

School Districts Pick New Board Members

My monthly business letter says in part, for whatever it's worth: Uncertainty best describes the over-all situation today. In certain fields, such as farm products, it would seem a definite downward trend has been established; even the Administration has failed in its attempt to stem the tide. Pipe lines are rapidly filling up in many items; lower prices, long-term credits, or both, are not providing the anticipated stimulation.

Buyers for long term commitments are marking time; orders which should have been placed for next Christmas trade are being held up. Hand to mouth buying is the order of the day.

Meanwhile, factory inventories are still rising—a bad sign, as many of them are extremely top-heavy. During January these inventories rose 300 million dollars, according to the Department of Commerce, making a total of 24 billions, against 23.7 billions at the end of December and 20.8 billions a year ago. Unless these inventories are substantially reduced, and soon, somebody is going to get hurt.

There is still lots of money in the hands of the public, but, it will be noted, it is becoming concentrated more and more in the hands of the "saving group," and these people are waiting for values. The so-called average man has been squandering his money on luxuries beyond his means and has been dipping into his reserves to such an extent that he finds it hard to make both ends meet, even for necessities; a condition quite usual at this period of the cycle, known as a period of redistribution of wealth.

McGee Farm Sale Set Next Week

J. A. McGee, Muleshoe real estate man, announced today that he has sold his farm, consisting of 240 acres, located about five miles north of Muleshoe on the Friona highway. He said he had sold it to Tom Payne, Littlefield, who will farm the place.

The place is highly improved and has a fine home on it. Mr. McGee has farmed it for many years in addition to operating his real estate agency.

Mr. McGee will hold a public auction sale at the place next Thursday, April 15. He will have household goods, farm implements, etc., and expects that neighbor men will consign some livestock and additional farm implements to the sale, expected to be rather large. Col. Wanzor will cry the sale.

An unofficial, but considered accurate report on the city's population places the total now at 3,762, nearly three times the people enumerated in the last official Government census in 1940.

Frank Cummings, tax collector for Muleshoe Independent School District, made the count while taking the school census and announced his findings this week.

He went to every house in the city and got an accurate statement of the number of persons in each home. Here is the way he analyzed his findings:

Original town—Whites, 2731; Negroes, 403;

McCain and other additions which have not been formally included in the city limits, 628.

Muleshoe must be ranked as one of the fastest growing towns in the country because of its nearly 200 per cent population gain in less than eight years.

Farm Families Can Take Fresh Hope That REA Lines Will Soon Arrive

Washington, D. C., Apr. 7 — The farm families who have waited for months or years for the REA line to reach their homes can now take fresh hope, according to a report received by this paper from Cong. George Mahon. Last week the House of Representatives by a vote of 199 to 154 passed an Amendment providing \$175 million in REA loan funds to become immediately available upon approval by the Senate and the President, which is expected within three weeks. The House has also approved an additional \$400 million in loans for the REA to become available on July first. Mahon advises that this represents the most ambitious REA program ever undertaken in the history of the nation. Prospects are that abundant funds for the REA will be available for a period of at least

one year. However there will still be delays brought about by the inability of the REA office in Washington to process applications with sufficient speed and for the reason that abundant construction materials are not yet on the market. Fortunately, in recent weeks the material situation has definitely improved.

Mahon is a member of the Appropriations committee and joined with other friends of the REA in Congress in the successful effort to provide additional funds. Such funds are provided in the form of loans to REA Co-ops which are repaid with interest to the Government.

Bailey A Cotton Leader In 1947

Preliminary figures show the 1947

cotton production in Bailey County at 52,851 running bales as compared with 2650 bales ginned in 1946. Ray L. Miller, Dallas Regional Director of the Department of Commerce Field Service has announced. The figures were compiled by the Census Bureau of the Department of Commerce and final statistics will be released later, Mr. Miller stated.

The 1947 cotton production in Texas was 3,306,882 running bales as compared with 1,635,178 bales ginned in 1946. Lubbock County produced 180,935 bales which was more than three times the county's 1946 production.

The Census figures revealed that Lamb County was in second place in 1947 with 115,162 bales. In third place was Cameron County with 111,188 bales compared with 87,734 bales in 1946.

Other counties of the state which produced more than 50,000 bales in 1947 with the 1946 production figures are as follows:
