Fat Salvage Is Being Continued

While the general food supply has materially improved during the past few months, national stocks of fats and oils are still critically short and housewives are urged to continue saving every drop of used fats. E. A. McBride, district officer for marketing, Production and Marketing Administration, said today.

Dropping meats, fats and oils from the point list does not mean that there is a sufficient supply of industrial oils so necessary in speeding reconversion, McBride continued. "As a matter of fact the situation is serious and the government is depending upon all housewife's kitchen is the greatest source to salvage every ounce of used fats." He pointed out that the housewife's kitchen is the greatest source of used fat supply.

Fats are used in the manufacture of hundreds of essential products such as synthetic rubber, ice luges, automobiles, soaps, paint, nylons and plastics.

Col. Dorris of Famous 200th CA Was Visitor Here

Lt. Col. W. O. Dorris, wife and son, John Paul, were visitors in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Marty Ezell Sunday.

Col. Dorris, member of the famous 200th Coast Artillery, a New Mexico outfit, was for three and one-half years a prisoner of the Japanese. His home is at Albuquerque, where he is spending three months recuperation leave.

Col. Dorris related that as long as he was held in the Philippines the American prisoners received at least decent food and some medicine, but at Fukuoka, in Japan, they received only cruelty and hard labor.

He brought home the American flag that was raised at Fukuoka prison camp, a flag that the 52 American prisoners lovingly fashioned of tattered remnants of several parachutes. Col Dorris said that to these men it was the most beautiful flag ever made. The flag was brought to Clovis and raised at the half of the Thanksgiving football game.

Col. Dorris participated in the Bataan Death March and spent several months in hated Cabanatuan Prison Camp in the Philippines.

He related that the flag was made after the end of the war when the Japs suddenly became very obliging. It will be turned over to the State of New Mexico to be preserved permanently.

New Mexico people have welcomed back these members of their 200th Coast Artillery who survived the war and Japanese cruelty, with open arms.

Water and Sewer System Expansion, Street Improvement, Auditorium Are Included in City Betterment Plans

December 15 has been set as the date on which citizens of Muleshoe will vote on a proposal to issue bonds in the sum of \$150,000 in the city's first program for improvement and expansion.

The City Commission, with Mayor R. L. Brown and Commissioners Earl Ladd and W. M. Pool, Jr., present at a special session passed the order unanimously for calling the election.

Briefly, the proposal is to issue bonds as follows:

Issuance of revenue bonds in the sum of \$100,000 to be used to retire a previous bond issue of \$150,000 which bears 4 per cent interest; and to provide \$10,000 for extension and improvement of the city's water system and city sanitary sewer system;

Issuance of bonds in the sum of \$25,000 for the erection of a city auditorium;

And issuance of bonds in the sum of \$25,000 for paying the city's pro rata part in a planned city street improvement program.

Lower Interest Rate

Members of the city commission said they have sold the bonds providing they are issued at a very low interest rate as follows:

First 5 years, 2 1-4 per cent.

Second 5 years, 2 1-2 per cent.

Balance of term, 15 years, at 3 per cent.

On the \$15,000 in bonds which are to be retired the city will save a tiny sum in interest charges.

No Increase in Taxes

There will be no increase in city of Muleshoe taxes to be paid by the

tax payer, members of the city government said.

The larger amount, \$100,000 of the proposed bonds would be revenue bonds. No mortgage will be given against the city's water and sewer systems. The bond purchasers will merely have a lien against the revenues thereof. Principal and interest will be paid in yearly installments from said revenues.

In the second place, while bonds to build a proposed city auditorium and to improve city streets will be repaid from taxes the city commission is certain that no increase in taxes or in city valuations will be necessary.

The city's financial condition is such that it may even be possible to lower the rate two years hence, it was said. As any rate it is known that even with the present amount of tax money being received there will be no need for more to meet bond payments, and it is pointed out that new buildings going up and improvements to city property will cause an increase of total tax money collected, with the rate kept at its present figure.

The city commission feels that it is serving the best interests of the city and each of its property owners and citizens, by calling for this bond election now, while the money market is so favorable. There will not be another time when so low an interest rate can be obtained.

And they feel that every improvement that will be carried out if these bonds are voted, is vitally needed by the city and is in demand by its citizens.

At present, for instance, there is not a suitable place where the community may hold its public gatherings. Churches, schools, the court house—any sizeable room have been used by various groups and organizations.

Extension and improvements in the city's water and sewer system is imperative, they feel. The town is growing rapidly and these facilities must now be extended to take in new territory where homes will be built. Some repairs and improvements to both systems are also required, they said.

Street improvement would seem to be one of the projects all can agree is necessary.

Sidelights From Washington

Hearings by the Joint House and Senate Committee on the Pearl Harbor disaster is in full swing. It is doubtful that the whole truth of this tragedy will ever be known. The effectiveness of the hearing is being jeopardized by the partisan wrangling of certain members of the committee.

The people are entitled to know all the facts about Pearl Harbor, but they will not have time and opportunity to read the voluminous testimony now being taken. Yet, the press and radio are doing their best to cover the hearings and make pertinent information available to the public.

I dropped in on the hearings to listen briefly to some of the testimony of Admiral Richardson. There were 100 newspaper and radio and reporters in attendance, and three motion picture cameras were in operation.

The banner cotton crop year for the twenty-five counties of the 19th Congressional District was 1937, when we produced more than one million bales. As of November 1st of this year, our district had harvested 77,000 bales, which is 10,000 bales less than was harvested by the same date in the poor crop year of 1934.

The appointment of Admiral Nimitz may not promote the cause of unification of the Armed Forces. He has declared himself in opposition to the plan, and some of his statements in regard to the

victory in the Pacific have rankled Army officials who are sponsoring the proposal.

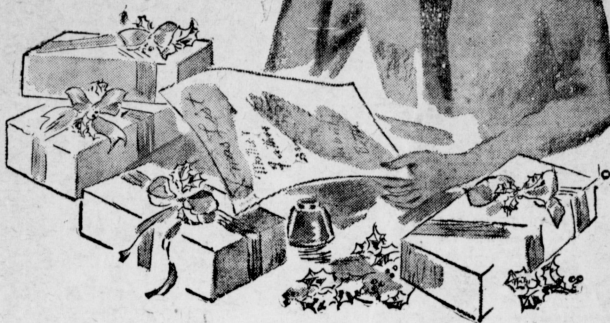

Dorothy Crow, War Worker, Here For Visit

Dorothy (Schuster) Crow arrived this week for a short visit in Muleshoe with relatives and friends after a long stay from home in war work.

Dorothy has been employed with the Post Ordnance Property, Fort Sam Houston, San Antonio, since December 15, 1942. Her work has demanded close attention and con-

stant attendance. For several years she has had charge of the Memorandum Receipt Section, which is loaning out the major items to various organizations on the Post. At present she has around 60 accounts, each with responsible officers and enlisted men. These organizations draw vehicles, weapons, and tools mostly. All these items must have proper authorizations, and basis before issuing.

At an inventory, about a month and a half ago the vehicles alone totaled over 1500. Such reports are handed in to the commanding of the Post and sent to Hq 8th Service Command in Dallas. Listing of

shipping orders, telegrams and teletype from the 8th Service Command were kept on file in her section and under her responsibility, and at the same time a list of all officers on the Post is kept in the Memorandum Receipt Section and each officer leaving the Post for a permanent new station must have a clearance of property.

For several months now Dorothy has had charge also of processing of Tactical Units in Ordnance material leaving for overseas duty. Her job was to make up the authorized allowances to be sent to the 8th Service Command, Washington, D. C., the port of embarkation, and to the unit to carry overseas for each organization of weapons (machine guns and small arms), ammunition, tools, cleaning and preserving materials and vehicles with spare parts.

After this listing, called Form 413, is made and processed through the unit to check material on hand, the list is then run through available warehouses, and remaining unfilled items are re-ordered and requisitioned on special POM or-

ders. Telephone leased lines all over the country, teletypes and telegram conveniences were at her disposal for such rush orders. Secret orders and troop movements and other confidential matters were also under her responsibility.

Pt. Sam Houston, she said, has turned out some of the biggest and best units overseas. Of course, all the units were not processed while Dorothy had the department, but the 2nd, 88th, and 95th Divisions,

most of the Railway Battalions in France, the 3rd, 6th, 8th, 9th, 10th and 15th Armies are some of the organizations coming from Fort Sam Houston.

Dorothy says that upon returning to San Antonio this week she is leaving her indefinite war job for a raise in pay and a permanent position with the Provost Marshal General's School, the only M. P. training school in the U. S. She

will be in the Hq Supply and thinks she will like her work very much.

Dorothy Crow is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. E. Schuster (wid. married) Staff Sgt. Wm. L. Crow, who is in China, with the Hq. Fighters Group of the 14th Air Force. She is expecting him home from overseas in December, in time for Christmas. She says in her own mind the Chinese have had him long enough.

FEEDING THE MILKING HERD

Cotton seed meal, being one of our scarcest feeds, should be fed according to recommendations of

our leading dairy specialist. It is still good business for the farmer to produce cream to the maximum ability of his milk cows while cream prices are high, but excessive feeding of cotton seed meal will defeat this purpose. Continued feeding of the same amount of cotton seed meal in the ration after wheat pasture has been turned on good wheat pasture is a common mistake made by some panhandle dairymen.

100 pounds of cotton seed meal to 1000 pounds of grain to be fed during the milking period at the rate of one pound of the mixture for each three pounds of milk produced by the cow, for cows on good wheat pasture and roughage

is recommended by G. G. Gibson, Extension Dairy Husbandman.

When cows have no green pasture and low grade roughage such as punny stalks from grain sorghum harvest is the only other feed Mr. Gibson recommends 500 pounds of cotton seed meal to each 1000 pounds of grain fed at the rate of one pound of the mixture to each 3 pounds of milk produced by each cow.

Minerals may be mixed in the above rations at the rate of two pounds of calcium, one pound of salt and one pound of bone meal to reach 100 pounds of mixture, but recent tests show that cows obtain their needed minerals at a more accurate rate when a tough

is placed under the shed and three compartments are provided and kept supplied one with granular salt, one with calcium carbonate and one with bone meal 365 days out of the year.

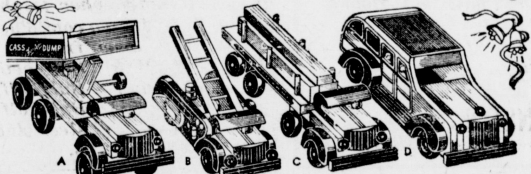

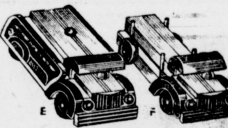

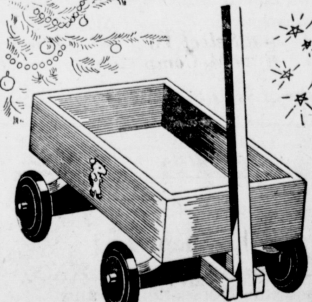

The resolution and order follows: WHEREAS, it is considered to be to the best interests of the City that the bonds of said City shall be issued for the purposes hereinafter stated, and that there is a necessity for the issuance of said bonds; therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF MULESHOE, TEXAS:

That an election be held on the 15th day of December, 1945, and which is not less than fifteen (15) days nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of this RESOLUTION AND ORDER, at which election the following propositions shall be submitted to the resident qualified electors who own taxable property in said City and who have duly rendered same for taxation, for their action thereupon:

"SHALL the Board of Commissioners of the City of Muleshoe, Texas, be authorized to issue the general obligation tax bonds of said City in the principal sum of TWENTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$25,000.00), maturing serially over a period of years not to exceed thirty (30) years from the date thereof bearing interest at the maximum rate of THREE PER CENTUM (3%) per annum, for the purpose of constructing a municipal auditorium in and for said City and to provide for the payment of principal of and interest on said bonds by levying a tax sufficient to pay the annual interest and to create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem said bonds as they become due?"

II
In no event shall the issuance of bonds for one of the aforesaid propositions or purposes be dependent upon the authorization or issuance of bonds for any of the

other propositions or purposes, it being the intent hereof to provide for the creation of three (3) bond debts, each separate and independent of the other.

III
In event the said revenue bonds are authorized to be issued by a majority vote of the qualified electors of said city, voting in said election and the same are issued and sold, the holder or holders of such revenue bonds shall never have the right to demand payment thereof out of any funds raised or to be raised by taxation; and each bond issued or executed in pursuance of such election, shall contain this clause:
"The holder hereof shall never have the right to demand payment of this obligation out of any funds raised or to be raised by taxation."

IV
Said election shall be held at the CITY HALL, the City of Muleshoe, Texas, and the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of the election, to-wit: J. L. Alsop, Presiding Judge, Mrs. Walter Witte, Judge, Rufus Gilbreath Clerk and T. C. Young, Clerk.

That said election shall be held under the provisions of and in accordance with the laws governing the issuance of municipal bonds in cities as provided in the General Laws of the State of Texas; and only qualified electors who own taxable property in the City, and who have rendered the same for taxation, shall be qualified to vote.

VI
That the ballots of said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:

OFFICIAL BALLOT
"For the issuance of water and Sewer System Revenue Bonds and encumbering the City's combined water and sewer system, or the revenues thereof, or both, for the payment of same."

"Against the issuance of Water and Sewer System Revenue Bonds and encumbering the City's combined water and sewer system, or the revenues thereof, or both, for the payment of same."

"For the issuance of Street Improvement Bonds and the levy of a tax in payment thereof."

"Against the issuance of Street Improvement Bonds and the levy of a tax in payment thereof."

"For the issuance of Municipal Auditorium Bonds and the levy of a tax in payment thereof."

"Against the issuance of Municipal Auditorium Bonds and the levy of a tax in payment thereof."

As to each of the foregoing propositions, each voter shall mark with black ink or black pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his or her vote on the three propositions respectively.

VII
That a copy of this resolution and

order, signed by the Mayor of said City and attested by the City Clerk, shall serve as a proper notice of said election.

VIII
That said notice of said election shall be given by posting and publication of a copy of this resolution and order at the top of which shall appear the words, "NOTICE OF ELECTION FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS." Said notice shall be posted at the CITY HALL, the election precinct, herein designated, and at two other public places in said City, not less than fourteen (14) days prior to the date on which said election is to be held, and be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in The Muleshoe Journal, a newspaper of general circulation in the City of Muleshoe, the first of said publications to be made not less than fourteen (14) days prior to the date set for said election.
