Baccalaureate services will be held in the Valley Gym on Sunday, May 26, and Commencement will be on Friday, May 31, also in the Valley Gym.

Sherice Price, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Hubert Price, is the Junior High Valedictorian with a two year average of 95.48.

Jill Eudy, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jay Eudy, is the salutatorian

for the Junior High with an average of 95.14.

Others in the Eighth Grade with high averages are Joanie Turner, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jan Turner, with 92.95, and Marlene Cawley, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Cawley, with a two-year average of 91.76.

The Junior High graduation exercises will be held Thursday night, May 30, at 8:00 o'clock.

### Voting Was Light Across Texas Last Week

Voters stayed away from the polls in droves all across Texas in last Saturday's first primary elections, in some counties less than 40 percent showing up to vote. Briscoe and Hall counties made better showings than many spots, although even here the turnout was less than hoped for.

In Hall County, Valley School Superintendent Loran Denton was elected as County Judge, taking a 950 to 369 win over W. W. Cooper, also of Turkey. Harold Lane was returned as Commissioner of Precinct 4, taking a 174-155 win over James Fuston. Zip Durrett won over Mack Cofer in the other Hall County Commissioner race. Curtis Tunnell was unopposed as Justice of the Peace, Precinct 4, Hall County.

Tops Gilreath was returned to office as County School Superintendent, winning over Ladislaus Wolka, 1183-119.

State Rep. Bill Heatley of Paducah was re-elected to that post.

Ray Farabee won in Hall County in the race of State Senator, polling 729 votes to Charles Finnell's 438. (unofficial returns)

The race scheduled to be the most hotly contested turned out to be not much of a race after all, as Hall County voters went for Hall County native Jack Hightower in his bid for the Democratic candidate against Bob Price in the November elections. Unofficial returns showed Hightower winning about 10-1 in Hall County.

Hall voters turned down the horse race betting by about 3-1.

In Briscoe County the only two local races that were contested were in the Silverton Precincts, where Johnnie Lanham defeated Barbara Pigg in a close race, 287-258. Roy S. Brown won over Bryant Eddleman for Commissioner, Precinct 4, 120-60.

In uncontested races, Mrs. Bess McWilliams was elected as County and District Clerk; Orval Cobb as Commissioner, Precinct 2; Mildred Reid, Treasurer; L. J. Bedwell, Justice of the Peace, Precinct 2, and M. G. Moreland, County Judge of Briscoe County.

In the race for U. S. Representative, 13th District, Briscoe voters cast 529 votes for Jack Hightower; Ray Ruffin, 108; Louis Finney, 36. So, once again Jack Hightower won with ease, and, of course, has won the race without a runoff.

In the race for State Senator, the spot being vacated by Hightower, Ray Farabee won in Briscoe County by a 400 to 229 margin over Charles Finnell.

The other state races in Briscoe pretty well followed the state trend.

On the gambling issue Briscoe County voted 408-213 against.

Only 17 Briscoe Republicans voted Saturday, giving 17 votes to Bob Price, United States Representative from the 13th District.

In other state races the vote was as follows: Governor: Jim Granberry, 17; Odell McBrayer, 0; Lieutenant Governor: Gaylord Marshall, 14; Troy Skates, 3; Right-to-work Amendment: For, 17; Against, 0; Income Tax: For, 15; Against, 1; Pari-Mutuel Wagering: For, 13; Against, 4.

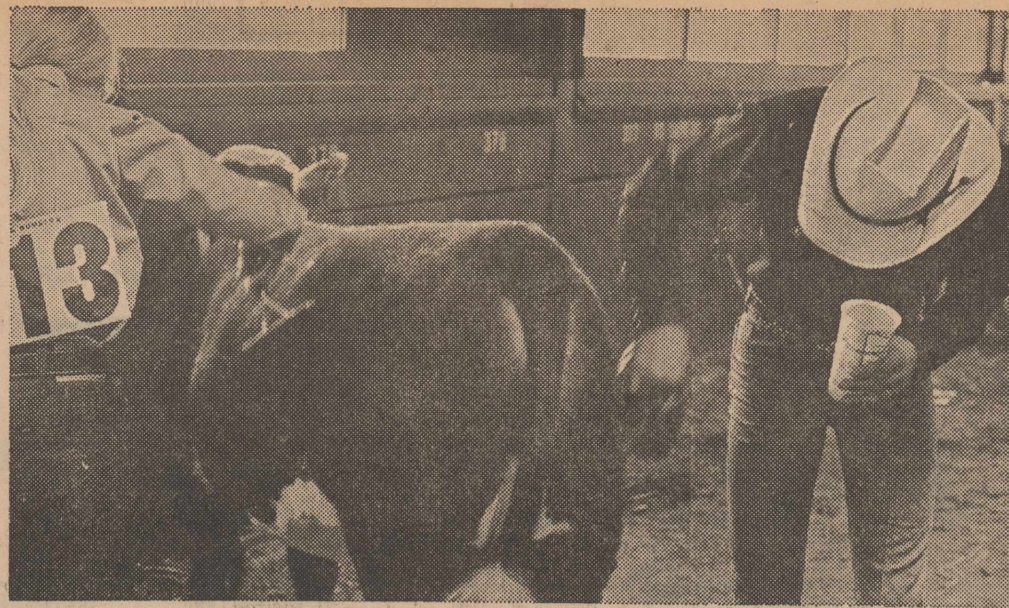

**Youths Find 4-H Beef Where The Action Is**



Being where the action is at a county or state fair doesn't mean being only on the carnival midway or close to the race track. The action and competition is even more keen in the livestock area, where literally hundreds of animals are on display, parading before judges and pleasing an enthusiastic audience.

Among the favorites are sleek beef animals, representing virtually every breed, with their coats trimmed, shined and even curled. And adding to the pleasing sight are equally well-groomed 4-H boys and girls at the end of the halter. Their concentration is overshadowed only by the pride they take in their projects which have taken a year or more of their time to feed, train and groom.

Over 166,000 4-H'ers, nationwide, are involved in beef projects varying in size from an animal or two for the younger members to a small herd for the older teens. Each hopes to win a blue ribbon, to make a profit and to learn as much as he can about producing quality beef.

Giving added incentive to the young beef producer is Celanese Chemical Company, donor of county, state and national awards in the program. Selected by the Co-operative Extension Service, up to four young people in each county can earn medals of honor. One state winner is provided an expense-paid trip to National 4-H Congress, Dec. 1-5, in Chicago, and from those high achievers, six national scholarship winners

are selected to receive \$700 grants.

Winning top beef honors at fair shows in her home state of Wyoming and elsewhere came easy to a recent national winner in the 4-H beef program. Rebecca von Forell, 17, of Wheatland, started her 4-H beef experiences with a single purebred Hereford. She expanded that initial investment into a herd of 17 purebreds valued at more than \$8500. The scholarship winner, along with her own honors in showing quality livestock, has aided younger 4-H'ers in their efforts in showmanship and judging events.
