Rev. and Mrs. Lemy Pike attended a Sectional Fellowship meeting in Childress Tuesday night at the First Assembly of God Church.

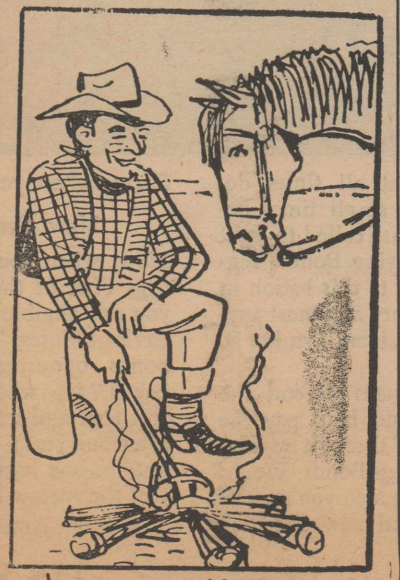

## Pee Wees To Play Friday Night

Another thrill-packed basketball game between the young athletes of the Fourth, Fifth, and Sixth Grades has been planned for Friday night, March 29 at 7 o'clock.

The 1968 annual program sign-ups are over. A total of 493 farms are participating in one or more of the programs. Diversion percentage is higher for cotton but about what was expected for feed grain.

Cotton farmers signed up to divert 7108.2 acres and plant 18102.5 acres. The percent diverted for cotton is 28.20 percent and planted 71.80 percent. Feed grain farmers agreed to plant 35,513.0 acres and divert 30,057.0 acres. The percent planted is 54.16 percent and diverted is 45.84 percent.

Advance payments made to farmers under the cotton program totaled \$105,361.09. Money paid out under the feed grain program was \$281,624.49. There were no advance wheat payments.

An ASC spokesman stated that he does not know of any other way the towns of Quitaque or Silverton could get a larger boost to their economies than they are getting through the farm programs. He is also hopeful that the townspeople as well as the farmers will join together in support of these vitally-needed programs.

## From The County Agents' Desk

### TEGAS WHEAT

Estimated yields, acreages, and production of Texas wheat for the 1967 crop year have been reported for each county by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

Briscoe County planted approximately 73,000 acres of wheat in 1967. Thirty-eight thousand of these acres were harvested within the county, with a total production of 407,200 bushels. This was an average of 10.6 bushels per acre on both irrigated and dry land varieties. Having a very unfavorable year moisture-wise, the county was some 5.4 bushels below the state average of 16 bushels.

### 1968 PREDICTIONS

With both winter moisture being abundant and climate conditions for wheat quite satisfactory at the present, the 1968 wheat crop looks to be far superior over the 1967 yields.

Green bug infestations are moderate to heavy in some localities over the county. This definitely will reduce yields on the wheat if control measures are not initiated where feasible.

Overall, the 1968 wheat crop could be above average for Briscoe County and the High Plains with continued good spring growing conditions and good harvesting weather.

### FERTILIZING YOUR SHRUBS

Ornamental plants will be more resistant to disease and make faster recovery from insect attacks when they are properly fertilized.

For the beginning gardener, a standard mixture such as 5-10-5 or 5-10-10 is suggested. More complicated mixtures can be used after experience has been gained. I add, that it may be easier to measure rather than weigh fertilizer. A pint of 5-10-5 is equal to about one pound, but other fertilizers may differ from this measure.

Method of application may depend on the type of plant material to be fertilized. Broadcasting by hand is the easiest method and with experience, an even distribution can be obtained. Take care not to get the fertilizer on the foliage of evergreen plants. Watering in is a good idea to prevent burning the foliage.

The most laborious—but possibly the best—method for fertilizing trees and deep rooted shrubs is by means of holes punched or bored in the soil. Using a crowbar is not easy work, but adequate soil moisture now will make the job easier. A soil auger or soil probe can be used if available.

The amount of fertilizer needed varies considerably, depending on the age and size of the tree. A safe method is to use 2 to 4 pounds of 8-8-8 for each inch of tree trunk diameter at breast height. Also, use half this dosage if 10-10-10 or 15-20-0 grade of fertilizer is used. For shrubs, the amount to use at

so depends on size. For small evergreens, 2 to 4 pounds of 5-10-5 per 100 square feet is suggested. For larger shrubs, the application may range from 2 to 15 pounds per shrub, the larger amount being for a shrub 12 to 15 feet and equally as wide.

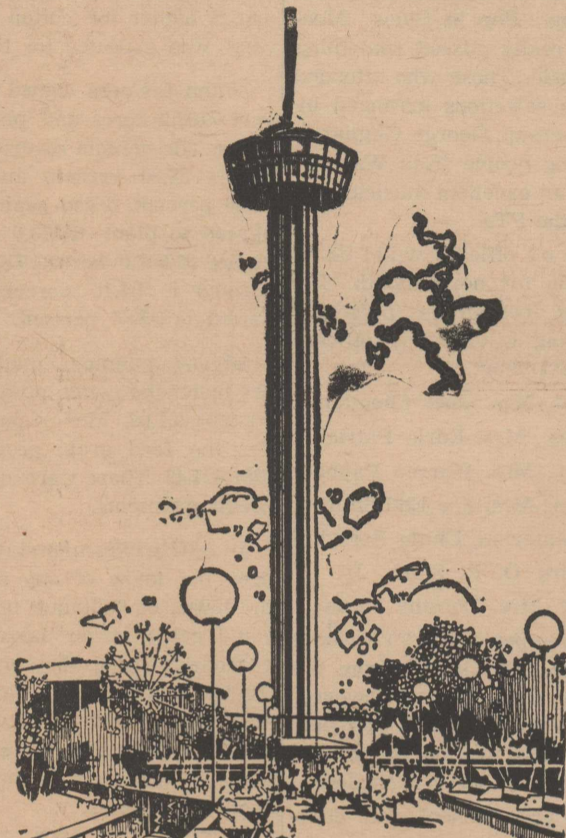
### APRIL 6 OPENING DAY HEMISFAIR READY FOR

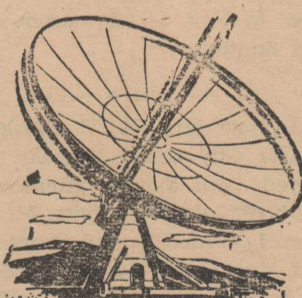

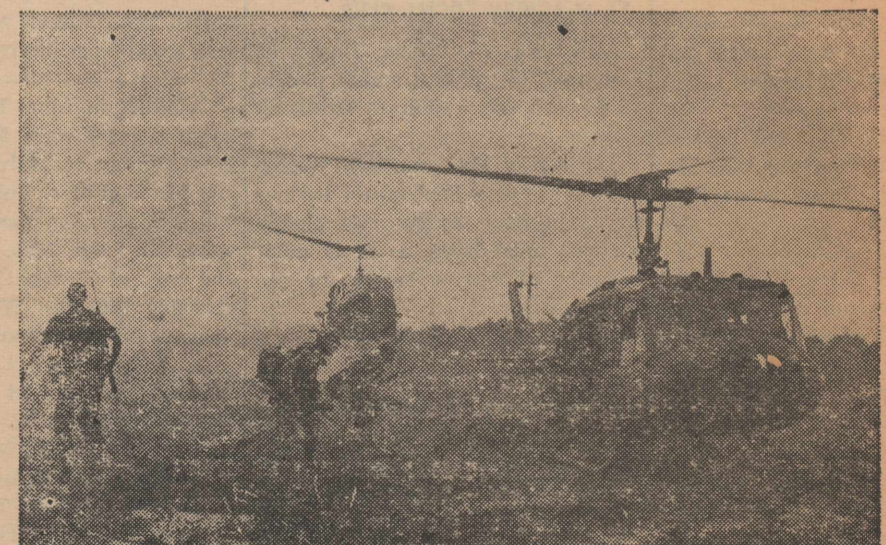
