Crop Insurance Deadline Apr 25

Bailey County farmers have until April 25 to place their 1945 crops of American Upland Cotton under protection of the all-risk Federal crop insurance program, states W. L. Key, chairman of the County AAA Committee.

Under the new insurance program, farmers will have a choice of two insurance contracts, one providing coverage up to 75 per cent of the average yield and the other up to 90 per cent. The insurance provides coverage against crop losses from drought, floods, hail, wind, frost, winter-kill, wildlife, hurricanes, insects plant diseases and other hazards determined by the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation to be unavoidable.

Contracts are now being written by county AAA committeemen and other authorized agents in the county, Key said. Contracts must be signed before the crop is planted and at least 50 applications must be signed before crop insurance becomes effective in the county.

The stage of the cotton crop's development will determine the maximum indemnity to be received in the event of loss, he said.

If a loss occurs after it is too late to replant cotton, but prior to the first cultivation, the indemnity will be 40 per cent of the maximum insured production. The land, of course, would be released for another crop.

Losses occurring after the first cultivation and before the end of harvest would be indemnified to the extent of 75 per cent of the maximum coverage. Indemnity for losses occurring after harvest but before delivery to the gin would be 100 per cent of the maximum coverage. Indemnities payable under the program may be used as collateral in securing government-encouraged commodity loans.

"Crop insurance is the only means of protecting crop investments from the immense hazards that go with crop growing," Key explained. "It offers assured reduction returns from planting delivery at the gin. It seems to me that most farmers who need returns from their cotton crops, need crop insurance."

Dear Mrs. Moeller:

Recently your husband, First Lieutenant Walter A. W. Moeller, was decorated with the Air Medal. It was an award made in recognition of courageous service to his combat organization, his fellow American airmen, his country, his home and to you.

He was cited for meritorious achievement while participating in aerial flights in the Southwest Pacific.

Your husband took part in sustained operational flight missions during which hostile contact was expected and encountered. These flights included bombing and strafing missions against enemy installations, shipping, and supply bases, and aided considerably in the recent successes in this theatre.

Almost every hour of every day your husband and the husbands of other American women, are doing just such things as that here in the Southwest Pacific.

There is a very real and very heroic contribution to victory and to peace.

I would like to tell you how genuinely proud I am to have men such as your husband in my command, and how gratified I am to know that young Americans with such courage and resourcefulness are fighting our country's battle against the aggressor nations.

You, Mrs. Moeller, have every reason to share that pride and gratification.

Bailey Ginnings Reach 26,450 Bales

Ginnings in Bailey County for the crop year of 1944 had reached a total of 26,450 bales of cotton for the 1944 crop year, according to report March 25 of Ginnings report, special agent of the Bureau of the Census.

P. C. Windsor, chairman of the Price Panel stated: "It is urgent that every retailer concerned with this new regulation be present at the meeting," he said. "For this will be the best opportunity to get any question concerning the new regulation answered."

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Clothing Pickup Here April 18

Muleshoe and Bailey County people are laying plans for participation in the United National Clothing Collection in the next few weeks. The collection, sponsored by the Muleshoe Lions Club locally. Purpose of the collection is to secure maximum quantity possible of good used clothing for free distribution to needy and destitute men, women and children in war-devastated countries.

Wednesday, April 18, in the afternoon is the time selected for collecting clothing here in Muleshoe, and dates and time for the work in other communities of the county are to be announced later.

The Lions Club appointed a committee, composed of Hoyt Morgan, Lee Pool, and Tye Young to make necessary arrangements. Committeemen said that if the people will place clothing they wish to give on the sidewalks in front of homes the bundles will be collected by trucks which will go along all residence streets.

What is needed is good substantial clothing for both winter and summer wear. Although clothing need not be in perfect repair, it must be useful to the people who will receive it. Underclothing and all types of cotton garments should be washed before they are donated, but need not be ironed.

All types of infants' garments are in demand.

Overcoats, topcoats, suits, coats, jackets, shirts all types of work clothes including overalls, coveralls, etc. sweaters, underwear, and robes, pajamas and knitted goods etc. are needed for men.

Women's and girls' overcoats, jackets, skirts, sweaters, shawls, dresses, underwear, aprons, jumpers, smocks, robes, nightwear and knitted gloves are wanted.

Caps and knitted headwear, all-so bedding, including blankets, sheets, yellow cases, quilts are urgently needed if in serviceable condition.

Shoes: Either oxfords or high shoes, of durable type with low or medium heels are desired. All shoes should be mated and tied together in pairs.

Cut or uncut materials (cottons, rayons, woolsens, etc.) one yard or more in length are wanted—but not rags or badly damaged, dirty or worn out fabrics.

The donated garments will be shipped to the war-devastated countries on the basis of the greatest need, and available shipping space. Clothing will be distributed free to the needy without discrimination of any kind.

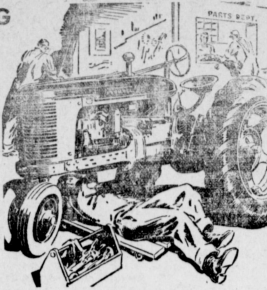
25. This was the first information received here since the War Department notified Mrs. Moore her husband was missing in action since January 1, 1945.

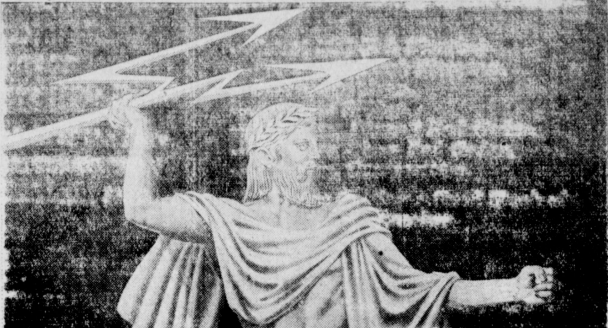

**Army Answers
Your War Problems**

Q. Have the soldiers of the Medical Department ever been given an insignia like the badge the Infantrymen wear?

A. Yes. The War Department has authorized a Medical Badge for members of the Medical Department who are assigned or temporarily attached to the Infantry in combat. It is of silver metal, elliptical in shape, and shows the Medical Department caduceus and the Geneva cross superimposed on a litter surrounded by a wreath of oak leaves. It is worn on the left breast above decorations and ribbons.

Q. My husband has been a prisoner of war in Germany. When he is liberated will he be immediately re-assigned to duty, or can he come home for a furlough first?

A. The present War Department is to give any soldier who has been a prisoner of war for over 30 days a furlough before reassigning him to duty.

Q. Our son was discharged from the Army a year ago and now has to go back to the hospital for further treatment. Is a Veterans' hospital the same as a general hospital?

A. No. Veterans' hospitals are operated by the Veterans Administration, which is not a part of the Army, and their patients are discharged service personnel. Army general hospitals are operated by the Army for soldiers who require treatment while in the service.

Q. My husband is in an Army hospital but it will be some time before he is discharged. We would like to borrow some money under the G. I. Bill of Rights to buy a farm. Since it is known that, because of his injury, he will be discharged from the Army, could we take out our loan now?

A. No. Benefits of the G. I. Bill of Rights are available only to personnel of the armed forces after their discharge.

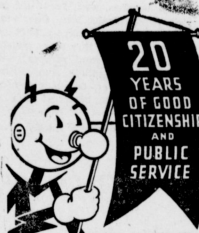

War Vets Neglected, Abused; Deaths High, Prober Asserts

Shocking charges of inefficiency, neglect, racketeering and downright carelessness and callousness that are causing an unconscionably high death rate among our war veterans in government hospitals are made in the March issue of Cosmopolitan magazine following an exhaustive investigation of the Veterans Administration by Albert Q. Maisel. In a thoroughly documented exposé of the pitiful conditions under which our war veterans are dying in our government hospitals at an alarming rate, Maisel charges that despite the astronomical sums of money appropriated for the treatment of these veterans, only one patient in six leaves our government hospitals cured.

"Only three out of five complete their hospitalization and win even the label of 'improved,'" Maisel declares. "The rest die or are discharged as 'unimproved' or run away to enter other hospitals or to suffer and die quietly at home." Investigation of the hospitalization given veterans consumed six months and covered hospitals throughout the eastern half of the United States. Asserting that the statistics used in the article are based on the public figures issued by the Veterans Administration itself, Maisel declares that "in many of the Veterans' Hospitals I have visited, the death rates are actually far higher, the 'cure' rates far lower, and conditions far, far worse than any cold statistics can ever indicate."

In a bitter indictment of Veterans Administration, Brig. General Frank T. Hines and his underlings in the central office in Washington, Maisel declares: "I have found doctors so overloaded that they could give the average patient only seven minutes attention a week. Not seven minutes a day—but seven minutes a week." "I have found nurses so negligent that they did not even bother to wash their hands after examining one patient with a contagious disease and before turning to another." "I have found some doctors who

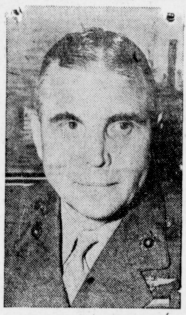
