Lynn was heard on KGNC radio Tuesday afternoon, then was seen on Channel 4 Tuesday night as he talked with Palmer in Viet Nam.

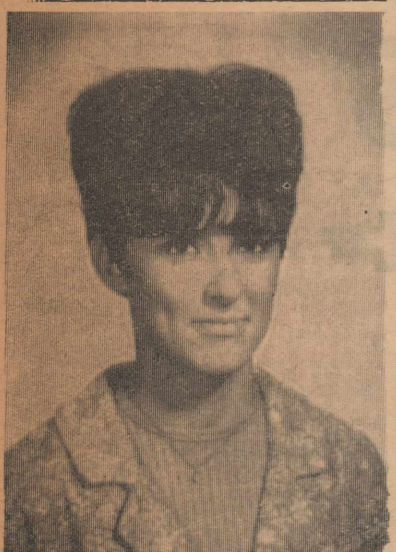

The Quitaque Congregation of Jehovah's Witnesses is making arrangements so that all who regularly associate with the group in Quitaque and other interested persons can gather for a special occasion, Friday, April 12, at 8 p. m., in the Kingdom Hall, 1st and Jago. The anniversary of the death of the Founder of Christianity will be

celebrated by the witnesses in 197 lands, which they believe is the anniversary of the death of Jesus Christ, beginning at sundown on Friday, April 12. According to V. D. Tiffin, presiding minister of the local congregation, "This is in harmony with Jesus' instructions to his disciples while he was still on earth, so those who are heirs of the heavenly kingdom will partake of the emblematic bread and wine on that occasion at the Kingdom Hall," he said. "In addition, all who look forward to life under that kingdom

Describing the calendar factor for their observation date, Tiffin said that April 12 is the equivalent of the fourteenth day of the first month of the Bible's sacred calendar known as Nisan. "This year that day begins at sundown on Friday, April 12."

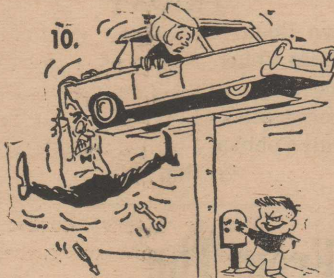

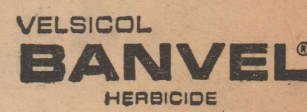
