Since I have a daughter with Down Syndrome, I always feel that if I try to inform at least one group of people of the real facts about Down Syndrome then I've helped my daughter, because misinformation not only causes a lot of pain, it's just not fair. Misinformation given to a parent of a newborn baby, that has a handicap (any handicap) can cause a lot of grief and maybe a wrong decision at the time they find out. Misinformation adds to the pain when anyone finds out they or a family member (be it child or adult) has a condition that's going to make them disable.

We all know that not knowing is hard enough but being told mistruths and misinformation makes the situation that more difficult and upsetting.

When I look back to when I plan on starting the month with facts on Mental Retardation since it constitutes one of America's largest groups of citizens having disabilities—more than six million people and slightly more than 100,000 newborn children are likely to be added to the group each year. I think it would be important to pass on some facts and info about this. Today one out of every 10 Americans has a family member with mental retardation. I will put that info in the next issue of the paper so I hope you will read it, and if you have any ideas or input, give me a call.

I had my daughter, Amber, 7 years ago. I remember all the grief I had when I found out. I knew nothing of Down Syndrome, only what I heard. After all, this wasn't suppose to happen to me, it's the other families that this happens to. I realize now that yes, some of that grief was a normal process that I had to go through but most of that grief was because of misinformation. I really believed that I was leaving that hospital with a baby that would do absolutely nothing all of her short life. Because of misinformation, me and my family and friends did not get to enjoy a very special time in our lives—the same enjoyment we all have when we have a child.

But Amber showed us very early on that all I thought was true was just a lot of misinformation and I had better get the real facts and information so she could develop to her full potential. And now she is always amazing me. Putting limitations on anyone, especially a child is the wrong thing to do. I believe that instead of Down Syndrome, it should be called Up Syndrome—after all isn't that the way to go.

I hope I can run some articles in the paper this month on different handicap conditions, so if anyone has any that they would like to put in, let me know. I hope I can get a workshop with a speaker to discuss different disabilities. Also would like to have a presentation at the schools. So if you have any ideas or would like to help, let me know. I would especially like to hear from our "special population," so they can let us know what they would like the public to know.

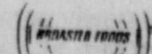

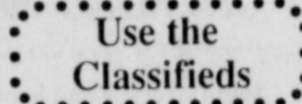

Notices Sent Concerning Social Security Number

Starting in October, some people in the Big Country area may receive a notice from their financial institution indicating that the Social Security number and/or the name in the institution's records are different than the ones in the records of the Internal Revenue Service, Glyn Hammons, Social Security manager in Abilene, said recently.

In some cases, Hammons said, it may be necessary for the person to contact Social Security to change his or her name in Social Security records or to verify the information already in those records.

If the person needs to change the information in Social Security records, he or she should have documentary evidence showing both his or her old and new names, as well as evidence of identity, Hammons said.

It is a good idea to call Social Security first to make sure what action is needed. That way, an unnecessary visit to the office may be avoided. It is easy to call Social Security's toll-free telephone number, 1-800-234-5772.

Toll-free telephone service is available from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. on weekdays. The best times to call are early in the morning and late afternoon. And if you can, it is best to call later in the week and later in the month.

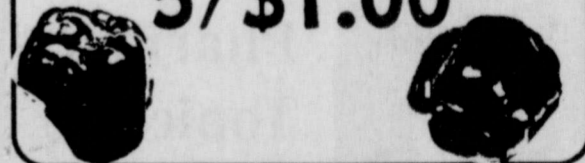

Influenza Season May Mark Debut Of New Type

This year's influenza season may mark the U. S. debut of B-Yamagata, the strain that appeared last year in Asia.

But, according to Dr. W. Paul Glezen of the National Influenza Research Center at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston, that prediction is tentative. Information from the southern hemisphere, which has already undergone its flu season, has not painted a clear picture of what kind of flu to expect.

"The southern hemisphere was hit by a mixture of flu viruses this year," Glezen said. "But, we think influenza B is most likely to be the main player in this year's flu season."

That prediction is also based in part on the cyclic appearance of flu strains. "It's

ease Control in Atlanta and the Food and Drug Administration in Washington, D.C., decide on the composition of each season's influenza vaccine based on viruses circulating worldwide.

Influenza usually strikes suddenly. Symptoms include fever, generalized muscle pain, weakness and a dry, hacking cough.

Victims of the flu should get plenty of rest and drink lots of liquids.

Adults may take aspirin or an aspirin substitute to reduce fever and pain, but people younger than 21 should use only aspirin-free pain relievers. Aspirin has been associated with Reye's syndrome, a complication of flu and chicken pox that can cause vomiting, convulsions, brain damage and death in children.

Influenza is caused by variants of types A and B influenza viruses.

Variants are classified according to where they were first identified.

Health-care workers should be vaccinated, Glezen said, because "the vaccine will help prevent their contracting the flu and spreading the virus to their patients."

The flu vaccine is available from most physicians and at community health centers.

"Those in the high-risk groups should be vaccinated soon and certainly before Thanksgiving," Glezen said, to lessen the risk of contracting the virus during the two weeks required for the shot to provide protection.

Flu cases usually begin appearing by early or mid-December and peak in January or February.

Glezen said those in a high-risk group who have never had a one-time pneumonia shot should consider getting one with the flu vaccine. It prevents pneumococcal pneumonia, frequently associated with influenza in the high-risk groups.
