CJC Board Of Regents Hears College In Sound Condition

The Cisco Junior College Board of Regents learned at its October 8 meeting that CJC ended the 1989-90 school year with an unaudited surplus of \$315,745.

Bobby Smith, Dean of Fiscal Services, pointed out that the final figures could change when the audit is presented at the November board meeting. "But I feel we have ended the year in sound fiscal condition."

"The primary reason for the surplus was enrollment growth," added Smith.

In other business, the Regents did the following:

Heard plans for a CJC Faculty Association study of tenure, merit pay, and multiple year contracts.

Were presented the 1992 legislative goals of the Texas Public Community/Junior College Association.

Accepted the resignation of Sheila Dunlap, student services secretary, who will be moving to Brownwood.

of the CJC Board of Regents will be November 12.

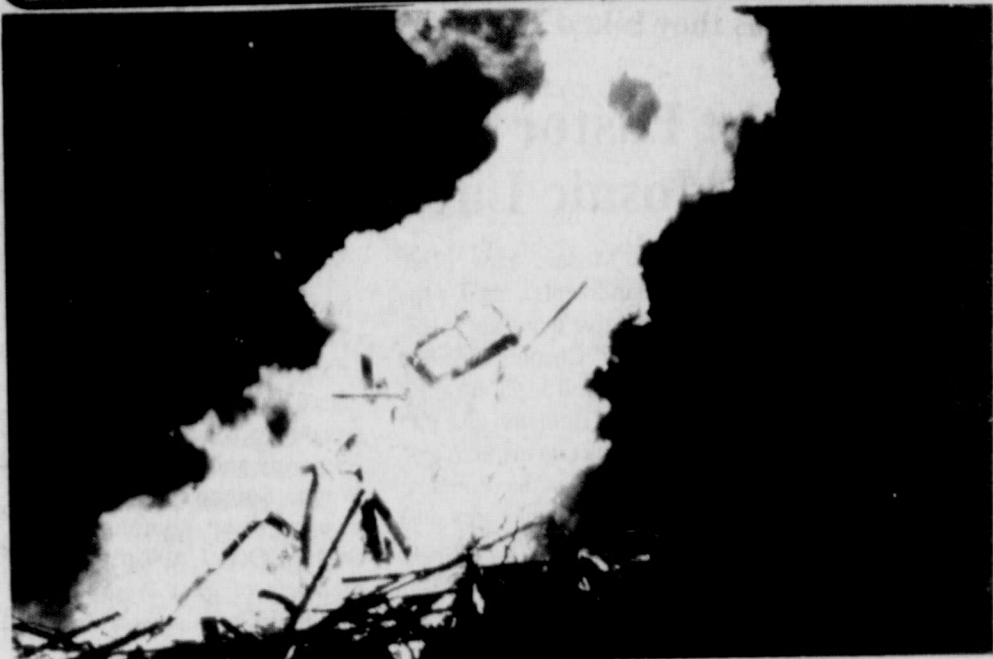
Calvary Baptist Will Hold Hallelujah Party

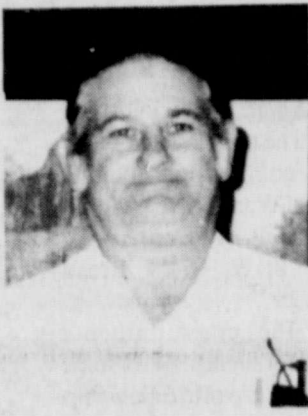
The party will be for children in grades kindergarten through sixth. All of the children of Cisco are invited. This is an alternative to Halloween, trick or treats, or having the children on the streets.

Reggie Pittman Announces For Commissioner

Hospital District Proposed Tax Rate Is Explained

Following the public hearing, the Board of Directors of the Cisco Hospital formally adopted the 1990 tax rate. The tax rate was set at \$.50 per \$100 of property value. This is an increase from the \$.14035 per \$100 of property value that was assessed the current roll-back rate.

A number of residents, those on fixed incomes, raised concerns about how they could afford an increase in property taxes. This is the same question that was raised as an issue during the January, 1990, tax roll-back election when the hospital district's tax rate was rolled back to \$.14135 per \$100 of property value from the rate set by the hospital board of \$\$.28 per \$100.

When the tax roll-back election's votes were tallied, a slim majority of 23 votes made the difference and the hospital district's tax rate was cut in half. Following the roll-back election, the hospital district refunded the difference between the amount, according to the Eastland County Tax Collector's office, averaged \$10 per taxpayer.

The 1990 tax rate of \$.50 per \$100 can best be explained like this: For every \$100 of property value, established by the Eastland County Appraisal District, the taxpayer would pay fifty cents. The appraisal district said that the average value of property in the Cisco Hospital District, based on appraisal figures, is \$18,347. The amount of tax on that amount is \$19.74.

The greatest concern regarding the tax rate was expressed by persons who are fixed incomes. Taxpayers who are over 65 years of age or are disabled may be eligible to apply for certain exemptions which would

mean a \$12,000 total exemption in the appraised property value. On the average property value of \$18,347 the exemptions would reduce the taxable value of the property to a total of \$6,347. This means the amount of tax that would be due on that property would total only \$31.74.

Based on figures supplied by the Appraisal District office and the tax rate adopted by the Cisco Hospital District, a bit of simple arithmetic will show the difference between the 1990 roll-back tax rate and the tax rate adopted by the hospital board to be only \$22.83. That can be further simplified by looking at how much a month that increase amounts to: \$1.90, or by the week: .33 cents. That is less than the price of a cup of coffee in the coffee shop.

The 50 cents per 100 dollars of property value would allow the Cisco District to re-open E. L. Graham Memorial Hospital with necessary staff and to recruit one, or two, additional doctors and

provide the level of quality health care that is needed in a community like Cisco.

It is easily understood why any tax increase is viewed with concern, but with some 750 voters, 1/3 of the total registered voters (property owners and non-property owners) who may qualify for the exemptions, the increase is minimal compared with the advantage of having a hospital to provide the necessary care for the residents of the area. There are people who are eligible to vote in a roll-back election who do not own property and not have any tax to pay at all.

Is the health of the citizens of our community worth the price of one cup of coffee a week, or a pack of cigarettes a month? Can we place that kind of price on a person's life and health?

A special statement is being mailed to each property owner showing exactly what the impact of the new Cisco Hospital District tax rate will be on that individual's property.

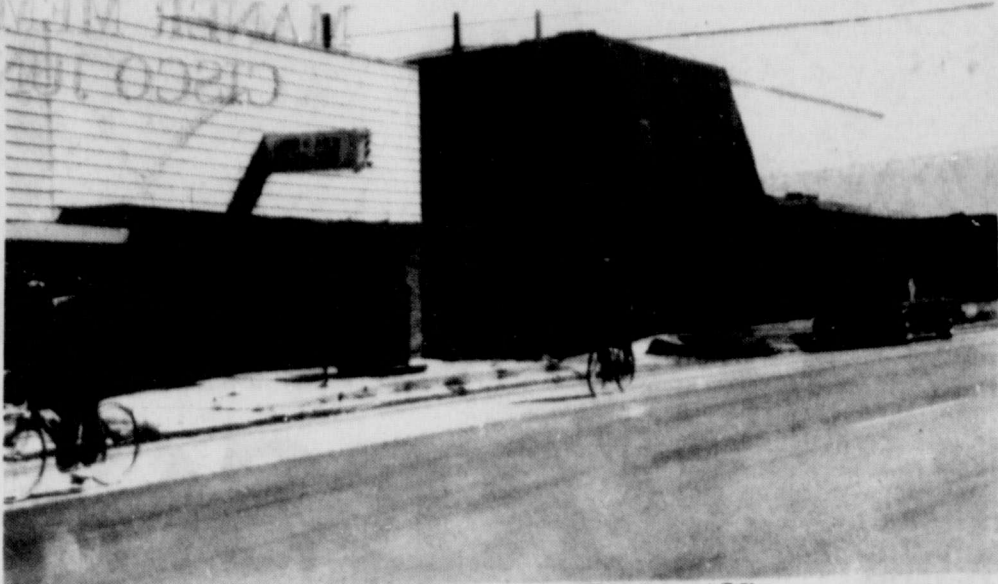
We can either recognize these problems and try to do something to solve them or we can sit back and wring our hands and wonder what ever happened to our good life.

**Faith Baptist Pastor To
Preach On 'Mosaic Law'**

Pastor M.H. Clark of Faith Baptist Church is currently preaching through the book of Galatians, an inspired letter written to the churches of Galatia (a region in present-day Turkey) after false teachers had come into them teaching that they must keep the law of Moses (circumcision, Ten Commandments, etc.) in order to be saved. Each Sunday morning Pastor Clark is speaking on a few verses at a time. This Sunday he will speak on Chapter 3, Verses 15-18, in which the inspired writer gives the last of eight reasons why we are no longer under the Mosaic Law and are not saved (go to Heaven) by virtue of our own good deeds, but by faith in the crucified, risen Lord Jesus Christ. The following Sunday (Oct. 21) he will take up the divine answer to the question: "If we are not saved

by the Mosaic Law (Ten Commandments), then why did God give that Law in the first place?" Chapter 3, Verses 19-25 (as well as passages in the book of Romans) give the answer. The two inspired letters of Paul to the Romans and to the Galatians are considered by most theologians to be the most basic interpretations of true Christianity.

Pastor Clark has also just started a series of evening sermons on the Book of Revelation, the last book of the Bible, which gives a clear description of the catastrophic close of this present age.

Services at Faith Baptist Church are as follows: Sunday School, 10 a.m.; morning preaching service, 11 a.m.; evening preaching service, 7 p.m. The church is located at West 18th Street and Avenue J in Cisco.

The Cisco Lobos Junior Varsity suffered a loss to the Eastland Mavs JV Thursday night at Maverick Stadium by the score of 20-to-0 in a hard fought contest. The Cisco Lobos held the Mavs in the first half to only 7 points with some excellent defensive efforts by Jason Houghton, Tommy Thompson and Cullen Rabel. The Mavericks depended heavily upon the running of No. 30, Hogg in the first half in which he carried the ball nine times for 43 yards rushing. One could say the entire rushing game was in the hands of Hogg for the Mavericks.

The first quarter went 0-to-0 with the Mavs finding the yards hard to come by due to the stubborn defensive game of the Lobos JV. However with 6:44 left in the second quarter Eastland got on the board with a two yard run by Hogg and the point after kick was good making the score at half time Eastland 7 and Cisco 0.

However the second half, especially the third quarter would one again prove to be the doom of the Lobo JV squad. The third quarter netted 13 points for the Mavs with some excellent combinations of running, ball control and passing. With 6:58

left in the third quarter, the Mavs ran 6 yards off right tackle for the second touchdown of the evening and the point after was good. The backbreaker came on a 60-yard pass-run combination from Mav quarterback Carmichael. The point after hit the right standard of the goal post and bounced back, no good.

The Cisco JV's toughened up in the fourth quarter like all good teams do and only allowed 42 yards total offense for the Mavericks. Although the score reflects a loss the Cisco Lobos played an excellent game behind the leadership of quarterback Jeff McCoy, and the running backs.

Q. What is the educational background of the average dentist?
A. The graduating dentist of today usually has had four years of pre-dental education, including basic anatomy, biology and chemistry, leading to a bachelor's degree. Prior to entering dental school, the aspiring dentist must pass a qualifying entrance exam to test mental abilities and physical dexterity. The first two years of dental school are spent learning the appropriate techniques for restoring the health of the teeth and gums, as well as basic human anatomy, physiology, and related subjects. The latter two years consist of work in the clinic with actual patients under the direct supervision of qualified instructors. Finally, the candidate is required to pass an examination to show his or her competence to practice in a particular state.

Breast-cancer detection: When a mammogram shows a suspicious lump, X-ray-guided fine needle aspiration can often produce a testable sample without the need for a surgical biopsy. Researchers at the University of Chicago are studying the procedure.

Weight loss alone may "cure" some patients with liver malfunction, doctors found at Mount Sinai Medical Center in New York.

Dermatologists at University of Pennsylvania School of Medicine have pinpointed the natural substance, triggered by stress, that causes skin flare-ups of acne and other conditions. Relaxation techniques are advised by the dermatologists.

Kidney researchers at the University of Illinois have found that misoprostol, an ulcer drug, enhances the performance of drugs used to keep transplant patients from rejecting their new kidneys.

ENTER PEANUT QUALITY SHOW

Peanut quality has been an area of importance to the peanut industry and peanut producers for sometime and is increasing in importance every year. The 1990 Comanche-Eastland County Peanut Quality Show was developed as a means to promote production practices important to the production of high quality peanuts.

Now that the peanut harvest is picking up, peanut producers will want to be making plans to enter. Each producer needs to identify those fields which will produce the highest quality of peanuts.

Peanut producers in Comanche and Eastland Counties may enter up to 6 loads that have a minimum dry weight of 6,000 pounds. There is a \$5.00 entry fee per load. Peanuts must have been grown in Comanche or Eastland County. There is a category for runner and spanish peanuts.

Loads must be identified and entry fee paid prior to grading. Entries are to be made at local peanut buying points in Comanche and Eastland County. Entry deadline is November 30, 1990.

Peanuts will be scored based on maximum value per ton after all quality factors are deducted on the ASCS Form 1007. Ties will be broken on quality factors affecting value.

A prize of \$1000.00 dollars is being guaranteed for the first place runner and spanish entry. Prizes for second place will be based on percent entries by peanut type and industry contributions. Awards will be presented December 20, 1990, at the De Leon City Hall.

The 1990 Comanche-Eastland County Peanut Quality Show is being planned and conducted by the Comanche and Eastland Counties Extension Program Council Crops Committees and Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agri-

ultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, handicap or national origin.

John Carter, 1690-1742, had one daughter and 2 sons. One son named Charles.

Charles, 1732-1806, was married three times and had 23 children, one of whom was Issac.

Issac was born in Cumberland Co. N.C. and enlisted in the American Revolutionary Army at a very early age. His first enlistment was 2-5-1777 to about Jan. 1780. Second time 7-1-1781 to 7-1-1782. Isaac married and lived in Orangeburg Dist. S.C. In 1810 Isaac moved his family including all of his eleven children by covered wagon to Pike Co. Miss. where he died in 1834. One of his children was Derrell.

Derrell, 1799-1876, born in S.C. and came to Pike Co. Miss. with his Father and Mother. Married Sereptha Taylor. After his Father Issac died they moved to Bossier Parish, La. They had 10 children. The first born being Minton Mansfield Carter Sr.

Minton, 1818-1892, born in Pike Co. Miss. He married Nancy Y. (various spellings of her last name). They moved with his Parents to Bossier Parish La./sometime after 1860 they moved to Buckner, Parker Co. Texas (near Lipan) where he died in 1892.

Nancy lived with her son Dearl near Lipan for several years, then lived with her son Minton Mansfield Carter Jr. near Carbon, where she died in July, 1912 and is buried in Long Branch Cemetery.

Nancy and Minton had at least seven children. Harvil and Dearl lived and died near Lipan. Minton Mansfield Jr. lived and died near Carbon. William Jasper moved to near Hawley, in 1903 and died there in 1924. Hanna stayed in Ark. and married a Scott. Ancrum went to Weatherford.

There are many descendants living in Jones, Eastland, Hood, Parker, Grayson, Tom Green, Tarrant, and many other counties in Texas plus New Mexico, Ariz. Calif., Ark., and other states.

Q. I have heard of Erikson's stages of life and the crises that occur. Please explain the ones for adolescence and young adults. I would like to help my teenagers through this time in their lives.

A. Erikson showed that identity is formed through identification with others who have meaning to us.

With a smoothly functioning identity we can take ourselves for granted. Erikson says we are most aware of our identity when we are about to make its acquaintance.

The Moratorium Phase is generally known as an identity crisis. New possibilities are considered. Once these decisions are made the questioning and dilemmas fade and peace of mind returns.

Erikson depicts the life cycle with the search for identity in the adolescent years. As adolescents they make their own personal choices, not being so dependent upon parents for all decisions made concerning them. Separation and individuation starts to occur in the adolescent years.

Identity must be resolved before the next phase of intimacy versus isolation is addressed.

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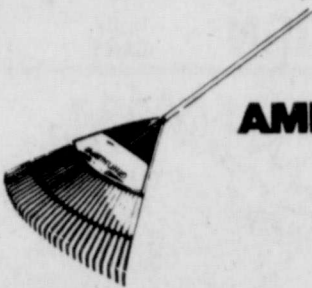
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"Death Of Rural Hospitals"

(PART II)

Physician-to-population ratios in rural areas are as low as 53 per 100,000 compared to 163 per 100,000 in urban areas, and the situation has grown worse after the National Health Service Corps was cut back under the Reagan administration. The corps placed physicians who, in return for scholarships, agreed to practice in underserved communities. The corps has 80 scholars in 1990 compared to 2,595 in 1988.

Attracting any medical school graduates to rural areas has become very difficult. As Size said: "Young doctors come out of school with a \$60,000 to \$80,000 debt that has to be paid off. They want to have a family and a house, just like anyone else, but to pay off that debt and establish their families, they have to have a certain income."

"Not only are rural doctors reimbursed less by the government and insurance companies but the also have a lower volume of patients. Per capita patient visits to physicians have been lower in rural than in urban areas since 1975," Size said.

Size, a graduate of the University of Chicago, said another problem has been the nationwide shift to out patients care, which has caused rural hospitals to lose money. Also, the rural patient who has to travel a great distance has traditionally been admitted to a hospital.

"There are often no home-care services, so the rural hospitals have had to keep patients longer than in areas that do have such services. The government now restricts admissions so that decision had been taken away," Size said.

What happens when a rural hospital closes because of

financial difficulties?

"The cost to the community is high," Size said. "The hospital is frequently the largest employer. If you close it, you put 150 people out of work who paid taxes, bought goods and hired other people."

The closing of a hospital, of course, is devastating to health care. The people of Bastrop, Texas, a rural town of about 5,000, know that firsthand. Their 25 bed hospital closed in August 1988 after 70 years of existence. Susan Cartelli, a former medical technician who grew up in Bastrop and then moved back with her husband after years of city life, had been on the board of the Bastrop Hospital.

"It was the Medicare differential and the people who didn't pay that finally put us under," she said. "Medicare was paying us 35% to 40% less for the same services performed in Austin, but we had to pay the same price for penicillin that Austin did."

What has happened since the hospital closed?

"We had a youngster at the high school collapse on the ball field from a heart condition no one knew he had. He died in the ambulance on the way to Smithfield 20 miles away," Cartelli said. "We've had a number of people with heart attacks who also died because the hospital was closed."

She said Bastrop had six physicians, but three left when the hospital closed. Of the three remaining, one is near retirement.

"Only one doctor does obstetrics, and we don't know how long he is going to continue to practice because of the high cost of his liability insurance."

The town has one ambulance with one emergency medical technician. "But if the ambulance is transporting a patient to a hospital in Austin 40 miles away. It's a three-hour turn around. If something happens at one end of town and the ambulance is at the other, it can be disastrous," Cartelli said.

But Bastrop hasn't sold its hospital. "We've kept it ready to open," Cartelli said. "but there is no way the town can raise tax money to support the hospital. What we are hoping to do is to get a grant to open a rural emergency center. A rural emergency center has to be supervised by a physician, but it can be staffed by a registered nurse, midwife or emergency medical technician. It is open 24 hours a day and patients can be kept up to three days."

In addition to trauma care, a major problem in rural areas, as Cartelli pointed out, is finding obstetrical care because of the increasing malpractice insurance rates. The problem affects all rural areas, not just those in Texas. The National Rural Health Association reported that in Colorado alone, 21% of the state's family and general practice physicians dropped of obstetrics in the past five years. If malpractice rates were to raise only modestly, 66% of the rural family practitioners and 47% of the rural obstetricians said they would stop delivering babies. That would leave 32 Colorado counties with no obstetrical care and an additional 15 counties with only one obstetrical provider. What can be done to cure the situation?

Dr. Charles Huntington of the American Academy of Family Practice offers the following suggestions:

"We need scholarships to get doctors out there, and we have to offer financial aid such as deferred student loan payments, medical school loan forgiveness, practice grants and tax exemptions in return for a period of service."

"We have to expand state medical society placement services and dispersion of residency programs into rural areas, and we need improved communication systems linking rural facilities with regional hospitals."

"We need programs to help family physicians cover the cost of malpractice insurance. We need tort reforms to reduce unwarranted lawsuits."

Huntington said that to save rural hospitals and physician practices, the federal government must immediately end the discrimination in payments. "Communities, hospitals and physicians must plan together and decide what it is they want to do, and map out a strategy. We believe small rural hospitals are a better place to work than large hospitals. There is a collegiality, and doctors must feel good about being doctors and nurses must feel good about being nurses."

Shattuck's Evans, a graduate of the University of Oklahoma, said, "I like the ability to be close to my patients—to decide what I do in my world."

"There is an effort to downsize some rural hospitals into other types of facilities instead of allowing them to be full-scale hospitals," Size said. He said most of the larger hospitals have contracts with smaller hospitals and help manage them, but the hospitals are owned and operated by the local community, and some of them become rural emergency centers or nursing facilities instead of full-scale hospitals.

There are several bills pending in Congress to try to remedy the major problems faced by rural hospitals and physicians, said Sherry Kaiman, government affairs consultant of the National Rural Health Association. Among them are:

The Rural Hospital Payment Equality Act of 1990, introduced by Rep. Byron Dorgan of North Dakota to equalize the standardized amounts paid to hospitals located in rural and urban areas. If Medicare is not cut, this bill stands a good chance, Kaiman said.

The Rural Health Improvement Act of 1990 has been

introduced in Congress, and one of its provisions would eliminate the urban-rural differential by January 1991.

The Senate and House both have National Health Service Corps Revitalization bills which are designed to encourage doctors to practice in rural areas. Kaiman said the legislation has high congressional priority and stands a good chance of getting passed.

The political debates continue, and rural health care remains imperiled. In the meantime, we need citizens who refuse to let their hospitals die.

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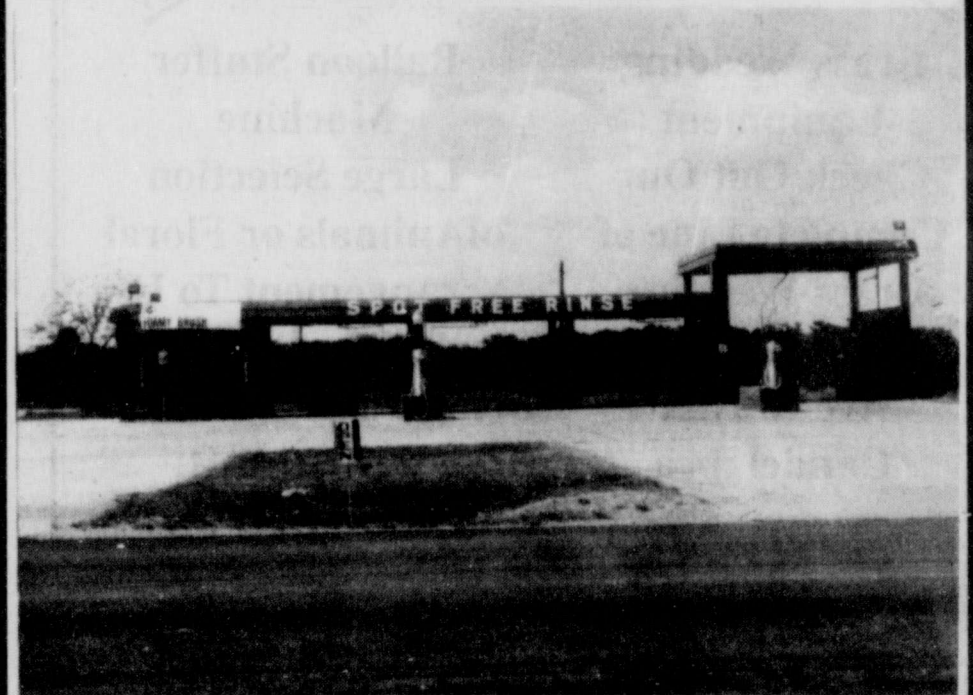
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Cisco Lions Club Report
