A nursery will be provided for children ages birth through three years.


Those interested in singing in the choir are encouraged to be at the church by 6:15 p.m. for a brief rehearsal.

Democrats claimed the office of Governor and the other statewide offices other than some judgeships.

Eastland County had a very good election turnout with 5,880 people voting. In the local contests, Democrat Bill Miears had 3177 votes to 1930 for Republican Marie Rabel for District Clerk. Monty Jones received 441 votes to 113 for Gary Rabel in the Justice of the Peace, Prec. 3, race. Billy Bacon, Jr. received 211 write-in votes to lose the County Commissioner, Prec. 4, office to Reggie Pittman, who had 1204 votes.

The Constitutional Amendment passed in every Eastland County box expect Desdemona and Carbon. It was a 43 to 43 tie in Desdemona and it lost 45 to 55 in Carbon. The county vote was 2182 for and 1587 against.

Dental Dialogue

The Topic Is Toothpaste

Q. What is the history of toothpaste?
A. Throughout the years, people have used an unusual variety of abrasives as toothpastes. About 4000 years ago the Egyptians used a substance made of incense, green lead, and verdigris (the green crust that forms on metal when exposed to water or air) as a dentifrice. The Chinese experimented with ground fish bones to clean their teeth. During the Middle Ages, the Arabs were the first to recognize the danger highly abrasive materials could have on teeth, especially the sand and pumice contained in some products. In Europe, acids were used to remove stains, and similar agents continued to be used until the early part of this century. It wasn't until 1934 that the American Dental Association began rating toothpastes as "accepted" or "unaccepted."

Q. What are Identity Achievers like?
A. Identity Achievers are a more diverse group than Foreclosures. Many factors and circumstances cause the formation of a self-made identity.
Psychological growth involves increasing autonomy from the parents and increased individuation from the pre-adolescent self.
The adolescent has internalized the parents values. Further growth involves re-working the internal self. This is the process of individuation.
Although the adolescent gains in autonomy and freedom, some security and protection as a child is relinquished.
Individuation is painful because it involves giving up trusted aspects that feel like the self. There is a sense of uncertainty and rootlessness. In return the adolescent gains possibilities, but freedom can be terrifying. They feel relativity and risk in life decisions. They are free but vulnerable.
Identity Achievement women have gone through this process during adolescence. They have forged identities on their own terms. They have reworked the identities assigned to them as children. They are not necessarily achievers in the work world. They are women who choose lives after a thorough options and have a life plan they can claim as their own.
Identity Achievement women are considered payers of the way.

From Ouistreham To Sainte-Mere-Eglise

A long-time wish of mine was to visit the coast of Normandy in northern France where the invasion of Europe was launched on D-Day, June 6, 1944. This desire was realized on October 12 when Michael Haley, our son-in-law, drove us along the coast over the entire stretch of coast from Pegasus Bridge, over the Orne River, to the upper reaches of Utah Beach near Sainte-Mere-Eglise.

All along the coast we could see remnants of Hitler's Atlantic Wall. Abandoned and destroyed bunkers still line the coast. Some have been converted to other uses, such as one used as a discotheque, one incorporated into a house, and one used as a root cellar. It was along this stretch of coast that the greatest armada ever assembled, over 4,600 landing craft and countless naval vessels, landed forces from the allied nations to begin the push to defeat Germany and end World War II 46 years ago. The approximately 80 km from Ouistreham to Sainte-Mere-Eglise was the scene of some of the bloodiest fighting of the war.

We traveled generally from east to west through the seven zones of responsibility, beginning with the areas of what is now called Pegasus Bridge which protected the left flank and provided an eventual route to Caen and the north. British and Canadian paratroopers and glider troops were landed in this zone in the cover of darkness of the night of June 5. The first house liberated from Nazi control, still stands on the banks of the Orne River at the bridge.

From Pegasus Bridge we went along the Orne to the coast at Ouistreham where Sword Beach, a British landing zone began. At Hermanville we saw the memorial to the Sword Beach landing which overlooks the beach. The beach here is relatively flat and the terrain beyond the

beach is not as imposing as the terrain beyond the other landing sites.

St. Aubin in the British zone known as Juno Beach was next on the route. Here the memorial is located atop a gutted German bunker. Beyond the beach we could see some of the hedgerows that were such an impediment to the advance inland.

The most important point of the British sector was our next stop. Arromanches, located on Gold Beach, and the site of the artificial harbor built by the British to supply the invasion, was most impressive. The museum at Arromanches contained a scale model of the Mulberry harbor, one of most amazing engineering feats of the war. The harbor was built in England in sections and towed across the channel and anchored off-shore. Many of the concrete and steel sections are still visible from shore. A diorama of the entire landing and invasion effort was a feature in the museum which I will never forget.

As we entered the American sector I was surprised at how sparsely populated and how much like the original state of the area it remained. The sunken roads, the walls, and the hedgerows which so drastically hampered the advance are still there.

Near the village of Colleville began Omaha Beach. This stretch of beach was more exposed to fire from the higher ground beyond the beach. The American forces had great difficulty in neutralizing the German resistance along Omaha Beach and casualties were heavy. It was in this area that the Americans built an artificial harbor for landing troops and materials. This artificial harbor was destroyed in the violent storm that hit during the second week of the invasion but concrete anchors on the beach remain as evidence.

High above Omaha Beach in the vicinity of Colleville - St. Laurents is the American cemetery. In one of the most beautiful settings I have ever seen is the final resting place of 9368 Americans who died

in the landerige and the bitter fighting in the weeks that followed. Originally the cemetery held the bodies of over 23,000 of our war dead, but 14,000 were later sent home at the request of families.

The reverence inspired by the countless rows of white marble crosses, arranged in sections within the 172 acres, with a huge memorial at one end and a chapel at the other was overwhelming. It is gratifying to see how beautifully landscaped and maintained this hallowed bit of American soil remains 46 years after its consecration.

We proceeded from the cemetery to Pont Du Hoc. This much publicized point is high on a bluff above Omaha Beach and the site of a huge German bunker. It was this bunker that the Rangers under Colonel Earl Rudder were ordered to knock out.

Some 400 Americans died or were wounded in scaling the cliffs to get at the bunker which the Allies thought contained large guns which could be used on the entire landing area. It turned out that the big guns had not been installed and the Rangers suffered needless casualties. The movie "The Longest Day" features this assault. The memorial to the landing on Omaha Beach is located atop this bunker. The entire area around the bunker and memorial has never been restored and grassed-over craters from bombs and shells are everywhere. We walked among these craters and the ruins and tried to imagine the noise and activity of that June day in 1944.

We walked about in the rooms below the ground and saw where the Germans lived and later died. On one concrete wall is a memorial plaque presented by Texas Governor Bill Clements in 1988.

Further west up the coast we came to the final landing zone, Utah Beach. This landing zone is in a flatter area of the beach but still an area heavily fortified by the Germans. This landing zone was essential to open a route to



Cherbourg on the Atlantic coast and the rest of the Cotentin Peninsula. The museum of the memorial to Utah Beach are just a few kilometers from the town of Sainte-Mere-Eglise.

Sainte-Mere-Eglise still has a replica of the paratrooper, John Steel, hanging from the south side. Many other evidences of the French appreciation for the liberation from four years of German occupation are displayed throughout the town.

Sainte-Mere-Eglise is in the midst of the area where the U.S. 104th and 82nd paratroopers and glider troops were dropped on the night before the landing to protect the west and northwest flank of the invasion area.

As we headed east again toward Pegasus Bridge and on to our base at Cabourg I had time to reflect on the tremendous costs in lives, materials, and emotions, required to land a force on the continent of Europe and begin the drive eastward to Berlin and the final defeat of the Nazis in 1945. My respect and admiration for the Americans who came ashore along this hostile stretch of coast grew as I reflected on the effort required and the hardships endured. To Jim Eidson and the many others, I can only say "Thank you, well done."

Truck Drivers Injured In Wreck


Two truck drivers were injured about 2 p.m. Thursday when their truck jackknifed on Interstate 20 about a half mile east of Cisco.

DAV Outraged By COLA Denial

"We're disgusted and outraged by the treatment that disabled American veterans have received from the Congress this year. While our elected representatives have been able to find the money and time to pass out their traditional pork-barrel projects, bail out savings and loan institutions and raise their own salaries, they haven't been able to adequately take care of veterans who become disabled through their service to this country."

That was the angry response from Joseph E. Andry, the

National Commander of the Disabled American Veterans (DAV) to Capitol Hill's denial of a 5.4 percent cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) for service-connected veterans and survivors of veterans who die from service-connected causes. Andry noted that while all other federal beneficiaries received a cost-of-living increase under the Fiscal Year 1991 federal budget, including Social Security recipients, federal employees and retired military personnel, disabled veterans did not.

"Why are disabled veter-

ans being singled out?" Andry asked. "Why are the needs of disabled veterans, their families and survivors being ignored?"

Andry noted that the loss of this year's COLA is particularly painful for disabled veterans and their families at a time when veteran's programs under the Department of Veterans Affairs are being cut by \$3.7 billion over the next five years. He added that many of the disabled veterans who will be affected are elderly and on fixed incomes. While they may likely see the costs of food, housing, and health care go up, they will see no COLA to counter those increases.

"It's inconceivable, at a

time when nearly 200,000 of our young servicemen and women in the Middle East are ready to sacrifice their lives and limbs for our country, to deny a basic cost-of-living adjustment for disabled veterans who have already made that sacrifice," said Andry. He added, "How will Congress explain to the survivors of those service personnel who have already lost their lives in the Persian Gulf that their sacrifice has been forgotten?"

Andry pointed out that while Congress could not find in its heart a COLA for disabled veterans, it was able to:

- give its members a 25 percent pay raise that will increase their pay from \$98,000 to \$125,000 a year.
- provide \$2.5 billion in tax breaks for the oil and gas industry;
- provide \$10 billion more for the "Savings and Loan" scandal;
- boost NASA funding by almost 14 percent; and
- provide a \$500,000 grant to the town of Strasburg, North Dakota, to build a museum honoring band leader Lawrence Welk.

"This is what we're dealing with in Washington, a total disregard for the real, human needs in this country," concluded Andry. "All veterans should be as outraged as we are. And all veterans should let their Senators and Congressman know before November 6th just what they

Wet And Cold Weather Again; Peanut Harvest Delayed

Another cold front brought a drop in temperatures and general rains to Eastland County at mid-week. Skies were clearing by late Thursday, however.

This wet spell had the same general pattern as the one last weekend, Nov. 3-4. Cold air

from the north met warm winds from the gulf. Rainfall totals for Wednesday night were an inch in Cisco, Eastland, Ranger, Rising Star, and other places around the county. Showers on Thursday brought the totals up to around 1.5 inches.

No damage was reported, although rural roads were muddy and slippery from the slow rains. Even the median on I-20 was boggy, with several cars stuck along the way. There were also some accidents on the Interstate.

By Thursday morning the temperature was 38 degrees in Cisco, and 42 degrees at the Eastland County Water District Plant near Lake Leon. The thermometer rose to about 44 degrees during the day, but the air felt colder because of the rain.

Randy Johnson at the Pump Station at Lake Cisco reported that the Lake had caught about

4 inches of water since the rain last weekend. He said 2.25 fell during the previous rain, and Wednesday nights and Thursday's total brought it on up.

"The Lake is still in good shape," Johnson said.

Near Lake Leon Water Plant operator Jesse White reports that the Lake continues at a high level. Lake Leon caught about an inch from recent rains, he said, and is now more than 63 ft. deep at the dam.

These last rains have been beneficial to about everything except the peanut crop, says David Tunmire, Eastland County Extension Agent.

"About 35 percent of the peanut crop is still in the fields," he says. "The ground was already wet, and the latest rain will delay the harvest by as much as 10 days at least."

The County Agent says that so far the peanuts have had little frost damage. A heavy freeze could really hurt them, with a loss of pounds a bushel as grade.

It doesn't look like this will happen here, however, although snow is in the Panhandle, and flurries reported as far down as Lubbock. Drier conditions are expected in Eastland County for the weekend, with temperatures climbing up.



To All Cisco Residents And Those Concerned For Our Children:

I love Cisco and the people in it! I want that made perfectly clear from the beginning. My family and I have never found anywhere that is friendlier, nicer, or more of a home than our community is. It has only been two years this month since we came to pastor the Cisco Church of the Nazarene, but it is our home and we hope it will be for many, many years to come. I love Cisco!

There is, however, one thing that appalls me. You see, I also drive a school bus here, as I have every other place I have pastored, and I have never seen anywhere that expressed such a total disregard for the flashing loading lights and the signs designating loading areas at the school. It does not seem to matter where the bus is loading or unloading, there are always a number of people

who will pass the bus anyway, some don't even slow down. Many people probably feel that because we always unload to the right, it is safe to pass on the left. Let me assure you as a school bus driver for many years and a parent for many more, children cannot always be counted on to go where they are supposed to. If a child were to drop a paper and run into the street to retrieve it I probably could not reach them in time to stop them from being hit.

Many of the cars that pass us at the schools are unloading children of their own. Some pull just past the bus and let their kids out right in front of it. I suppose they think that is the safest place because other cars will yield for the bus and them as well. Think about it. You didn't, why should they? That is not a safe place to stop and unload your children. There are mirrors and blind spots on buses that can hide whole cars much less a small child. We have been trained to check, but suppose we miss that little one some foggy morning, or any time? Suppose we run over him or her and snuff out that precious little life? Who would be to blame? A parent or driver who let their child out where they weren't supposed to or a bus driver who tried to see everything but just didn't? I assure you we try. I have thought about this very much and I know that no matter whose fault it was, it would have a devastating effect on my life for as long as I lived on this earth.

I must tell you this. The signs posted at the schools designating "Bus Parking

Only" are not there to inconvenience you. They are there to give us a safe place to load or unload the children. Some of you have gotten very angry at those who have asked you to move. Your children are watching you even then and you are not teaching them your concern for them when you slam car doors, chew out the bus driver, or even spin your tires as you leave to let us know how much we have upset you by asking you to obey the laws and street signs. (That's not really what you are showing us anyway.) You are teaching your children it is okay to disobey the law or get mad at it. Some have found out recently that it is against the law to pass a school bus when the Red Loading Lights are flashing. Thank you, Mr. Police Officer. You may have saved a child's life.

I could say much more on this subject, but I realize that I have already upset some of this community that is not only my home but the place God has directed me to perform His ministry. That has not been my intent and I will stop with this. I Love Cisco and I Love Cisco's Children. You must decide for yourself if you do too. Parents/Drivers, leave a little earlier or find another place to park (there really are many more places). The lights and signs are not there to make you late or be a nuisance, but to save the lives of our children.

Sheriff's Department Is Investigating Possible Murder

The Eastland County Sheriff's Department is investigating a possible murder.

An '86 Jeep Cherokee Laredo 4 door was found in a rural area north of Olden Thursday Blood was found in the seat and splattered on the steering wheel, ceiling, windshield, and other parts of the vehicle. Body tissue, was found near the driver's seat. What appeared to be bullet holes, possible from a shotgun slug, were found in a right side door post, with a possible bullet exit hole in the roof of the Cherokee.

Two or three shots were believed to have been fired, and a left side window was

shattered also. Evidence indicates that the suspected crime happened in a different location from where the Cherokee was found. Fingerprint, blood, and crime scene experts were being brought in to go over the vehicle Friday.

The Cherokee was for sale and was being tried out by a prospective buyer when it disappeared. After the rains,

officers had to use a four wheel drive vehicle to go to where the Cherokee was spotted.

At press time a body had not been found, and Sheriff Dee Hogan said that it may take some time to locate the body if a murder has occurred as they suspect. But we will have the evidence for a case when the missing pieces are found, he continued.
