JEWEL CHEESE PUFFS

- Mrs. Cecil Burke, 2426 Walnut, Amarillo

|---------------------|--------------------------------|
| 2 cups sifted | 1/4 teaspoon salt |
| all-purpose flour | 1 cup butter |
| 2 teaspoons | 1 package (8-oz.) cream cheese |
| baking powder | 2 eggs, beaten |
| 2 tablespoons sugar | |
- Preserves or jelly

Sift together dry ingredients. Beat butter and cream cheese until fluffy. Add beaten eggs and beat well. Blend into sifted dry ingredients. Chill dough one hour. On lightly floured board, roll dough 1/4 inch thick. Cut individual rounds with floured biscuit cutter. Make an impression in center of each round with thumb. Fill imprint with preserves or jelly (about 1 teaspoon). Bake on an ungreased baking sheet in moderate gas oven (375 degrees) for 15 minutes or until delicately browned. Serve warm. Makes about 24.

Home Notes

Now is the best time of year to enjoy apples, reports Gwendolyn Clyatt, Extension consumer marketing specialist.

Apples must be mature when picked to have good flavor, texture and storing ability. Look for firm, crisp, well-colored fruit and choose according to the use in mind.

Apples range from sweet to tart flavors. Some are best when eaten out-of-hand or sliced and diced for salads, sandwiches and desserts. Other all-purpose apples may be cooked, baked, stewed, scalloped, fried or roasted. Basically these are the two types marketed—eating apples and cooking apples.

Red or Golden Delicious apples are best when served raw. Their delicate flavor is lost when cooked.

Apples that are good cooked or raw include McIntosh, Jonathan and Rome Beauty. Rome Beauty apples are also exceptionally good for baking.

Once bought, apples should be stored in the vegetable crisper of the refrigerator and used in two to three weeks. Everyday apples kept at room temperature decrease in their storage life by more than a week.

Whether served raw or cooked, Mrs. Clyatt advises that these hints are followed to ensure a tasty apple treat.

Always wash apples before using.

Peel just before serving or cooking. If allowed to stand, browning occurs unless the fruit is sprinkled with lemon, orange or pineapple juice, or a commercial anti-darkening agent.

Use sugar in small amounts when cooking apples to bring out flavor—not mask it.

To keep apples whole, add sugar at the beginning when cooking. For making sauce, add sugar at the end of cooking.
