Dry Weather Notes

Dave Aylesworth, nurseryman—Johnson grass on a forty acre tract I own usually would sup 80 head of cattle for quite a while. This spring, no grazing, and no water, when it gets so dry that your Johnson grass withers and dies—It's gettin' dry."

Dave Coulter: "I irrigate all right but seems like it doesn't do good as it should. Nights have been too cool for good growing weather, and the wind and sand have not encouraged growing, either."

Old Timer, name not known:—"I saw it dry this way three years in succession on the Plains. That was in '16, '17 and '18 and I think it was broken by the snow and awful blizzard of late 1918, when so many cattle were lost."

What to plant in case rain does fall anytime soon engaged the attention of C. H. Long and B. M. Seales well known county farmers. Cotton is virtually ruled out of the picture by many if not most of Bailey County men, who consider it an extremely risky piece of business to plant cotton this late in the season, for they say it is only now and then a late planted field of cotton will do to "put a sack in."

Meantime, dry weather has not hampered for one minute the rapid growth of "white weeds" and other weeds, so that farmers have gone over ground as many as four times just to keep the weeds down.

Yes, as this is being written Monday, June 18, it is still dry on the Plains and every inhabitant, no matter how he makes a living, has to do at least a little head shaking about it. But perhaps it won't be quite as rough as one long time resident had it: "I have seen it run along this bad for quite some time—and then get worse," he declared in all solemnity.

Fats and Oils Badly Needed

Active participation of every woman in Bailey County in the used fats campaign is needed now to help deliver the knockout blow to the Japs. E. C. Munro, Amarillo, acting district representative of the WFA announced this week.

Natural reserves of oil and fats are lower than at any time in two years, while the demand for munitions, military medicines, opiates to ease pain, sulfa ointments and many other military items are at an all time high and will get still higher as more soldiers are assigned to the Pacific. Increased civilian needs make the situation more serious, he added.

"Every drop of fat that can be scraped from the bottom of frying, roasting and broiling pans, every teaspoonful lifted from the top of soups or from melted down fats are needed to help off-set a national deficit," Munro emphasized.

This year's goal for used kitchen fats is 250,000,000 pounds. In many instances collections have dropped in some towns and cities because of meat shortages. To off-set this decrease and go over the top this year, more used fats must come from towns and rural areas where families do their own butchering and have access to more meats.

Way To Stretch Sugar Given By Miss Patterson

Stretching the sugar ration is one of the big problems of the homemaker these days. A Florida Experiment Station scientist recommends making invert sugar to make it go farther, according to Grace L. Patterson, Bailey County home demonstration agent.

To make invert sugar, mix 2 cups sugar and one cup water. Add 1-4 teaspoon of tartaric acid (which you can get at any drug store).

Cover this sugar, water and tartaric acid mixture and simmer lightly for 30 minutes. Allow it to cool. Then you have invert sugar syrup. Each cup is worth 1 3-4 times as sweet as the same weight in plain syrup.

This syrup is excellent for use in canning, but it should be diluted. Use 1-4 cup invert sugar to 1 cup water for a thin syrup. It is also good in sweetening fruits, cereals, ice cream and beverages.

The above information applies to freezing as well as to canning. Honey does not freeze as solidly and it thaws more quickly than sugar syrup or corn syrup. Therefore, it is not as satisfactory for freezing.

Corn syrup or corn sugar may be substituted for all or part of the sugar. One cup sugar and 2 cups of dices a desirable syrup. This is a corn syrup to 6 cups of water proportion. If corn syrup is to replace all of the sugar, use 1-2 to 3-4 cup syrup and 1 cup water.

Brown sugar and syrups that have strong flavor, such as sorghum are not desirable for canning. Honey may be used to replace a small part of the sugar. It affects the flavor of the fruit more than corn syrup. It is very good with fruit pies. It is also good with fruit pickles.

NEVER use saccharin in canning. Heat makes it bitter. If saccharin is used, it should be added at the time you serve the fruit. Consult a doctor before using it, cause too much saccharin may be harmful.

This is bound to be only a partial list of those who have called to see Mr. Brown who is probably acquainted personally with more people in Texas than anyone that could be named, outside of perhaps a few state or national office holders. There are few counties in this big state in which R. L. Brown does not have a personal friend.

The Journal knows it expresses the sentiments of all when it hopes for a speedy recovery for Mayor Brown and his early return home.

NAVY SAYS MAIL YOUR CHRISTMAS PACKAGES EARLY

Dallas—The Navy Department is encouraging the mailing of overseas gift packages throughout the year. Although the War Department advises that the mailing period for Christmas parcels to Army personnel will be the same as last year—September 15 to October 15—there is no rest letted mailing period for the personnel of the Navy, Marine or Coast Guard.

All Christmas parcels should, however, be mailed out not later than October 15 to afford some degree of probability of delivery prior to Christmas day.

Due to the distances—more than five million square miles have been won from the enemy since 1941—and the size and frequency of combat operations in the Far Pacific, no guarantee of delivery can be made.

Drive Officially Closes On June 30

With only eight days left in the 7th War Loan Drive, Bailey County is still short of its E Bond quota, according to announcement made here today.

At that time, we lacked the sum of \$22,586.25 having the total assigned us, and drive leaders are anxious to have the full quota sold before the end of the official campaign June 30th.

Bailey County's E Bond purchases to date total \$117,493.25.

This is against a quota total in this drive of \$140,000, so that we are \$22,586.25 shy of our goal.

People throughout the county are urged to do their contemplated buying of bonds right now, so that purchases may be counted on the 7th War Loan quota.

Bailey County is in position to reach the assigned quota—it all depends on the people whose actions in the next few days will determine whether our efforts will be crowned with victory.

This is our part in the struggle for Victory and Freedom. We can not afford to be found wanting.

SHOES: Book III, stamps one, two and three, with airplane pictures, each good for one pair shoes indefinitely. A new stamp will be validated August 1.

GASOLINE (Coupons must be endorsed on front): A coupons, 4 gallons each, No. 13 expiring June 21. No. 16 coupons become valid on June 22 and will be good for five gallons each. B-6, B-7, C-7 and C-8 rations have a value of 5 gallons each. B-2 and B-3, 5 gallons valid for bulk delivery only. T coupons designated "Second Quarter" good for 5 gallons thru June 21; D, one and one-half gallons; and E-2 and E-3 one gallon each.

READING & WRITING

BY Edwin Seaver AND Robin McKown

Robert E. Sherwood says that Norman Corwin is undoubtedly the finest radio writer in the United States. He has developed new techniques in the field of radio writing. His poems and dramas are written to be heard rather than to be read. Yet his two books, "Thirteen by Corwin" and "More by Corwin," read surprisingly well.

Maybe you heard his new one—"On a Note of Triumph"—broadcast over CBS on V-E Day. It began like this:
*So they've given up,
 They're finally done in, and the rat is dead in an alley back of the Wilhelmsstrasse,
 Take a bow, G. I.; take a bow, little guy,
 The Superman of tomorrow lies at the feet of you common men of this afternoon.*

*This is it, kid, this is The Day, all the way from Newburyport to Vladivostok.
 You had what it took and you gave it, and each of you has a bank of rainbow around your helmet.
 Seems like free men have done it again.*
 Schoolteachers in the future are going to have a hard job defining Corwin's radio entertainments, like "On a Note of Triumph." Here's how the publishers try to define it: "It is much easier to describe by telling what it isn't than what it is. It isn't an essay, an epic poem, a photo drama, a play, a novel, a short story, or a series of vignettes, yet it has the elements of each."

Britishers have no reluctance to making cracks about the famous English climate. J. Frank Dobie relates in "Texan in England." One of them told him about the stranger who came to England to enjoy the summer but overslept himself one morning and missed it. Another related the story about a country squire who, upon being introduced to the Persian ambassador in London, said, "They tell me that in your country you worship the sun." "So would you if you ever saw him," the Persian replied.

Mr. Dobie, who is an admirer of reticence, both English and American, also tells this story. A stage driver of New Mexico, noted for his taciturnity, took five passengers on a sight-seeing tour over the mountains. Among these was a woman who began by exclaiming over the scenery, soon proceeded to cautioning the driver at steep places, and in between, fired a barrage of questions that showed more ignorance than curiosity. At the end of the journey, the passengers got out, and a quiet man asked what the fare was. "Two and a half," the old rawhide replied. Each passenger paid, the woman coming last. She handed over a five dollar bill which the driver put in his pocket. "Where's my change?" she asked. "Ain't any." "But you told the other's fare was two and a half." "They didn't talk," was the answer.

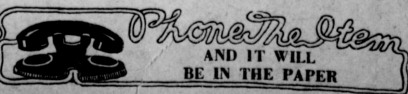

Washington Sidelights From

By Congressman George Mahon

Our Committee on Army appropriations, made up of five Democrats and three Republicans, is presenting to the House this week the thirty eight billion dollar Army Appropriation Bill. In my opinion, another bill of this size will not again be submitted to the Congress during this century—certainly not unless there should be a World War III, and the world need not and

must not permit a World War III. The sum of twelve billion dollars for pay of the Army is by far the largest item of the bill. The next largest item is for Airplanes and Air Corps equipment, with Ordnance, consisting of weapons, bombs, and ammunition ranking number three.

We plan to pass the bill in the House on Friday, June 22.

Our Committee expects to follow up on the expenditures as best we can, even to the extent of visiting war areas if we can find the time to do so. It is impossible for any human being to be familiar with every phase and detail of our far-flung and gigantic war program. A Congressman, like every one else these days, finds it impossible to do all the things that should be done.

My chief legislative assignment in Congress throughout the war has been on the Appropriations sub-Committee for the Army.

men will view each proposal with suspicion until it proves itself worthy — after extensive investigation, hundreds of thousands of dollars will be saved and much anguish will be spared in Texas alone. The Army Answers Your Questions

Q. Is it true that a soldier who has been awarded a Congressional Medal of Honor can be discharged from the service, regardless of the number of discharge points he has?

A. Yes. A soldier who has been awarded the Medal of Honor may, unless he is a Regular Army officer be discharged from the service on his own application.

Q. Our son always wanted to go to West Point, but was drafted before he could make arrangements. Could he be sent to West Point from the Army?

A. Yes. He may apply for preparatory training for an examination which will be given March 5, 1946 to select enlisted men to enter the Military Academy in the class beginning July 1, 1946.

Q. Do sailors get discharges on the point system as soldiers do?

A. The Navy has not put into effect any discharge plan similar to the Army's point system.

Q. If a sergeant went AWOL 4 days before his unit went overseas and he was reduced to the rank of private, will he get his rank back when he returns from overseas?

A. He will not assume his former rank when he returns from

overseas. However, his organization may promote him if he again demonstrates the qualities of leadership for which he was elevated in rank before.

Q. How long is an ex-service man permitted to wear his uniform following his discharge?

A. Until he arrives at his home. He may then wear the uniform for such military occasions as parades, ceremonies and veterans' meetings.

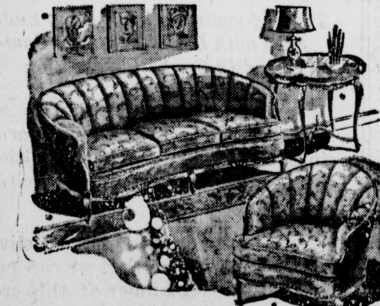

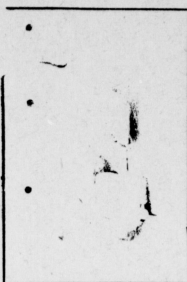

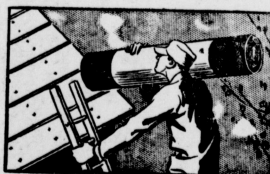
