Cisco Band And Belles Catch Attention of New York Times

The Cisco Junior College Band and Belles reaped some totally unexpected major publicity during their visit to New York last week for the Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade.

In addition to performing for two million parade viewers on Broadway, and for national television on all three networks, the Cisco students were the subject of a feature article in *The New York Times*, the nation's largest metropolitan daily newspaper. The *Times* article focused specifically on Wangler Belle Ginny Pope of Cisco, comparing her advance expectations of the Big Apple, which were admittedly apprehensive, to her later reactions to the city of New York and its people.

Shortly after arriving at the Southgate Hotel in mid-Manhattan on Tuesday, November 20, CJC Band Director Bill Swinney received a telephone call from the *Times*. The NY Metropolitan Section editor requested to send a reporter and photographer with the Cisco group on their sight-seeing tours, as well as to their meetings, rehearsals, down the Broadway parade route, and culminating at their feature performance for the NBC Television cameras at Macy's.

The article, written by Craig Wolff, with photograph by Fred R. Conrad, appeared on

Page 1 of the Metropolitan Section of the *Times* on Friday, November 23, the day following Thanksgiving and the Band/Belles performance. It read, in part:

"Watch New York from a step back, Ginny Pope had been telling herself for two days. Better yet, two steps back. Don't get too close to the people in rags and the hustlers and all those crowds. So she watched New York from ferries and tour buses. She thought she was keeping her distance.

"Wishful thinking for Ginny Pope. Because there she was at 11 o'clock yesterday morning, right in the very center of the city, taking one small step, then one giant high-kick, the tourist turned tourist attraction, all the way from Cisco, Tex., marching and dancing in the 64th Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade.

"Miss Pope took it all in—the soaring character balloons, the splashy floats, the hundreds of thousands of smiles. At first she was a bit scared, but then she scared herself with how well she fit in.

Hearing Voices

"Taking her place in the front row of her drill team, the Cisco Junior College Belles, a few paces behind the school's marching band, Miss Pope remembered her coach's direction to keep

smiling. But she also heard her mother saying, "Look straight ahead, mind your business, and no one will bother you."

"On Wednesday, Miss Pope, 20 years old, was dazzled by the Statue of Liberty and 'Gypsy.' She took in Ellis Island in a record eight minutes and was dumbfounded when she saw one man dragging a woman down a street and another 'using the restroom on the street.'

"Her thought then, she said, was 'New York should be ashamed of itself.'

"Yesterday, on Central Park West, in her cowgirl hat, denim skirt with sequin belt and fringed boots, she passed by the park and said, 'I didn't know there was any green here.' At Columbus Circle, she seemed to look not just at the crowds but into them, and remarked, 'People seem so together here.' At Times Square, she looked up at the people waving from high floors and at the children sitting cross-legged in front of the curb.

"I didn't really know New York had kids,' she said. "When it was over, after her group's 90 seconds on television, Miss Pope put her hands on her hips. 'Everything I said about New York yesterday, forget about it,' she

King And Queen Lobo LIX Will Be Crowned Thursday

The Coronation of the Fifty-Ninth King and Queen Lobo will be held Thursday, Nov. 29, at 7:30 p.m. in the Harrell Fine Arts Auditorium on the Cisco Junior College Campus. Tickets are \$3.50 for adults and \$1.50 for students. Tickets are now available from any member of the junior class, and will also be available at the door Thursday night.

When this tradition began in 1927, the student body selected five Cisco High School senior football players as nominees for the first King Lobo. These young men chose their own Queen candidates for the coronation. The lucky young lady who was escorted by King Lobo became Queen Lobo. This tradition continued in this manner until 1965 when it was decided that King Lobo nominees were no longer required to be football players. At that time also, five senior girls were nominated, and for the first time Queen Lobo was elected by the student body.

As the tradition continues today, the senior class chooses five nominees for both King and Queen. The entire student body of Cisco High School then elects King and Queen Lobo. Other members of the court are selected by their respective classes from kindergarten through Cisco Junior College.

daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth McCulloch; Kelly Rhodes, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ron Rhodes; Deitra Hearne, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ron Hearne; and Amanda McGinness, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Allen McGinness.

Nominees for King Lobo LIX are Brian Callarman, son of Mr. and Mrs. David Callarman; Brack Dempsey, son of Mr. and Mrs. Herman Dempsey; Phillip Gattis, son

of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Gattis; Keith Stowe, son of Mr. and Mrs. Gary Regeon; and Roy Worley, son of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Worley.

Phil Warren, Cisco High School principal, will crown the newly-elected King Lobo, who will then crown Queen Lobo.

Following the royal presentation, the junior class will entertain King and Queen Lobo LIX, their court and honored guests.

Sheriff Hogan Requests Another Deputy Be Hired

Sheriff Dee Hogan Monday requested that County Commissioners approve money to hire an additional Deputy. Hogan handed Judge Scott Bailey and the three Commissioners a leaflet full of data outlining the need for additional law enforcement in the county.

Hogan said he presently had four deputies. Counting himself, that was one lawman for every 1,200 rural residents, he said.

The Sheriff told the Court that the understaffing of rural areas was most critical during hunting season, when a number of people from outside the county had access to ranches. Cattle theft was a special problem during hunting season, he said, as well as some other rural threats.

The Commissioners appeared to be somewhat cool to the idea of appropriating

more money, and tabled the request. They discussed the role of local Constables in County law enforcement, and were told that the Constable in Pct. 1 serves as a Bailiff in the 91st District Court, and others mainly served papers. Hogan told the court that Gene Hicks, the Constable at Rising Star, was one who got and did active investigations in addition to other duties.

Richard Robinson, Commissioner of Pct. 1, told Hogan: "I don't think a month and a half into the budget year, even if we had the money, we couldn't justify calling it an emergency to give you more money."

Robinson also said he thought the state average was one law officer for every 2,000 people.

Norman Christian, the Commissioner of Pct. 2, said that the county's population was dwindling - they needed to cut expenses and not add on.

L. T. Owen, Comm. of Pct. 3, told Hogan: "We need to study this."

Billy Bacon, Comm. of Pct. 4, was not present at the meeting. In other matters, the Commissioners approved the final payment of \$2,480 to Jedco Design of Clyde for numbering county roads. John Davis represented Jedco, and he told the Commissioners he had posted some signs within the city limits of Cisco and Eastland.

L. T. Owen reported that some were also within the City of Rising Star, and he would like to have them removed.

District Attorney Emory Walton told the Commissioners that the County might be held liable where county signs are posted inside city limits.

Davis said he would work with the Commissioners and clear up final matters on the signs.

The Commissioners tabled a request by Lynn Williamson to close County Road 462 in Pct. 2 until Williamson obtains a complete legal description of the property and signatures of all adjoining

Wranglers Named To All-Conference Team

Four members of the Cisco Junior College Wranglers football team have been named to the Texas Junior College All-Conference Football Team for 1990. Nine Wranglers received Honorable Mention honors.

Named to the All-Conference team were:

Bert Milliner, 5'6", 150 pounds sophomore wide receiver from Cedar Hill, First Team All-Conference (unanimous). He was the leading receiving in the conference with 46 catches for 958 yards and 10 touchdowns. He averaged 95.8 yards per game, and 20.7 yards per catch average.

Daryl Cummings, 6'3", 285 pounds sophomore offensive guard from San Angelo, First Team All-Conference. He was the only unanimous offensive lineman chosen for the all-conference team. Daryl started 20 games while at CJC.

Jerry Butler, 5'6", 250 pounds sophomore defensive tackle from Henderson, First Team All-Conference. He set a school record for tackles by

a defensive lineman. He had 102 unassisted tackles, 18 assists, and 120 total hits.

said. "This city confuses me." "She was asked if, just maybe, she was from New York after all. "Why, do I sound like one?" she asked.

"When Cisco was selected from 300 applicants to be one of the parade's 10 bands, its members looked forward to seeing the big city, although most regretted having to spend Thanksgiving away from home.

Just Like New York
"Phyllis Atchley, the 19-year-old drum major, said she didn't know there was any Thanksgiving in New York, even as the band director, Bill Swinney, who had been to New York before, told her that New York is really the same as Cisco, where a population of about 4,500 in northwest Texas is trying to adjust to a fading oil industry.

"You mean people really sit down and have turkey here?" she said. "Is Thanksgiving the same when you're doing it in apartments and not in a house?"

"But she and Miss Pope and the others certainly kept to some traditions. They arrived on Tuesday and saw the Lower East Side and SoHo through shaded windows of tour buses. As they waited for the boat to Liberty Island on Wednesday morning, a man sang, 'I want to wish you a Merry Christmas,' reggae style. Other men offered 'Rolex watches' for \$25.

Ellis Island and Pizza
"On the trip across New York Harbor, Miss Pope engaged in a philosophical discussion with a few of the other young women on the meaning of Thanksgiving, and they decided that it lay in what they were doing. 'Just the chance to be able to see all this, to live life,' Miss Pope said.

"At Ellis Island, Miss Pope visited one exhibit. She hurried by a window filled with old passports and a 1913 picture of men, holding signs in Yiddish and Italian and Russian, protesting poor working conditions. Then she ate pizza.

"On the way back to Manhattan, she pointed at the twin

towers of the World Trade Center and the skyscrapers of Battery Park City that from a distance looked to her like something from a Superman comic book.

"Miss Pope and others awoke at 3:20 yesterday morning to practice their routine for the television people. They were told they could not do a running start into their routine, as they had rehearsed. Because they would be appearing just after a commercial, they would have to start in place.

"At 7:15 they gathered in front of the Museum of Natural History, and it was not until 9:45 that they started their march south at 77th Street, when they heard a voice announce, 'Cisco Junior College, please join the parade.'

'Howdy, New York'
"Miss Atchley stepped backward in a basic 4/4 rhythm. She seemed to set the mood, at first moving her arms and fists rigidly to signal 'halt' and 'play.' But at 52nd Street she said a 'plot' was brewing. The word was passed from musicians to dancers, and all at once they chanted, 'Yee-haw,' and then 'Howdy, New York.'

"There was no stopping them then. Miss Pope had been complaining of stiffness in her calf muscles, but she gave a few kicks that nearly knocked her hat off.

"At 11 A.M. she and the others waited for the 'You're on' signal from the television director at Herald Square. Despite the last-moment change in the routine, all went smoothly.

"The group turned from Broadway onto 34th Street, performed once more to the 'Yellow Rose of Texas' and then just about bounced off the parade route on their way to their hotel on 31st Street. They could not stop playing, and people could not stop watching them. They then did an impromptu jazz number in front of Madison Square Garden. Passers-by cheered. When last seen, Miss Pope and the others were dancing absurdly across Seventh Avenue."

County Jail Escapee Is Considered Dangerous

An athletic 23 year old man being held in the Eastland County Jail on burglary charges made his second escape early Monday morning. According to Sheriff Hogan, he escaped around 1:15 a.m., but first placed the lone jailer in a cell and locked it. Officers discovered the escape around 6:10 a.m. when they arrived at the jail.

"Pretending to be ill and in need of medication, the strong 240lb. prisoner lured the jailer to his cell with the requested medication," said Hogan. "He then attacked the jailer, reportedly trying to break his neck, and rendered him unconscious. Seizing the keys, he picked up the jailer and threw him into a cell." Hogan continued, "then he used the keys to make his escape."

The prisoner had been placed alone in an inside cell after he climbed and jumped over a fifteen foot fence at the prisoner recreation yard to escape Wednesday. Officers

quickly found him and returned him to the jail after that escape.

Officers were searching for Harlan Dale Stanley, a 5 foot 11 inches white male with brown eyes and brown or blonde hair. From near Loving, Texas, he has a unicorn tattooed on his right arm and a heart and wings on the left. He is wanted for escape and is considered dangerous.

Eastland County Crimestoppers has offered a

\$1,000. reward for information leading to the arrest of Stanley. Call 629-TIPS and you don't have to give your name.

Q. What are Identity Achievers like?
A. Identity Achievers are a more diverse group than Foreclosures. Many factors and circumstances cause the formation of a self-made identity.

Psychological growth involves increasing autonomy from the parents and increased individuation from the pre-adolescent self. The adolescent has internalized the parents values. Further growth involves re-working the internal self. This is the process of individuation.

Although the adolescent gains in autonomy and freedom, some security and protection as a child is relinquished. Individuation is painful because it involves giving up trusted aspects that feel like the self. There is a sense of uncertainty and rootlessness. In return the adolescent gains possibilities, but freedom can be terrifying. They feel relativity and risk in life decisions. They are free but vulnerable.

Identity Achievement women have gone through this process during adolescence. They have forged identities on their own terms. They have reworked the identities assigned to them as children. They are not necessarily achievers in the work world. They are women who choose lives after sifthrough options and have a life plan they can claim as their own.

Main Hunting Seasons In Texas

The fall and winter months are the main hunting seasons in Texas. Consequently, advertising for hunting equip-

ment, ammunition and firearms, plus a few news stories about hunting accidents tend to heighten public awareness

about firearm dangers. However, while some firearm-related deaths occur among hunters (12 in 1989),

even more people—including children—are accidentally killed in homes where guns are kept for self-defense. These domestic tragedies occur throughout the year.

According to officials at the Texas Department of Health (TDH), mishaps with firearms of all types are the third leading cause of accidental death among children ages 5-14 (after motor vehicle accidents and drownings). Most of these shootings can be attributed to adult irresponsibility in allowing children access to loaded guns.

In a recent report in "Texas Medicine," the journal of the Texas Medical Association, TDH's Dr. Patti Patterson said that firearm accidents comprise less than 5 percent of shooting deaths among adults, "but they are a major part of (firearm-related) mortality in children." Dr. Patterson is pediatric consultant to the TDH Associate Commissioner for Family Health Services.

Dr. Patterson and her co-author, Dr. Alfonso Helguin, a professor of epidemiology in San Antonio's UT School of Public Health, found that from 1984, some 337 Texas children younger than 15 died from firearm injuries. About 43% of those deaths were accidental, while 41% were intentional homicides, 15% were suicides and the cause of the remaining 1% was unknown.

The authors said that their own research and other studies confirm that most fatal shooting accidents among children occur in homes, when unsupervised children play with loaded, improperly stored guns. "Many tragic incidents have occurred when children have mistaken real guns for toys," Dr. Patterson said.

Dr. Patterson recommends that physicians counsel parents about potential dangers posed by firearms in the home. In addition, she advises parents who decide they need to keep a gun at home to follow basic firearm safety rules:

*Never keep a gun loaded, either in the house or in a car;

*Keep guns and ammunition locked in separate places;

*Always treat a gun as if it were loaded and ready to fire;

*Never allow children access to a gun;

*Have a gunsmith check antique or souvenir guns to be sure they are disarmed, preferably modifying them so they can not fire; and

*Be sure that gun owners in homes where children may visit also follow the same safety rules.

during November. Diabetes Month, to make the public more aware of the importance of proper health care for diabetics.

Diabetes is one of the top ten leading causes of death in Texas. It is also the leading cause of new cases of blindness and the leading cause of lower extremity amputations not related to injury.

People at risk for diabetes include those who: have a family history of diabetes, are 40 and older, and/or are overweight. Also, American Indians, Mexican-Americans and blacks are more likely than others in the U. S. to develop diabetes.

Demographics in this state point to the probability of an even higher incidence of diabetes in the future. The largest age groups in the Texas population of some 17 million are the very young and the middle-aged. Adult onset diabetes is most likely to develop during middle age, and as an already overweight population ages, an increase in the adult form of the disease is expected.

In addition, members of Texans' growing black and Hispanic populations are more likely to get this disease. Diabetes is 33% more common among blacks. Black women have 50% more diabetes than Anglo women and face an even greater risk if they are obese.

Hispanics have three to five times the risk of developing diabetes as Anglos. One study in San Antonio showed that women living in the barrios were four times more likely to have diabetes than Hispanic women living in the suburbs. For men living in the barrios, the diabetes rate was twice as high. The reason are not clear, but obesity, more common in the barrios, and diet are thought to increase the risk of developing diabetes.

Diabetes is a group of disorders characterized by unusually high levels of sugar in the blood, caused by the body's inability to make or use the hormone insulin. All

persons with Type I, or insulin dependent, diabetes require regular insulin injections to control their blood sugar levels. Type I usually occurs in young children. There is no known way to prevent this type of diabetes.

Adults, however, are more likely to contract non-insulin dependent, or Type II, diabetes which often can be controlled by a combination of dietary therapy and regular exercise. Type II patients may also take oral medications that help to control their blood sugar. Approximately 90% of all diabetes cases are Type II.

In either type of diabetes, dietary management is crucial to controlling blood sugar level. Diabetes therapy is intended to strike a balance between the effects (on blood sugar levels) of food intake, physical activity and medication. Each person with diabetes should have a prescribed nutrition plan, designed to meet that individual's specific needs.

In most cases, by following the doctor's treatment plan the patient can lead an otherwise active, "normal" life. Failure to do so can lead to kidney failure, strokes, blindness, heart disease, amputations — even premature death.

Risk for developing Type II diabetes can be reduced by keeping weight at a moderate level, getting regular exercise, abstaining from smoking, using alcohol in moderation, reducing stress and getting regular medical checkups.

Symptoms of Type II diabetes include fatigue, excessive thirst, excessive urination, blurred vision, frequent skin infections and slow healing of cuts and bruises.

Symptoms of Type I diabetes include frequent urination, weakness, rapid weight loss, irritability, nausea, vomiting and extreme hunger.

Carelessness Taking Unnecessary Toll On Farm Youngsters

Every year in Texas, avoidable accidents on farms and ranches usually claim the lives of more than a dozen youngsters and injure hundreds more.

"The tragedy is that in nearly every case, these accidents could have been prevented," said Thomas D. Valco, an agricultural engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "In most farm accidents involving young children ages 14 and under, carelessness and distractions are the leading causes. Usually, the child involved has no business being there in the first place."

Valco, who has recently completed an analysis of rural deaths in Texas, said farm children are placed in needless jeopardy when they hitch rides on tractors, wander down to the stock tank by themselves, or work or help around farm equipment that they don't know how to control.

In a 1987 national study of farm youth deaths - the most recent of the few studies done on the subject - Texas led the 35 states surveyed with 16 deaths of farm children ages 14 years or younger, Valco said.

Nine children in the same age group died in 1988 in Texas, followed by 17 in 1989. Five had died through July of 1990.

"The number of deaths, compared to traffic fatalities for this age group, are relatively few," Valco said, "but deaths are just the tip of the iceberg here." Studies show that for every farm fatality there are 100 disabling injuries - where children have lost a finger or an eye or use of a limb.

September marks farm safety observances nationally, but Valco said it's frustrating to see young people continue to be injured "despite intensified farm safety educational programs taught to youths and adults across Texas."

"The leading cause of farm youth deaths in 1990 and 1989 has been drowning," he said. "Four of the five 1990 deaths occurred when toddlers or older children fell or stepped

Drownings accounted for eight of the 17 farm youth deaths in Texas in 1989, Valco said. Six others died in farm equipment mishaps: three fell off tractors while riding with relatives, two were operating tractors that overturned, and one was killed in a cotton harvester.

"The 1988 casualties included two children who fell off tractors and were run over, one who fell off a shredder, one run over by a motor grader, one killed by a large round bale of hay, two who drowned, one thrown from a horse and stepped on, and one gored by a family pet - a buffalo," Valco said.

In 1987, the 16 Texas youth fatalities included seven farm equipment accidents, three in hunting accidents, two drownings and two run over by pickup trucks towing trailers.

Valco said farm families are exposed to work place hazards around the clock, "and safety has to be part of that every day schedule."

"On farms and ranches, children often begin helping with chores at an early age, even operating machinery and vehicles, including tractors, which are meant for adults," Valco said.

"Children must be trained about the hazards of farm machinery, and a good example set by adults is invaluable," he said. "We do not need an extra rider on a tractor. Even if equipment manufacturers added a small second seat, this would not solve the dangers for children."

He recommended that children be assigned jobs suited to their age and capability, with proper supervision from an adult.

"Farms are usually a long way from a doctor or hospital, especially if the accident happens in a remote field," he said. "Many lives could be saved if farm personnel were trained in emergency response techniques."

After her young son died in a farm equipment accident three years ago, one mother has launched a national campaign to prevent other farm youth deaths. Marilyn Adams of Earlham, Iowa, organized

"Farm Safety for Just Kids" and has conducted safety workshops for parents and children in the Midwest and Canada.

"We provide farm safety materials to 4-H clubs and others," Adams said. She hopes to organize local chapters of "Farm Safety for Just Kids" during the coming year.

A retired agricultural safety engineer, Arnold Skromme of Moline, Ill., works to get manufacturers to include more safety features in all farm equipment.

Skromme, who compiled a 1987 farm accident study, listed 101 deaths of farm children 14 and under in 35 states that year. Texas led with 16 deaths in this national report.

Skromme said statistics are sketchy because many child deaths are not reported as farm-related deaths and some states don't even keep such information. He suggested that as many as 300 young people (19 or younger) may die on farms each year.

"The biggest killer of children on farms is extra riders on tractors," Skromme said. "Of course, children should not be on farm tractors at all."

"But since this isn't likely to happen, each state should pass a law requiring that all self-propelled equipment, including tractors, have two seats with safety belts, and rollover protective structures," Skromme said.

He believes some progress is being made. One equipment company (John Deere) now is putting two seats on its combines, but others are slow to follow.

"The companies must first recognize that a child wants to be on the tractor with Dad - and will ride on the equipment even if there is no protective equipment or safety seat," Skromme said.

Skromme also is campaigning for warning horns to signal when a farm vehicle is put in reverse, so that children will know to move out of its path.

Heart Disease, Cancer Still Lead Among Top 10 Killers of Texans

More than 54 percent of the 124,563 deaths of Texas residents last year resulted either from heart disease or

cancer, according to the Texas Department of Health's (TDH) Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The number of deaths from

heart disease decreased slightly by 641, from 40,803 in 1988 to 40,162 in 1989. However, the number of cancer deaths increased by 1,438, from 25,880 in 1988 to 27,318 in 1989.

Cerebrovascular disease ranked third among the leading causes of death, claiming 8,343 Texans in 1989, while accidents ranked fourth, with 6,540 victims.

Completing the list of 10 leading killers were: (5) bronchitis, emphysema, asthma and allied condition—4,337; (6) pneumonia and influenza—3,869; (7) diabetes mellitus—2,872; (8) homicide—2,086; (9) suicide—2,073; and (10) chronic liver disease and cirrhosis—1,606. The remaining 25,357 deaths of Texas residents in 1989 were attributed to other causes.

Dr. Robert Bernstin, Texas Commissioner of Health, said, "Death for whatever cause is always tragic, but since heart disease, cancer and some of the other leading killers are largely preventable, it is even more saddening."

The commissioner said that individuals can dramatically reduce the risk of heart disease and cancer by developing healthful lifestyles.

"Young people should be aware that many illnesses in older people are the result of years of bad habits, such as smoking," Dr. Bernstin said.

He said that physicians usually can help patients to manage diabetes, high blood pressure and tendencies toward obesity, all of which can contribute to heart problems. Individuals can learn to correct their high blood cholesterol, and add needed exercise to improve their overall health.

Cancer prevention includes: not smoking, having regular checkups, maintaining a proper diet, using a sunscreen and protective clothing in the sun, and limiting exposure to chemicals and other cancer-causing substances.

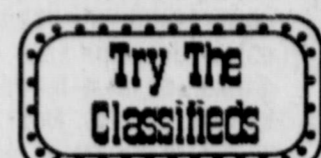

Keep Christmas Trees Cool And In Water

"Buying it fresh and keeping it fresh are the most important things to remember about selecting and caring for your Christmas tree," says Lloyd Vander Streek, President of the National Christmas Tree Association. He suggests a few simple tests for checking a tree's freshness.

First gently grasp a branch between your thumb and forefinger and pull it gently toward you. Few needles should come off in your hand if the tree is fresh. Second, take a look at the ground around the tree. You shouldn't see an excessive amount of green needles on the ground. Some loss of brown needles is normal.

Once you've chosen your tree, keep it in a sheltered, unheated area, such as a porch or garage until you are ready to decorate it.

Before you set up your tree, make a fresh, straight cut across the base of the trunk (about a quarter of an inch up from the original cut) and place the tree in a water-bearing stand. A tree will absorb as much as a gallon of water in the first 24 hours and one or more quarts a day thereafter. Water will prevent the needles

from drying and the boughs from drooping.

Keep your tree away from heat and draft sources like a fireplace, radiator, or television set. Test your light cords and connections before hanging them on the tree to make sure they're in good working order. And be sure to unplug them before you go to bed or leave the house.

Sensible precautions such

as these help to preserve the unique beauty and tradition only a real Christmas tree can provide.

"Natural Christmas trees bring so much more pleasure to the holiday," says Vander Streek. "That's why so many families choose a real tree as part of their celebration."

Buckling Up Prevents Casualties

With so much attention focused on the crisis in the Middle East, it's easy to neglect everyday habits like fastening your safety belt.

But the Texas Coalition for Safety Belts reminds Texans that buckling up is vital, both for military people on the move and for those of us who remain at home.

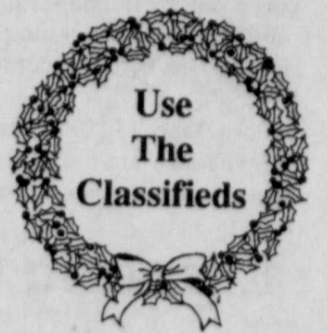

Fishing Outdoors

Gov. Clements Draws Sheep Hunt Winner

Mixed reports are coming in on the area deer rut. Many bucks with swelled necks have felled, but probably not even half as of Nov. 11, 1990. Grandpaw's Smokehouse had 140 deer brought in.

An excellent 15 point buck was reported killed less than 10 miles north of town. This fine deer was said to be choosing a doe.

Lake Leon's bass fishing has been running hot and cold. Anglers are having a good day then bad as with the report from Chuck Burgess who said he had fish to five pounds this past Saturday. But could only boat three small fish by lunch Sunday. I was able to locate a few fish in shallow water on jigs in the reed patches at mid lake.

The crappie fishing has slowed some with the best catches coming at night around the golf course area.

Minnnows hung around 12 feet near large pecan trees is working but a number of fine team events are being set for the 1991 angling year. And as of now northwest director for Anglers Choice, John Smith, reports this region will be held. Currently the lakes to be fished in no particular order are: Spence, Proctor, Possum Kingdom, Brownwood, Leon, Hubbard and Twin Buttes.

Don't forget the Jan. 20, 1991 TABC team event at Lake Falcon, December, you only have to finish in the top 20 in one event to qualify for the classic. Other events include Feb. 10, Choke Canyon; March 3, Toledo Bend; April 7, Sam Rayburn; May 5, Possum Kingdom; August 4, Richland-Chambers Championship; Sept. 28-29 lake to be announced.

David Abbey has won a December desert bighorn sheep hunt as a result of his application being drawn by Gov. Bill Clements during the

Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission meeting on Nov. 8.

Abbey, a 24-year-old former range and wildlife management student at Texas Tech University, was chosen from a bin containing 1,558 applications submitted during 1989. He could be the first person in recent times to harvest a desert bighorn sheep in Texas when he hunts in the Sierra Diablo Mountains north of Van Horn in the Trans-Pecos area of West Texas.

Abbey will have to pay a \$300 tag fee and will be accompanied by a TPWD biologist. The biologist has to assure that the sheep to be harvested is a mature ram.

At the turn of the century there were an estimated 1,500 bighorn sheep in West Texas, but their population was decimated by unregulated market hunting and disease and, by the 1960s, all native bighorns were gone. Recent restoration efforts by TPWD, the Texas Bighorn Society and private landowners have been successful - there are now an estimated 300 sheep. A helicopter census taken this year indicates the population is

healthy and will allow the harvest of a surplus mature ram.

"Sportsmen's funds have made this program possible through the purchase of hunting licenses and hunting related equipment," said Andrew Sansom, TPWD executive director. "It's only fitting that a Texas sportsman be able to harvest the first desert bighorn sheep in Texas in modern times."
