

WashingTon.—Railroads of the United States today asked the Interstate Commerce Commission for an increase of 25 per cent in freight rates, with certain (xceptions as to which lesser incr. ases were sought, to become effective on May 15, subject to modification by subsequent orders of the Commission. No increase was asked in the present passenger fares.

A general and immediate increase in freight rates is imperative, the petition said, to meet the critical situation resulting from the combination of increased wages of railroad employees, increased and increasing prices for materials and supplies and a severe decline in traffic and revenues with freight rates at prewar levels and passenger fares only slightly higher than before the war.


