Churning Butter To CJC President

Roger Clinton Schustereit, Scotch, Irish, German, and Protestant, also President of Cisco Junior College.

Named after two friends of his father, Roger was born Feb. 8, 1947.

Doctor Schustereit is the youngest Junior College President in the State of Texas. With a chuckle he says, "By two days."

Roger's earliest, vivid, memory occurred at a ripe old age of 3. He and his Dad were passing a Hudson Automobile Dealership. A big, new, 1950 green, Hudson Hornet was on display and spied by Roger through the show window.

Roger was ecstatically impressed with the beautiful, shiny car. He shouted excitedly, "Daddy! I want that car." The family bought the car.

Roger's parents ran a frozen food locker, working from "cantill can't." Roger's grandparents owned a Dairy Farm near Victoria, and were his baby sitters, which made for a beautiful, exciting day, all around. You might say he was the youngest tycoon in those parts, owning two businesses. Well! He was boss anyway.

Roger was the No. 1 butter maker, turning the churn crank until the cream turned into golden butter. He would have milked the cows too, except he was just a shade small.

He says wistfully, "Those are some of the most pleasant memories."

He recalls, "My grandfather was a giant of a man, but a kind and gentle, with huge hands." Roger writes poetry and once wrote a poem about his grandfather's huge hands.

His grandmother, the typical hardworking, German, granny, was a tiny woman of about 5'5", who worked as hard as any man. Roger's parents inherited the tenacity for hard work. His mom kept shop, while his dad plowed the corn field on the farm. The corn was fed to cattle.

Roger reminisces, "I've always tried to practice what my dad taught: 'When you work for someone, do the best

job you can.' I've followed this rule when I worked in meat markets, going through school, teaching, administering as a Dean, Vice President and as President of CJC."

Roger's mother was the force behind his love for education. Teaching, prior to marriage, she continued to teach into her seventies. Roger remembers, "American History was my big love during high school. I've always been a history buff, The Texas Revolution, The Civil War, I still love it all."

Being a graduate of Victoria High School in 1965, he started to V.J.C. in the fall.

Roger says, "As a sophomore in VJC, my English teacher's influence shifted me from Social Science. She introduced me to World Literature."

"On arriving at U.T., that influence bade me take more English classes. I started out in Pre-Law and I graduated with a Bachelors degree in 1969."

I majored in English, becoming a teacher. My speciality was teaching Writing and Literature."

Dr. Roger C. Schustereit's feet are firmly planted on the CJC campus, assuming command on Aug. 1, 1988.

Cisco Jr. College is one of the major industries in the county, employing over 100 people. There is also a large number of part time teachers in various locations. The budget for last year was over 5.5 million dollars. That makes a significant impact on the community."

This writer noted that being the Chief Executive of a major industry as CJC, is no easy task. Roger Schustereit performs all the aspects of his job professionally.

CJC operates like a well-oiled machine or a high tech computer, but with all the qualities needed to develop the mind of young adults.

CJC students, faculty and the people of this area are fortunate to have a man of Roger Schustereit's caliber.

Parade Begins 5:30 P.M.

Christmas Parade And Treasure Hunt Are Saturday, December 15

The annual Christmas parade, treasure hunt, community Christmas Tree lighting and caroling will be held in Cisco Saturday evening, Dec. 15. Santa Claus will be in town for the parade.

The first-time ever night parade will begin at 5:30 p.m., and the treasure hunt will begin immediately following the lighting of the Community Christmas Tree at the Hilton Center after the parade.

Both events are sponsored by the Cisco Chamber of Commerce. Don Wallace is parade chairman, and Bill Austin is chairman for the treasure hunt.

Theme of this year's parade is "The Night Before Christmas." All entries must be decorated with lights. If generators are not owned or borrowed, they may be rented. Battery operated light may also be used, however, parade organizers are asking that no headlights be used during the parade.

The parade will line up at 4:30 p.m. except automobile entries which will line up at 4 p.m. (See map on back page.)

All entries will line up facing Avenue E. The parade will feed into Avenue E and travel south to West 13th Street, east on 13th to Conrad Hilton Avenue, and then north to the Hilton Center.

Trophies will be given for first and second places in all divisions, including all automobile classes.

Mr. Austin reported that treasure hunt tickets will be distributed beginning Tuesday, Dec. 11 until noon Friday, Dec. 14. Tickets will be available, one for each member of the family, at the Cisco Chamber of Commerce office. Anyone picking up the

Shopping for gifts at the Post Office, where you buy your stamps, can save both time and gasoline, said Cisco Postmaster Melvin Wende. "Our philatelic gifts will provide countless hours of pleasure," he said, "and can be enjoyed for year to come."

For example:
Tree ornaments, crafted in brass, silverplated in a snowflake shape and crowned with one of the 1990 Christmas stamps, are priced at \$14.95 each. Order forms are available in the post office lobby.
Stampin', a board game, costs \$13.95, and is available

over the counter. The game appeals to players age eight to adult. Each game includes the pamphlet, Introduction to Stamp Collecting.

The Best of the Decade Mint Set, priced at \$18.95, contains 51 actual stamps from the most popular issues of the 1980s. The set includes protective mounts and a 56-page book of illustrations and narrative.

The Postal Service Guide to U.S. Stamps contains a list of stamp values for new and used stamps, full color illustrations and interesting facts about all U.S. stamps printed

since 1874. It also contains a list of valuable stamp errors. The 336 page booklet costs \$5.95.

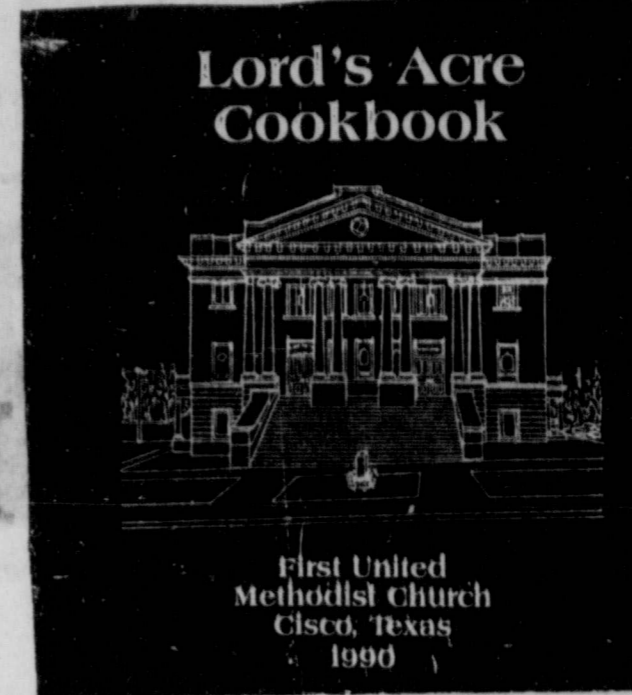

Orthodontic Line-Up

Q. Can all crooked or mis-aligned teeth be corrected?
 A. Most malocclusions can be corrected by moving the teeth into new positions, thereby allowing the patient to have a more attractive smile and a better "tooth to tooth" relationship. Some of the most common orthodontic problems include: crowded or overlapped teeth, protruding upper or lower teeth, and abnormal spacing between the teeth. All these are problems that can be treated or improved. Help is also available when there is a missing tooth and the remaining teeth are tipped inward and need to be uprighted so a bridge can be fitted. Almost any problem that can be corrected during childhood can still be corrected in an adult.

Pharmacy Topics

How frequently should a woman have a Pap smear? Doctors at the University of Washington in Seattle found that waiting more than two years between tests quadrupled the risk of developing cervical cancer. In most cases, a doctor will recommend the appropriate interval.

At-home tooth bleaching method saves time in the dentist's chair. For two to six weeks, under the dentist's supervision, patients sleep wearing a mouthguard filled with a gentle bleach solution, researchers at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill report.

Toddlers with faint horizontal marks on their baby teeth may also have mild to severe hearing loss, researchers at Case Western Reserve University found. The key: both teeth and hearing develop at the same time in the fetus.

Treatment for sickle-cell anemia is under study at Johns Hopkins University. Chemotherapy drug, hydroxyurea, seems to stimulate the production of a natural chemical that interferes with sickling.

Should Eastland County Add A Sheriff's Deputy?

 What does Eastland County want in law enforcement? Most residents will tell you that they want the best possible, unless they are in a law-breaking business like selling illegal drugs or stealing. But what Eastland County is willing to pay for seems to be much less.

Former Sheriffs have asked for more deputies in order to always be able to respond to calls for help at any hour of the day or night. But these requests have seemingly fallen on deaf ears. Commissioners have been budget concerned, as they should be, but spending increases always seem to go in other directions. And some spending increases are state mandated.

Once again a request for an additional deputy is being made. And Sheriff Dee Hogan has some good points to back his request. Eastland County presently has four deputies, but since serving legal papers has become a full time job for one deputy, that leaves only three to answer calls 7 days a week night and day, and to investigate crimes. The legal

deputy is paying his way, collecting more than \$24,000. in fees for the county last year and already having collected more than \$23,000. this year.

Deputies are supposed to have two days off each week, and they are limited in the number of hours for which they can be paid each week. But since there are more hours in the week than the hours the deputies can be paid, and since two or three officers are often required at one time, most of the deputies have been working extra twenty hours a week without pay, reports Sheriff Hogan. They want to respond when needed to protect lives and property, and to solve crimes, Hogan continues, but after working such long hours regularly, they are becoming mentally and physically exhausted.

Eastland Counties' deputies are trained officers who continually update their skills as technology advances and state and federal laws become more complex. And they are faced with much higher paying job offers and possibilities in other counties. They also have a dangerous job which requires

them to be alert at all times.

The Sheriff's Association recommendation that each county have a deputy for each one thousand people in the county outside of cities with police forces has become the standard in Texas, Hogan reminds us. The Manpower Survey shows that several of the adjoining counties have, or nearly have, one deputy for each thousand. With about six thousand of Eastland Counties estimated 18,500 residents outside of policed cities, the county has one deputy for each thousand and five hundred.

Hogan points out that it would take two additional deputies to bring the county up to standards, but that the requested once deputy would give the county one deputy for each 1,200 unpoliced residents.

The present officers have a good track record, solving several major crimes recently in just days rather than months. But there are other drains on their time. They spend days in the courthouse waiting their turn to testify, and many out of county trips must be made. Last week deputies had to travel to Bowie, Brownwood, and Odessa to pick up prisoners, and they will need to transport some to TDC Monday. Four emer-

gency trips were also made to take people to the state mental hospital in Austin.

Sheriff Hogan and his deputies have made a major impact in reducing the manufacture and selling of illegal drugs in the county during the past two years. But Hogan says that at least one more deputy is necessary if the Department is to continue to keep the crime and illegal drug situations in the county under control.

Hogan reminds that he is not asking for as many deputies as the surrounding counties have, and he states that one deputy can drive an auto, seized by the Department, as a patrol car in order to save money. And with enough deputies more cars will be seized in the future as drug and theft operations are broken, promised Hogan.

The local economy is bad, but that is when theft and burglary cases increase. Addicts are forced to support their habits with crime when the economy is poor, Hogan reminds us. And he points out that the new budget had to be submitted to the Commissioners' Court way back in May, under orders that the proposed budgets could not contain funding for raises or additional employees.

The final decision is up to the County Commissioners, who have to make decisions about what the county needs and where spending can be reduced. But they listen to the voters who elect them, so the voters should express their

priorities and opinions to these elected officials.

The voters should decide if it is more economical to add a deputy and pay an additional salary, or to try to get by without one, hoping that your home won't be one of those burglarized, that your children or grandchildren won't be among those who become addicts, and that a member of your family or neighborhood won't have to die because an office wasn't available when needed. There isn't enough money for all our wants, but we must decide which are needs, and then speak up.

Q. Many teenagers are experimenters. Which phase most accurately describes this group?

A. Moratorium are the universal idea of what teenagers are like. The Moratorium girls are considered daughters of crisis. In this group are women who have left their churches, marched in anti-war protests, criticized their parents, and experimented with morality issues - and felt guilty.

Moratoriums gave responsiveness to social problems and a closeness to great philosophical questions.

Moratoriums are attuned to options, knowing that they could design their own lives, but often wanted to choose both sides of contradiction.

The Moratorium Phase is one of testing and searching for new identities. These women are usually very interesting lively and engaging. But Female Moratoriums do not show the positive adaptive personalities as their male counterparts. Female Moratoriums behave like Fififusions. They show lower self esteem and greater anxiety than do Identity Achievers and Foreclosures.

Moratorium women value exploration above commitment.

The Eastland County Sheriff's Department had a busy week of November 25 through December 1.

Monday, November 25, Harlan Dale Stanley escaped from the county jail; his second escape. 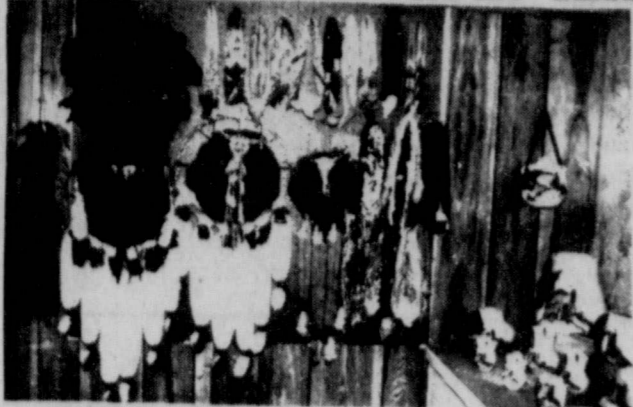

Stenholm Says Send Right Message To Saddam Hussein

Saddam Hussein has used every available means to kill his own people and family members to maintain his power, and he should not be allowed to gain from his conquest of Kuwait, says 17th Congressional District Representative Charles Stenholm.

The people of this district don't want war and I don't believe that President Bush wants war, Stenholm continued, but if we are going to put American lives at risk, we need to send an unwavering

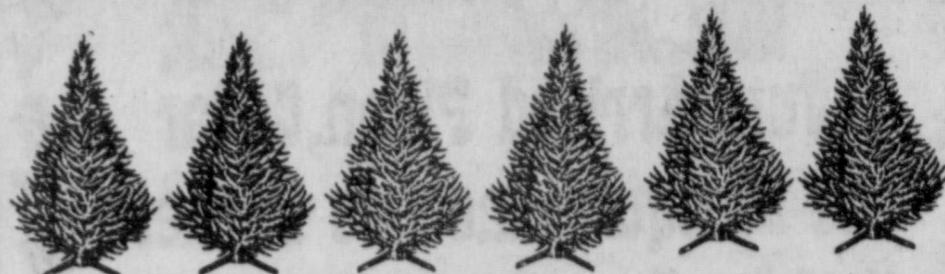

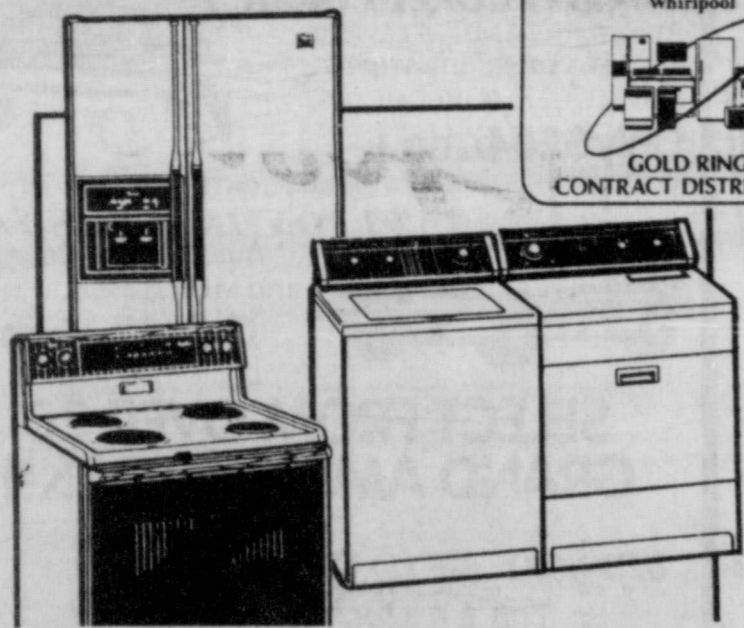



Health News And Views

According to the new year times doctors throughout the nation are very unhappy with Medicare! You see for some 90 years doctors have depended upon a simple test called EKG to measure the heart impulse and to measure impulse and alert the doctor to signs of problems and insurers and patients that there might be a heart problem.

Medicare paints the doctors are charging too much for the EKG and the Medicare states they can save some \$725 million over the next 4 years by decreasing by 40% the usage of the payment for the service.

There is a movement to persuade congress to override the regulation of Medicare and to continue allowing the EKG Measurement.

You will also find that you will be paying more for cataract surgery and reading of X rays because medicare plans in 1991 to decrease the payment, not fully, but to a lesser amount.

Medicare paid doctor \$470 million for the reading of EKGs which Medicare classifies as a simple procedure. The expenditure caught the

attention of the administration and the decrease of funds were ordered.

The house voted to eliminate the Medicare payment for interpreting the EKG because as indicated it was classified as a routine procedure. However, the senate would not go with the plan so the elimination has been postponed until 1992.

The reason this article is so profound is that more and more people who use medicare will find in 1991 they will be required to pay more for Part B services.

When a user of Medicare receives their explanation of Medicare benefit show how much Medicare pays toward a procedure you should examine the document and if unable to determine just how much you will have to pay perhaps you would want to contact someone at the Senior Center, 442-2263, and possibly an appeal is in order.

You will no doubt receive notice this month of increases of your supplemental insurance, also. Once again for counseling contact the Senior Center for help.

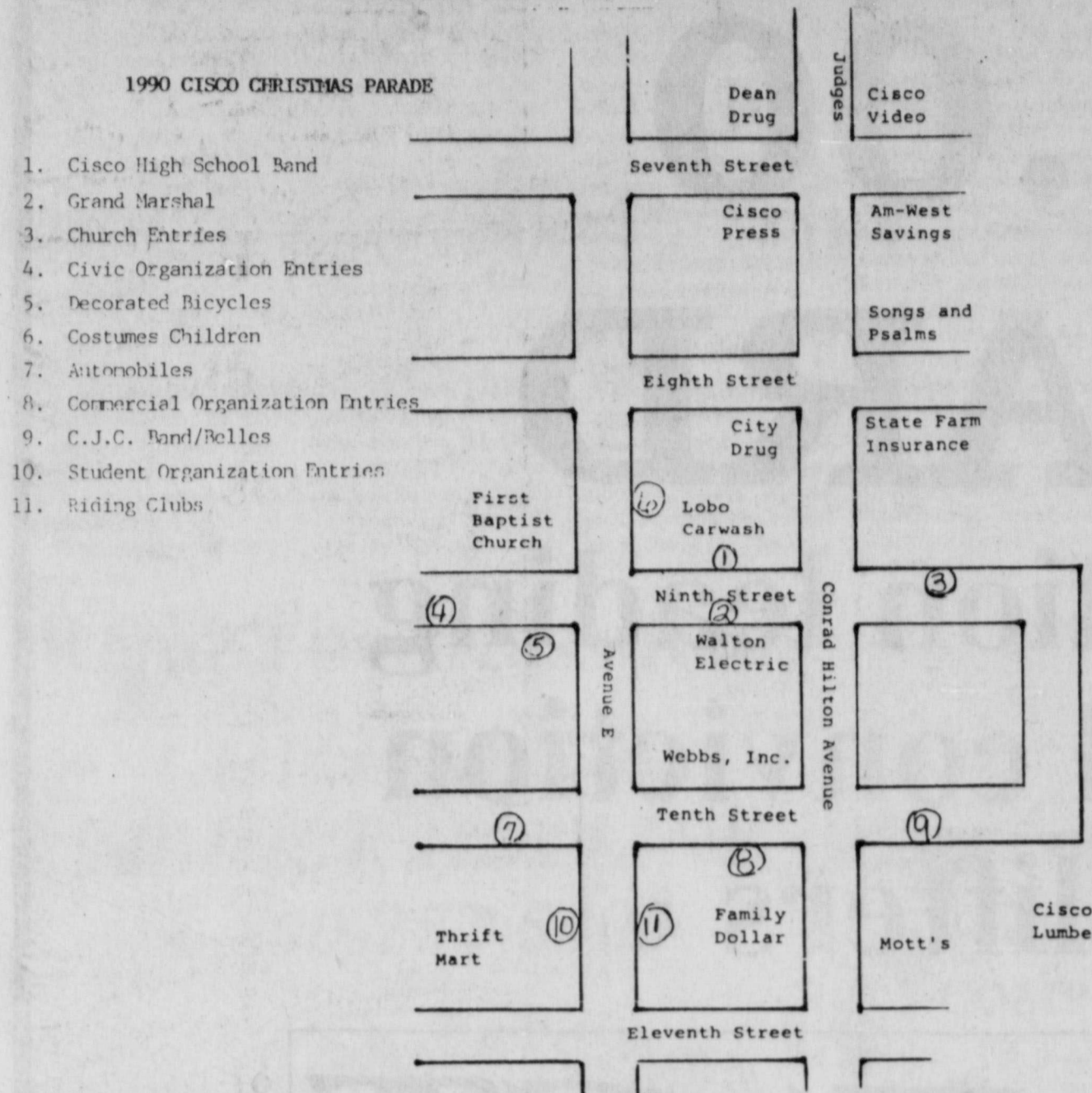
