## Muleshoe FFA Members Now Have \$4,333.90 Invested In Livestock

In classes in Vocational Agriculture in Muleshoe high school, instruction is derived from and is geared to the farming activities of this region.

As a part of each year of study, each vocational pupil undertakes the production and management of crop and livestock enterprises as an essential in learning the necessary skills and technical knowledge required in modern agriculture. They learn to do by doing; the work that needs to be done on the farm becomes a part of the supervised learning practice.

The 56 students enrolled in agriculture this year have made very excellent progress with their farming programs. These boys have invested in livestock \$4,333.90 at the present time, according to Edward White, instructor.

The following is an itemized account of the livestock, kinds and number of head for the school year 1944-45:

Calves for beef, 11 sold, 12 on hand; Cows for calf production, 2 sold, 21 on hand; Cows for milk production, 2 sold 14 on hand; Bulls—2 sold, 2 on hand.

Sows for pig production, 5 sold, 5 on hand; Bred gilts, 3 on hand; Boars, 10 on hand; Fat hogs and feeders, 24 sold, 10 on hand.

Hens for eggs, 255 on hand; Fryers and pullets 300 sold, 350 on hand.

## Gov't Acts To Increase Feeding Of Beef Cattle

College Station.—The U. S. Government has announced action to increase feeding of beef cattle with the objective of encouraging maximum slaughter of cattle and hogs, and improving the distribution of meat. But a statement by the War Food Administration quotes Director Fred M. Vinson of the Office of War Mobilization and Reconstruction that consumers should not expect immediate increase in meat supplies as a result of the program.

To encourage feeding, Director Vinson announced there would be no downward revision in the per cent riding ceiling, plus a 10 per cent maximum of the stabilization ranges of beef cattle except bulls, without at least six months notice to producers. Effective after May 19, Commodity Credit Corporation instituted payment to the seller of 50 cents a hundred on AA and A grade cattle sold for slaughter (sold for \$14.25 or more per hundred, Chicago basis) weighing 800 pounds or more, which have been owned by the seller for more than 30 days.

The statement said that the Defense Supplies Corporation would increase the pork subsidy payment 40 cents per live hundredweight, beginning April 1. The total pork subsidy now effective is \$1.70 per live hundredweight, as compared with the previous rate of \$1.70.

Subsidy payments on all grades of cattle are increased by the Defense Supplies Corporation 25 cents per live hundredweight. But the subsidy payments are subject to the withdrawal of four cents of the subsidy for each five cents decline in the average drove costs, from the maximum to the minimum of the stabilization range, with a minimum subsidy payment of 25 cents per hundredweight.

It was announced at headquarters of the Division commander, Major Gen. George W. Griner.

Veteran combat teams of the "The Tokyo Express" Division landed on the strategic Ryukyuan stronghold on April 9 and quickly moved to the front lines where they are blasting stiff Jap resistance.

Pvt. Stevenson is seeing action against the enemy with the 27th's Appleknocker regiment.

The 19 year old Texas soldier entered the service in August, 1944, and has served three months overseas.

Mrs. Stevenson and their baby, Joe Bob, live in Muleshoe.

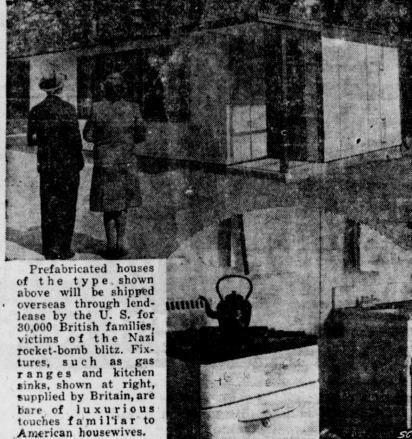

Collice Station, June 13.—The U. S. secretary of agriculture has amended the pink bollworm quarantine effective May 23, to add 15 Texas counties and parts of two others not heretofore under quarantine, to the lightly infested area. The counties are Bailey, Borden, Coe, Ryan, Coleman, Goliad, McCulloch, Nolan, Fannin, San Saba, Scurry, Taylor and Victoria, and parts of Coke and Jackson.

According to information from the Agricultural Research Administration of the U. S. Department of Agriculture received by the A. and M. College Extension Service, the action was taken because of the discovery of additional infestations.

The pink bollworm quarantine regulates the movement of okra, cotton, and wild cotton, including the plants and all parts of plants from parts of Texas, Arizona, Louisiana, and New Mexico. All forms of manufactured cotton fiber, cottonseed, lint, linters, seed cotton, cottonseed hulls, cake and meal, along with bagging, containers, and wrappers of cotton and cotton products or any commodities fouled with such products also come under the quarantine regulations.

The area now under regulation comprises 78 Texas counties in the central and western part of the state, the Lower Rio Grande Valley and Coastal Bend area; southern and south central New Mexico and Arizona, and two parishes in southwest Louisiana.

### PAPERS TO SOLDIERS IN ETO DISCONTINUED FOR A TIME

Due to the fact that the stay of nearly all soldiers in the European Theatre of Operations is of uncertain duration, The Journal is discontinuing papers to soldiers there for the time being. When permanent addresses are furnished the subscriptions will be resumed and no paper for time will be lost.

But where a New York APO has been recently assigned and it appears the soldier will be in the U. S. Army of Occupation, the paper will be mailed to the soldier as usual.

The Navy has announced that no papers will be accepted for overseas mailing after July 1, unless a written request has been filed by the addressee for same. Therefore, all Navy men are urged to write such a request to this paper, if they are now subscribers.

Papers will be furnished if you desire to send one to your soldier who is a subscriber and about whose address there is an uncertainty, by first class mail. From 6 to ten weeks would be required to send papers by first class mail, and by the 11th soldier might be back in the U. S. or moved to another theater, and the paper would clutter up the mail.

## Cole Awarded Purple Heart

With The 37th Infantry Division in the Philippines—Pvt. Lewis O. Cole, of Muleshoe, has been awarded the Purple Heart medal for wounds received in action during the liberation of Manila. Among the first fighting troops to enter the Philippine capital, Infantryman Cole is the son of Mrs. Laura E. Cole, Muleshoe.

A veteran of more than 20 months overseas service, Cole previously saw action as a jungle fighter on Bougainville in the Solomons, and has served on Guadalcanal and on New Caledonia.

In addition to the Purple Heart, he wears the Distinguished Unit Badge, as a member of an infantry company cited by the President for outstanding performance in combat, the Combat Infantryman Badge for exemplary service in action, and the Asiatic-Pacific Theater ribbon with two Battle Stars.

### Pfc. Jennings Back From Overseas Duty

No further details were given and his family are merely hoping and praying that some mistake has been made. It is a slim hope, but they cling to it.

Young Border was reared in Muleshoe. He graduated from the high school here with the class of 1937. He was 26, and in civil life managed a grocery in Los Angeles.

He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Border, who formerly operated Border's Grocery here, now live in Los Angeles.

In September, 1938, he was married to Miss Phyllis Payne, who survives him. The couple have two small sons, Glenn 5 and Johnny 3. Mrs. Border and the boys have been here in the home of her mother, Mrs. Chet Layne.

Other survivors include two brothers, both in training at Camp Roberts, Calif., and a sister, who lives in Los Angeles.

Mrs. Border and the two children left today Thursday, to be with his family at Los Angeles.

Pfc. Border entered the service in August, 1944, and first trained at Camp Roberts. He was serving in the 96th Division, 10th Army. This was said to have been his first battle experience.

## Santa Fe Faces Record Grain Car Shortage

Chicago, June 11.—"With a bumper wheat crop coming to harvest, we are facing the darkest respect for box cars in which to move this last year's crop."

J. J. Mahoney, superintendent of transportation for the Santa Fe railway, reported today.

"For the first time in my years with the Santa Fe," Mahoney went on, "we do not have a backlog of empty cars stored in the wheat belt. For years, the Western roads have stored from 20,000 to 30,000 cars to handle this annual grain movement."

"Today, we are using every car we can lay our hands on and we still are moving last year's crop."

Despite unfavorable weather conditions, estimates for the 945 crop indicate that it will match last year's bumper yield. With an improvement in growing conditions, he crop could reach record breaking proportions.

Expedients the Santa Fe is using to meet the critical wheat car shortage were outlined by Mahoney. These include the use of gondolas, stock and refrigerator cars. Two hundred gondolas are being fitted with steel roofs and will be used in shuttle service between Southwestern terminals and Gulf ports. Between 600 and 1000 other open topped gondolas will be assigned in the wheat belt for short hauls between country elevators and terminals.

Tests of the gondolas in handling wheat have shown they carry grain with light losses and have the advantage of saving time and labor for loading and unloading. The stock cars are being slatted and lined with paper so they serve in much the same manner as a box car.

"We are going to do everything possible," Mahoney said, "to get the 1945 wheat crop under cover and avoid the spoilage of foodstuffs. If we could obtain the customary supply of empty cars from our neighboring roads it would be of untold benefit in this crisis, but other war jobs have to be done and it doesn't appear that we will get much help this year."

**A JOINT RESOLUTION**

PROPOSING an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing for a Supreme Court of nine members; prescribing their qualifications; and providing for their election, tenure of office and compensation.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS**

SECTION 1. That Section 2 of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereinafter to read as follows:

"ARTICLE 5. SEC. 2. The Supreme Court shall consist of a Chief Justice and eight Associate Justices, any five of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of five shall be necessary to a decision of a case; provided, that when the business of the court may require, the court may sit in sections as designated by the court to hear argument of causes and to consider applications for writs of error or other preliminary matters. No person shall be eligible to the office of Chief Justice or Associate Justice of the supreme court unless he be, at the time of his election, a citizen of the United States and of this state, and unless he shall have attained the age of thirty-five years, and shall have been a practicing lawyer or a lawyer and judge of a court of record together at least ten years. Said Justices shall be elected (three of them each two years) by the qualified voters of the state at a general election; shall hold their offices six years, or until their successors are elected and qualified; and shall each receive such compensation as shall be provided by law. In case of a vacancy in the office of any Justice of the Supreme Court, the Governor shall fill the vacancy until the next general election for state officers, and at such general election the vacancy for the unexpired term shall be filled by election by the qualified voters of the state. The Justices of the Supreme Court who may be in office at the time this amendment takes effect shall continue in office until the expiration of their terms of office under the present Constitution, and until their successors are elected and qualified. The Judges of the Commission of Appeals who may be in office at the time this amendment takes effect shall become Associate Justices of the Supreme Court and each shall continue in office as such Associate Justice of the Supreme Court until January 1st next preceding the expiration of the term to which he has been appointed and until his successor shall be elected and qualified."

SEC. 2. Said proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote on the qualified electors of this state at a special election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in August, 1945, at which election each voter opposing said proposed amendment shall scratch off the ballot with a pen or pencil the following words printed on said ballot:

"FOR the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members", and each voter favoring said proposed amendment shall scratch off the ballot in the same manner the following words printed on said ballot:

"AGAINST the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

SEC. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and said election held as provided by the Constitution and laws of this state.

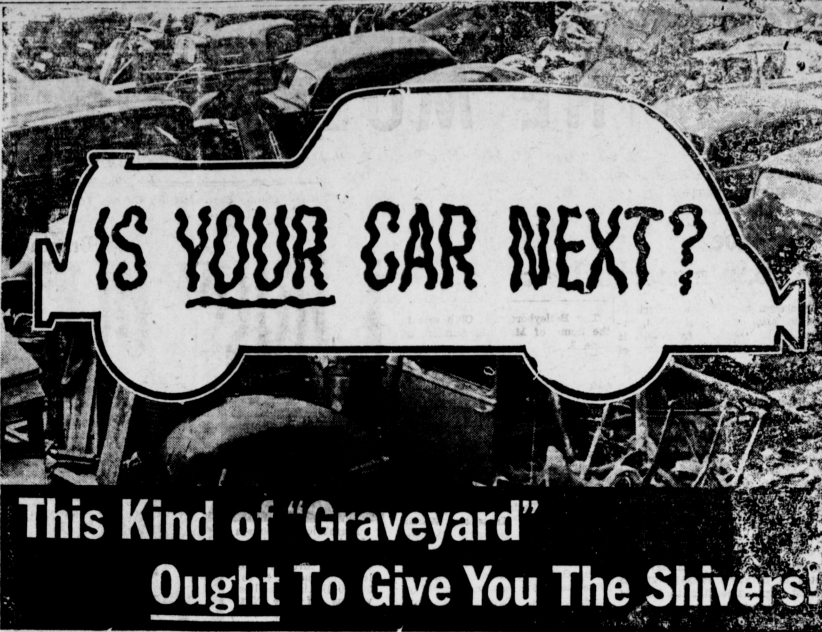

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE STATE OF TEXAS SECTION 1. That Section 24 of

Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"SECTION 24. Members of the Legislature shall receive from the public Treasury a per diem of Ten Dollars (\$10) per day during their tenure of office. In addition to the per diem the members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for each twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel by land, regardless of railways or water routes; and the Comptroller of the State shall prepare and preserve a table of distances to each county seat, now or hereafter to be established; and by such table the mileage of each member shall be paid; but no member shall be entitled to mileage for any extra session that may be called within one day after the adjournment of any regular or called session."

SEC. 2. The foregoing Constitu-

tional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the state on the fourth Saturday in August, A. D. 1945, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for continuous salary per diem of all members of the Legislature during their tenure of office" and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for continuous salary per diem of all members of the Legislature during their tenure of office."

EACH voter shall mark out one

of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment.

SEC. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

SEC. 4. The provisions of this Constitutional Amendment shall be self-enacting and if a majority of votes at said election shall be cast for same the Governor shall, within thirty (30) days after said election issue a proclamation declaring this Amendment to be a part of the Constitution of Texas.

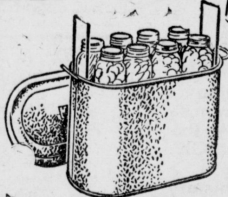

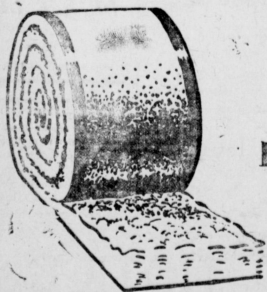

regular Army, Navy, or Marine Corps of the United States shall not be permitted to vote; providing that other members of the armed forces shall be entitled to vote under certain conditions; providing the form of the ballot for the voting on said proposed amendment; fixing the time for holding an election; directing the Governor to issue the necessary proclamations; and making an appropriation.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE  
LEGISLATURE OF THE  
STATE OF TEXAS**

**SECTION 1.** There shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas the matter of amending Article VI of the Constitution of Texas, by adding thereto a new section which will modify the present restrictions concerning voting. This new section shall be inserted between Section 2 and Section 3 of said Article VI and shall be known as Section 2a, and shall read as follows:

**SECTION 2a.** Nothing in this Constitution shall be construed to require any person, who at the time of the holding of an election hereinafter referred to, or who, within eighteen months immediately prior to the time of the holding of any such election, was a member of the armed forces of the United States or of the Armed Force Reserve of the United States, or of any branch or component part of such armed forces or Armed Force Reserve, or the United States Maritime Service or the United States Merchant Marine and who is otherwise a qualified voter under the laws and Constitution of this state, to pay a poll tax or to hold a receipt for any poll tax assessed against him, as a condition precedent to his right to vote in any election held under the authority of the laws of this state during the time the United States is engaged in fighting a war, or within one year after the close of the calendar year in which said war is terminated.

**"PROVIDED,** however, that the foregoing provisions of this section do not confer the right to vote upon any person who is a member of the regular establishment of the United States Army, Navy or Marine Corps; and provided further that all persons in the armed forces of the United States, or the component branches thereof, not members of the regular establishment of the United States Army, Navy or Marine Corps, are hereby declared not to be disqualified from voting by reason of any provision of subsection "Fifth" of Section 1, of this Article."

**SEC. 2** The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state on August 28, 1944, at which election all voters

favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following:

**"FOR** the amendment to Article VI of the Constitution of Texas providing that any person in the armed forces of the United States, or the Armed Force Reserve of the United States, or of any branch or component part thereof, or of the United States Maritime Service or the United States Merchant Marine, or who has been a member of same within eighteen months prior to the holding of any election in this state authorized by law, and is otherwise a qualified voter, shall not be required to pay, or to hold a receipt for the payment of, a poll tax in order to vote at any such election, if same is held while the United States is at war or within a certain stated time thereafter."

**THOSE OPPOSED** to such amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the following:

**"AGAINST** the amendment to Article VI of the Constitution of Texas, providing that any person in the armed forces of the United States, or the Armed Force Reserve of the United States, or of any branch or component part thereof or of the United States Maritime Service, or the United States Merchant Marine or who has been a member of same within eighteen months prior to the holding of any election in this state authorized by

law, and is otherwise a qualified voter, shall not be required to pay or to hold a receipt for the payment of, a poll tax in order to vote at any such election, if same is held while the United States is at war or within a certain stated time thereafter."

**SEC. 3.** The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamations relating to the publication of the foregoing Resolution, in the various counties of the state, and shall cause the same to be published as required by the statutes and the Constitution in connection with the submission of proposed amendments to the Constitution, to the people for their action at a statewide election. If it shall appear from the returns of the election at which the foregoing amendment to the Constitution is voted upon that a majority of the qualified voters have voted for said amendment, same shall then become a part of the Constitution of Texas.

**SEC. 4.** There is hereby appropriated out of the General Fund of the State of Texas, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00) or so much thereof as may be necessary to pay the expenses of circulating said Resolution in each county in the state and for such other purposes as may be necessary, or required by law, or by the Constitution.

### HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas amending Sections 51a, 51b, 51c and 51d of Article III so that the same shall consist of one section to be known as Section 51a, providing that the Legislature shall have the power to provide assistance to and provide for the payment of same to actual

bona fide citizens of Texas who are needy aged persons over the age of sixty-five (65) years, needy blind persons over the age of twenty-one (21) years and needy children under the age of sixteen (16) years; providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States for such assistance providing that the payments of such assistance from State funds shall never exceed either the payments from Federal funds or a total of more than Thirty-five Million Dollars (\$35,000,000) per year; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication, and making an appropriation to defray the necessary expenses of proclamation, publication, and holding the election.

### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS

Section 1. That Sections 51a, 51b, 51c, and 51d of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended and the same are hereby amended so that the same shall hereafter consist of one section to be numbered 51a, which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 51a. The Legislature shall have the power, by general laws to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be provided by the Legislature to be deemed expedient for assistance to, and for the payment of assistance to, (1) Needy persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application; provided that the maximum payment per month from State funds shall not be more than Twenty Dollars (\$20) per month.

"(2) Needy blind persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are over the age of twenty-one (21) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

"(3) Needy children who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are under the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid on account of any child over one (1) year who has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Federal Government of the United States such financial aid for the assistance of the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children as such Government may offer not inconsistent with restrictions herein set forth; provided however that the amount of such assistance out of State Funds to each person assisted shall never exceed the amount so expended out of Federal funds; and provided further that the total amount of money to be expended out of State Funds for such assistance to the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children shall never exceed the sum of Thirty-five Million Dollars (\$35,000,000) per year."

Should the Legislature enact enabling laws and provide an additional appropriation hereto in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be invalid by reason of their anticipatory character.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of Texas at a special election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the 25th day of August, 1945, at which election there shall be printed on each ballot the following clause:

Legislature the power to set up a system of payments to needy children under sixteen (16) years of age; providing for the expenditure of funds from the Federal Government, limiting the total amount which may be expended for such assistance out of State Funds; and providing conditions as to residence within the State in order to become eligible to receive assistance."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and held as required by the Constitution and Laws of the State

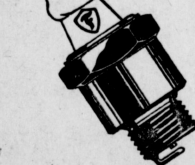

**PRESERVING FOOD AT HOME NEEDS CAREFUL PLANS AND FORETHOUGHT**

Every household should have a definite plan of activity these days in stocking the pantry shelves with home canned and preserved foods for the winter months, and this plan will not only include that of planning with a plan, but preserving with a purpose, says Miss Grace L. Patterson, County Home Demonstration Agent.

Begin, Miss Patterson suggests, by estimating the amount of fruits, vegetables and meats your family will need. Then set that number as your canning goal. A good guide to use in estimating this amount is to consider that about half the necessary consumption of food for your family during the year will be fresh and the other half processed.

If fresh foods are available for as much as three-fourths of the year, half the amounts suggested will be sufficient. If the season is shorter, say one fourth of the year, you must take one and one half times the suggested amounts. Children under ten years of age require about half the suggested amounts.

Here is the suggested plan: Each individual in the family requires 22 quarts of green and yellow vegetables, such as beans, okra, and squash, and 22 quarts of tomatoes or citrus fruits. Also include for each member of the family 22 quarts of other fruit, 5 quarts of pickles or relishes, and 7 pints of preserves and jellies. In meats, allow 88 pounds of meat for each person. Usually half this amount is canned, and is equivalent to about 20 quarts of canned meat or chicken.

It is well to remember, also that food may be preserved in other ways. In dried food, one fourth lb. is equivalent to one quart of food canned. 2 pounds frozen equals one quart canned and 4 pounds stored, or 2 quarts brined are equivalent to one quart canned.

Take into consideration also the likes and dislikes of your family, for example, if tomato juice is a favorite in your household, make

your goal high for that product. Strive for variety and avoid overstocking in some fruits and vegetables.

**Mahon Reports On Washington**

Predictions here as to the end of the war in the Pacific range from thirty days to three years, but several factors make the date of final victory wholly unpredictable. It is certain that Japan will be subjected to bombing of unheard of intensity and devastation, far exceeding the bombings of Germany. Leticia would dictate an early surrender by Japan if she is to save some of her cities and industries, but the Japs do not operate on the basis of logic.

Our Army at the peak of the two front war was 8,300,000. When Germany out of the war, the question is often asked, "Why do we need a seven million man Army to defeat Japan?" We probably don't, but the War Department is unwilling to take chances. The War Department claims that the larger Army will admit of more effective rotation policies, more frequent relief for combat soldiers. Gen. Marshall himself is credited with saying that will lose fewer lives with a seven million man Army than with a

smaller Army. The Japanese Army is reported to be about four... and one half million.

Clint Anderson, who is resigning from Congress to become Secretary of Agriculture has considerable first hand knowledge of our West Texas farm problems. He has traveled across our Congressional District many times enroute from his home in New Mexico to the East, visiting in Lubbock a number of times.

Freight rate equalization which we have fought for in the South and West for years is partly realized as a result of recent decisions by the Interstate Commerce Commission. Our Southwestern producers and consumers will profit by the decision. Also, in the post war period industry will have the greatest incentive in our history to develop in the Southwest.

The War Department Subcommittee, of which I am a member, is now holding extensive hearings on Army requirements for the coming fiscal year. Gen. Marshall and Gen. Arnold have reported in detail as to our war program. The hearings are scheduled for completion in May, scheduled for completion by June 15.

Of interest to Texans is the fact that the huge appropriation con-

templated for the continued construction of the big B-32 now being manufactured in Fort Worth will be greatly curtailed. The B-29 and B-32 were the twin big bomber hopes of the AAF, but the B-29 turned out so well that the other will be sidetracked as second best.

I recently accompanied the crew of a B-29 on a test flight. It is a delightful experience to fly in this huge plane over friendly territory. But despite its graceful beauty, the Japs have found that in the hands of a courageous American crew it is the deadliest weapon in the history of warfare.

It is reported that Gen. Ike Eisenhower will visit Washington this month and address a joint session of Congress. I think the able and his appearance is greeted with the same outburst of applause as was received by the young Infantry sergeant, at a similar session some time ago, was given the Congressional Medal of Honor.

*Just Between Us*  
FOR the busy woman who likes to save tasty, unusual food, but has neither the time nor the inclination to spend hours "over a hot stove," the casserole, little known though it is, is a heaven-sent boon.  
Meat, fish or cheese goes right into the casserole with the vegetables and seasoning. You pop it all into the oven and just forget about it until it's ready to be put on the table. Add a salad and a beverage and, presto, you've a tasty, hearty meal. The casserole itself makes an attractive centerpiece and, incidentally, there's no pot-washing afterward.  
To cook anything from a New England boiled dinner to chicken sauciere or shrimp and oyster pie, all you need do is get yourself one deep casserole and one shallow one (about the size of a large frying pan) with a long handle—individual casseroles are a nice touch but not strictly necessary. Then choose one of the splendid recipe books evolved to this special type of cooking, follow the simple directions carefully and watch your culinary reputation blossom as family and tests sample even your first casserole experiments.  
Here, for example, is a wonderful fish for a bridge luncheon or Sunday night supper. It was passed on to me by Ingene Wolcott whom you've probably heard on her MIS program, "What's Your Idea?"  
To serve four — ingredients: 4 large, firm tomatoes, 4 eggs, one tablespoon grated cheese, ¼ teaspoon basil, ¼ teaspoon thyme, salt and pepper. Directions: Pop tomatoes into boiling water for a minute so that skin is easily peeled. Cut out a hollow center in each tomato and fill with a whole raw egg. Sprinkle top with cheese and seasoning and place in low buttered casserole. Bake 20 minutes in 350 oven and serve hot. — NORMA

**TOOLS ALREADY ON FARMS VALUABLE IN CONTOURING**

CHICAGO, ILL.—End of the war will find farmers with another kind of savings besides cash, which will prove helpful in the nation's long-time program of community and prosperity building. This is the "farm bank" of soil saving; the "compound interest" accumulated over several decades of soil and water conservation to save the rich top soil from washing and blowing away. So declared George L. Gillette, President of the Farm Equipment Institute here today.

"While soil building through contour farming, terracing and crop rotations in the United States goes back to Thomas Jefferson's work in Virginia well over a century ago," said Gillette, "comparatively little was done in an organized manner until the United States Department of Agriculture in the Twenties set up erosion-control experiment stations and instituted an intensive study of soil erosion."

From the very beginning of the conservation program, the farm equipment industry has cooperated with the United States Government helping the farmer solve his land problems, Gillette points out. Through personal effort, through advertisements, these companies and their representatives have made helpful suggestions to the farmer on how to improve soil fertility, increase water-holding capacity and prevent the loss of soils by erosion. Implement dealers also played a very substantial part in this program, explaining to the farmers how they might make terraces, build dams and do contour farming with the equipment already on their farms. The above picture is an example of contour farming.

"This backlog of knowledge gained by the American farmers in soil conservation over the past years has paid big dividends in World War II, and now with the ending of the European War," says Gillette, "the farmer is ready as never before to help build a prosperous community through his increased activity and accelerated interest in soil conservation."
