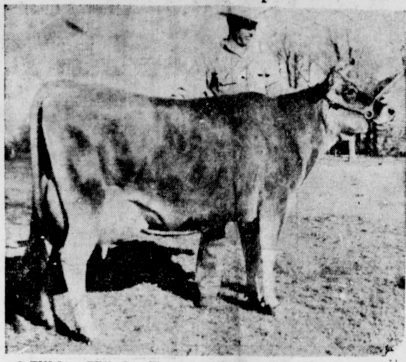

Mr. Young said about 350 superintendents from all parts of the state were in attendance. An expert from A & M will come here in April to conduct a two weeks course. Eligible to attend are Mr. Young and his son, Lowell, who has helped his father with the work here for some time.

Wilhites Building Homes For Veterans

H. L. "Doc" Wilhite and his brother, J. E. Wilhite, recently completed a new house in Muleshoe and now have four more about ready to start in their efforts toward providing housing for veterans.

J. E. Wilhite has recently received his discharge after serving 37 months in both war theatres with the Seabees. He has returned and rejoined his brother in the house building program.

Veterans get preference under the new housing program with which the Wilhites are complying. However, if a new house is built and no veteran buys it within thirty days any other person is then eligible to buy it.

The five homes are to be built in the Golf Course Addition. The Wilhite brothers expect to buy additional lots in Muleshoe for their new houses, they said.

A fine new industry for this territory is the Muleshoe Tile Plant, now in operation at the old quarters of the Allen McReynolds Lumber Company, just north of the court house.

Proprietors are O. G. Bowen, M. P. Roberts and Melvin Lee, all Muleshoe men.

They bring volcanic pumice from near Albuquerque, New Mexico, for the principal element of their product, which comes in two classes.

A wall tile is made with dimensions of 5 by 8 by 12 inches, and a partition tile is 5 by 4 by 12 inches. The product is known as Insul Tile.

The plant owners have been awaiting results of tests for strength now being conducted by laboratory technicians at Texas Technological College before advertising their tile for sale.

The tile made here is similar to that being used by Mr. Malone in his creamery building northwest of the court house.

Seven men are now employed by the plant. The enterprise not only gives employment to local men but will serve to lessen the current building material shortage and stimulate the building program of this territory.

Color Favorites
In Spring Fashions**

Colors this spring will be the source of many inspirations in creating your costumes, according to Mrs. Laurette Wilson county home demonstration agent.

Blues and greens lead the list as color favorites for spring. Coupled with orange tones, which are coming into the color spotlight after several years absence, you will have a delightful time in your play with colors.

You will be hearing of colors such as hope turquoise, Pacific lime, victorious blue, heroic green, orange glory, peace blue, valor rose, brave red, and gallant coral. The pastel color range will reflect the soft loveliness of trappes and ice creams.

Luscious is the word for the color names such as lemon ice, ice cream pink, frosted mint, ice aqua, crushed peach, rum frappe, ari-cot mousse, and candy blue. They certainly should set your imagination to work.

Neutral tones still rate high as a basic color. Champagne blonde, cream, caramel, peace oyster and floella gray are color names denoting the high style colors.

Banana yellow and amber honey are names in the golden family. While in the pink and rose groups

are such names as celestial pink and mondo:in rose.

Polks in the fashion world indicate wide acceptance of green, and of especial interest is one color called plaza green, with a leaning toward the yellow tone. Toning in with this is a lighter shade called cool green. Lime jade and sun olive are two other attractive colors in the green group. Two blue: greens are called aqua dew and seaway green.

In 1946 blues are more animated in character. This is indicated by the color names of midship blue and California blue. China peacock and exotic turquoise are colors inspired by the oriental blues.

As mentioned above orange ones are important this spring. Terra cotta red and its lighter companion melon rose, or chili spice, described as a hot peppery hue, with its lighter blending tone, cloud coral, add variety to the color roll. And they offer a wide color range from which you can concoct innumerable intriguing color harmonies.

"The other day while I was buying my groceries I noticed two women standing at the bread counter pinching each loaf one by one.

I commented on this to my grocer and asked him if he would explain it to me. He smiled and said, "When store bread first came into popularity many years ago, bakers made every effort to deliver it oven-fresh to local groceries. 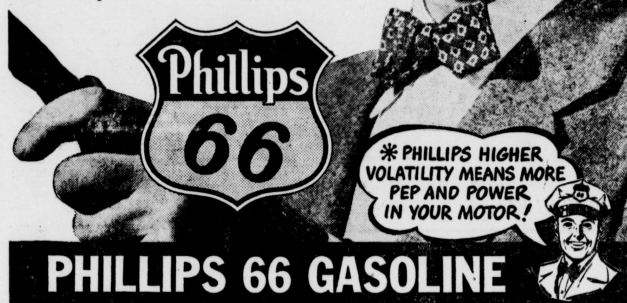

HONEST HAROLD DEPARTS

Men representing special interests over which Secretary Ickes had control often were outspoken in their opposition to the "Old Curmudgeon." But throughout the country many so called common people have looked upon Mr. Ickes as honest, fearless, and intelligent.

His bias at Mr. Truman therefore can scarcely fail to affect the President's prestige. Mr. Ickes, in his letter of resignation suggested that the quality of the Presidential appointments is steadily declining, and in

saying so merely brought out in the open what columnists and lay observers for that matter have been hinting at for some time.

The departing secretary plainly reminded Mr. Truman of the mess President Harding got into with his "Ohio Gang."

We are not in position to know whether Mr. Truman's appointments are steadily deteriorating in quality. But we do know that such an impression is easily created in this post war period and for the benefit of the Democratic party, which we

have supported since childhood, we wish he would refrain from giving even the semblance of the wrong impression.

However, no man on earth could so conduct the office of President of the United States without incurring criticism; we have to remember that at least some of the howling is from the outs, who want in.

IWO JIMA ANNIVERSARY

We were reminded by Forrest W. "Chief" Jones, teacher of Vocational Agriculture in Muleshoe high school, that Tuesday, February 19, was the first anniversary of D-Day on Iwo Jima.

It is hard for us to realize that only one year has elapsed since our Marines stormed the beaches of the Pacific's most heavily fortified island and began a 27 day battle that, Jones said, was the beginning of the end and was the straw that broke the camel's back. He considers our taking of Iwo Jima was done at a higher price than was ever before paid for such a small piece of ground.

Chief was a member of the 4th Marine Regiment with which the 5th Marine hit the beaches on February 19. The 3rd Marine Regiment was held in reserve. The Japs contested the landing and bitterly fought for every foot of the island. An unforgettable incident was the flag raising by members of the 5th Regiment on Mt. Suribachi, a scene preserved forever by a snapshot taken by an Associated Press photographer.

At one time during the 27-day campaign, the 4th had 75 per cent casualties. Chief Jones remembers the American boys who gave their lives or were maimed there so that other people might continue to live the sort of lives they want to live, and he cannot help wishing that all of us would show more evidence that we remember, too, not only this sacrifice but that of all our men in this war that preserved us the way of life that we all cherish.

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Some Advantages of Strip Cropping
Strip cropping, combined with contour tillage and terracing where necessary has been proved by experiment stations of the Soil Conservation Service and by co-operators in the various demonstration areas to be very economical and effective, and the most practical means of controlling erosion and conserving soil and water on cultivated land.
It is now known that, other factors being equal, the longer the slope the greater the degree of erosion. Contour strip cropping divides the length of the slope, checks the momentum of running off water, filters out the soil being carried off, and increases the absorption of rain water by the soil.
The multitude of obstructions offered by the dense, close-growing crops in the alternate strips slow down the flow of water, thus permitting it to soak into the soil and by spreading the water, prevent it from concentrating in low areas and gullies. They also deflect wind currents and prevent soil blowing.
