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## VALLEY - CLAUDE PLAYOFF GAME TO BE AT CLARENDON

The Valley girls vs. Claude Mustangettes will meet at Clarendon College at 7:00 p.m. Friday to determine the championship of District 2-A in the girls division. The two teams wound up with identical 14-2 records in district play.

District 2-A officials met Wednesday night and Clarendon College was selected as the site for the playoff game. The bi-district game will be played next week, either Monday or Tuesday night.

The Claude - Memphis boys playoff will follow the girls playoff game Friday night, and double admission will be charged.

## Cooper Is Candidate for Hall County Judge

W. W. Cooper of Turkey has authorized the Valley Tribune to run the following announcement for him on the Democratic Ticket:

Since I am announcing as a candidate for Hall County Judge, these are my qualifications:

I was born in Turkey, Texas, on January 20, 1912, to Mr. and Mrs. Roy E. Cooper. My mother was the former Vivian Eddins. My grandfather, Mr. Dave Cooper, came to Turkey in 1892 and patented two sections of farm land on which I still farm and live. My great-uncle Dave Lane and grandfather, Dave Cooper, built the first church and school in the Turkey area, paying most of the cost and doing most of the labor. My great uncle, C. A. Cooper, and his family were farmers in the Hulver community. My grandmother, Sue Eddins, owned a hotel in Estelline where many of the cowboys and travelers stayed when they drove cattle to the railroad.

I was married to Madeline P. Dipilla in Denver, Colorado, March 29, 1936. We have three children, Deanna Mae, Freddy and Lucille, and eight grandchildren.

### EDUCATION

I attended the Turkey schools and graduated third in a class of nineteen in 1930.

My Bachelor of Science degree is from North Texas State University. My Masters degree is from West Texas State University.

I have attended Texas Technological College, Western State College, and Highlands University in New Mexico doing graduate work above my Masters to keep up with the modern education trends. I have the following certificates: Superintendent, High School Principal, Supervisor and T. I. C. in the U. S. Air Force.

### EXPERIENCE

During my high school and college years, I worked during the summer for the Texas Highway Department. I worked three summers and two years for the Texas Highway Engineers as roadman and inspector under Mr. J. E. Bryan, resident engineer. We were surveying the roads to Estelline and South of Turkey to the Motley County line. After these were built, I worked two summers for the Texas Highway Maintenance Department under J. E. Joiner and three summers under Doug Dosier.

In 1937, I took a Civil Service job with the United States Engineers in Galveston. We did flood control surveys on the Colorado River for twelve months. In 1938 and 1939 I was assistant party chief on a survey party on the intercoastal canal between Galveston and Palacios. In 1940 I went to work for Smith Hinchman & Grylls, a private engineering firm on layout work for the Lone Star Ordinance Plant in Texarkana, Texas. (The government had requested that all married men with children report for defense work where they were needed) We completed this in one year. In 1941 I went to work for Broadrick & Gordon, another engineering firm, as a party chief. Our party did the final topographical survey on the Remington Arms plant west of Denver, Colorado.

In 1942 I was transferred to the Globe Ordinance plant west of Flagstaff, Arizona. After my termination in Flagstaff, I returned to Turkey and managed the Cooper

Farm Estate which was a Certified Seed Farm.

My past family and I have paid County taxes for many years (since 1892) and my children will continue to pay these taxes. ## Elmer Lacy Dies Of Injuries Received In Highway Crash

Elmer Lacy of Turkey died Monday morning, February 4 about 5:00 a.m. at Methodist Hospital in Lubbock of injuries he received in a highway crash on Monday, January 21 that took the life of his wife, Geraldine, who died instantly. The accident took place about three miles west of Turkey on Highway 86.

Funeral services for Mr. Lacy, 61, were held at 3:00 p.m. Tuesday, February 5, 1974, at the Turkey Church of Christ, where he was a member. Officiating were Odell Purdy and Clark Johnson, Church of Christ ministers from Lubbock, and Herbert Gipson, minister of the West Amarillo Church of Christ. Burial was in Dreamland Cemetery by Seigler Funeral Home.

A resident of Turkey for 59 years, Mr. Lacy had been very active in civic and church activities for many years. He served as Mayor of the City of Turkey for several years and was Precinct Chairman for the Democratic Party at the time of his death. Mr. Lacy had owned hardware stores in Turkey, Petersburg and McLean, and was vice president of Peoples State Bank at Turkey at his death. He was a veteran of World War II.

Survivors include four sisters, Mrs. Luke (Chloe) Lane and Mrs. George (Clemma) Johnson, both of Turkey, Mrs. Verner (Cleta) Bradshaw of Floydada and Mrs. Murry (Ellen) Smith of Amarillo; and a large number of nieces and nephews.

Last Friday night the Valley teams wound up the home schedule by taking a pair of wins over Wellington, and the girls game was especially sweet for the Valley girls for it was Wellington who upset the Patriots in the first round of District 2-A action thus throwing Claude and Valley into a tie and a playoff as happened last year.

The Valley girls left no doubt in the minds of fans present at the Wellington game as to the outcome of that game for the Patriots took charge right from the start, and although the Valley girls did not score an awful lot of points themselves, they were even stingier on the guard end of the gym. At the end of the first period of play Valley led 13-3 and at halftime the score was 25-8. Coach George Scott let all of his squad get in on the action and six of the squad got on the scoreboard with Eva Cheatham having the best night this time, tallying 25 points. Janna Turner hit for 18 points, Cherri Brown, who is playing real good basketball, tossed in 8 points, Mitchie Lipscomb, who slightly injured her sore knee and did not play the last half, hit 6 points, and Bonnie Clary and Cookie Lipscomb, who played guard most of the game, hit for 2 and 1 point respectively. Jane Duncan, Mary Brunson, Connie Ferguson, Vonaceil Robison and Shonda Smith all saw action on the guard end of the court. The final score in that game was 59-34 with Valley leading all the way.

The Rockets and Patriots' contest was close only the first quarter. The score was tied at 8-8 in the first quarter but the Patriots went on to lead 12-8 at the end of the quarter but increased the lead to 34-14 at halftime. The final score in that one was 72-58 but the Patriots led by 26 points at one or two points in the game.

In Tuesday night's games at Silvertown the Valley JV girls took the opening contest 60-35. Martha Holman won scoring honors with 23 points. Darlene Hendrix hit for 21, Jena Mullin 10, Louise Holman 4 and Debra Parsley 2. Others seeing action were Christine DeLa-

The Patriots JV boys also won their contest 34-24 but The Tribune reporter couldn't find the scorebook for that one.

The Valley varsity girls took an 82-16 win over Silvertown's young Owlettes. Janna Turner hit for 32 points to spark the Patriots while Becky Francis led the Owlettes in the scoring column with 13 points.

The Owls came to play and for almost three quarters it appeared that an upset might be in the making but Coach Hulsey's Patriots finally put it out of reach in the fourth quarter with a 24-point outburst.

The Owls led 11-9 at the first stop and kept the lead most of the second quarter but the Patriots managed to tie the score at 25-25 at halftime. The Owls did not quit, however, and trailed by only 34-39 at the end of three quarters.

Brent Guest and Randy Green led the Patriots with 13 points each and all hands got on the scoreboard.

This was the final game of the season for the Valley boys but it has been a good season for Coach Hulsey and his Patriots—one that surprised quite a few people, for practically this same group of boys managed to win only two games last season, one of them a district game. This year the Patriots won 17 games and lost 11. This year the Patriots won over every team in the district at least once with the exception of Claude, who won over the Patriots both times by one-point margins. In the final standings the Patriots will own third place if our figuring is correct. The district winner is not known as yet as Claude won over Memphis Tuesday night to throw the boy's race into a playoff as happened in the girls division.

However, regardless of how that playoff goes, Coach Bill Hulsey is the Valley Tribune's nomination for Coach of the Year, at least in the Panhandle area, and the Patriots are The Tribune's choice for Surprise Team of the Year. Local fans are very proud of Coach Hulsey and his Valley Patriots.

Darrell was carried to Methodist Hospital in Lubbock where it was determined that he received two skull fractures and a fractured collarbone. His condition worsened Tuesday and doctors expected that Darrell would have a rough time of it Tuesday night but Wednesday reports are that he fared better than was expected and that his condition was improved.

The Tribune has been unable to learn details of the accident other than he was riding a moving tractor and that he fell underneath and was hit by some part of the tractor. According to reports received, the wheels did not run over Darrell.

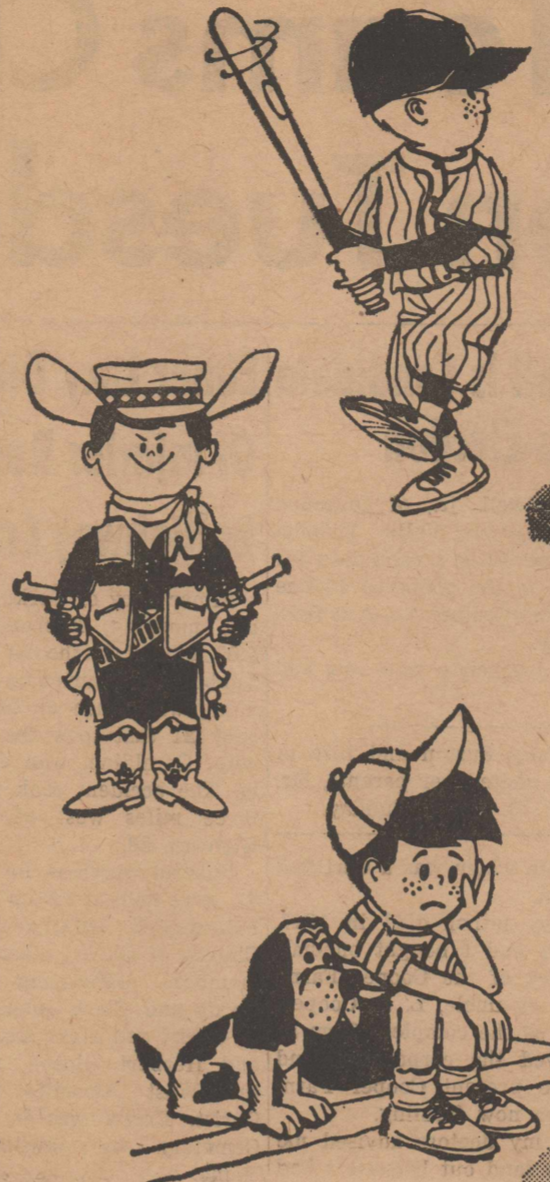

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**Hey! Mr. Employer! Do You Know About New Law?**

Here is a message of vital importance to every employer in the State of Texas, brought to you as a public service by your local Independent Insurance agent who is a member of the Texas Association of Insurance Agents. Effective January 1, 1974, the Workmen's Compensation law has been amended to apply to business and professional organizations which have one or two employees. Here is the report: The 1973 Texas legislature enacted S.F. 283 which made many substantial changes in our Workman's Compensation law. We'd like to call one of these to your attention.

For practical purposes, ALL employees in this state except "domestic servants or casual employees engaged in employment incidental to a personal residence, farm laborers, (or) ranch laborers . . ." should now be protected by Workmen's Compensation insurance, or the employer loses his common law defenses if the injured worker sues him. Formerly you had to have at least three persons on your payroll to be affected. But beginning on January 1,

1974, employers with one or two employees will be brought under the terms of the Workmen's Compensation Act. The question that probably occurs to you at this point is: What if I as a small employer fail to carry Workmen's Compensation insurance? Well, if you don't and one of your employees is injured, he has the right to sue you and will almost certainly be awarded damages. (Your liability doesn't cover either the legal costs in such a case or the court judgment.)

By being uninsured the three so-called common law defenses against a suit by an injured employee can't be asserted in court. These are: The Fellow Servant Rule (The injury was caused by another employee.); Assumption of Risk (The injured worker knew job conditions were dangerous and assumed the risk.); Contributory Negligence (The injured person was partially at fault himself.)

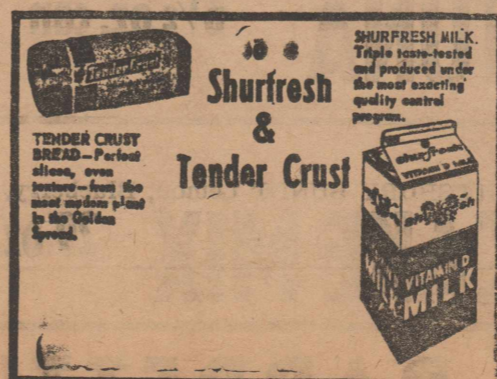
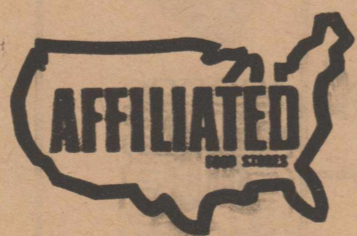
