Muleshoe Bill Is Withdrawn by Deen

AUSTIN, April 11.—So far as the Texas House is concerned the Panhandle's potato growing town of Muleshoe is still fenced in. Rep Tom Deen, Floydada, withdrew his bill giving the county seat of Bailey county the right to expand its corporate limits after vigorous protests from Rep. S. J. Isaacks, El Paso. Deen said Muleshoe had become a leading potato growing area, but land surrounding the town, Texas town was owned completely by a large cattle syndicate. The syndicate won't sell the pasture land though it is unpopulated. Other interests can't erect needed sheds and a drying plant for the potato industry, Deen complained. His bill provided towns under 5,000 population might enlarge by vote of the city council. It was amended to specify the area to be annexed should not be occupied by qualified voters. Isaacks said he sympathized with Deen's and Muleshoe's troubles, "but they want to take in land and tax it so he's owners will have to sell."

"That's taking a man's property without due process of law," Isaacks said. "The amendment makes it more vicious because a town could seize a farmer's land and tax it so he'd have to sell. This is a dangerous precedent." Deen, asking consent to withdraw his bill, said he would get Isaacks and others to help him iron out Muleshoe's difficulties.

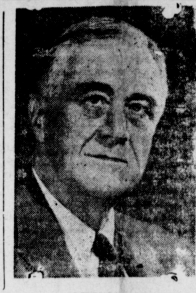

Telephone Company Lays Plans for Improved Plant Here After War

Southwest Associated Telephone Company is fully aware of Muleshoe's rapid growth in recent times and believes in its future continued progress, and is making plans to give a developing community the kind of service it will need and want in the post war period. This is the word brought here by Leland J. Mast, district manager, and C. R. Burnance, commercial superintendent, both of Lubbock, when they met Friday with the Chamber of Commerce in its weekly luncheon session at Muleshoe Coffee Shop. Their immediate aim is to improve their service wherever possible, although they are hampered by lack of materials, equipment and so forth. In the next few months the telephone company hopes to give a direct connection to Lubbock from Muleshoe, and this will help to expedite long distance calls originating in this territory. The company serves a large territory. Their towns are all growing. They have a large number of applications now for new telephones which cannot all be filled, because new equipment is not at present available, they said. When new equipment is available the company will replace the old magnetic system with a common battery system. Muleshoe likely will receive hand tool equipment, though they did not rule out the possibility of a dial system here.

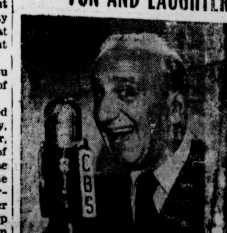

Thus he advanced through barbed wire entanglements until severely wounded. To familiarize the public with the discharge button that has been issued by the DAV, charters by Congress and recognized by government as one of the organizations to which veterans can apply for free information in file claims, Vivian D. Corby, National DAV Adjutant, in announcing the program, said: "When you see that gold-plated plastic discharge button it means the wearer has seen service in World War II. He may even be disabled as a result of his service and deserves every consideration possible."

Army Answers Your War Problems

Q I received a dependency discharge from the Women's Army Auxiliary Corps before it became the WFWA's Army Corps. Am I eligible for benefits under the G. I. Bill of Rights?

A The Veterans Administration, which administers the G. I. Bill of Rights, says that discharged members of the Women's Army Auxiliary Corps are not eligible for such benefits.

Q I married a soldier 6 months ago and haven't got my family allowance yet? What can I do?

A Write your husband and ask him to apply for a family allowance for you. If he does not make the application, you may do so yourself. Secure a form from the nearest Army installation or write or one to the War Department, Newark, N. J.

The form when completed should be sent to the office in Newark, together with a certified copy of your marriage record.

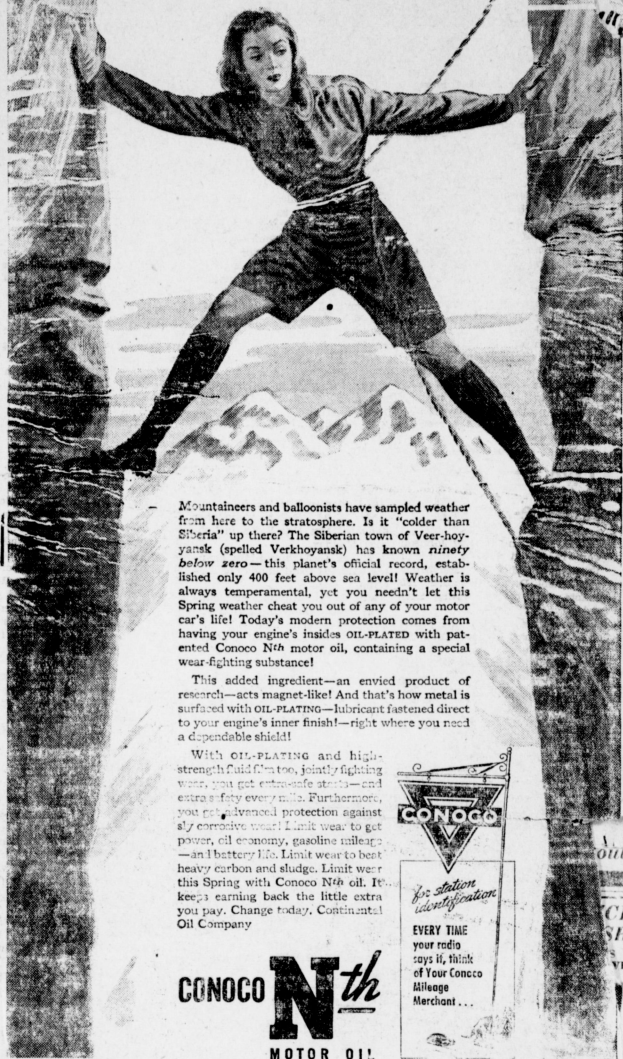
Q Can court action be instituted which will change the beneficiary of a soldier's National Service Life Insurance?

A No. Court action cannot affect the designated beneficiary of National Service Life Insurance as shown on the original or amended application of the insured service man and approved by the Veterans Administration.

Q I am a discharged soldier. I got some of the decorations I got while in the service. Is there any way I can get duplicates?

A You may apply for duplicate decorations by writing to the Branch, Adjutant General's Office, 72-74 Wall Street, New York, N. Y.

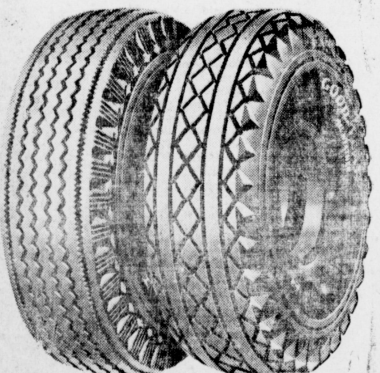

Hon. George H. Mahon, Congressman from this district has come out forthrightly for U. S. retention of island bases we are now taking from the Japs in the Pacific, and thereby has renewed discussion of a question that will agitate the minds of Americans for some time.

We are not an imperialistic nation, we desire no peoples' land, do not wish any aggrandizement.

But under present circumstances it does seem sensible that we not risk the chance that we shall be attacked again in future from these very bases our boys are dying and being wounded to wrest from a savage, cruel, heathen enemy.

The Congressman addressed a letter to the President and to the Secretaries of State, War, and Navy, in which he wrote:

As a Member of Congress, and as an American citizen, I respectfully urge that our Government make no commitments that would preclude our retaining after the end of this war the necessary bases which have been bought by American blood and money—bases

like Iwo Jima. I certainly feel that the American people want the American flag never to be hauled down from essential bases now being won.

This is certainly my view, and I hope it is the official view of the Government.

The boys of the county are especially lucky that these two men are available to act as their leader, mentor and friend.

Q. Is there any opportunity for a disabled veteran of World War II to serve other war disabled?

A. The Disabled American Veterans, in cooperation with the U. S. Veterans' Administration, is training a limited number of men as national service officers. Full details can be obtained by contacting any DAV national service officer.

Q. I have held several ranks in the Army. After my discharge what uniform may I wear on occasions of ceremony?

A. Army regulations provide honorably discharged persons may wear upon such occasions the uniform and insignia of the highest grade held during war service.

Q. Can a loan company, because of default, attach a veteran's pension?

A. The Veterans' Administration has ruled that no deduction can be taken from pensions if the loan was undertaken in good faith.

Q. Is compensation payable for injury suffered by a veteran as a result of having submitted to examination or treatment authorized by the Veterans' Administration?

A. Yes.

Q. What recourse is open to a claimant whose claim for compensation or pension has been denied?

A. Claimants may appeal decisions. The Disabled American Veterans has obtained benefits for a large number of veterans who had previously had claims rejected.

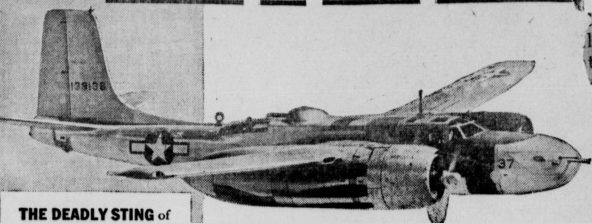

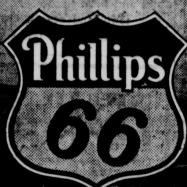

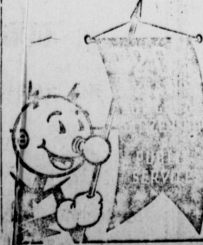

ANSWERS TO READER PROBLEMS

Report of receipt does the Government inclusive of the amount paid monthly to beneficiaries of deceased who had National Service insurance? The monthly installment for \$1,000 of National Service

Life Insurance varies according to the age of the beneficiary on his last birthday before the insured soldier dies. The American Experience Table of Mortality, with interest at three per cent per annum is used as a basis for determining the amount of each installment. Q. How long after his discharge

will my son have to apply for his education under the GI Bill of Rights? A. Two years following his discharge or the war's end, whichever is later.

Q. It seems to take a long time for my letters to get to my husband overseas. It is true that letters with air all stamps on them do not always travel by air? A. The only personal mail guaranteed passage overseas by air is V-mail. Air space is not always available for ordinary air mail and some of it must be carried by ship.

Q. Is the divorced wife of a soldier entitled to a family allowance? A. The divorced wife of a soldier will receive a family allow-

ance toward which the soldier will contribute, only if the divorce decree says that a soldier must pay her alimony. The allowance, however, cannot exceed \$42 a month. Any amount above the \$42 is an additional payment on the part of the soldier.

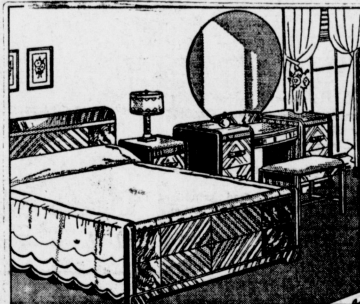
