Soil Fertility Day Set For Tuesday

The Briscoe County Soil Fertility Day will be held next Tuesday, February 20, at 7:30 p. m. at the Silverton High School cafeteria.

The purpose of the Briscoe County Soil Fertility meeting this year will be to help encourage farmers and ranchers to improve livestock and crop production for the future.

Topics for this year's program include: cotton varieties; liquid protein supplemental feeding; grain sorghum insects and diseases; and cotton, soybeans, and grain sorghum fertilization. Speakers for this year's program will be Dr. Levon Ray, Cotton Breeder; Dr. Jim Valentine, Extension Soil Chemist at Lubbock; and Dr. Bob Berry, Plant Pathologist with the Extension Service at Lubbock.

All farmers, ranchers, and their families are urged to be present at the two-hour meeting. Refreshments will be furnished courtesy of the First State Bank in Silverton and the P. C. A. of Silverton.

QHS FRESHMEN TAKE TOP HONORS AT MCADOO TOURNEY LAST WEEK

Quitaque's Freshmen Boys took top honors at McAdoo's Freshman Tournament, playing three tough games and winning all three.

In the first game, played Thursday, the Freshmen played Roosevelt. Quitaque got off to a slow start, but wound up with a 48-41 victory. The young Panthers were behind after the first quarter 11-9, but dominated most of the next three. Larry Price won scoring honors with 17 points, closely followed by Ysidro Leal with 15 points. Other scorers included Gary Chandler, 7, Danny Tiffin, 5, Larry King, 2, and 2 points being made by a Roosevelt player. Danny Jones also saw action but did not score. Hughes was high-point man for Roosevelt with 19.

In the second game, played Friday, Quitaque took a 59-56 win over Ralls. This was probably the roughest game because the Panthers had to come from behind during all of the first half. Ralls already had 15 points on the scoreboard before Quitaque finally scored. The Panthers were behind 16-18 at the end of the first period, and 19-31 at half-time. The second half, though, belonged to Quitaque, keeping the lead after gaining it mid-way of the third period.

Quitaque closed out its regular season schedule last Friday night, both teams taking lop-sided wins over Matador.

The Pantherettes looked real sharp as they rolled over the Matador scoring spree by Carol Myers adorettes 87-30, sparked by a 30 and a 27 point performance by Sherry Stark. Jackie Cheatham added 22 points to the total. The Pantherettes wound up 9-1 in district play with only the loss at Estelline at Estelline to mar their season record.

The Panthers wound up with a spotless record in district play, roaring over the 100 mark the 8th time in district as they downed the Matadors 113-27.

Jimmy Pointer led the scoring assault with 27 points, and Lynn Payne was right up there with him with 26 points.

Flomot's Junior High teams played at McAdoo Thursday night of last week with both teams losing. The Flomot girls lost to Guthrie 34-10 and the boys were beaten by Crosbyton, 4-16. Jackie Starkey scored 3 points for Flomot in the girls game and David Martin also scored 3 points in the boys contest.

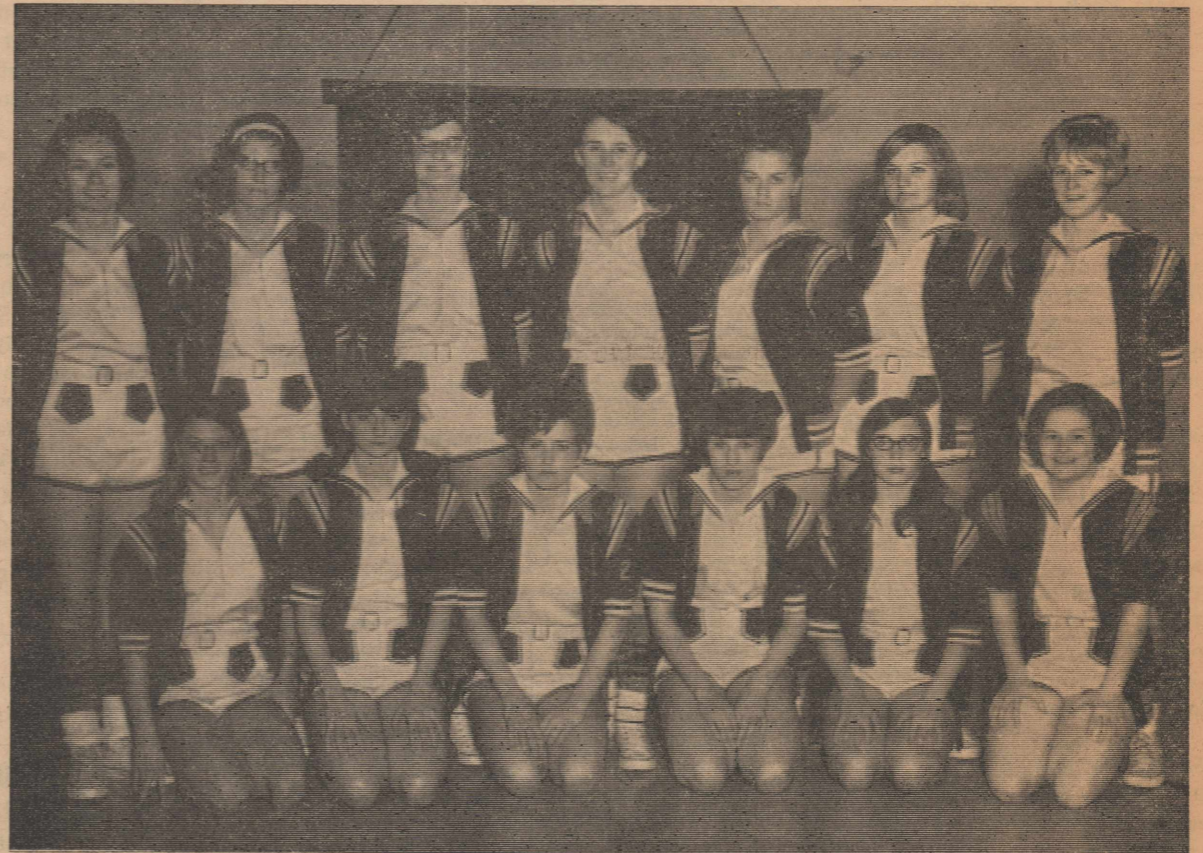

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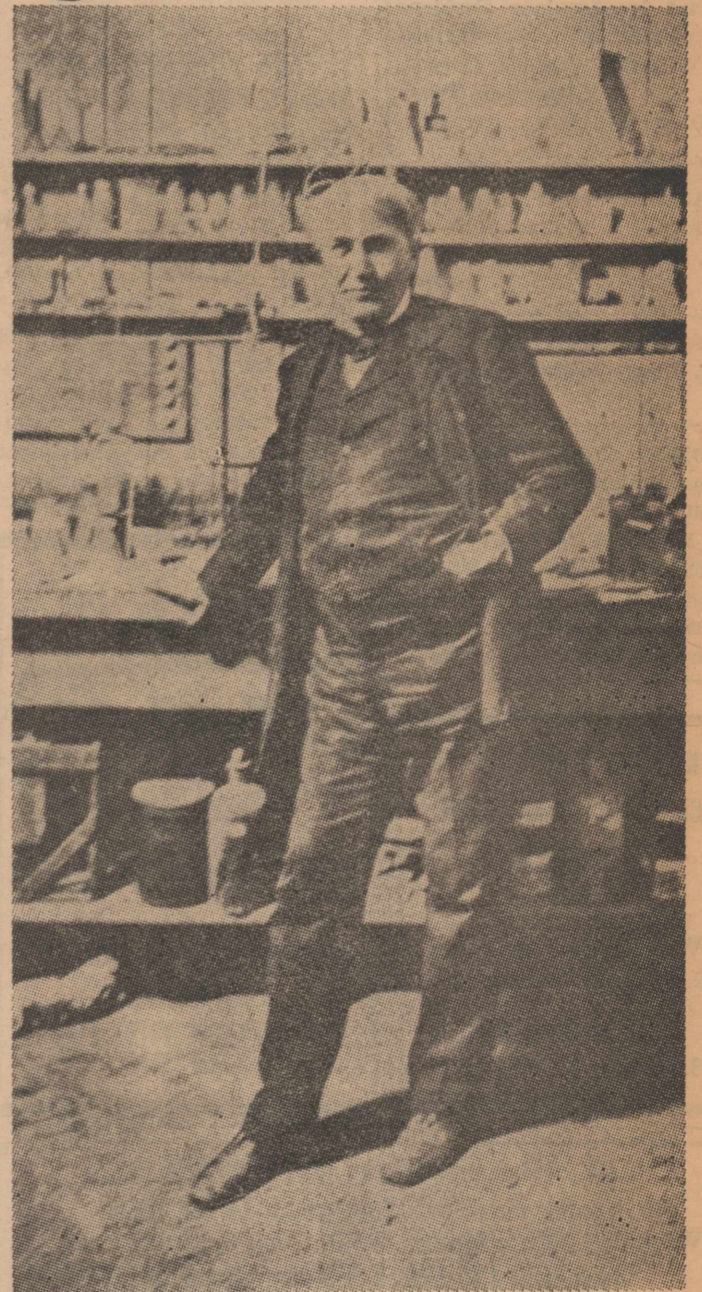

HEMISFAIR NOTES

Work on the multitude of structures at HemisFair is rolling along, mostly right on schedule. The 622-foot Tower of the Americas will be

ready by mid-March, and interior exhibits are being put up in numerous buildings.

Basil Zarov, chief of press accreditation and visits at Montreal's Expo '67, visited HemisFair recently and reported the San Antonio World's Fair progress was well ahead of the pace Expo set last year.

Zarov said the heavy rains that slowed work recently were nothing like the weather problems faced by Expo. He said once they had to use a pneumatic drill to dig up a tree because the ground was frozen.

The workload of Visitor Services, Inc., a non-profit organization set up to handle advance hotel-motel reservations for HemisFair, has been tripled since Christmas.

Between Dec. 22 and Jan 12, the office's weekly tally of calls jumped from 132 to 450 and letters requiring a written reply increased from 275 to 1,581.

APRIL 1 DEADLINE FOR BASS FRY REQUESTS

AUSTIN — Because of the many new or renovated stock ponds in Texas, requests for fry stocking should be submitted before April 1, according to Texas Parks and Wildlife Department Inland Fisheries coordinator Marion Toole.

Toole says any requests for bass fry received after April 1 will be held over until the following spring.

Requests for catfish or sunfish should be submitted before August 1.

Most Department employees have fish application cards for landowners or their agents. These cards should be completed and mailed to the appropriate Department regional offices at Tyler, Waco, San Angelo, La Porte, or Rockport.

Applicants in doubt about pond locations by region may query the Department in Austin and supply information concerning water location as to county and nearest town or ask their local game warden.
