## Freight Rate Fight Goes On

The West Texas Chamber of Commerce, pioneer and a leader in the six-year war to bring equality in freight rates to Texas and the South western territory, is not resting on oars or laurels. While pleased with the May 15 history making order by the ICC to the nation's rail carriers to institute uniform freight classifications and work out interterritorial rate scales knocking out all discriminations and bringing parity to all sections, the regional chamber warns that the fight has just begun, calls for continued cooperation of all affiliated allied agencies and announces it is launching out on the following 3-point program:

1. To help organize and actively participate in hearings for working out the Commission's order setting up a system of uniform classifications.
2. To instigate further proceedings to "once and for all time give us complete parity in scales."
3. To explore the entire field of commodity rates in order to win equality with other sections on like commodities moving in like directions.

## Polio Man Enter Through The Teeth

Austin.—The exact route through which the polio virus enters the human body has never been conclusively determined. For some time the orofarynx lobes and gastro-intestinal tract have been suspected as possible portals of entry, and lately, according to Dr. G. W. Cox, State Health Officer, science is pointing the finger of suspicion to the exposed pulps of teeth.

This interesting theory has been advanced as a result of extensive research with animals tending to demonstrate that the virus might enter the body through an exposed pulp and travel along the nerve pathways.

These experiments appear to show that the exposed pulp of teeth do constitute another possible portal of entry for polio and Dr. Cox pointed out that this portal can be closed readily by proper dental measures. "Bar any doorway whereby polio can enter your body," Dr. Cox urged Texans.

## Ration Program

### JUNE 1 TO JULY 1

SUGAR: Stamp No. 36 is good for 5 pounds through August 31.

MEATS AND FATS: Book IV, red stamps E2 through U2 good for 10 points each. V2 through Z2 became valid June 1. E2, F2 G2 H2 and J2 expire June 30.

PROCESSED FOODS: Book IV, blue stamps through Z2 and A1 through C1 are good for 10 points each. D1 through H1, valid June 1. N2, P2, Q2, R2 and S2 expire June 30.

SHOES: Book III, stamps one, two and three, with airplane pictures, each good for one pair shoes indefinitely. A new stamp will be validated August 1.

GASOLINE (Coupons must be endorsed on front): A coupons, 4 gallons each, No. 15 expiring June 21. No. 16 coupons become valid on June 22 and will be good for five gallons each. B-6, B-7, C-7 and C-8 rations have a value of 5 gallons each. R-2 and R-3, 5 gallons valid for bulk delivery only. T coupons designated "Second Quarter" good for 5 gallons thru June 21; D, one and one-half gallons; and E-2 and E-3 one gallon each.

TIRE INSPECTION: T book holders every six months or every 6,000 miles, whichever one comes first. New Mileage Rationing Record required to obtain gasoline rations. Application for passenger car tire replacement must show condition of all tires in use.

### ROOSEVELT STAMP SERIES

A. J. Gardner Muleshoe postmaster, has received notice from Washington that the new stamps printed to honor the memory of the late President Franklin Delano Roosevelt, will soon be available to the people. Denominations of 1, 2, 3, and 5 cents will be issued, and the 3-cent stamp will be released in Washington June 27, and in the country at large sometime in July. The stamp bears a portrait of Mr. Roosevelt, and the south view of the White House. Collectors wishing first day cancelled stamps should consult the postal authorities.

## Two Thirds E Bond Quota Bought In Bailey County

### Lubbock Fights Johnson Grass

Lubbock County farmers are showing the way to the rest of the Plains in their fight to eliminate the pest of Johnson grass, which notes The Plainview Herald, is becoming a menace to agriculture, particularly where row crops are farmed here on the plains.

Outlining the fight the Lubbock people are waging against Johnson grass, the paper says: In Lubbock county something is being done by the farmers, county commissioners and the State Highway Department about Johnson grass.

In Crosby, Lynn, Hockley, Lamb and Bailey counties something is being done, but probably not on as extensive a scale as in Lubbock. There these control measures are followed:

1. County commissioners should shoulder responsibility of freeing the county roads of Johnson grass.
  2. The State Highway Department should do likewise with state roads.
  3. The railroads should take care of their right of ways in like manner.
- The land owner or tenant should eradicate the grass from his farm. The machinery for carrying out the plan came after 525 farmers met and formed the Anti-Johnson Grass Committee. After careful study of all methods, the committee decided on the use of one or more of the following methods to control the grass.
1. Common salt used at the rate of 3-4 to 1 pound per square foot.
  2. Diastilate or kerosene heavily applied when Johnson grass has reached the blooming stage.
  3. Sodium chlorate applied as a spray using 1 pound per gallon of water.
  4. Flooding of heavily seeded fields combined with one of the first three methods.
  5. Constant grazing with livestock for two or three years.

## Sat. Coward Is Given Third Cluster

An Eighth Air Force Bomber Station, England—Tech. Sgt. B. Edward Coward, 29, of Crosbyton, formerly of Muleshoe, gunner of a B-17 Flying Fortress of the 95th Bombardment Group, has been awarded the 3rd Oak Leaf Cluster to the Air Medal for "meritorious achievement" while participating in Eighth Air Force bombing attacks on vital industrial targets in Germany, and on Nazi airfields supply dumps and gun emplacements in conjunction with advances by Allied ground forces on the continent.

The second card apparently was written some time later, but bore no date and read as follows:

I am still well and working. We had our second anniversary in September. I have received five letters including two from the Company. This makes four I have written.

Love, Morris.

—Buy a WAR BOND TODAY!

People of Bailey County have subscribed two-thirds of their assigned E Bond quota, according to a summary made public Thursday by Jesse M. Osborn, general chairman.

He said the sales to date amounted to \$102,500 in this class bonds. Quota for the county is \$140,000, so that we are now \$37,500 short of reaching the goal.

In other class bonds, the county has just about reached its assigned quota. To Thursday, bonds of classes other than E bonds, had been sold in the amount of \$102,000. Quota in this division is \$105,000. Bailey county citizens have so far in the 7th War Loan, bought an overall total of \$207,500, against an overall quota in this drive of \$245,000.

Leaders are hopeful that all quotas will be met soon. It is pointed out that no concerted drive has been made in several communities. Most recent rally was held at West Camp, and this community went 20 per cent over its E bond quota.

However, county leaders are not expecting purchase of bonds to end when our quotas are met. They realize a tremendous job is facing us—that of defeating the Japs, and that to do this we have to supply the sheens of war to bring unlimited and overwhelming power against our enemies. Therefore, the more bonds that are bought, the sooner will this power be brought to bear and the sooner victory will come.

Pvt. James C. Broyles, who has been visiting his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Edgar Broyles for the past two weeks, has returned to his post at Houston. While en route there he will stop over at Temple to see a buddy who has just arrived in the States. Pfc. Marshall Oliver is convalescing in a hospital there and is reported to be doing nicely. He was wounded in Germany 24th Feb. 1945.

## Pvt. Floyd Henderson Recovering In England From Mortar Shell Wounds

THE 129TH GEN. HOSPITAL, ENGLAND.—Pvt. Floyd W. Henderson, 19, of Earth, is now convalescing at this U. S. Army general hospital in England from mortar shell fragment wounds of the head and right shoulder, incurred during action against enemy troops near the Remagen bridgehead at the Rhine. He has been awarded the Purple Heart.

Pvt. Henderson is making progress and will recover from his wounds after "thorough convalescence," said Capt. Carlisle W. McKee, his ward surgeon. "He is receiving the best treatment modern science can make possible."

Rifeman in an infantry unit, he and his company met with a striking German resistance as they moved deeper into the Reich after crossing the Rhine over the celebrated Remagen bridge.

"The Jerries tried to stop us with every weapon known to modern warfare," related the Earth soldier. "We ran into terrific small arms fire and were constantly harassed by mortar and artillery fire. When an 88 burst a few yards from me as I was moving with a column through a German village, fragments struck me in the head and shoulder. I had immediate first aid given me by a company first aid man and was moved as soon as possible back to an evacuation hospital. Later I was flown to England in a smooth flying C-47."

Henderson is the son of Mr. and Mrs. L. G. Henderson, of Amherst. He entered the Army in March, of 1944, and received infantry training at Camp Wolters, Texas. He is married to the former Miss Jesse Snow, of Muleshoe. In civilian life he was engaged in farming.

### The Army Answers Your Questions

**Q.** My husband was a first lieutenant in the Officers Reserve Corps when he entered the service. He is now a major overseas. Since his promotions have been temporary and have been in the Army of the United States instead of the reserve, what rank will he hold when he is released from active duty and resumes his place in the reserve.

**A.** The War Department has announced that all qualified officers holding commissions in the Army of the United States will be offered the highest temporary rank held while on active duty should they join the Officers Reserve Corps at the time they are released.

**Q.** Has there been any change in the age limit for joining the Women's Army Corps?

**A.** Yes. The minimum age for enlistment in the WAAC used to be 50. It is now 38. The minimum age remains at 20.

**Q.** Would you please list the decorations for which soldiers are given five discharge credits under the point demobilization plan?

**A.** Five points are given for the first and five for each additional award of the following for services performed since September 16, 1940: Medal of Honor, Distinguished Service Cross, Legion of Merit, Silver Star, Distinguished Flying Cross, Soldier's Medal, Bronze Star.

**Q.** Can a bank refuse to loan money under the GI Bill of Rights? A. Many misunderstandings exist over this point. The bank can refuse to loan money under provisions of the bill, if money is loaned under the bill, the government participates to this extent:

It will guarantee to the bank payment of one-half the loan, up to two thousand dollars, if the veteran should not make his loan payments. The government also pays the interest for one year for the portion of the loan it guarantees. The loans are made by the bank, and not by the government.

or the United States Maritime Service, or the United States Merchant Marine, or who has been a member of same within eighteen months prior to the holding of any election in this state authorized by law, and is otherwise a qualified voter, shall not be required to pay, or to hold a receipt for the payment of, a poll tax in order to vote at any such election if same is held while the United States is at war or within a certain stated time thereafter

—providing that members of the regular Army, Navy, or Marine Corps of the United States shall not be permitted to vote; providing that other members of the armed forces shall be entitled to vote under certain conditions; providing the form of the ballot for the voting on said proposed amendment; fixing the time for holding an election; directing the Governor to issue the necessary proclamations; and making an appropriation.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS**

**SECTION 1.** There shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas the matter of amending Article VI of the Constitution of Texas, by adding thereto a new section which will modify the present restrictions concerning voting. This new section shall be inserted between Section 2 and Section 3 of said Article VI and shall be known as Section 2a, and shall read as follows:

"SECTION 2a. Nothing in this Constitution shall be construed to require any person, who at the time of the holding of an election hereinafter referred to, is or who within eighteen months immediately prior to the time of the holding of any such election was a member of the armed forces of the United States or of the Armed Force Reserve of the United States, or of any branch or component part of such armed forces or Armed Force Reserve, or the United States Maritime Service or the United States Merchant Marine and who is otherwise a qualified voter under the laws and Constitution of this state, to pay a poll tax or to hold a receipt for a poll tax assessed against him, as a condition precedent to his right to vote in any election held under the authority of the laws of this state during the time the United States is engaged in fighting a war, or within one year after the close of the calendar year in which said war is terminated.

"PROVIDED, however, that the foregoing provisions of this section do not confer the right to vote upon any person who is a member of the regular establishment of the United States Army, Navy or Marine Corps; and provided further that all persons in the armed forces of the United States, or the component branches thereof, not members of the regular establishment

of the United States Army, Navy or Marine Corps, are hereby declared not to be disqualified from voting by reason of any provision of subsection "Fifth" of Section 1, of this Article."

**SEC. 2** The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state on August 25, 1945, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following:

"FOR the amendment to Article VI of the Constitution of Texas providing that any person in the armed forces of the United States, or the Armed Force Reserve of the United States, or of any branch or component part thereof, or of the United States Maritime Service or the United States Merchant Marine, or who has been a member of same within eighteen months prior to the holding of any election in this state authorized by law, and is otherwise a qualified voter, shall not be required to pay, or to hold a receipt for the payment of, a poll tax in order to vote at any such election, if same is held while the United States is at war or within a certain stated time thereafter."

**SEC. 3.** The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamations relating to the publication of the foregoing Resolution, in the various counties of the state, and shall cause the same to be published as required by the statutes and the Constitution in connection with the submission of proposed amendments to the Constitution, to the people for their action at a statewide election. If it shall appear from the returns of the election at which the foregoing amendment to the Constitution is voted upon that a majority of the qualified voters have voted for said amendment, same shall then become a part of the Constitution of Texas.

**SEC. 4.** There is hereby appropriated out of the General Fund of the State of Texas, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00), or so much thereof as may be necessary to pay the expenses of advertising said Resolution in each county in the state and for such other purposes as may be necessary, or required by law, or by the Constitution.

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION**

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas amending Sections 51a, 51b, 51c and 51d of Article III so that the same shall consist of one section to be known as Section 51a, providing that the Legislature shall have the power to provide assistance to and provide for the payment of same to actual bona fide citizens of Texas who are needy aged persons over the age of sixty-five (65) years, needy blind persons over the age of twenty-one (21) years and needy children under the age of sixteen (16) years; providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States for such assistance providing that the payments of such assistance from State funds shall never exceed either the payments

from Federal funds or a total of more than Thirty-five Million Dollars (\$35,000,000) per year; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication, and making an appropriation to defray the necessary expenses of proclamation, publication, and holding the election.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS**

Section 1. That Sections 51a, 51b, 51c, and 51d of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended and the same are hereby amended so that the same shall hereafter consist of one section to be numbered 51a, which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 51a. The Legislature shall have the power, by general laws to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be by the Legislature be deemed expedient for assistance to, and for the payment of assistance to:

"(1) Needy persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application; provided that the maximum payment per month from State funds shall not be more than Twenty Dollars (\$20) per month.

"(2) Needy blind persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are over the age of twenty-one (21) years; provided that no such

assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

"(1) Needy children who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are under the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid on account of any child over one (1) year old who has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding the application for such assistance, or on account of any child under the age of one (1) year whose mother has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Federal Government of the United States such financial aid for the assistance of the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children as such Government may offer not inconsistent with restrictions herein set forth; provided however that the amount of such assistance out of State Funds to each person assisted shall never exceed the amount so expended out of Federal funds; and provided further that the total amount of money to be expended out of State funds for such assistance to the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children shall never exceed the sum of Thirty-five Million Dollars (\$35,000,000) per year."

Should the Legislature enact enabling laws and provide an additional appropriation hereto in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be invalid by reason of their anticipatory character.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of Texas at a special election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the 25th day of August, 1945, at which election there shall be printed on such ballot the following clause:

For the amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payment of old age assistance to those above sixty-five (65) years of age; provided that monthly payments from State funds to any one person may be in valid amounts based on need, that the maximum payment per month per person from State funds shall not be more than Twenty Dollars (\$20) per month; giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments for the needy blind persons over twenty-one (21) years of age; giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments to needy children under six-

teen (16) years of age; providing for the expenditure of funds from the Federal Government; limiting the total amount which may be expended for such assistance out of State funds; and providing conditions as to residence within the State, in order to become eligible to receive assistance."

"Against the amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payment of old age assistance to those above sixty-five (65) years of age; provided that monthly payments from State funds to any one person may be in valid amounts based on need, that the maximum payment per month per person from State funds shall not be more than Twenty Dollars (\$20) per month; giving the Legislature the power to

set up a system of payments for the needy blind persons over twenty-one (21) years of age; giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments to needy children under sixteen (16) years of age; providing for the expenditure of funds from the Federal Government, limiting the total amount which may be expended for such assistance out of State Funds; and providing conditions as to residence within the State in order to become eligible to receive assistance."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and held as required by the Constitution and Laws of the State

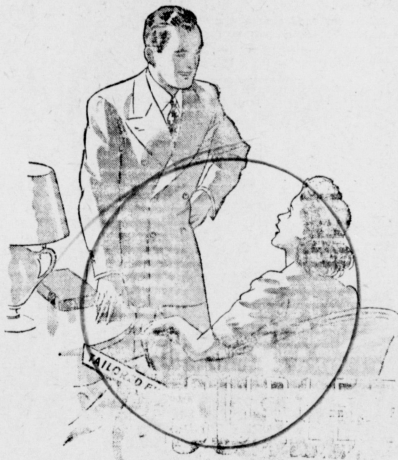

### WAR BONDS—A GOOD BUY FOR THE FARMER

The 7th War Loan started May 14. Americans as individuals are taking on their biggest quota to date—seven billion dollars in E bonds alone.

You may be wondering, "why this biggest of all individual quotas now? Haven't we already reached the peak? A fair question—requiring a straight answer.

The Battle of Japan has just begun. It must be backed up, paid for—fought for by a free people, intent on sweeping the Pacific clear of fascist hate—forever. With the war in the West our first and major concern, we have not yet been able to go all-out in the East. But neither has the Jap.

Millions of fighting men—freshly outfitted and equipped—will have to be moved from Europe halfway around the globe, and supplied day

There are many other reasons for supporting the 7th War Loan—reasons that take us from the present to the future. By investing in the 7th War Loan, the patriotic American is safeguarding his own future, his country's future.

A survey following the 6th War

Loan showed that 57 per cent of the farmers who were personally solicited bought bonds. In spite of an "off" season so far as income is concerned, farm War Bond leaders expect to sell more bonds to farmers during the Seventh War Loan than in any previous drive. Farmers are urged to convert expanded bank accounts into bonds.

Money invested in War Bonds will serve as a reserve for farm operations in bad years, for deferred purchases and equipment, for new household equipment. Whatever the postwar adjustment, farmers with War Bonds will have an easier time of it than they did following the last war.

## Just Between Us

soft water. To test the soap to see if it is neutral, put a bit of it on your tongue, and if neutral it will not bite or sting.

When the soap solution has cooled to a jelly-like consistency, beat it with a rotary egg beater until it looks like cake icing. When suds die down, re-beat them.

Remove the dust from the upholstered furniture with a vacuum cleaner or whisk broom. Before shampooing the fabric with dry suds, test in an inconspicuous place to see whether it is washable. If so, then apply the dry suds to a small area with a brush, sponge or cloth. Use a light circular motion. Rinse several times.

Be sure no soap remains in the material. Use as little water as possible so that the foundation will not become wet. Work quickly and wash a small area at a time; and let each new area overlap the last one a little. Place furniture in an airy place to dry but not in the sun.

If fabric has a nap, brush it after it is thoroughly dry so that the threads will be in the right direction. Leather covered furniture can be washed with suds in much the same way.

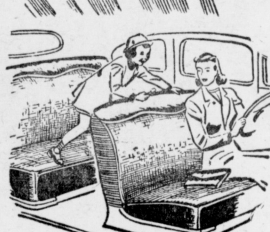

**S. J. R. No. 8**  
**A JOINT RESOLUTION**  
 PROPOSING an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing for a Supreme Court of nine members; prescribing their qualifications; and providing for their election, tenure of office and compensation.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS**

**SECTION 1.** That Section 2 of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:  
**"ARTICLE 5. SEC. 1.** The Supreme Court shall consist of a Chief Justice and eight Associate Justices, any five of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of five shall be necessary to a decision of a case; provided, that when the business of the court may require, the court may sit in sections as designated by the court to hear argument of causes and to consider applications for writs of error or other preliminary matters. No person shall be eligible to the office of Chief Justice or Associate Justice of the supreme court unless he be, at the time of his election, a citizen of the United States and of this state, and unless he shall have attained the age of thirty-five years, and shall have been a practicing lawyer or a lawyer and judge of a court of record together at least ten years. Said Justices shall be elected (three of them each two years) by the

qualified voters of the state, at a general election; shall hold their offices six years, or until their successors are elected and qualified; and shall each receive such compensation as shall be provided by law. In case of a vacancy in the office of any Justice of the Supreme Court, the Governor shall fill the vacancy until the next general election for state officers, and at such general election the vacancy for the unexpired term shall be filled by election by the qualified voters of the state. The Justice of the Supreme Court who may be in office at the time this amendment takes effect shall continue in office until the expiration of their term of office under the present Constitution, and until their successors are elected and qualified. The Judges of the Commission of Appeals who may be in office at the time this amendment takes effect, shall become Associate Justices of the Supreme Court and each shall continue in office as such Associate Justice of the Supreme Court until January 1st next preceding the expiration of the term to which he has been appointed and until his successor shall be elected and qualified."

**SEC. 2.** Said proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote on the qualified electors of this state at a special election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in August, 1945, at which election each voter opposing said proposed amendment shall scratch off the

ballot with a pen or pencil the following words printed on said ballot:  
 "FOR the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members"; and each voter favoring said proposed amendment shall scratch off the ballot in the same manner the following words printed on said ballot:  
 "AGAINST the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

**SEC. 3.** The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and said election held as provided by the Constitution and laws of this state.

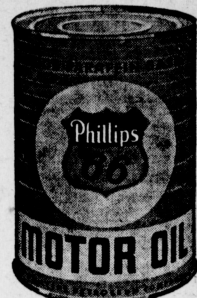

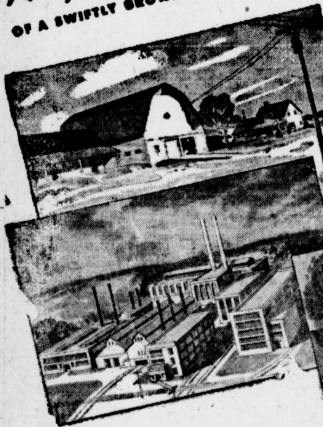

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION**  
 PROPOSING an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide for continuous salary per diem of all members of the Legislature during their tenure of office.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE STATE OF TEXAS**

**SECTION 1.** That Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:  
**"SECTION 24.** Members of the Legislature shall receive from the public Treasury a per diem of Ten Dollars (\$10) per day during their tenure of office. In addition to the per diem the members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for each twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel by land, regardless of railways or water routes; and the Comptroller of the State shall prepare and preserve a table of distances to each county seat, now or hereafter to be established; and by such table the mileage of each member shall be paid; but no member shall be entitled to mileage for any extra session that may be called within one day after the adjournment of any regular or called session."

**SEC. 2.** The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the state on the fourth Saturday in August, A. D. 1945, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:  
**"FOR** the Constitutional Amendment providing for continuous salary per diem of all members of the Legislature during their tenure of office" and  
**"AGAINST** the Constitutional Amendment providing for contin-

uous salary per diem of all members of the Legislature during their tenure of office."

**EACH** voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment.

**SEC. 3.** The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

**SEC. 4.** The provisions of this Constitutional Amendment shall be self-enacting and if a majority of votes at said election shall be cast for

same the Governor shall, within thirty (30) days after said election, issue a proclamation declaring this Amendment to be a part of the Constitution of Texas.
