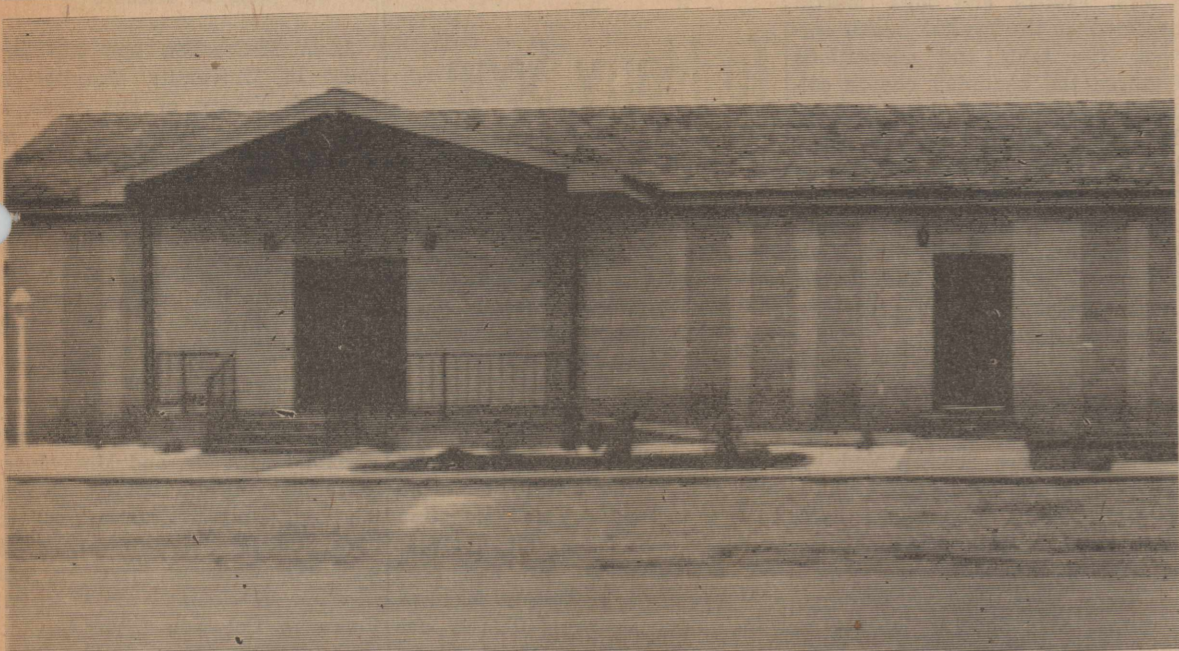

Season's First Wheat Received at Elevator

The first wheat of the season came in last week before the rains started falling, both at Turkey and Quitaque.

Arville Setliff reported that J. B. Barton of Flomot brought in the first wheat on Wednesday of last week to the Setliff Elevator in Turkey.

Ray Payne brought the first load to Quitaque on Friday and John Pigg brought in a load to the Quitaque Elevator Saturday.

The first wheat delivered was believed to have averaged about 12 bushels per acre, which is pretty good, considering the dry winter.

Deferred Grazing Is Good Soil Treatment

Deferred grazing is postponing or resting grazing land for a prescribed period. The rest period should be a minimum of three months during the growing season of the plants.

The purposes of deferred grazing are to (1) promote natural revegetation by increasing the vigor of the forage stand and permitting desirable plants to produce seed; (2) provide a feed reserve for fall and winter grazing or emergency use; (3) to improve the appearance of range with inadequate cover; and (4) to improve hydrologic conditions and reduce soil loss.

Rangeland following brush control should be deferred for at least three months to permit herbaceous vegetative maintenance and improvement. Rangeland that has been seeded to grass should be deferred the first entire growing season following planting and into subsequent years as needed to insure stand establishment.

Larry Payne Injured In Accident

Larry Payne, 9-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Lonnie Payne of Quitaque, was seriously injured late Tuesday afternoon when his leg was caught in a power takeoff on a tractor. He and his brother, Lonnie, were with their grandfather, Buck Payne, at his home southeast of Silverton. Mr. Payne had started the tractor, according to report, and as it was hard to start, he left it running while he and the boys went into the barn. He heard the boy scream and realized he had only one boy with him in the barn. When Mr. Payne and Lonnie, the older brother, got to him, they realized he had got his pants leg caught in the power takeoff.

He was taken to Plainview hospital for emergency treatment, then was transferred on to Lubbock Methodist Hospital.

The doctor there told the family his right leg was broken in two places near the ankle, and the arteries were severed. It was thought at first that his leg could not be saved but the doctor pinched the arteries together, and put pins into his leg and according to report, his leg and foot were pink and warm when friends from Quitaque left the hospital. The doctor said it would be at least 48 hours before he could tell them definitely if he could save the foot. His leg was badly skinned and he will require skin graft.

A flash flood dumped from 4 1/2 to 5 1/2 inches of rain on Turkey last Friday morning in about an hour's time, causing Main Street to become a river with the water rising to sidewalk level and in some instances flooding the stores. The city proper seemed to catch the full brunt of the freak flood which fortunately did not cover a wide area. Residents just a couple of miles west of town reported receiving less than a quarter of an inch of rain from that storm. Quitaque had a bare mist that fell only a few minutes.

Since that time heavy rains have fallen all over the area, beginning late Saturday afternoon and continuing through much of the night. Sunday night more rain fell and Monday night saw more storms all over the Panhandle area.

As is usual in weather as has occurred in the past five days, rainfall has been heavier in some spots than in others and there is no way to find out a general figure but most everyone seems to feel that probably at least five inches has fallen on most everyone. Arville Setliff, who is manager of the Quitaque Elevator, estimates that Turkey proper probably has received 10 inches or more since Friday of last week. No reports of hail in the Valley has been heard of by the Tribune staff, although much of the Silverton area received hail both Saturday and Sunday nights.

So, the drought has been broken, but many thousands of acres of crops must be replanted, and on the Plains, it is getting very late for that.

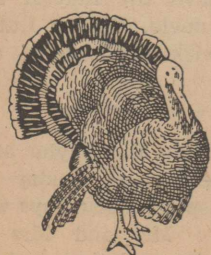

Blackleg Vaccination Advisable Every Year

All cattle under two years of age should be vaccinated for blackleg every year, advises Jimmy Vanstory, Briscoe County Agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

According to Vanstory, blackleg has been around for a long time and seems to show up wherever cattle are raised. It is caused by bacteria which are usually ingested with feed. The infection ends up in the heavy muscles of the animal, where it causes great damage and forms large quantities of gas in the tissues. When pressure is applied to the affected area, the gas in the tissues makes a crackling sound, like paper being crumpled.

An animal which has died from blackleg has a characteristic posture. Because of the terrific swelling soon after death, the animal has its legs extended and stiff like a sawhorse.

Once animals are stricken with the disease, they usually die in 12 to 48 hours. The disease can be prevented by vaccination with a bacterin made from the organism which causes the disease. Since animals under two years of age are the ones usually affected, they are the ones which should be vaccinated.

Although annual vaccination means that some animals be vaccinated more than once, this will not hurt the animals and will keep resistance at a high level, explains Vanstory.

If there is an outbreak of blackleg on your farm, the best thing to do is to vaccinate all the young animals and hope you are getting ahead of the infection. You may continue to lose animals for about two weeks. After that much time has passed since vaccination, the animals are generally safe. However, an annual vaccination program for all cattle under two years of age will eliminate chances of an outbreak, contends Vanstory.

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Texas Declared "Hog Cholera Free"

May 24 marked a special milestone for Texas swine producers in the battle against hog cholera. After a year free of outbreaks of the costly swine disease, Texas has been declared "hog cholera free" by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, announces Jimmy Vanstory, Briscoe County Agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The occasion marks the first time since late 1962 that all 50 states have been pronounced free of hog cholera.

In a special ceremony in Austin, a certificate recognizing the achievement—signed by Secretary of Agriculture Earl L. Butz—was presented to Norman Moser, chairman of the Texas Animal Health Commission. The presentation was made by Dr. Francis Mulhern, administrator of the USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service, Washington, D. C. Mulhern praised the work done

in Texas as well as in the other swine producing states to eradicate hog cholera. He noted that the efforts have already resulted in great savings to producers and that these savings will be even more significant in the coming years.

The USDA official cautioned producers to remain vigilant, however, so that the dreaded disease can be kept out of the state. This is especially important in Texas since the state borders Mexico where hog cholera is still widespread.

Recent isolated cases of the disease have popped up in Mississippi and Puerto Rico, but the cases were quickly contained and the "hog cholera free" status was not revoked, Vanstory points out.

The disease ran rampant in the 1950's, destroying an estimated 5,000 to 6,000 swine herds annually and costing producers \$40 to \$50 million a year in vaccine alone. Vaccine use was discontinued after 1969.

A cooperative state-federal era-

tion program began in late 1962 and has since cost just over \$100 million. About a fourth of that cost has gone to pay indemnities to produce whose hogs had to be destroyed to stamp out infection.

The remaining costs have been for field operations and laboratory expenses.

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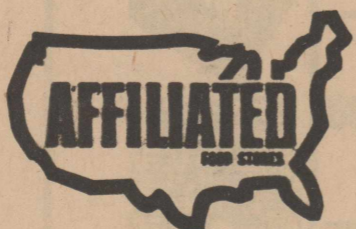

Home Gardens May Need Extra Fertilizer

With home gardens making good progress in most areas, now is the time to consider additional fertilizer applications.

According to Jimmy Vanstory, Briscoe County Agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, most vegetable crops will respond to additional fertilizer. Soil type, type of fertilizer, row spacing and the particular crop will determine the amount of fertilizer used.

More fertilizer can be applied to heavy clay soils than to light sandy soils because heavy soils hold nutrients better. Crops grown on sandy soils will respond to light, frequent applications of side-dressed fertilizer, points out Vanstory.

Additional fertilizer applied as a side-dress application should be of a form that is readily available to growing crops, adds Vanstory. The most common forms are ammonium sulfate (21-0-0) and ammonium nitrate (33-0-0). Most home grown vegetables will respond to light applications of nitrogen but show little benefit from applications of complete fertilizers containing nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium.

Apply fertilizer between the garden rows and work it into the soil if possible. Be careful to avoid root damage and do not place the fertilizer too close to the growing plants, cautions Vanstory.

For most fruiting crops such as beans, tomatoes, peppers, eggplant, okra and the vine crops, apply five teaspoons of ammonium sulfate or two to three teaspoons of ammonium nitrate for each ten

feet of garden row. Begin applications when the fruit of the tomato, pepper and eggplant are about one inch in diameter and repeat at two to three week intervals. For beans, okra and the vine crops, begin side dressing after the first harvest.

Root crops such as onions, beets and turnips will often make satisfactory growth without additional fertilizer. If growth is poor, light applications of a nitrogen fertilizer should help.

Sweet corn responds to liberal amounts of nitrogen. Fertilize with four tablespoons of ammonium nitrate or eight tablespoons of ammonium sulfate per ten feet of row when the corn is 12 to 18 inches tall.

Vanstory reminds home gardeners that these rates are general and will vary with row spacing and soil type. The successful home gardener will avoid over-fertilizing but will also make sure that growing crops do not suffer from a lack of nutrients.

Leafy crops such as lettuce, cabbage and greens can be fertilized at about twice the rate used for fruiting crops, since more foliage growth is needed, points out Van-

story. Begin side-dress applications after several sets of character leaves have formed and repeat at two-week intervals. If plants are making satisfactory growth, reduce the rate but continue bi-weekly applications.

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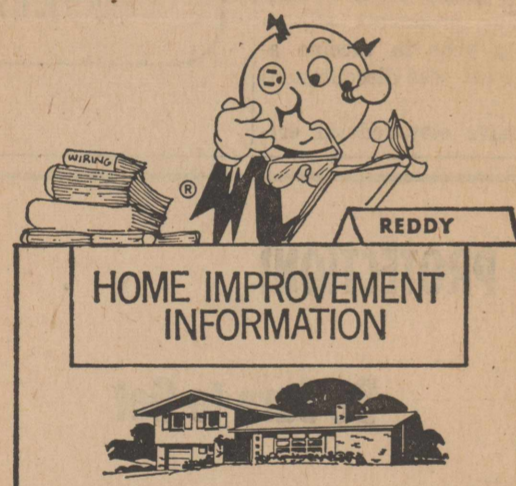
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
