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Primary Elections To Be Held Saturday



Saturday, May 4, is First Primary Election Day and several races are being hotly contested here in this area.

On the local level there are few races that are being contested. For Quitaque voters on the local level none of the county races have more than one candidate, while one of the precincts on the Plains has a race for a Commissioner's job. Bryant Eddleman is challenging Roy Brown in that one, while Barbara Pigg is being challenged by Johnnie Lanham for Justice of the Peace.

In Hall County, Turkey also has a Commissioner race with James Fuston being a candidate for the spot against incumbent Harold Lane. Incumbent Tops Gilreath, who is County School Superintendent, is being opposed by Father Walko.

Valley High School Superintendent Loran Denton and W. W. Coper are candidates for the office of County Judge of Hall County.

Otherwise, the race creating the most excitement locally is that for U. S. Representative of the 13th Congressional District, with the office being held presently by Republican Bob Price. He does not have a Republican opponent.

There are three Democratic candidates in the race for that office. They are Ray Ruffin of Amarillo, who announced his candidacy soon after the election two years ago; an Amarillo doctor, Louis Finney; and State Senator Jack Hightower, who has compiled for himself a very distinguished record, first as a district attorney and then in the State Legislature where he has proven to be a very effective and capable representative of the people of this area, of which he is

Good, Soaking Rains Fall In Local Vicinity

Rains measuring more than two inches have fallen in the local vicinity the past two days and nights and just about every precious drop of moisture soaked into the thirsty earth, for most of the rain has fallen in very slow drizzles.

The showers started falling Sunday night around 10 o'clock and up to a quarter of an inch was recorded in spots, with most reporting .2 and .3. Monday brought more showers and pushed the overall total to an inch or better, then off and on Tuesday more light showers fell and the drizzle continued just about all night long and pushed the totals to above the two inch mark for most everyone.

As this is written (Wednesday morning) it is still cloudy and prospects still look pretty good for more rain and forecasters say another front should move through this area about Friday and possibly bring more moisture. Even though no more rain falls right now, chances are very good that if you want to see a farmer next week, you will find him in the field planting.

Bob, felled by a paralyzing stroke several years and confined to a wheelchair, attended the first two celebrations, but he suffered another stroke several weeks ago and was unable to attend this year's event. In fact none of the members of the old Texas Playboys band were present, as several of them are in bad health. Nevertheless, the crowd was in a good mood and enjoyed the day's activities.

A parade down Main Street of Turkey beginning at 10 o'clock Saturday morning got the day off to a good start.

Jack Bell and Gus Timmons, flag bearers, led off the parade, and riding just behind them were some of the visiting entertainers, Bill Mack of WBAP Radio of Fort Worth, a recording artist and radio-TV personality (he is the voice of the Mead's Fine Bread cartoon cowboy), Joe Bob Barnhill, who grew up in Turkey and is now a

Parents and the general public are cordially invited to visit at anytime.

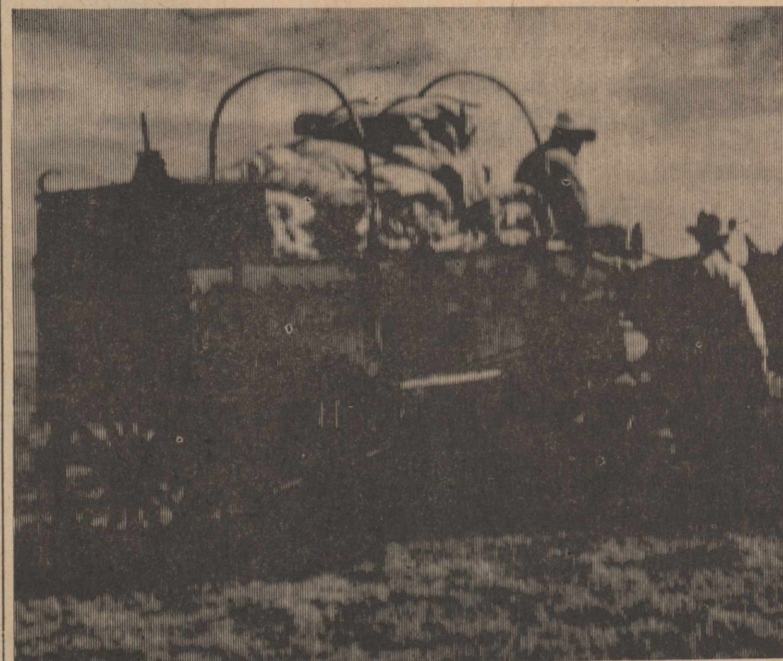

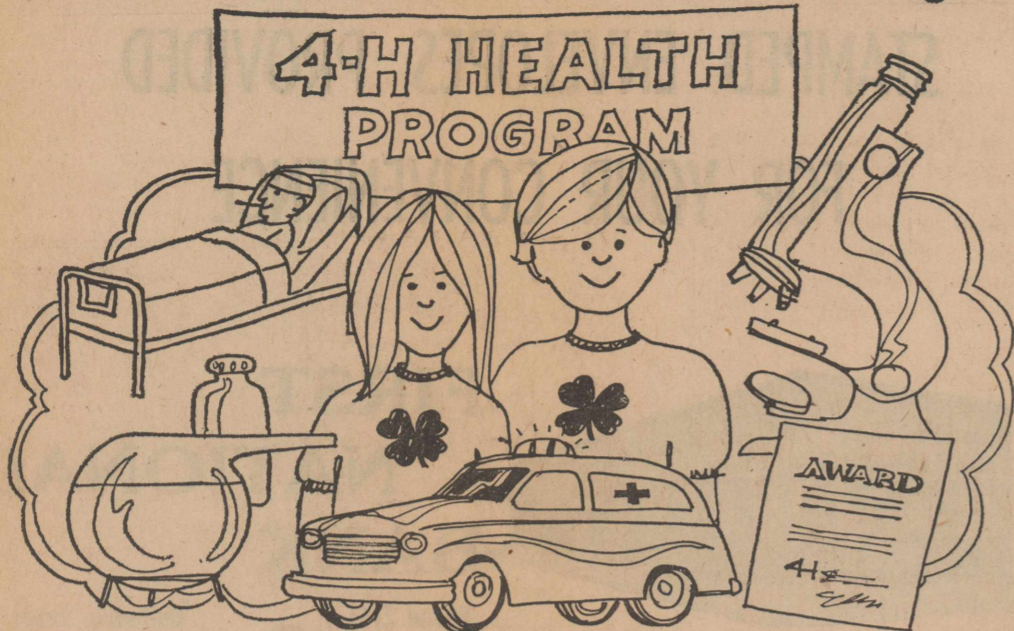

STREP THROAT DANGERS

Don't take a child's sore throat too lightly, one expert emphasized this week.

"Although not every sore throat is strep throat, medical attention can prevent complications—such as rheumatic fever and glomerulonephritis," Dr. Barbara A. Sears, health education specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, emphasized.

This year finds cases of strep throat and scarlet fever up from the same time period in 1973, she said.

In case of a sudden sore throat—along with certain symptoms, Dr. Sears advised seeking medical

attention, especially for children.

"These symptoms include throat discomfort when swallowing, swollen glands in the neck and pain when pressed gently under the angle of the jaw.

"Also if the child feels feverish—with a temperature of 101-104 degrees, which usually indicates a strep infection—or if he complains of headache or nausea, or was in contact with other children who have scarlet fever or sore throats, take him to the doctor.

"Only a physician can determine whether or not there's a strep infection. Proper medical treatment early in the course of infection usually will prevent complications, she noted.

Turning to possible complications, the specialist explained that rheumatic fever can permanently damage a child's heart. This condition known as rheumatic heart disease, is most prevalent between the ages of five and 15.

"Glomerulonephritis, on the other hand, results in an inflammation of kidney structures. Blood in the urine, swelling, high blood pressure—and in severe cases, shortness of breath, delirium, convulsions and coma—characterize this condition.

"Although exact cause is unknown, this disease often follows other infections—especially those of the upper respiratory tract," Dr. Sears added.

SORGHUM EXPORTS

ON THE INCREASE

Sorghum has come to the forefront as a major export grain, and its markets are strong and steady.

"About one-fifth of the milo crop in the United States is exported each year, making it the top sorghum exporting country," says Roland Smith, grain marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"A continuing up-trend can be expected in the long run although exports may soften some this year. Japan continues as the leading importer. Israel looks like she will continue importing along with India, Venezuela, Chile, Nicaragua, the Netherlands, Iran, Niger, Mauritania, Upper Volta and Senegal, the last four being African countries," points out the Texas A&M University System specialist.

The volume of sorghum moving to Japan this year should exceed the 105 million bushels imported in 1973. This was more than half of all the sorghum exported. The Japanese use the grain for chicken and cattle feed.

Israel ranks as the second most important importer with orders exceeding 20 million bushels.

"India is not far behind but its market is dependent on human food production. When there is enough wheat and rice to go around, Indian milo imports drop. In times of food shortages, sorghum is consumed as a cereal grain," says Smith.

Using sorghum as basic chicken feed, the Netherlands imports about five million bushels yearly.

Cates Seeking Third Term In Texas House

State Representative Phil Cates announced today that he has filed for re-election to a third term in the Texas House of Representatives.

The Pampa Democrat announced that he would continue to serve the people of District 66 fairly and honestly. "Both the District and the Capitol Offices are open daily during the week," Rep. Cates said.

"I am seeking a third term to the Texas House and pledge my continued support for (1) the development of a sufficient water supply for the Panhandle-Plains region, (2) frugal fiscal practices at all levels of state government,

Some 14 million bushels of sorghum were shipped to Venezuela last year where the grain is used primarily for feeding cattle.

"Competition from other grains, mainly corn and wheat, and other producing countries exists. With substitution of one grain for another, either for human or animal consumption, grain competition has tightened. Argentina, South Africa and Thailand appear to be the strongest competitors in the export field," the specialist notes.

Smith commends the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Association and the U. S. Feed Grain Council for their efforts in opening the export door for sorghum as a livestock and human food.

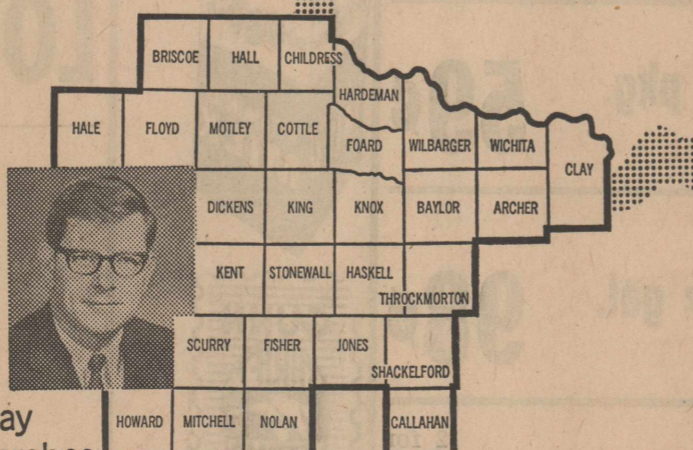

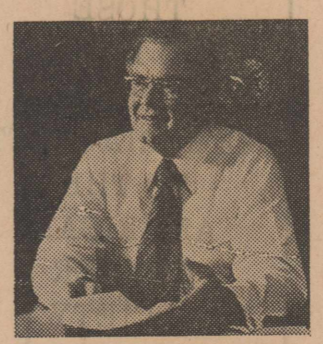

ADVERTISEMENTS SAID TO BE DISHONEST

Advertisements promoting pari-mutuel betting in Texas were characterized as dishonest today by Abner V. McCall, co-chairman of the Anti-Crime Council of Texas. "The advertisements of the gambling proponents is misleading," said McCall. "It asks us to legalize horse racing. Horse racing is already legal."
McCall noted proponents of pari-mutuel betting "don't even attempt to make the case for gambling," a situation he said is "interesting."
"ACT (Anti-Crime Council of Texas) is not against horses or horse racing. ACT is against commercialized gambling," McCall said in his statement.
He added: "The vote on May 4 is on gambling, not horse racing."
McCall, noting a half-million dollar campaign to promote gambling, commented: "We are confident the gamblers will not be able to buy the election with a barrage of misleading advertising."
