Sam Houston Black, Pioneer Cattle Man, Died Here Sunday At Age 85

Sam Houston Black was born in Navasota, Walker county, Texas, November 2, 1859 and passed away March 11, at Muleshoe, Texas. He was named after Gen. Sam Houston, who happened to be a guest in the Black home in Walker county on the night of the cattleman's birth. General Houston asked the parents for permission to name the child and, when it was granted, he bestowed his own name upon the baby.

Henry Black, the father of Sam Houston Black, was in the Mier Expedition and escaped into Texas after the drawing of the beans. Soon after his escape into Texas, he married Henrietta Dewey, who was a cousin of Admiral Dewey, after which he settled in East Texas, where the family was reared. During the Civil War Sam Houston Black's father operated a line of stage coaches in Texas and Louisiana. During the early boyhood of Sam Houston Black he drove a stage coach for his father. In 1880, Sam Houston Black was married to Mary Ellen Barnett of Graham, Texas. To them were

Emphasis on E Bonds in Seventh War Loan Drive, To Begin in May

Information on the forthcoming Seventh War Loan Drive is set out in a letter received by E. R. Hart, Muleshoe, Bailey county bond sales committee chairman, from M. Smith, Plainview, Regional Chairman. The drive is to begin May 14 and run through June; however, the drive on sales of E type bonds is to begin on April 1 or thereafter. Smith wrote, "Actually, he said, April 9 has been set for the kick-off on the sale of E Bonds. The major stress in the coming drive is to be placed on sales to individuals. The individual quota will be \$7 billion, compared with only \$5 billion in the Sixth. The series E quota for the nation is set at \$4 billion, against \$2 1/2 in the Sixth. The tabulation period for series E Bonds, and possibly F and G Bonds, will be April 1 through July 7, Smith wrote. Marketable issues will be offered from June 18 through June 30. Continuing, the Regional Chairman wrote:

"Although we do not know what the E Bond quota for Texas will be, we expect it to be somewhere between 62 and 65 per cent increase over the Sixth War Loan E Bond quota. We will have the State E Bond quota in the next few days and hope to be able to assign each county its E Bond quota by March 15. It is expected that the overall quota will be about the same as it was in the Sixth War Loan. Smith went ahead to say that full cooperation of citizens institutions and organizations will be necessary in the counties to drive home the need for the greatly increased sales of E Bonds.

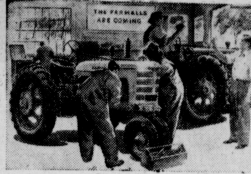

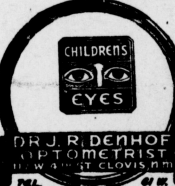
