'Scouting For Food' Set Saturday

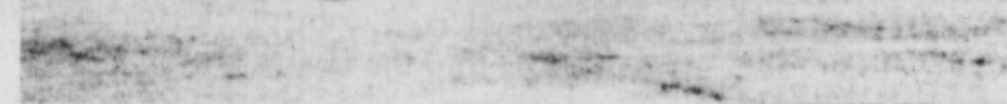
"Scouting For Food" is an event that includes the participation of Boy Scouts, Cub Scouts, and Explorers all over the United States and also helps needy people across the nation.

Record Sixth Appearance In Macy's Parade

CJC Band And Belles Leave For New York City Tuesday

The Cisco Junior College Wrangler Band and Belles will perform in Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade in New York City Thursday for their sixth appearance, the most any band has appeared in the annual parade. They are scheduled to appear in the final hour of the parade, according to word received here.

A large group will accompany the college delegation to New York City for the four days and three nights trip. "It is no small honor to be invited to New York's famous Macy's Parade. In fact only about 15 bands and one or two drill teams from the entire USA receive invitations to the prestigious parade each year. The CJC Band and Belles have already made a quite extraordinary five appearances beginning back in 1971," said Eris Ritchie of Southwest Enterprises, who planned the trip and will conduct the tour personally. "We feel extremely honored

in being selected yet once more to represent the state of Texas in the nationally televised parade production Thursday."

The itinerary calls for the group to meet at CJC at 4 a.m. Tuesday and depart Cisco at 4:30 for D/FW Airport. American Airlines Flight 82 will depart for New York City at 8:17 a.m. and arrive at New York LaGuardia Airport at 12:30 p.m. After arriving at Southgate Tower Hotel, the tour group will have free time until 5 p.m. when they will go on a walking tour to Times Square and the theatre district.

At 7:30 p.m. Thursday the group may attend the broad show "Gypsy" or enjoy other activities "on their own." All Band and Belle members may attend the Broadway Show, go ice skating at Rockefeller Center, go to a movie in the Rockefeller Center area, or remain in the skating rink area at Rockefeller Center.

At 10 p.m. all groups will return to the hotel, walking unless the weather is inclement. If it is, they will take the subway.

On Wednesday, the group will leave the hotel at 9 a.m. for a Gray Line Sight-Seeing Tour which will include Chinatown, Lower Manhattan, the Bowery, ferry ride to the Statue of Liberty and an hour's tour of the Statue, the financial district and Ellis Island. An optional guided tour of the United Nations Headquarters will be available.

Thursday, from 6 a.m. until 1 p.m., the Band and Belles will be involved in parade activities. They will be picked

up by busses at the hotel and transported to their parade assembly point.

Following the parade, the group will meet in the hotel's ballroom and walk to the Empire State Building. Thanksgiving Dinner will be served at Houlihan's Restaurant in the Empire State Building at 2:30 p.m.

A tour of the Empire State Building Observatory will follow dinner; then they will walk to Rockefeller Center for a tour there, including St. Patrick's Cathedral.

One of the highlights of the trip will be the Christmas Show performance at Radio City Music Hall Thursday evening.

Friday, the group has two options before leaving the hotel. They may either tour the New York Stock Exchange, or spend time shopping at Macy's or other stores in the area.

American Airline Flight 375 will depart LaGuardia Airport at 6 p.m. and arrive at D/FW at 8:58 p.m.

The group is expected to arrive back in Cisco at midnight Friday.

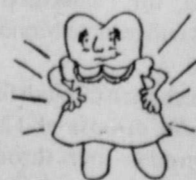

Baby Blues

Q. Is it true a mother experiences more cavities, or even loses a tooth, with each new baby?
A. No. It is also not true that the baby absorbs calcium from the mother's teeth, thereby weakening them. If a woman has more decay while she's pregnant, it's probably due to more sugar consumption and less attention to her teeth. During pregnancy, it is very important to maintain a healthy diet, and to brush and floss regularly. It is true that the chance of gum disease is increased because of hormonal changes during pregnancy. An expectant mother needs to continue with her regular dental check-ups, and ask her dentist about special instructions on dental care for herself and the new baby.

Q. What are Identity Achievers like?
A. Identity Achievers are a more diverse group than Foreclosures. Many factors and circumstances cause the formation of a self-made identity.

Psychological growth involves increasing autonomy from the parents and increased individuation from the pre-adolescent self. The adolescent has internalized the parents values. Further growth involves re-working the internal self. This is the process of individuation.

Although the adolescent gains in autonomy and freedom, some security and protection as a child is relinquished.

Individuation is painful because it involves giving up trusted aspects that feel like the self. There is a sense of uncertainty and rootlessness. In return the adolescent gains possibilities, but freedom can be terrifying. They feel relativity and risk in life decisions. They are free but vulnerable.

Identity Achievement women have gone through this process during adolescence. They have forged identities on their own terms. They have reworked the identities assigned to them as children. They are not necessarily achievers in the work world. They are women who choose lives after still through options and have a life plan they can claim as their own.

Identity Achievement women are considered payers of the way.

For men with a non-cancerous enlarged prostate, a new procedure uses a surgical balloon to relieve urinary obstruction. Doctors reporting the method in the Lancet, the British medical journal, have not yet determined how long the improvement will last.

Heart patients who take beta blockers should not go off medication -- even for a while -- without a doctor's approval. Stopping the drug abruptly temporarily quadruples heart attack risk, the Journal of the American Medical Association reported.

All pregnant women should be screened for gestational diabetes between the 24th and 28th week, according to a report in Obstetrics and Gynecology. Currently, only older women with specific risk factors are tested.

Obesity is strongly tied to heredity, a study of identical twins found. Studies reported in the New England Journal of Medicine noted that twins ended up the same weight, whether they grew up together or apart, and that some people do get fat even when they eat less.

Frances Bishop Gives Review From 'Tchaikovsky in America'

A Review by Frances Bishop from the book "Tchaikovsky In America" and piano music from Music Club President Virginia W. Russell were highlights of the Eastland Music Study Club meeting Nov. 7.

The Women's Clubhouse was filled for the event with Club members, "Friends of Music" and guests. Program Leader Inez Cogburn welcomed the crowd.

The program began with Mrs. Russell's playing of a Tchaikovsky composition "Andante Cantabile," Op. 11. She remarked that this number was actually from music composed for a String Quartet. It seemed well suited to a piano, however.

Russian folk music formed the theme, with "The Volga Boatman" rising at the first of the peice. This dissolved into melodic variations, but the

"Boatman" song surfaced again at the conclusion.

The mood of this piece drew the audience into Frances Bishop's book review.

"I recommend that you read this book for yourself," Mrs. Bishop said. "The author is a genius - he has assembled Tchaikovsky's Diary, newspaper clippings and letters to give a complete picture of the Russian composer's trip to the opening of Carnegie Hall."

Her narrative began with Tchaikovsky's arrival in New York City in April, 1891, just in time to rehearse for the grand opening of Carnegie Hall on May 5.

"I am ten times better known in America than Europe, and more of a big shot here than in Russia," the composer wrote home.

But this welcome didn't keep Tchaikovsky happy - he was sad and homesick. After

a morning rehearsal he wrote: "Too much confusion. The musicians are tired."

On May 5, 1891 around 5,000 people arrived at Carnegie Hall opening, Tchaikovsky was inwardly worried, but showed none of this to the public. His conducting was flawless, and the pianist and orchestra performed beautifully.

Later Tchaikovsky was shocked when newspapers said he looked much older than his 50 years. But after his last appearance at the Music Hall he said: "I'm greatly loved by the American people."

He returned to Russia in late May, and died before he could ever come back to America.

After Frances Bishop gave her interesting Review, Virginia Russell made announcements. She said that Viola Payne had been appointed Crusade For Strings Chairman for the club, and would be reporting on activities to an officer in District IV of the

Texas Federation.

A group of members made plans to attend the District IV Federation Day meeting in Fort Worth Nov. 14.

Mrs. Emily Perkins presented the club with a treasured photograph (in color) made at the dedication of the pipe organ at the First Methodist Church in Eastland. The picture was gratefully received by the club.

Hostesses at the Nov. 7 meeting were Beulah Beth Smith, Mildred Turner, and Bonnie Rice. They had a beautifully appointed table with a large centerpiece of fall fruits. Mauve chrsanthemums accented the colors of the centerpiece. Punch and assorted cookies were served to all.

At the conclusion of the meeting plans were finalized for the Christmas Dinner at the Clubhouse Dec. 3.

FOOD SHIPMENT TO SAUDI ARABIA

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service is receiving numerous inquiries about shipping food to Saudi Arabia for American troops.

Kenneth Hall, of Federal Extension Service Food Science division, offers these suggestions:

"Because of religious reasons, any form of alcoholic beverages and pork items are taboo. You should use common sense concerning other foods.

Canned vegetables are susceptible to spoilage by thermophiles, because temperatures in storage and transportation containers may reach 150 degrees F. Although canned fruits are safe and will not spoil, quality will deteriorate rapidly at high temperatures.

Dried and intermediate moisture foods survive best under these adverse conditions. Because of the likelihood of worm growth, I suggest sending only dried fruit commercially packaged in sulfure dioxide or other preservatives. Certain types of cookies and cakes are good, but avoid those that become stale readily or that may break or crumble in transit. Candies should not be the type that melt and should be individually wrapped. Nuts that are vacuum packed and with antioxidants should survive."

When baking cookies, Janet Thomas, Eastland County Extension Agent, suggests that you do not use chocolate chips since they will melt. Also do not use butter or margarine because it may become rancid with high heat. Mrs. Thomas suggests that

you use butter flavored shortening. Also it is advisable to wrap each cookie separately which will help retain the freshness and facilitate packaging. Another suggestion is that empty coffee cans make ideal containers for packaging the cookies. Do not send any drinkable alcohol which includes liquor-flavored foods.

Rick Wende, at the Eastland Post Office, states that Christmas packages mailed to the troops by surface mail should have been mailed by November 3rd; however priority, air mail deadline is November 16. Wende stated that Christmas cards and letters need to be mailed by November 26th deadline to insure delivery for the holidays. In selecting Christmas cards, remember that religious materials contrary to the Islamic faith will

be censored.

RANGER COOKIES
1/2 cup shortening
1/2 cup granulated sugar
1/2 cup brown sugar
1 egg
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1 cup all purpose flour
1/2 teaspoon soda
1/4 teaspoon baking powder
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 cup quick cooking oats
1 cup fortified whole wheat flakes cereal
1/2 cup shredded coconut
Heat oven to 375 degrees.
Mix thoroughly shortening, granulated sugar, brown sugar, egg and vanilla. Stir in remaining ingredients.
Drop dough by rounded

teaspoonfuls 2 inches apart onto ungreased baking sheet. Bake 10 minutes. Immediately remove from baking sheet.

Makes 3 dozen cookies.

Fund Started For Eastland County Man Injured In Wyoming Oilfield Mishap

An Eastland County man was critically injured on September 21, 1990, when the casing-pulling equipment on which he was working collapsed while attempting to retrieve casing from an abandoned Wyoming well.

Joe Stephenson, 51, was employed by RHS Operating of Eastland when the accident occurred. A 34 year old Graham man, Mike Taylor was killed instantly when debris from the collapse struck him a fatal blow. Stephenson was also struck by flying debris and sustained major injuries to his head, face and arm.

A medical rescue team arrived at the remote well site more than an hour after the accident. Paramedics worked feverishly to save the injured man's life. Stephenson was sent to a Wyoming Medical Center in Casper where he underwent 13 hours of Emergency Surgery.

After stabilizing, Stephenson was transferred to the University of Utah Medical Center in Salt Lake City where two additional surgeries were performed and where he remains in guarded condition in the hospital's neuro-critical care unit.

Because the accident occurred on the job, Stephenson's personal medical insurance has denied coverage. Thus far, the company for whom Stephenson worked has been unable to provide evidence of insurance which will cover the medical or personal expenses which are currently estimated at near a half million dollars.

Because of the lack of insurance coverage and the critical nature of his injuries, Stephenson and his wife Lynn will be unable to transfer to a medical facility nearer to home.

At this point, Doctors attending Stephenson are cautious with their prognosis. Stephenson has lost one eye and has serious damage to the other. His brain has also been damaged, but the full extent of his disability may not be known for many months to come, it is reported.

A group of concerned friends and neighbors have established a fund-raising effort to help cover some of the financial burdens placed on the family of Joe Stephenson.

A one day gold scramble will be held on December 8

beginning at 11:00 a.m. at Lone Cedar Country Club. That night at the Lone Cedar Club House a dinner, dance and auction will be open to the public for \$25.00 per couple with all proceeds going to the Stephenson Relief Fund.

A car wash will be held at Russell's Auto on December 3 and a raffle and bake sale are still in the planning stages.

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Keep Thanksgiving Safe From Uninvited Guests

COLLEGE STATION—A favorite Thanksgiving food also is an ideal breeding ground for bacteria that cause food-borne illness.

Stuffing cooked with turkey or chicken is a traditional dish for many families during the holidays. It's also a food more likely to cause food sickness if not prepared, cooked or stored properly, according to Dr. Al Wagner, food technologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Food-borne illness may seem a mere annoyance to some, but it can cause serious problems. The Food and Drug Administration reports that food contamination can lead to arthritis, kidney damage, heart problems and in rare cases, death.

"This illness can cause the strongest athlete to double over in pain from stomach cramps, diarrhea, vomiting and dehydration," Wagner said. "An estimated 24 to 81 million cases of food illness occur each year in the United States, costing \$5 billion to \$17 billion in medical care and lost productivity."

Whether you plan to make stuffing from scratch or out of a box, cook it immediately after mixing it — separately from the meat, advises Dr. Bethann Witcher, Extension nutritionist.

"If you cook the turkey in advance, remove the meat from the bones right after cooking and refrigerate or freeze it," she said. "If food is contaminated and held at room temperature too long, bacteria may produce a harmful toxin, Staphylococcus aureus, that cannot be destroyed by ordinary cooking."

Other holiday trimmings such as broth and gravy spoil easily and should be refrigerated quickly after cooking.

she said. Always serve these food hot and do not store them more than two days.

"Cream pies and cream puffs are often involved in food illness," Witcher said. "Since cream pies and cream-filled pastries get soggy if refrigerated too long, wait to fill them as close to serving time as possible, but do not allow them to sit at room temperature too long."

Foods that require hand preparation such as ham sandwiches, potato salads and chicken salads also need special care, she said. Serve the type of sandwiches that can be frozen and thawed as needed. Try freezing cubes of chicken to use in salads. Cubes will thaw as the salad stands, keeping it as cold as possible.

"Don't let huge quantities of leftovers fill your refrigerator for days," Witcher said. "Plan in advance how to use remaining foods and freeze the rest."

A few simple precautions in food handling can prevent happy holidays from becoming miserable ones. Following these tips, known as the "Four Cs," to prevent food illness:

• Clean your hands, utensils, equipment, working surfaces and also foods that require washing.

• Cook foods until their temperatures reach at least 140 degrees Fahrenheit and maintain foods above that temperature when serving.

• Chill foods immediately after purchasing and after serving. Maintain at a temperature of less than 40 degrees F; keep refrigerators set between 32 and 40 degrees, freezers at 0 degrees.

• Keep raw foods and any equipment used to prepare raw foods away from cooked and ready-to-eat foods to avoid cross-contamination from bacteria.

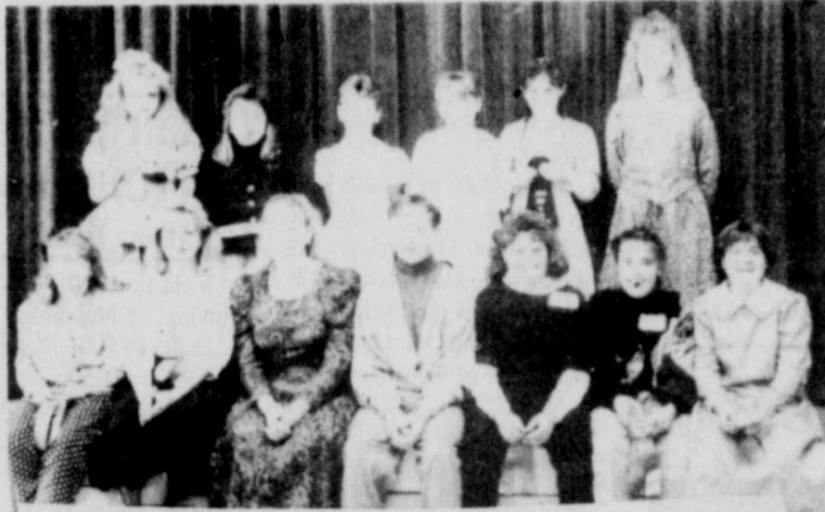

...Having contacted the Library of Congress, WASHINGTON, D.C., in response to request for information regarding copies of out-of-print books, I received the following reference to "PHOTOGRAPHIC REPRODUCTION":

"Some out-of-print publications can be difficult or time-consuming to locate on the antiquarian market and may not have been reprinted. In such cases, copies may sometimes be obtainable through various methods of photographic reproduction.

Full-size paper copies of books, magazine articles and other materials can be obtained by use of electrostatic process. The Library of Congress Photoduplication Service can produce Xerox and other types of copies from materials in the Library's collections, subject to copyright or other restrictions. Further details, including rates are obtainable from the Library of Congress, Photoduplication Service, Washington, D.C. 20540.

There are several commercial organizations which specialize in producing electrostatic copies of scarce books. Among them are University Microfilms International, 300 North Zeeb Road, Ann Arbor, Michigan, 48106; and Micro Photo Division, Bell & Howell Company, Old Mansfield Road, P.O. Box

774, Wooster, Ohio 44691. They produce full size copies of out-of-print books, provided they can locate a copy of the book and obtain permission from the copyright holder where needed. Information on the charges for these services is available upon application to these companies. Many libraries have electrostatic or other copiers, which can produce full-size paper copies of pages from books, periodicals, and other materials in their collections, subject to copyright or other restrictions.

Many scarce books are copied on 35-mm roll microfilm, microfiche (small sheets of film, similar in appearance to snapshot negatives), or opaque microfilm (cards on which material is printed in extremely small size) However, publications reproduced in these forms can be used only with special reading machines. If such devices are available in a nearby library or other facility, a librarian may be able to help you determine the organizations to which you can turn for microcopies. Many of the materials available in microfilm are listed in the Guide to Microfilms in Print (Westport, Conn., Microfilm Review, 1961+ annual), the Subject Guide to Microforms in Print (Westport, Conn., Microfilm Review 1962+annual), Eva M. Tilton's Union List of Publications in Opaque Microforms, 2d. ed. (New York, Scarecrow Press, 1964, 744 p.), the National Register of Microform Masters (Washington, Library of Congress, Sept., 1965+ annual) and Newspapers in Microform (Washington, Library of Congress, 1948+ annual) A list of libraries with facilities for copying materials in their collections can be found in Joseph Z. Nitecki's Directory of Library Reprographic Services, a World Guide, 6th ed., ([Weston, Conn.] Published for the Reproduction of Library Materials Section, RTSD-American Library Association, by Microform Review, Inc., [c.1976] 178p.) The American Library Directory (New York, R.R. Bowker Co., 1923 + biennial) indicates the availability of microfilming facilities and reading machines for various types of microforms in the libraries listed."

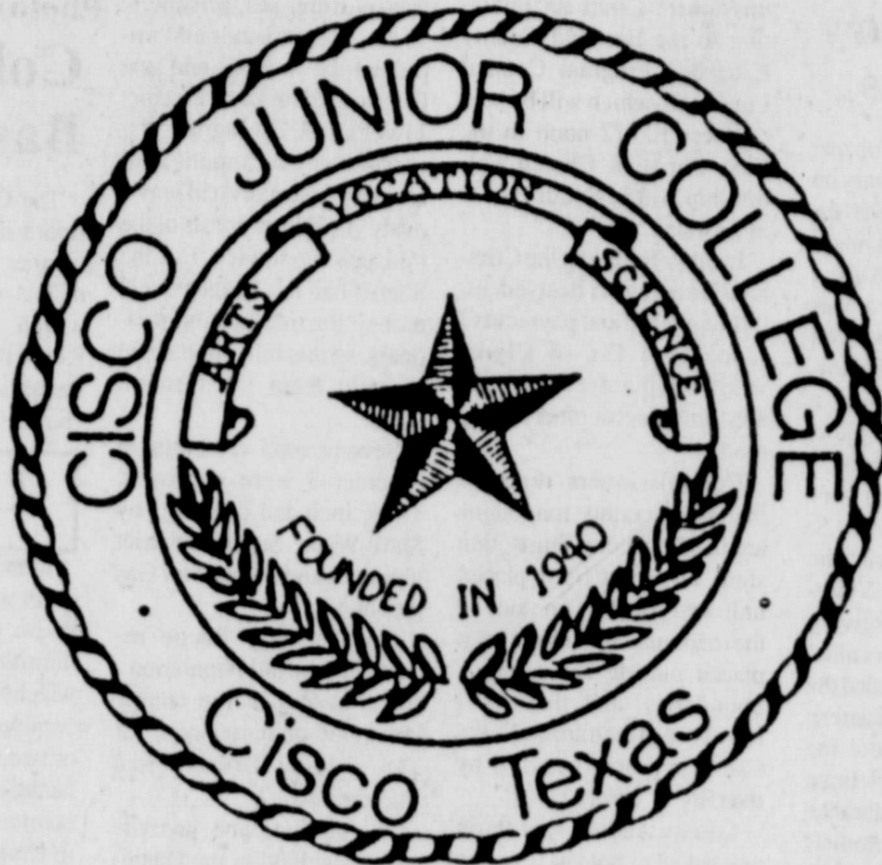

Commissioners Delay Road Mapping Payment

Eastland County Commissioners held a regular meeting Tuesday, Nov. 13. The agenda was not as long as usual, but there were some important items.

The Commissioners agreed to a request from County Agent David Tunmire to sponsor a Seminar on underground water management. This will be held Nov. 27 at 7 p.m. in the Community Room of Eastland National Bank. Tunmire said that several specialists will discuss the subject, focusing on Eastland County.

Tunmire also gave the Commissioners Court an invitation to the Eastland County Extension Program Council Luncheon, which will be held on Dec. 10, 12 noon in the First Christian Church Fellowship Bldg., South Lamar in Eastland.

In other business, the Commissioners again delayed authorizing the final payment to Jedco Sign Co. of Clyde, which was hired some months ago to map and number county roads.

Commissioners reported that some county road signs are inside the city limits, that signs have not been placed uniformly on the same side of the roads, that some have been placed outside the county's boundaries, and that signs have been placed around Lake Cisco on property owned by the City of Cisco.

County Auditor Ray Pruitt was asked to hold any money due Jedco until the Commissioners approve the sign company's work.

On other agenda items, the Commissioners approved a request from Norman Christian, Commissioner of Pct. 2,

that he should bid on some property for sale in Ranger. This location would be used by the Precinct.

Also approved was a request by Billy Bacon, Commissioner of Pct. 4, that he pay for a damaged gas tank from his precinct funds.

Bacon said a grader on a county road in the Mitchell Community (SW of Cisco) left a large rock on the roadway. A woman's car was damaged when she hit the rock. Repairs to the gas tank will cost \$269.00, Bacon said.

The Commissioners agreed to pay a bill for \$641.00 for transporting jail prisoners. Three Commissioners approved the motion, and one (Richard Robinson of Precinct 1) voted no. During the discussion on the Commissioners agreed that they had previously voted to pay costs of the transporting service. But the Sheriff had not budgeted any money for transporting prisoners, so this bill will have to be paid from the General Fund.

Several road crossings in Precinct 3 were approved. These included crossings by Staff Water Supply District pipelines and a Lone Star Gas pipeline.

Comm. Billy Bacon reported a low jail population - six prisoners in the county jail. Four of these were for TDC and due to be transported Tuesday.

In addition, one juvenile was being held in the Detention Center in Abilene.

Bacon said that the jail was "Very clean, as always."

The next regular Commissioner's Court meeting was set for Monday, Nov. 26.

It was announced that a monthly feature article called "State Of the College Report" will be initiated in January to keep local newspaper readers better informed about CJC.

The board accepted the resignation of Joe D. Gregory, maintenance mechanics instructor in Abilene.

Other routine matters were discussed.

The next regular meeting of the CJC Board of Regents will be January 14, 1991.

Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor,

As many Cisco residents know, there are entire communities in rural America which have NO doctors. Other communities have only one or two doctors to address the health care needs of an entire community. Such is the case in Cisco with only one doctor.

A common thread that runs through communities without doctors is the lack of a hospital. With many small communities competing for the services of a very limited number of primary care physicians, those without hospitals are "our of the running." The distribution of physician manpower favors communities with hospitals.

Another common thread in these communities is that residents, many of them elderly, must depend on out-of-town doctors or the outpatient departments of out-of-town hospitals for medical care. In many cases they wait for hours to see a doctor, seldom if ever seeing the same one twice in a row. Unwilling to accept such conditions, many people stop seeking medical attention until conditions worsen and are often beyond the scope of primary treatment and prevention.

Is this what is wanted for

the citizens of Cisco, Texas? the goal to reopen E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital is not unreasonable — if you consider the alternatives.

If you support the hospital, vote AGAINST a tax rollback.

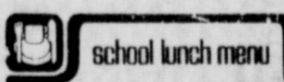

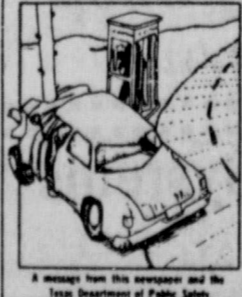
