### Methodist Hour Speaker Named

The first Southwide radio broadcast of "The Methodist Hour" will be heard from Maryland to Texas, from Florida to the Middle West, Sunday morning, February 17th, as Bishop Clare Purcell, president of the college of bishops of the southeastern jurisdiction of the Methodist church, speaks over an independent network of 36 stations.

Dr. William F. Quillan, executive secretary of the southeastern jurisdictional council of the Methodist Church, announces that other "Methodist Hour" programs will be heard during May and June. This first broadcast by the council is in cooperation with the South Central Jurisdictional Council and the Upper Room. The council is a member of the Southern Religious Radio Conference which is composed of the radio committees of the Baptist, Presbyterian, Methodist churches and representatives of certain radio stations.

Bishop Purcell will speak on "The Church That Is To Be." He is resident bishop of the Charlotte area of the Southeastern Jurisdiction, a member of the general commission on Army and Navy chaplains, and a member of the North Carolina Council of Churches.

The Methodist Hour program can be heard at 7:30 a. m. Sundays over KGNC, Amarillo WFAA, Dallas, or WOAI, San Antonio.

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## L. T. McKillip For Commissioner Of Precinct 1

### WE VIEW WITH ALARM

Discovery of a method of using atomic power to kill people and the apparent muddle of efforts at controlling it is causing this editor not only to "view with alarm," but in fact he is just plain scared.

We suppose some were scared when steam power was utilized, when the automobile and the airplane were invented, sensing that far reaching changes were about to be made in their daily lives. But all these things were simply applications of things already

known, and had not the "supernatural" aspect that the unleashing of the secret of atomic power seems to bear.

The United Nations organization seems to be slowly getting around to the view that the thing must be controlled, but they go too slow for this writer. We have no faith that the United States can long keep this secret; other nations inevitably do what we have done, and if there is to be a future conflict doubtless both sides will manage to use some form of this unearthly power.

We cannot abide this prospect. We have the gravest fear of such development. Nothing that we value—our lives, our property or our civilization—could possibly be safe in such an eventuality.

Now, then, the Texas Association for the study of the Social and Political Implications of Atomic Energy has been formed to obtain the recommendations of the best citizen scientists to be made available to Congress. This writer hopes and hopes that such groups now forming throughout the U. S. will be effective in forcing drastic measures for this most disturbing menace.

## Sidelights From Washington

Many farm and ranch people in Texas are experiencing a delay in getting rural electrification services. Where the delay is caused by the lack of funds by the local REA, much hope is offered by the fact that President last week asked Congress to increase REA loan authorizations by one hundred million dollars. This would mean about five million dollars in new loans to Texas—more than two any other state—and would take care of the more pressing applications for the next few months.

Claude Wickard, head of REA, has asked some of us who have sponsored the REA program thru the years to try to get Congressional action on the new request by March 31st. This we are trying to do.

Prior to July 1st, the beginning of the new fiscal year, we plan to provide an additional and greatly expanded REA program. It is estimated that it will take seven years to fully complete the REA program of making electricity available to all rural homes. Only one farm home out of every three in Texas now has electricity. A rapid expansion of REA in Texas should be one of our major post war objectives.

Many people have written me about the Poage Bill, which provides REA loan authorizations for a three-year period, I am supporting the bill, as it would make possible a better system of planning for the local REA co-ops. However, the best hope for early success on pending projects is the recent request of the President.

This week I was appointed chairman of a five-man subcommittee to handle all appropriations in

the House for Government-owned Corporations. The appointment was made by Clarence Cannon, chairman of the appropriations committee.

By an act of Congress approved last December, Congress proposes to keep a closer rein on Government-owned Corporations.

We will have jurisdiction over the Commodity Credit Corporation, which handles loans on cotton and other commodities, Reconstruction Finance Corporation, Federal Crop Insurance Corporation, TVA, and all other wholly owned government corporations, totaling in all about forty. The programs of these agencies have a very direct bearing upon the welfare of our people.

It is too early to tell just what our committee will be able to do in promoting economy and improving the service which these various agencies are required to render to the American people. We will do our best to promote and safeguard the public interest.

In addition to the new assignment, I will continue my work on the War Department and Independent Offices Subcommittees.

According to the latest census report, the 25-county 1935 Congressional District has harvested 292,000 bales of cotton from the 1945 crop. This seems very small when

compared with the 1,120,000 bales produced by the same counties in 1937.

## Continued Fat Saving Is Urged

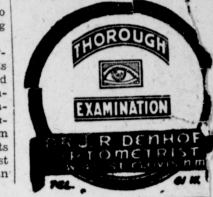
Continued cooperation of every housewife in saving and turning in used kitchen fats to local grocers was urged in this district by E. A. McBrayer, District Director.

At the same time he appealed to all grocers to continue accepting used fats regularly.

"There must be no let up in saving and collecting used kitchen fats until we have as much as we need and this may take months," he emphasized. Normally, most of the nation's supply of inedible and industrial fats and oils comes from the Pacific but present shipments from these areas are the smallest in many years and little change can be expected soon, he said.

For this reason, the American must continue to contribute to the backlog of fats and oil, which the nation must draw from its household and per capita terms.

**Navy Developing A Ready Reserve**

New Orleans, Feb. 12.—Captain Arthur A. Agerton, USN, Eighth Naval District Director of Ready Reserves, New Orleans, will seek locations for 82 divisions and 22 battalions of the Ready Reserves when he makes a tour of key cities in the eight states in the district, it was announced today.

Locations for the various Naval Reserve units have not been selected at present, Captain Agerton said. States to be visited by Captain Agerton include Louisiana, Arkansas, Alabama, Oklahoma, Tennessee, Texas, Mississippi and the western part of Florida. His itinerary has not been completed.

Captain Agerton also has charge of filling a proposed complement of 1,066 officers and 16,400 enlisted men in the district for the Ready Reserve, which will be kept at a high rate of training and availability for immediate mobilization.

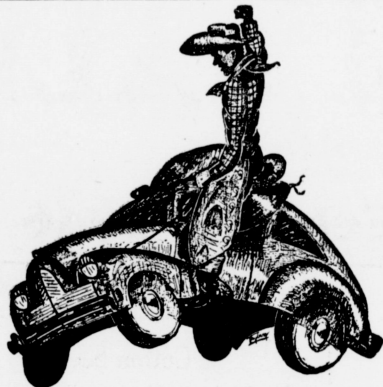

**Better Check On Your Car Title**

AUSTIN FEB. 12.—The Motor Vehicle Division of the Texas Highway Department today urged all Texas motor vehicle owners to see that the titles for vehicles to be registered in 1946 are in order. The law provides that before a vehicle may be registered, the owner must present to the Tax Collector the prior year's registration receipt and must have a title.

Many people do not understand the importance and value of the Title Act, and do not realize that the Certificate of Title Act was passed

to improve the validity of titles on motor vehicles thereby making such title comparable to an abstract on real estate.

Motor vehicle owners who have acquired used vehicles, and who have received assigned titles from the previous owners, are urged to apply at once for their titles in order that the transactions may be recorded and the new owners shown on the title records of the Department. Motor vehicle owners are also urged to register their equipment by purchasing the 1946 license plates as soon as possible. It is a common practice throughout the State for owners to wait until the last week in March, thereby creating congested conditions and long lines of applicants in the various Tax Collector's offices. The County Tax Collectors are experiencing difficulty in obtaining temporary help, and you will be helping them and yourselves by obtaining 1946 license plates during February or in the first part of

March and not waiting until the last day or days.

with trimming them. Just cut the cloth in 6 place mats, hem the mats, and pop them into dye baths. You will have place mats for your dining table that are pretty and easy to launder.

**RAINFALL CONSERVATION**  
The precipitation over Bailey County is great enough nearly every year to produce good crops if all the rainfall were properly conserved. Frequently, however, the spring and summer rains fall very quickly and on untraced fields run off without wetting the soil to any appreciable depth. It has been thoroughly demonstrated that terraces will check the runoff enough so that a fair crop can be produced, when on adjoining untraced fields a complete, failure results. In many instances where the slope is not too great the mere contouring of the crop rows will help very materially in holding the water on the land. While contoured rows help a great deal it is advisable to use terrace structures also.
