## Farm Security Now Has Increased Authority For Veteran Farm Loans

### BANGS DISEASE TESTS PLANNED

Owners of dairy cattle desiring to protect consumers of the dairy products from their herds against undulant fever will now be able to have "Bangs" tests run on their cattle. Get in touch with the county agent. Many herd owners have taken advantage of the Federal Government program and have a certificate showing that their herds are clean, but they should keep their good record by annual testing in order to keep their certificate up to date.

Many dairymen are taking advantage of the services of Dr. J. H. Fass, Veterinarian who recently moved to Muleshoe with the purpose of serving Bailey County and surrounding territory in the field of veterinary medicine.

The county agent is willing to assist in arranging a schedule for testing of any cow or group of cattle in Bailey County and it suggested that neighbors in any community agree on a particular date for testing and leave the information concerning the testing at the County Agent's office.

If difficulty is encountered in arranging for testing several herds in your community on the same day, special arrangements will be made to test your herd at a later date.

Mr. Deaton was owner of a gin at Lariat, and had gin interests at other Texas points, as well as ice plants at Fort Sumner and at Sudan.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Laura Celesta Deaton; two sons, Carl E. Deaton, A. M. 16, Corpus Christi, and William Earl Deaton, of Lariat; four daughters, Mrs. Mable Lorene Martin, of Clovis, Mrs. Essie May Sisk of Levelland, and Mrs. Dorothea Baldrige, of Muskogee, Okla.; and Betty Jeanette, Lariat.

Mr. Deaton's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Will Deaton of Ceres, Calif., and five brothers and a sister also survive.

### Harvey Back From Caribbean

Lieutenant Clark Harvey, U. S. N. R. of Muleshoe, has returned from a tour of duty in the Caribbean, where he served with the Navy's Patrol Bombing Squadron Two Hundred Fourteen.

Using big Mariner Flying boats, the squadron ranged over thousands of miles of ocean on convoy coverages and anti-submarine sweeps. Pilots and air crew men frequently found boredom their chief enemy during long hours of "staring routine patrols. Although one plane was forced down, its crew was saved and the squadron lost no personnel during its 20 months of duty - a reflection on the skill of both flying and ground crews.

The 27 year old Navy flier is the son of H. G. Harvey, of Muleshoe.

### LOCAL MAN IN GROUP CITED

Jennings is here now on furlough visiting his parents. The accompanying story was delayed but is printed now because anything which concerns the work of our defenders is of interest to us home folks.

An Eighth Air Force Liberator Station, England.—Pfc. James R. Jennings, of Muleshoe, a member of a ground maintenance crew which was commended by Col. William Jones, commanding the 45th Bombardment Group Heavy, for "Distinguished and Outstanding Performance of Duty" in servicing, and maintaining a B-24 aircraft heavy bomber known as the "Sweetest Rose of Texas" that completed 100 operational missions without one returning early because of mechanical failure.

The "Rose" bombed nearly every

important city in Nazi dominated Europe, and was baptized by fire from enemy flak and Luftwaffe fighters. The record of 100 missions without return from mechanical failure reflects credit both on the ground crew and the flier, who have skillfully brought the "Rose" back in spite of damage or the loss of engines due to flak. The combat crews and engineering officers gave praise to the maintenance men for being the conscientious, hard working crew that kept the "Rose" the best serviced plane in the group.

Pfc. Jennings' group, a part of Maj. Gen. Kepner's 2nd Air Division, received the Distinguished Unit Citation for outstanding performance of duty against the enemy.

Pfc. Jennings entered the service in 1942 and has served in England since November, 1943.

He stated, "Because of being an ex-gunner with four missions to my credit before being grounded, I know the full importance of keeping a plane in tip top condition."

## Peace's Cruiser Blasts Okinawa

ABOARD A HEAVY CRUISER—delayed—James Homer Peace, 19, fireman, second class, USN, son of Mrs. Grace Lee Peace of Muleshoe, fought aboard this crack heavy cruiser as it bombarded the Japs on Okinawa, pounding artillery, and gibbet installations into rubble to clear the path for invasion troops.

As enemy resistance subsided, the ship moved closer to the barren beaches and opened fire at point-blank range with her 8-inch guns. The ships' "gooney-bird", flying over targets, mixed new range instructions with a good word for the gunners.

Interspersed with firing directions were occasional phrases like: "Nice work, right on" or "bull's eye" or a blunt but expressive "That one knocked the hell out of them."

Every officer and man at his battle station through most of the operation. Men on anti-aircraft batteries stayed at their guns 200 consecutive hours, napping fitfully between barrages.

While bombarding the enemy beaches, the ship was repeatedly attacked by Japanese planes. Effective fire from the ship's "AA" guns recorded many enemy downed enemy aircraft in the ship's log.

## Sergeant Splawn Given Discharge

Staff Sgt. Woodrow H. Splawn has his honorable discharge from the United States Army after accumulating 101 points, and is back home at Muleshoe.

He was in the Army 4 years, ten months and 16 days. Recently he had been serving at Headquarters of the Sixth Army on Luzon.

Sgt. Splawn entered the service August 22, 1940. He took part in the campaigns of New Guinea, Bismarck Archipelago, Southern Pacific Islands, and Luzon.

He received the Asiatic-Pacific Campaign Medal with 4 Bronze Stars, the Philippines Liberation Medal with 1 Bronze Star, Good Conduct Medal, and the American Defense Service Medal.

His parents are Mr. and Mrs. C. I. Splawn, who live north of Muleshoe.

and dinner menus, says Miss Grace L. Patterson, county home demonstration agent of Bailey county.

Medium sized eggs are as good as large eggs of the same grade when they are at least 1-8 cheaper, while small eggs are economical as large eggs when they are 1-4 cheaper. They have relatively the same food value, high in protein, vitamin A, B-vitamins and iron. The same is true of color.

Suggestions for variations of the egg theme is menu planning. Instead of the traditional cheese soufflé—try a vegetable soufflé, using minced onion, finely chopped green pepper, chopped celery and dried cooked vegetables such as peas, asparagus, or snap beans folded into the beaten eggs.

Custards make a good main dish, too. Leave out the vanilla and nutmeg, and use meat broth or vegetable liquid in place of part or all the milk. Then serve with a vege-

table plate.

Eggs make a good stretcher for meat when used in quick egg noodles cooked in meat broth. Beat one or two eggs with a little salt until they are foamy. Blend two table-spoons of flour for each egg, and pour the batter in a steady stream into the simmering broth. Cook the noodles just two minutes.

Homemakers will find that with a little planning and ingenuity on their part, their families will enjoy these egg dishes, and at the same time get their required daily amount of protein for good nutrition.

## Sidelights From Washington

By Congressman Geo. Mahon

On all sides one hears comments to the effect that President Truman has got off to a good start as President. He is friendly, and he would not know how to be arrogant or aloof. There has probably never been a more informal, down to earth, sort of fellow in the Presidency than Harry Truman.

Most people in public life have referred to former Presidents as Mr.

President or Mr. So and So. Even President Roosevelt was generally called Mr. President or Mr. Roosevelt by his associates in public life. But scores of men in public life call President Truman by his first name, Harry. It seems to fit in perfectly with the man. He appears to think of himself as just an ordinary fellow with a big job to do and who needs a lot of people to help him.

He was extremely well received when he appeared before the Senate last week to deliver the United Nations Charter. The Senate has been consulted from the beginning of the proposed plan, first by President Roosevelt and later by President Truman, and the ground work for favorable Senate action has been well laid.

Speaking of President Truman's informality, on the first occasion when he addressed a joint session of Congress, he forgot to wait until Speaker Rayburn presented him before proceeding with his speech. He was about to do the same thing on the next occasion when Speaker Rayburn whispered audibly, "Hold on, Harry, let me introduce you!" Not long ago I had occasion to call on President Truman at the

White House. He had on a blue shirt and was in his shirt sleeves. With complete informality, he began the conversation by inquiring about Lubbock, recalling his visit there last year.

Of course, the President has a hard road ahead of him, but all our people wish him well, particularly in the field of foreign policy and in his capacity as Commander in Chief for the knockout blow against Japan.

## The Army Answers Your Questions

Q. Is there any way a soldier who has been sentenced to a year in the guardhouse can be released from the service for good without serving his one year sentence?

A. If the soldier's sentence stated that he is to be dishonorably discharged following a year's de-

tionment, the headquarters which reviews his case after the court passed the sentence, or a higher headquarters, may remit his detention and allow him to be discharged. His sentence may also be commuted by the Secretary of War.

Q. I am an Army veteran. I am employed in an essential industry, but have a chance to take a better job. Is it true that I can take this other job without getting a release from my present employer?

A. Yes. If you are a veteran of World War II you are not subject to War Manpower Commission rulings and do not need a release to accept other employment.

Q. Is there any limitation as to the time a veteran has in which to apply for schooling under the G. I. Bill of Rights?

A. Yes. To obtain the educational privileges of the G. I. Bill of Rights, a veteran must go to school within two years after the end of the war. If he is discharged after the war is over, he has two years following the date of his discharge in which to apply for the educational benefits.
