Any Muleshoe Family Needing To Build Home Can Get WPB Priority

Anyone who needs a house in Muleshoe, can show that need, can get a priority from the War Production Board for materials to be used in its construction.

This is the message given members of the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce last Friday at their weekly luncheon by Judge J. A. Raley, evaluator for the Lubbock district office of the Federal Housing Administration. Furthermore, Judge Raley said, F. H. A. is willing to help finance home construction in Muleshoe. The owner, he said, would be expected to have about 20 per cent of the cost of the finished home plus owning the lot.

Club Women Make Dress Form

It costs just about \$1.10 to make a dress form, according to Bailey County home demonstration club women, and they think the investment is most profitable.

A dress form, in case you didn't know, is a model of yourself made with gummed paper tape, tops of old stockings, and Jersey tubing. The forms are usually mounted on stands made from broom sticks and scrap lumber, according to Grace L. Patterson, county home demonstration agent. Women like dress forms because they save lots of trying on and fitting, which a seamstress can't do for herself very well.

A training school for making these forms was held in the district court room Friday, January 26. A demonstration form was made on Mrs. Gwinn Self of the Progress home demonstration club in the morning by Miss Patterson. In the afternoon the women present divided into groups and made five other forms.

Sgt. L. Hammons, Wounded, Back Home for Visit

Sgt. Lester Hammons was glad to talk to The Journal, because, he figures, the story the paper prints will save him from the task of answering so many questions put to him by his old friends and neighbors around Muleshoe. They all know Lester. They know he is an observing sort of fellow, so they let him have the questions. But Lester doesn't really mind. He is so absorbed with being glad to be back in old Bailey county, that nothing would bother him an awful lot.

Lester is the son of Mrs. J. C. Hammons. He entered the Army over a year before the "Day of Infamy," in September, 1940. One of those ribbons he wears shows this. As a member of an Infantry Regiment of the Third Division, he wound up with a piece of shell fragment in his neck—entered the visit home.

His first campaign began Nov. 8, 1942, when he landed in North Africa to help shake Italians and Germans from their hold on the south shores of the Mediterranean. He was in Tunisia when the last German surrendered.

With the 5th Army, he landed in Sicily July 10, 1943, and there met the enemy. He has 39 days of continuous combat. He entered Sicily near the small city of Laccia.

His outfit went from there to Salerno, landing 10 days after D-Day. In store for him were 39 days of consecutive fighting. Around that town, at Anzio beachhead and further north. They landed at Anzio Jan. 22, 1944. His outfit was at the front and coasted the Volturno, entering the Eternal City—Rome, on June 4.

Here his Division rested from the wars, as other units took up the chase of the Nazis north of the capital.

The grim realities of war were relegated to one side for a brief time as the Americans visited the historic buildings and saw the famous places of this beautiful city. They were there about a week. The local boy said it is really a marvellously beautiful city, and is superbly clean. Inhabitants were nicely dressed, which surprised him because Italy had long been at war and the Germans had occupied Rome since Mussolini's fall.

The rest was short enough. As a part of the 7th Army, his Division landed in August in Southern France and began the job of running the Nazis out of that unhappy country. After the rough treatment his bunch had seen the Germans hand our forces in Italy, it did Lester and his bunch good to surprise a huge Nazi convoy hastening away from South France. The Yanks left little of the long convoy of motor vehicles so badly needed by the enemy.

They chased the Germans on to the north and finally out of France. One day, Lester neglected to dodge. When you hear an enemy shell coming over, you automatically judge its trajectory and decide whether it's headed for your immediate vicinity. This one seemed to be high, so he felt safe. As luck would have it, the shell struck the top of a tall tree and exploded and a fragment of same headed right for Lester's neck. It missed the jugular barely and miraculously failed to strike the spinal column. This was Nov. 11. After hospitalization in France and later in England he began the trip home. From here he will go to a hospital for further examination.

The Bailey county soldier was awarded the Purple Heart and he also wears the Combat Infantryman's Badge; and what he is so proud of is his Good Conduct Medal, for he says, many probably never did think he would win this particular decoration. The bronze star indicates one military campaign, the silver star four. He has participated in five.

An Eighth Air Force Bomber Station, England—Corp. Bernard E. Coward, 29, of Crosbyton and Muleshoe, top turret gunner on a B-17 Flying Fortress, has been assigned to the 95th Bombardment Group, commanded by Col. Jack E. Shuck of Casper, Wyo., and Monroe, Conn., and is now taking an orientation course on flying procedure in the European Theater of operations, prior to beginning combat duty in the air.

Cpl. Coward is a member of the Eighth Air Force Posters group which led the first American bombing attack on targets in Berlin, and which was cited by the President for his outstanding assistance on the railroad marshalling yards at Munster, Germany, in October, 1943. As a component of "the distinguished Third Air Division," the group also shared in a "President citation given the entire division for its historic England-Africa schmitt bombing of an important Messerschmitt fighter plane plant at Regensburg, Germany, in August, 1943.

The AAF gunner, son of Mr. and Mrs. Byron Coward, of Crosbyton, formerly of Muleshoe, was formerly a farmer at Muleshoe.

This is to inform you of the change in address of four of your boys. Perhaps we should have given you this information before, but we have been very busy; however our intentions were all for the best.

Our present address is Camp Roberts, California. We are in company of the 78th Infantry Training Battalion. In case you ever need either of us, please write us at this address, but be sure to mail instructions early as the mail service is very slow.

When we signed up for the present job, we signed up for a full time job; however, we are permitted all the free time we want between 12 a. m. and 4 a. m., provided we sleep.

On this we especially like about the job is that we never idle. We are also permitted special privileges such as washing the barracks with small steel brushes, cleaning the latrine, and if we pull the right strings we get to be Kitchen Police.

Sunday is the best day for that as it is a day of rest. As soon as you get to be a sergeant, you get a week and a half.

There are two lieutenants to every private. The lieutenants have pretty clothes but they didn't give us anything like theirs. We inquire about clothes like theirs but they refused to give us any.

We are the only Texans in our Company but we have just about talked these Californians into helping Texas with the war. In fact, they seem to have quite a bit of regard for us.

As soon as we finish training here, we get a furlough with all transportation paid—(to a Port of Embarkation Station). That sure is nice of them.

Again we apologize for not reporting sooner, but will try to be more prompt next time.

Army Answers Your War Problems

Q My son has been listed as "Missing in action." I just know he is a prisoner of war. I would like to write a letter to him that can be delivered to him as soon as he is found. Is there any place I can send this letter?

A Do not, under any circumstances, address a letter to a soldier listed as "missing in action," on the assumption that he is a prisoner of war. Such letters can be harmful to him if they fall into unauthorized hands.

Q Can a soldier stop his wife's family allowance check if they become separated?

A He may officially protest the payment of the family allowance but unless she agrees that it not be paid, she will continue to receive it as long as they are legally married.

Q Is there any way I can find the address of a soldier overseas? I only know his name and what part of the Army he is in.

A Yes. Write the Adjutant General, War Department, Washington, D. C. Include as much as you know of his full name, Army Serial Number and organization.

Q If a soldier is killed in action and leaves insurance made out to his grandmother, can his mother claim and get a portion of the insurance benefits?

A No. A soldier's insurance is paid to the beneficiary he designates.

Q I am the widow of a veteran of the first world war. Does my marriage to my late husband have to have lasted any specified time for me to become eligible for a pension?

A Since that is a matter that must be acted upon by the Veterans Administration, which is not a part of the Army, it is suggested that you visit or write the Veterans Administration office nearest you.

Vets To Get Business Loans

The necessary machinery for processing applications by veterans of World War II for business loans under the Servicemen's Readjustment Act of 1944 (G. I. Bill of Rights) has been set up in the Dallas Loan Agency of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation.

L. B. Glidden, manager, has announced. Loans applied for may be used in purchasing any business, supplies, equipment, machinery or the tools to be used by the veteran in pursuing a gainful occupation.

The Government may guarantee repayment of such loans to the extent of 50 per cent, but not in an amount exceeding \$2000 as

its maximum guaranty. Thus, the veteran who qualifies for a business loan may obtain a guaranty of 50 per cent of any loan up to \$4000. He may, of course, obtain from his banker a loan of greater amount, for instance, \$6000; but the guaranty is limited to \$2000. In loans of less than \$4000, the Government guarantees half; thus, in a \$3000 loan the guaranty amounts to \$1500, not more.

The veteran desiring to purchase a business in this way may consult his local banker, or write the nearest RFC Loan Agency.
