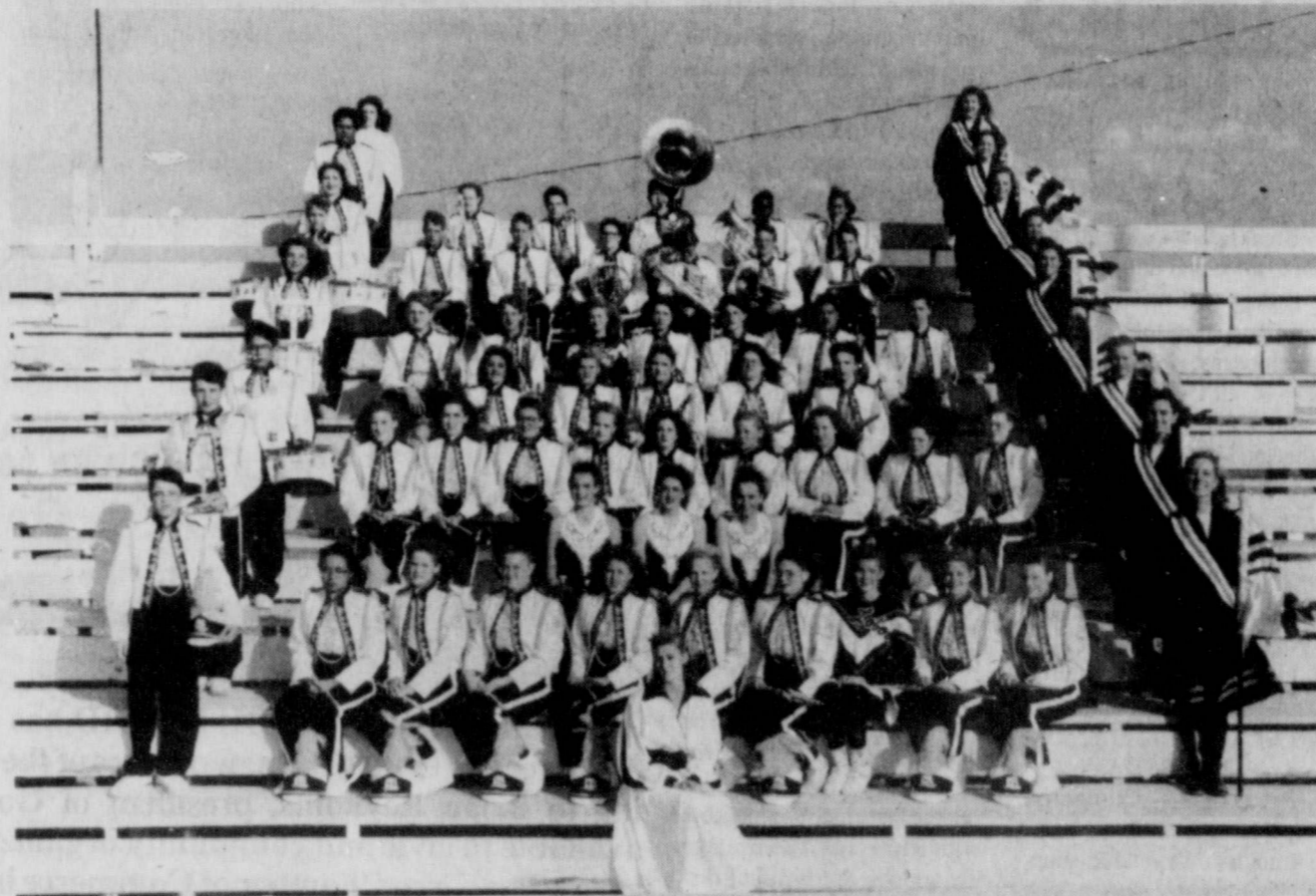

School Board Accepts Resignations Monday

The Cisco Independent School Board accepted the resignations of two principals and an elementary school teacher at its meeting Monday night.

Cisco High School Principal Phil Warren submitted his resignation, effective Dec. 20. He has accepted the position of superintendent of the Lazbuddie School District in the Panhandle.

Mr. Warren has been principal here for the past 1 1/2 years.

The board also accepted the resignation of Cisco Junior High School Principal Jim Puryear. He will retire Jan 11, 1991, the end of this semester.

Also resigning Monday was Jeanna White, effective Dec. 20. She is the music teacher at Cisco Elementary School, and will move to Dallas over the holidays and teach there.

Linda Shelton has been hired to replace Ms. White as music teacher. Mrs. Shelton, of Van Horn, will be moving to Breckenridge where her

husband is employed.

Mr. Puryear moved to Cisco in 1961 and was head football coach and athletic director at Cisco Junior College for eight years before joining the faculty of Cisco Independent Schools. He was coach and teacher before becoming principal.

Mr. Puryear said, "We are not leaving Cisco. This is our home. I've enjoyed every minute of my career with Cisco schools, but I believe it is time to move on to something else. I might open a fish stand or give golf lessons, whichever is needed most in Cisco. I haven't decided yet."

The board is searching for temporary replacements for the two administrators until principals can be hired for the next school year.

Christmas Parade & Treasure Hunt

Conrad Hilton Avenue was expected to be lined with holiday shoppers at 5:30 p.m. Saturday at the first ever night Christmas parade in Cisco and the annual Treasure Hunt.

Santa Claus will appear in the parade, making his first official visit of the season to Cisco.

Theme for the parade is "The Night Before Christmas" and all entries will be decorated with lights, either powered by generator or battery. No headlights will be used in the parade.

Trophies will be given for first and second places in all divisions, which includes bands, civic floats, commercial organizations, student floats, church floats, performing groups, costumed children, decorated bicycles, group equestrians, individual equestrian, and automobiles: antique (20-30 years), classics (40-50 years), classics (60-70 years), street rods, pickups and muscle cars.

Don Wallace is chairman of the parade, which will travel north on Conrad Hilton Avenue to Third Street. Participants will assemble at 4:30 p.m. at their assigned locations, facing Avenue E, travel to 13th Street, then proceed east to Conrad Hilton Avenue and turn north. Automobile

entires will line up at 4 p.m.

The annual Treasure Hunt will follow the lighting of the Community Christmas Tree at the Hilton Center, according to Bill Austin, Treasure Hunt chairman. Treasure Hunt tickets were distributed throughout the week at the Chamber of Commerce office. Most stores plan to remain open until 9 p.m. Saturday.

After the parade there will be the lighting of the Christmas Tree and caroling at the Hilton Center.

There will be entertainment provided by the Cisco High School Choir and a display of Christmas trees decorated by clubs, organizations and churches in the community.

Cisco Man Dies In Accident

Bobby Wayne Cozart, 36, of Cisco died as the result of injuries sustained in a truck accident shortly after 10 p.m. Tuesday, Dec. 11, 1990, about two miles east of Cisco on U.S. Highway 80.

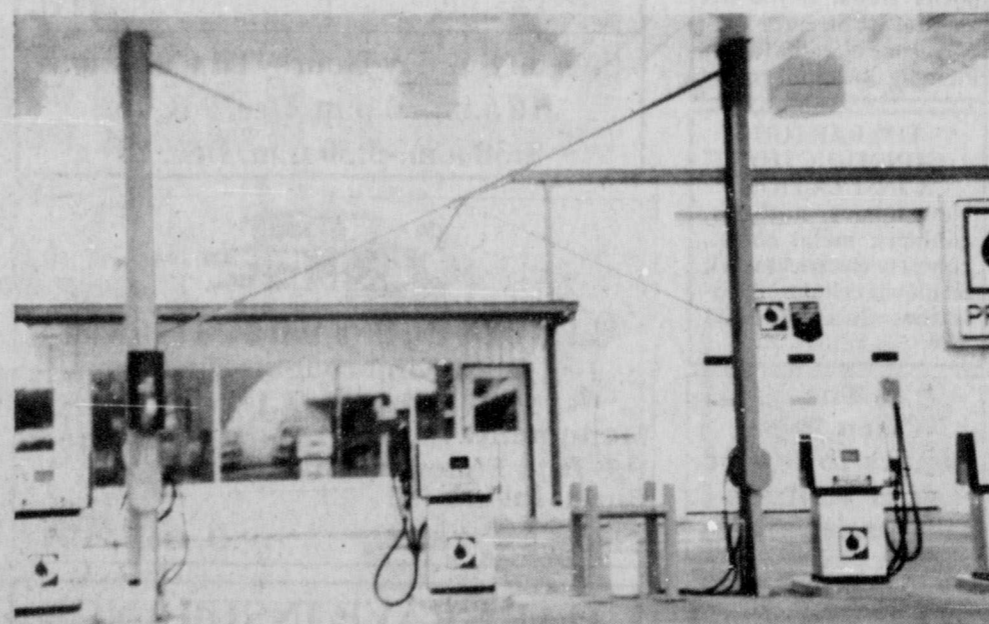
Cozart was driving a tractor-trailer owned by United Energex of Cisco. The west-bound truck ran off the right side of the road, according to Department of Public Safety Trooper Steve Foster. Cozart apparently overcorrected and the truck, loaded with salt water, turned over and landed upside down.

Cozart's body was trapped in the cab until rescuers used the "Jaws of Life" to free him, Foster said. He was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace J.V. Heysler.

CJC To Offer Adult Education Course In Agriculture Economics

Cisco Junior College will offer a 24-hour adult education course in Agriculture Economics. The comprehensive, step-by-step series of workshops is designed to assist farm families in developing and improving their financial management and commodity marketing ability. The course will utilize Market Master, American Farm Bureau Federation materials. Persons completing the course will receive 2.4 continuing education units.

The series of three workshops includes: Cash Commodity Marketing, Hedging in the Cash and Futures Market, and Fundamental and Technical Analysis.

The class will meet from

6:30 to 9:30 p.m. in the Texas Room Maner Memorial Library. Dates for the course are Thursday, Feb. 14; Tuesday, Feb. 19; Thursday, Feb. 21; Tuesday, Feb. 26; Thursday, Feb. 28; Tuesday, March 5; Thursday, March 7; and Tuesday, March 12.

Instructor for the course is Truet Hart. Cost for the course is \$175. A minimum of eight paid participants is necessary for the course to be offered. All program materials are included. Families are encouraged to take the course together. One set of instructional materials will be provided per family.

Accidents Reported In Eastland County

Late Tuesday night Bobby Wayne Cozart of Cisco was killed in a one vehicle accident. Cozart apparently overcorrected when the tractor-trailer truck he was driving veered off the road to the right a couple of miles east of Cisco on Highway 80, according to D.P.S. Trooper Steve Foster.

The shifting of the salt water being hauled by the tank truck caused it to flip over, pinning Cozart in the tractor. It took emergency personnel 30 to 40 minutes to free Cozart's body from the wreckage, and he was pronounced dead at the scene.

In another accident south of Eastland Wednesday night, a truck traveling east on I-20 lost a cotton gin roller, which fell from its bed onto the roadway.

First a truck tractor, then an automobile, and finally another truck tractor hit the roller on the roadway, reported

Trooper Foster. The car, a Subaru driven by two Dallas women and one of the trucks was damaged. Both of the women were taken by ambulance to the Eastland Memorial Hospital. As of Thursday evening the women remained hospitalized in Eastland, but their condition was not believed to be serious.

The trucks hitting the roller were described as belonging to Merchants and Central Freight.

D.P.S. Sgt. Jerry Mathews advised motorists during the busy holiday season to remember that an accident can happen to you as well. 'Don't drive when you are too tired or when you don't need to be on the roads, or when you are drinking, cautioned the officers. Don't speed and avoid driving when the weather is bad.' Mathews continued, 'the same old causes continue to kill people.'

TASP Test To Be January 5, 1991

To give some students one more chance to take the Texas Academic Skills Program Test before they risk not being allowed to enroll for more college courses this spring, the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board has arranged to offer the TASP Test on Jan. 5, 1991, at six sites across the state.

Students can only register by phone and for one week only — call 512-926-8746 from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. Wednesday, Dec. 12, to Wednesday, Dec. 19.

"In recent weeks, the Coordinating Board has received some calls from students concerned that their failure to take the TASP Test will result in their being blocked from enrolling this spring in anything but remedial courses at a state public college or university," said Commissioner of Higher Education Kenneth H. Ashworth.

"The vast majority of Texas students have met their responsibility to take the TASP Test. We are offering this additional test date as a service to give the students who missed the five TASP Test dates in 1990 another option so that they can continue their education without interruption," he said.

Depending upon the college or university attended, students must take the TASP Test either prior to enrolling in 15 semester credit hours. Students who do not pass the math, writing or reading sections of the test receive special help to improve their skills. They must pass all sections of the test before they can enroll beyond 60 semester credit hours.

Dr. Joan Matthews, Director of Special Projects at the Coordinating Board, said taking the TASP Test in January may involve travel and extra expense for some students since the test is only being offered at these locations: The University of Texas at El Paso, Texas Tech University in Lubbock, Collin County Community College in Plano, The University of Texas at San Antonio, Hous-

ton Community College, and the University of Texas-Pan American in Edinburg.

Because this test date is outside the Coordinating Board's contract with the testing company, all costs must be covered by a higher fee of \$65, Matthews said.

The TASP Test will be offered on at least six additional dates in 1991 at the regular fee of \$24.

Students who take the test on Jan. 5 will be given a receipt to present at spring registration as proof that they have taken the TASP Test. They must follow up and

provide their schools with their official TASP scores from National Evaluation Systems, Inc. or risk not receiving credit for their spring classes.

"Early indications are that TASP is working well and has provided much needed academic support for many students," Commissioner Ashworth said. For more information, contact the TASP office at the Coordinating Board, at 483-6200.





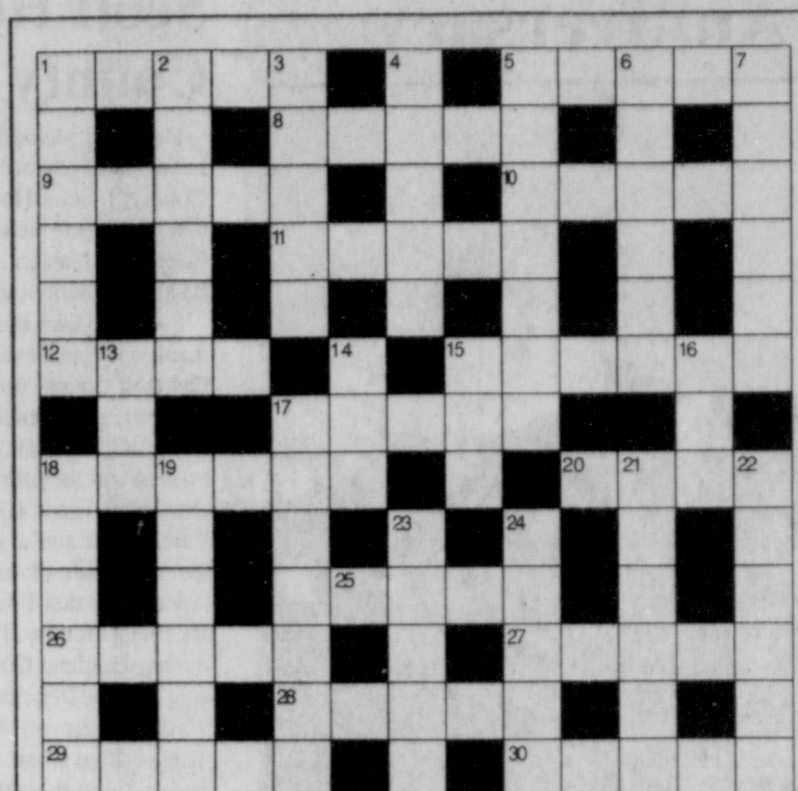

WEATHER CAUSING PROBLEMS FOR SMALL GRAINS

During the past week, I have received numerous telephone calls about yellow areas in small grain fields. Most of these areas have shown signs of nitrogen deficiency due mainly to the weather.

The wet, warm weather we had this fall has been a blessing for small grain but it also has caused some problems. Due to the wet conditions most of the small grains are remaining shallow rooted and are not sending down deep roots. A lot of the nitrogen that was applied earlier may have gone deeper into the soil than the roots have grown.

You add to wet conditions warm weather and this can help bring on nitrogen deficiency symptoms. Most small grain fields are growing very rapidly due to unusually warm weather. This rapid growth is causing the plants to need more nitrogen.

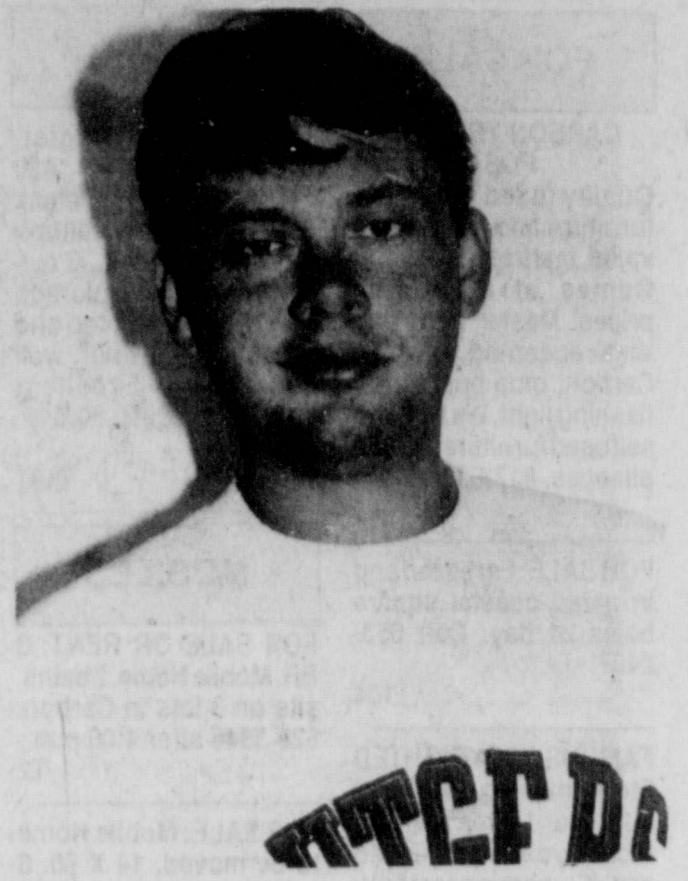
How can you tell if you have nitrogen deficiency in your small grain. Generally it will show up as pale green or yellow areas first in low areas where water may collect but doesn't stand for an extended period. Another sign that you

have nitrogen deficiency is if the small grain field has strips that are pale green or yellow in color that go across the field similar to your fertilizer application pattern.

Green bugs will also cause similar coloring in small grains but generally it will not follow the same pattern or start in the same location as nitrogen deficiency as described earlier.

The best thing to do is to inspect the field before you make an application of fertilizer of insecticide. Know what the problem is before you solve it.

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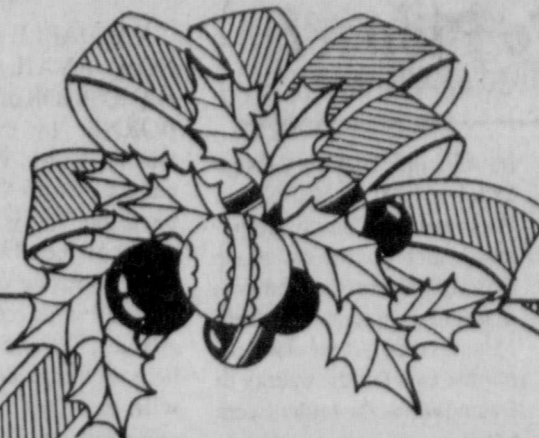

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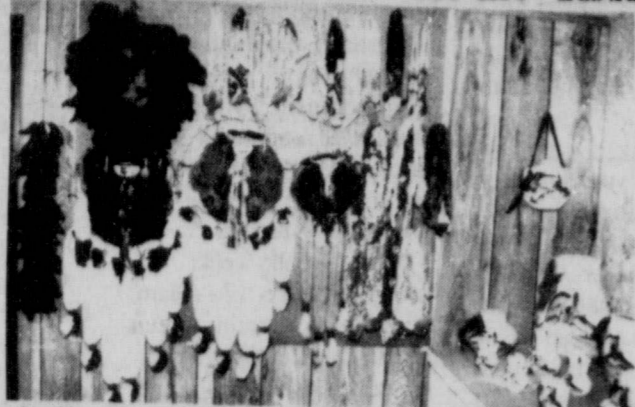

Dear Sirs;

Lubbock County will celebrate the 100th anniversary of the counties organization in March of 1991. As a member of the centennial committee I have become very involved in gathering information on the early settlers. I'm sure you will understand from your experience with the Eastland County history how involved you can become in a project of this type. I have learned that several of our early families came to us from Eastland County and wonder if you might have additional information on these people.

I am especially interested in George W. Shannon who served as a Sheriff in Eastland County and later as the first county judge of Luccock County. Is there any chance a photograph of Mr. Shannon might have survived? Could he possibly be in a group photo of the Confederate Veterans at some gathering? If such a photograph could be found I would gladly pay for a copy so that this could be added to our local collection I am enclosing some of the

information I have gathered on Mr. Shannon and would appreciate any additional information.

Another Confederate veteran I am researching is John P. Boles. I have had a very difficult time gathering information on Mr. Boles as he

died in 1909 and his family moved away. Just recently I found a brief mention of a visit J.L. Tindall paid to Lubbock to visit his old friend, John P. Boles, who had been his neighbor for "35 years"...A visit to Austin and a brief review of Eastland County Tax records showed Mr. Boles on the tax roll 1890-1896. I do not know if he was related to the other Boles/Bowles families in the area. He married Alice H. Harrall December 28, 1887. I have checked the 1880 census index but do not find a family by that name in Eastland County. If you can give me any information on Mr. Boles I will be very grateful. I have been researching him for over three years now.

Fishing Outdoors

Sam Rayburn Experiencing Extra Eagles
During a recent visit to Lake Sam Rayburn in East Texas, I was pleasantly surprised to see an increased population of nesting American Bald Eagles. Rayburn is visited annually by these wonderful birds of prey but in smaller numbers. In one day in one area of the impoundment we spotted two, with a possible third distant sighting. The prior weekend a reported sighting. The prior weekend a reported four birds were spotted in a complete different area of the lake. Each year T.P.W.D. officials ask for volunteers to help locate count and observe many types of wildlife around the state. Hanel Scott of Canyon Lake set a new largemouth bass record at Lake McQueeny with a fish weighing 12.5 pounds. Scott's bass caught Nov. 8 on a jig in two feet of water, surpasses the previous record of 11.85 pounds.

acre lake northeast of San Antonio that has produced numerous big bass, was stocked with Florida bass in 1978 and 1985. Area crappie enthusiasts are finding some excellent catches at Lake Brownwood in the Pecan Bayou. Flea Flies dunked around lay down brush tops. Blue with red head shaken in about 6 feet of water have been producing good limits. Bass chasers are experiencing some fine catches at Lake Leon. Crankbaits and jigs fished near the main river channel breaks are producing best. A few nice sized fish to

4 pounds have been coming off the rip rap of the Chock-O-Block bridge. The following fishing report was compiled by the TPWD. Here is the weekly fishing report as compiled by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. **Central** Brownwood: Water slightly off color, 60 degrees, spillway level; black bass are slow to 4 pounds, due mostly to lack of fishermen, on deep running baits, silver spoons and spinners; hybrid striper are schooling with limits to 5 pounds on dead shrimp; crappie are fairly good around brush piles in 15-16 feet of water on jigs and minnows; white bass are schooling, limits on silver spoons and jigs; channel catfish are good to 3 pounds on shad or large minnow baited trotline; yellow catfish are good to 20 pounds on trotline baited with shad, perch and large minnows. **South** Amistad: Water clear, 61 degrees, normal level; black bass are fair to 3 1/2 pounds on spinners early and late, red worms are good in the middle of the day; striper are spotty to 17 pounds on live bait and Zara spoons under birds near the dam and in San Pedro Canyon; crappie slow; white bass are fair with some schooling on 1 ounce white slabs under birds; catfish are good sized but not in big numbers on cheese baits in 15 or 60 feet of water. Choke: Water clear, 70 degrees, 14 1/2 feet low; black bass are slow to 9 pounds on spinners in 1-5 feet of water along points in backs of coves; striper are fair to 15 pounds in 20-30 feet of water near the dam; crappie are slow, no limits, some in 10-20 feet of water in the back of coves on minnows; white bass are fair, some around Highway 99 bridge; catfish are good with limits in the 2-4 pound range in 5 feet of water along the south shore flats in the river channel; some hump backed blues in 30 feet of water in the 15 to 55 pound range on drop lines along the river channel. Fort Phantom Hill: Water clear, normal level; black bass and all fishing slow due to weather. Granbury: Water clear, normal level; black bass are slow; striper are good on spinners; crappie are slow, some around boat house on minnows; catfish are good at night on cut bait. Miller Creek: Water clear, 63 degrees, normal level; black bass are slow in the 7-10 pound range off points on spinners and rattle lures; striper are fair to 7 pounds on small live perch near dam area, striper are also hitting trolling lures; crappie are good to 2 pounds on chartreuse combination tube jigs; white bass are fairly good in creeks to 2 pounds on jigs around brush and near cover; catfish are good to 25 pounds on trotlines with large minnows; shad and cut bait; carp and buffalo are excellent in number on dough bait, cut bait and minnows. Possum Kingdom: Water clear, 68 degrees, 18 inches low; black bass are good to 4 1/2 pounds on cranks and spinners; striper and picking up on chartreuse and white slabs in 30-35 feet of water in the 10-12 pound range with limits crappie jigs and around baited houses and boat docks in 10-12 feet of water; white bass are good to 25 fish per string to 1 1/2 pounds on cranks; catfish are good to 20 pounds on trotline with shrimp and live perch; catfish are good to 8 pounds on rod and reel with cut bait and worms. Spence: Water clear, 66 degrees, 35 feet low; black bass are fair to 7 pounds on buzz baits; striper are fair to 12 pounds on live bait; crappie are slow; white bass are slow; catfish are slow.

Pharmacy Topics

New complaint among frequently flying executives: neck and shoulder pain caused by luggage. Rehabilitation specialist in Royal Oak, Michigan, prescribes a luggage cart.

New periodontal treatment uses cosmetic surgery techniques. Instead of cutting away gum pockets, surgeon at Harvard University School of Dental Medicine scrapes the tooth root, then stitches the gum incision to heal back to normal.

Older patients who take tranquilizers may increase their risk of hip fractures -- depending on the type they take, say researchers at Vanderbilt University in Nashville. Drugs with a long "half-life" were associated with more fractures than shorter-acting drugs.

Fluoridation may cause a form of bone cancer -- if you drink the equivalent of 380 to 700 glasses of fluoridated water a day -- and if you're a rat. National Institutes of Health scientists still don't believe it could cause cancer in humans.

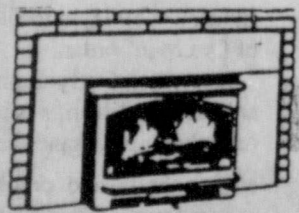

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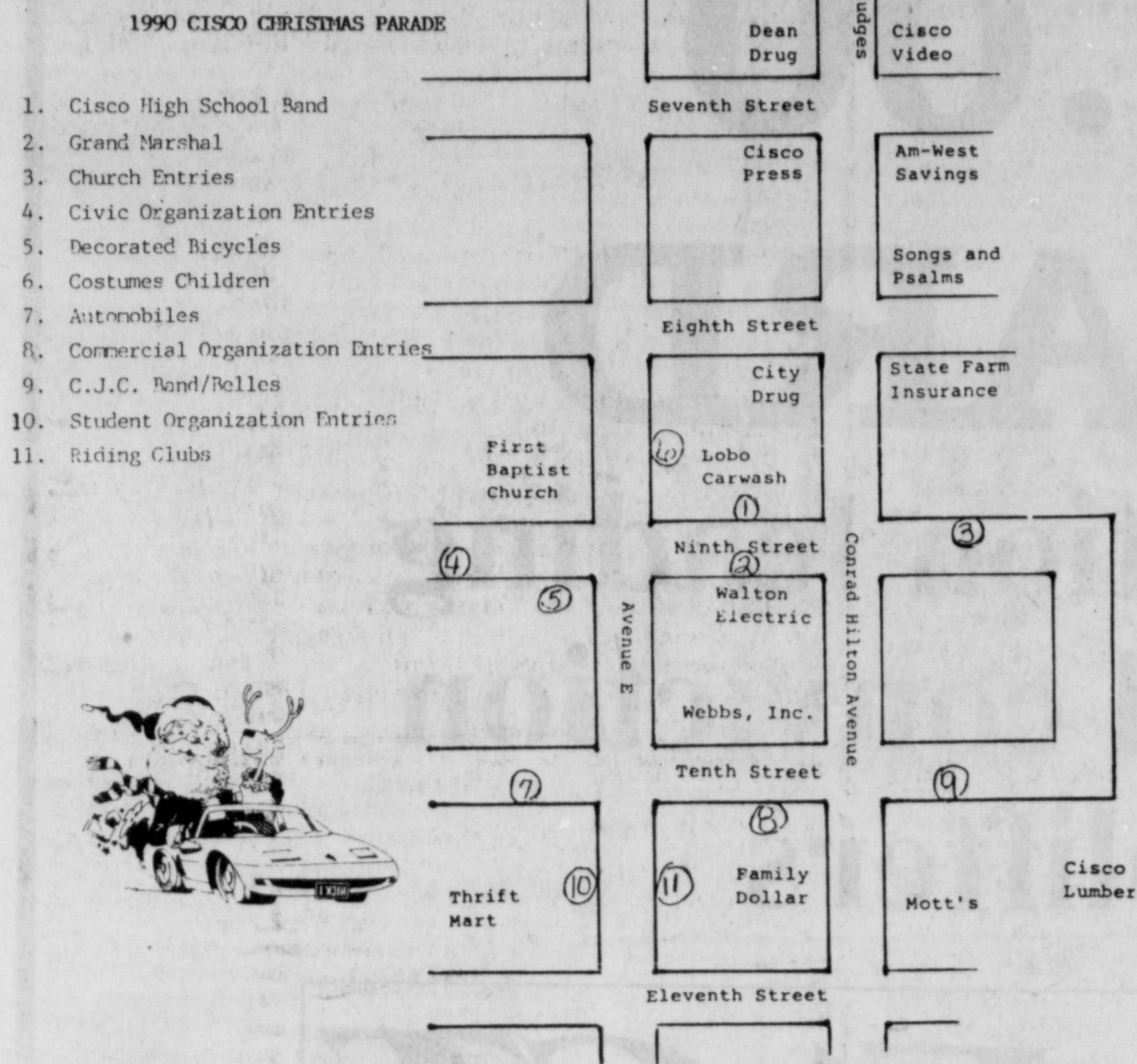

Tip Helps To Solve Church Burglary

The Eastland County Sheriff's Dept. recovered all of the items taken in a recent burglary of the Corinth Baptist Church, and two individuals were arrested and charged with the offense. The items recovered Tuesday ranged from the church's sound system, a television and a microwave oven, to the children's furniture and toys from the nursery and the tissue from the rest rooms. Reportedly, everything taken the week before, when several doors at the church were

broken open, was recovered. A Crimestopper's tip assisted officers in locating the stolen items and the people who were arrested, reported Sheriff Dee Hogan. A man and woman were being held in the Eastland County Jail with their bond set at \$10,000 each after they were arraigned. Items taken from the church were located in a houses in north Cisco. The arrested couple are also suspects in some other cases being investigated by the Sheriff's Dept., says Hogan.

Social Security Cuts Cisco From Schedule

Due to the budget crisis that has affected the Social Security Administration, no social security representative will be in Cisco during the months of January, February or March, according to a report. Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor,
I agree with Mrs. Odesa Collins' letter to you in the Dec. 9th edition.

I have resided in Cisco for 42 years, paying taxes, and have not complained. I live on a small fixed income and thank God for everything He allows me to have. I know it costs to operate any business, or establishment, be it City, State, or Federal, or Family Owned. My husband and I were in business for ten years. It was hard then with three sons in school in this city. I know it is much worse now than in the 1950-1960s with wages, fuel and etc. increasing.

I can't see why our city sanitation employees were discharged and men from Abilene hired. We are causing a hardship on our fellow citizens, placing them without jobs. Cisco is slowly dying. If we don't do something about it, Cisco will soon be no more than Putnam, all because of those who want everything the way they want it to be. It's sad to see our local hospital standing there, a symbol of hope to those who are suffering and a disgrace to those who are passed on who paid into it that it could be built.

I am 76 years old, and I don't recall Cisco ever being without doctors and a hospital. We as taxpayers are still having to pay for it. Graham Memorial Hospital staff and doctors are to be commended for the services they provided. I know from first hand experience. It was one of the very best.

Dr. Cermin has been our family physician since he first came to Cisco. He is the most compassionate, caring doctor I have used, "being many." He is not only his patients' physician, he is also a friend. He and his staff care. In May 1986 I was in his office, he said you need to be in the hospital. He called my son Larry on his job and Larry came, drove me to the hospital. In Feb. 1989, I was in the doctor's office with a severe gall bladder attack. My son was out of town. Dr. Cermin told me, I'm having one of the ladies to take you to the hospital. Doris, one of his employees, drove me to the hospital and waited by my bedside until I was admitted and asked who she could contact for me.

I knew a Cisco man who was having chest pains and drove himself to his doctor in a town not far from Cisco. He was told to get to Abilene as quick as he could get there. I believe the doctor should have called an ambulance for him, or better still, admitted him to the hospital to be stabilized first. But the man drove back to Cisco, got my nephew off his job to drive him to Abilene. The man didn't live long after a heart bypass.

It's sad to think of someone devoting most of his life to prepare themselves and give their best helping suffering and dying humanity, and thinking they have found the perfect place to retire when reaching that age in life, to find it not to be true, because some can't see all the good they have done. And in time, that one has to shut their eyes and walk off, leaving everything behind they have worked for, and to begin from the bottom again. I am thankful for having had a Christian doctor who gave his best, also his wonderful staff. They cared.

Dear Editor,

Well, finally we are getting around to stating facts rather than trying to scare people. I hope PEOPLE FOR PROGRESS understands now that we need an election by informed voters, not inflamed voters. I hope Ms. Collins understands that the best check and balance in our government is the loyal opposition who has as much right to their opinions as she does and should not be degraded and knocked around because we don't agree with her.

I, for one, believe the only honest vote is a well informed vote. I have taken the time to check on Preferred Management Corporation. I picked one of the hospitals and personally talked to the administrator; then I call Preferred Mang. and talked to a Mr. W (Wettinger I think). I have no reason to doubt that they are an honest and reputable company. I believe, as I was told, that they are not going to put their business reputation on the line until they have checked out a situation and seen some glimmer of hope of "saving" the hospital. But, as Mr. W said, there will be no miracle cure. The hospital has failed because the people haven't been using it and all the taxes won't make them use it. If the citizens won't go to hometown doctors, if doctors won't utilize the hospital, then neither Preferred Mang. nor you or I can keep the hospital open. There are a lot of factors that will make people vote for the tax rollback. Number one is, a lot of people don't trust the hospital board one darn inch. There are too many rumors of the board not opening the records up, of not quite right financial dealings, of trying to force their wants down the citizens throat no matter what. There are those who won't ever use this town's hospital or doctors no matter what. It is too easy nowadays to drive to a specialist or big town doctor. I, myself, am leery of voting for a 50 cent tax rate because once it is in place, we the citizens have no way to do what with it if the hospital can not be "turned around."

The only way to reopen the hospital is by making guarantees that can not be made. Guarantee that you can get doctors here and that the people will go to them, not somewhere else. Guarantee that the doctors will use the hospital and that the hospital will be a facility the doctors will want to use. Guarantee that once the people are using the hospital that the tax rate will be rolled back to an honest level. Guarantee that the board members will be open and above board with every thing and with every citizen, cause if they aren't you can be sure that Preferred Mang. will not work with them and the citizens will throw them out.

If you would like to see the hospital open again, then you will have to use the doctors that come here, you will have to go to this hospital and you will have to believe by faith that the tax rate will be rolled back by the board when it is no longer needed at 50 cent. If you will do all that, then by all means vote for keeping the hospital open. But, if you are not going to use the hospital or doctors, if you don't believe the board will represent the wishes of the citizens, then vote to close the hospital. But please, don't vote to keep the hospital open if you are not going to use it. Let us have a vote that will honestly reflect how the citizens feel about the hospital. The only way to keep it open is by using it; if it is not going to be used then lets close it down once and for all and pay off the debt.
