Orientation Program Set For This Fall's First Grade Students

Supt. Herman Moseley has announced this week that a two weeks orientation program will be held for youngsters who will be in the first grade this fall. This is not a Head Start program, Mr. Moseley emphasizes, but is a program for all youngsters who will be starting to school this fall. The program will be under the direction of Mrs. Novelle Wise, First Grade teacher.

Mr. Moseley stated that he sincerely hopes that there will be 100 percent participation by all of the youngsters who will start to school this fall. The program will begin on August 12 and will continue for two weeks, beginning at 8:30 a. m. and continuing until 11:30 five days each week.

The program is designed to give the youngsters an idea of what school will be like. Paper and pencils and all materials needed in the program will be furnished by the school. There will be no cost to the parents. There will be a break or recess each morning and refreshments will be furnished at no cost to the children or parent.

The program is highly recommended by the State Agency. Mr. Moseley said that the Nazareth School are going to have a six weeks program, which is already underway. Wellington will hold a two weeks program and Supt. Moseley said that he will go to Wellington and attend that program as an observer.

Supt. Moseley said that if the parents of any of the youngsters need transportation for their children to the orientation program, that can be furnished, also without charge. He again emphasized that he hopes that there will be 100 percent participation.

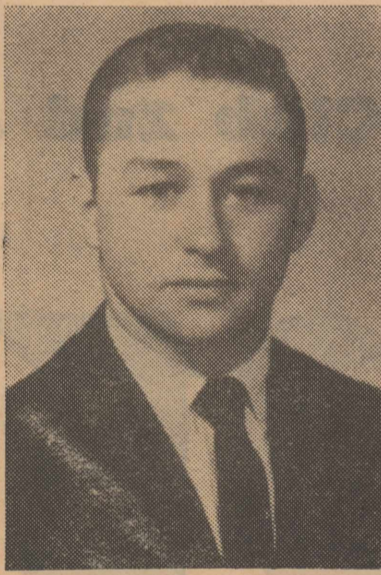

Side-Dress N For High Yields—Earlier Maturity

Nitrogen's importance in attaining most profitable yield levels of corn, sorghum, sugar beets and many other crops is well known. These crops contain more N than any other essential fertilizer element. Neglect N and the investment in other inputs will not pay off as well.

The effect of nitrogen on maturity of corn is frequently misunderstood. Last fall some growers blamed wet corn on too much nitrogen. Research says this is wrong—the fields with adequate nitrogen can be expected to mature earlier than fields with too little nitrogen.

Results in 1967 tests by Purdue University and the University of Illinois show that high nitrogen plots not only produced higher yields but also lower moisture content at harvest than the low nitrogen plots. Take for example the Indiana tests where 180 lbs. N per acre increased yields by 53 bushels per acre and reduced moisture at harvest by almost 2 percent.

Lbs. N/Acre	Bu/Acre	% moisture
None	89	33.9
120	126	33.2
180	142	31.3

Similar trends were observed in 1966 Illinois tests, where plots fertilized with 180 pounds N per acre produced 191 bushels of 21.6% moisture corn, compared with 104 bushels of 29% moisture corn on the no-nitrogen plots.

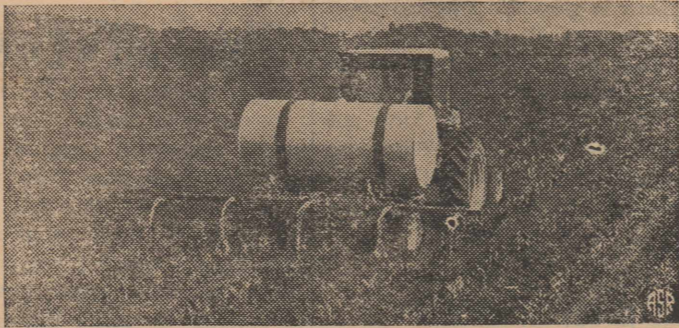
In general, nitrogen studies from other states involving different seasons and a wide range in nitrogen rates have indicated no delay in maturity due to N. Used on well limed fertile soils—with correct balance of phosphate, potash and other elements, nitrogen can be expected to advance rather than delay maturity.

As a rule, nitrogen should be applied after the crop is up and well established. At this time root systems have not reached into the middles and will not be injured by application equipment or cultivators.

Sugar beets should be side-dressed as early as possible. In Northern Ohio, for instance, it is generally best that nitrogen be applied before June 15.

If delayed application is unavoidable, corn and sorghum can be side-dressed with good results until the crop is too tall to get through with equipment. Nebraska research shows very favorable response to nitrogen applied when corn was 3 feet tall.

Just remember that side-dressed nitrogen is used efficiently by crops in most soils under a wide range of growing conditions. Now is the time to check the records on all fields and side-dress what is needed to reach top yields.

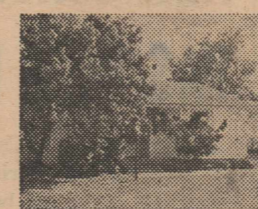

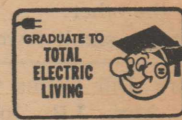

The couple left immediately on a short wedding trip to New Mexico, and on their return, they are at home at 22nd Street in Canyon. They will enroll at West Texas State this summer.

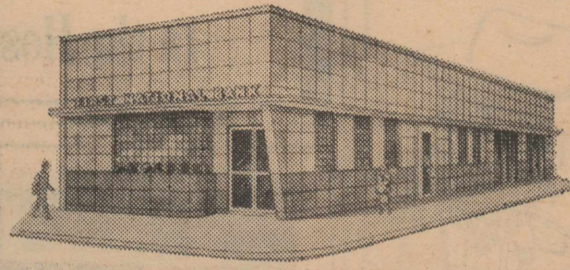

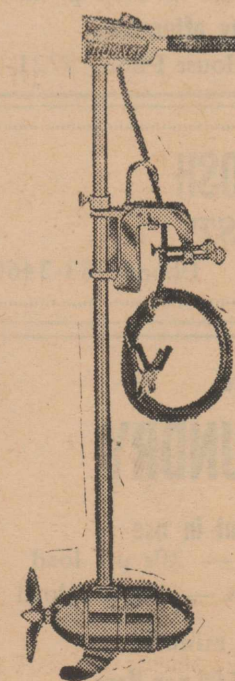
