The Chase carried the famous 182nd "Americal" Army division from the Philippines to the Jap homeland.

SANTA ANA, CALIF.—Sgt. Bennie R. Vise, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Vise of Route 1, Muleshoe, has been honorably discharged at the separation base maintained here by the Army Air Forces.

The AAF has awarded him the European Theatre ribbon with 12 battle stars and a Presidential Unit Citation with two clusters.

Before entering the service, Sgt. Vise was employed by Consolidated Aircraft of San Diego, Calif.; he attended school at Lubbock, Texas at Texas Tech at Lubbock.

## City Dads Hear Alfalfa Mill, New School, Sidewalks Are In The Cards And Many Other Projects Forecast

The first meeting of the first City Planning Board of the City of Muleshoe was called to order by the mayor, R. L. Brown, at 8:15 p. m. Tuesday. Roll call of members showed that those present were: City Commissioner: R. L. Brown, mayor, Myron Pool, commissioner, Chamber of Commerce: Rufus Gilbert, Horace Taylor, absent.

Lions Club: Glenn Rickey, and A. J. Gardner.

School board: Sam Fox and J. Clyde Taylor.

Julian Lenua represented the city as a special councilman, and Earl Ladd was present and was appointed a member of the City Commission to replace a member who had recently resigned.

The law, recently enacted, in regard to lengthening the streets and alleys, relief of crowded conditions and erection of public buildings on private property within or without the city was read.

Mr. Brown read a letter from Koch & Fowler, city planners, in which Mr. Koch stated he will be in Muleshoe Oct. 26 to meet with the Chamber of Commerce and address the members.

Sidewalks—Possibility of putting down sidewalks in the city was discussed, and it was agreed this can be done.

Members discussed a possible city bond issue to improve the water works, pave some streets and lay sidewalks and gutters. This program would include a civic center and swimming pool, and small parks.

New School Grounds—J. Clyde Taylor of the school board reported that E. K. Warren has given the school district 20 acres of land just west of the present city limits for use as a school ground. Sam Fox of the board discussed the bond issue which the board is planning to erect new school buildings.

Methods of voting the several small additions to the town into the city were discussed and tentative plans for an election were made.

Shorty Thomas, E. L. Magby, and Mat Dudley in the future will attend meetings of the Planning Board as members for the east side residential section.

Alfalfa Mill—Mr. Brown told the meeting that contact has been made with a company that will build an alfalfa mill in Muleshoe. Plans are for the new industry, so badly needed by alfalfa growers of the territory, to occupy 10 acres of land lying north of the stock pens and south of the airport, on the railroad.

The Board will meet again next Tuesday night.

## Over \$700 Given For War Fund

Liberty school district has turned in \$114, their quota was \$100, according to announcement of Tye Young, county chairman.

Mr. Young said Wednesday the total turned in for the county was \$700, this being about one third the quota for the county.

When reports begin to come in from other sections of the county the amount so far collected will be greatly enlarged, it is believed.

## 29 Vets Lined Up For VFW Post

Olle W. Smith, Deputy Chief of Staff of the Veterans of Foreign Wars in Texas, spent Tuesday in Muleshoe and continued to contact ex-servicemen who are eligible for membership in the organization with the view of establishing a Post here for Bailey County and Muleshoe territory.

A meeting of veterans who are not members has been called for the night of October 30 and will be held in the American Legion Hall. Smith said all overseas veterans of World Wars I and II are urged to attend this meeting.

He said he has contacted 29 veterans here, this being twice the number of members required to secure a charter, 15 being the minimum required for organizing.

Smith will be in Muleshoe every Thursday through October and may be found at the Commissioners Court room in the court house.

He wears battle stars for these campaigns, and also the Good Conduct, American Defense, and the Philippine Liberation medals.



Continued from Last Week  
Some of the responsibilities of District Supervisors are:

1. To formulate a district program and work plan.
2. To require land owners to enter into and perform agreements as will prevent and control erosion.
3. To formulate land use regulations if they appear necessary.
4. To employ needed assistance in accordance with the State law that available funds will permit.
5. To address requests for assistance to appropriate State and Federal agencies.
6. To request local representatives of agencies and farmer-ranchmen committees to serve on an advisory committee to the Supervisor.
7. To make actual field application of pertinent provisions of the program.
8. To request the county agents and others to explain the contents of the district program and other district activities to farmers, business and professional men and others in the district.
9. To keep the district work plan current.
10. To request county agents, vocational agricultural teachers and

others to explain the accomplishments of soil conservation districts to the landowners and operators in the district.

11. To request vocational agriculture teachers to conduct classes in soil conservation.
12. To make semi-annual statistical reports and prepare narrative semi-annual reports.
13. To hold the necessary meetings to conduct the affairs of the district.
14. To receive and use in an efficient manner any funds, equipment, materials, services or other assistance that may be available to the district.
