Boys Of 18-19 To Sign Up In 5th Registration

New FSA Area

President Roosevelt summoned about 3,000,000 of America's young men Friday to register. June 30 and complete the survey of manpower available for fighting or making the weapons of combat.

The final batch of registrants under the Selective Service Asimile by youths of 18 and 19, plus those who have become 20 since the first of the year.

Four previous registrations took care of 20 through 64 years of age, nearly 40,000,000 of them.

Those 18 and 19 cannot be drafted for military service under existing law, but some of them might be mobilized with oldwing the service in war plants. The Bureau of Research and Statistics of the Federal Security Agency estimated that as of April 1, there were 2,483,000 men in that age bracket, while probably 500,000 who have turned

The Army and Navy have been urging voluntary enlistments of youths of 18 and 19 and those who have joined the armed forces will not have to register.

The presidential proclamation day also made provision for registration before or after that date in exceptional cases.
