# The End Of An Era

June 21, 1974 marked the end of a colorful era. It was on this date that Jim Stroup signed the deed that conveyed the remainder of the Stroup Ranch west of Quitaque that had been in possession of his family since 1903. It was a very difficult decision for Jim to make, but advancing years and a plaguing arthritic condition convinced him that it was time to step aside and leave the rigors of ranch life to a younger generation. A storehouse of memories, however, surely must have flooded his mind as he signed the deed to Dale and Dona Smith on that last section of land. Jim's mother, the late Dora Merrell Stroup, came to the area that is now Floyd County in June of 1888, and his father, O. W. Stroup, came to this country in the spring of 1892. For a few years Mr. Stroup worked for the F Ranch, then he was hired by Charles Goodnight, who offered to help him file on two sections of land along the Quitaque River, just above Quitaque Falls. In 1901 Dora Merrell and O. W. Stroup were married, and they lived in a one-room house on this claim. Later this land was exchanged for two sections west of Quitaque in Briscoe County, and four children, Jim, Gladys, Charles and Jack, were added to the Stroup household. Eventually the Stroup ranch expanded to 4,032 acres, plus an adjacent 640 acres that was owned by Jim and his wife, Myrtie. From 1892 until this date the Stroup name has been synonymous with our early pioneers and the development of the Caprock country. On December 10, 1960, at the age of 87, O. W. Stroup passed away. After Mrs. Stroup's passing in 1969 the family knew it was finally time to dispose of the estate, so in 1971 all but Jim's land was sold in two parcels. E. A. Birdwell purchased all but the home place section, and Gerald and Dale Smith became the new owners of the 640 acres

Some great changes have taken place around Quitaque since those early days before the turn of the century. When the Stroups came to this country there were no roads, just lines of endless cow trails. The countryside was a picture of raw native beauty, with bountiful grass and trees visible as far as the eye could see. As people crossed the prairie they sometimes drove one way and then another, and eventually the beaten-out tracks would form make-shift roads. There were three choices of conveyances—wagon, horseback or buggy. After the land was slowly settled, and the town of Quitaque was established, Mrs. Stroup recalled that six wire gates had to be opened between their house and town.

But through it all a family was reared, a town was formed and a country was settled. And the blessings of life far outweighed the trials and hardships, and as Jim settled back in his apartment in town and summed it all up, he was probably speaking not only for himself and the Stroup family, but also for all the other pioneers who did so much to mold our country. He said: "God has been so great, so good, and has blessed me in so many ways during my life. He has blessed me with good health, a strong body, a godly wife, a son, and so many friends and other blessings that I can never count them all."





# Clip and save this vacation checklist.

- REFRIGERATOR OR FREEZER: Change thermostat control to slightly warmer (or "Vacation") setting according to the manufacturer's recommendations.
- DISHWASHER: Make sure it's empty. Shut the door, but
- DISPOSER: Run and flush with cold water.
- TELECTRIC RANGE: Make sure all switches are in the WASHERS: Turn off water supply at faucets.
- WATER HEATER (ELECTRIC): Turn off at circuit breaker
- panel. When you return, run a small amount of water from a hot water faucet to make sure there is water in the tank before you turn the circuit on. TRASH COMPACTOR: Remove any accumulated trash.
- TELEVISION SETS: Unplug from electric outlet and disconnect the antenna lead-in cable. CLOCK RADIOS, ETC.: Check these and all other items with automatic "On-Off" controls. Disconnect the ones that won't be needed.
- LIGHTING: Be sure that all lights are off except those needed for security, such as: 1) yard light and/or other exterior lighting with automatic controls — on at dusk, off at dawn; 2) portable lamp in living area with automatic control; 3) hall or bathroom light.
- AIR CONDITIONING: Normally, air conditioning should be turned off completely while on summer vacation. However, if there is anything in your home that might suffer heat damage, the thermostat setting could be raised 5 to 10 degrees above normal operation and the unit left on. For comfort, you might have a friend or neighbor turn on the unit the day of your return.

### Chef's Touch Ideas for Quick and Easy Cooking

NEW YORK (ED)—Using a basic mix, like a spaghetti sauce one, you can come up with a wide variety of dishes. The prepared sauce makes an interesting basic basting sauce for both chicken and spareribs. Browned pork chops cooked in the sauce take on a different character. Serve these with rice or even noodles.

Substitute white wine for part of the water called for when preparing the sauce, and you have an interesting flavor for children. Simply brown chicken pieces, put in casserole and pour the wineflavored sauce over the top Cook in the oven until the chicken is done.

And, of course, spaghetti sauce mix may be used to prepare the traditional Italian dishes such as pizza, veal or eggplant Parmesan and

Following is a recipe for Lasagne Supper. It's an old recipe with a new twist. Chopped broccoli has been added for color, flavor and extra nutrition. It's also meatless to help the budget. To give yourself a night off from cooking, make two at one time and freeze one before baking it. It will be ready for one of those days you had no time for cooking or just didn't want to cook.

LASAGNE SUPPER 9 lasagne noodles (about 1/2

## Through the Zoo With Eye and Camera

NEW YORK (ED)—A spring photographic safari to your local zoo offers an over-whelming variety of animal subjects as they react happily to being outdoors again. In the spring there is the added attraction of the new and lively young animals.

Whether yours is a big city zoo with acres of building and outdoor runs, or a small, one-building menagerie, a little planning on your part will result in better pictures. As a start, find out when feeding time is scheduled. The animals will be at their most alert when they know their food is coming and, of course, feeding time itself is usually good for pictures. In some cases, such as a sea lion leaping for a fish, the results can be spectacular.

At a large zoo, it might be wise to limit yourself to, say, the monkeys or the big cats. Then just watch. Your patience will be rewarded. While you're waiting, give some thought to lighting angles.
With the animal on one side of the bars or moat and

you on the other, it's true you are somewhat limited in your choice of angle. When it's possible, however, try to shoot so that backlighting will heighten the texture of the animal's fur.


