Chalmers Resigns, Hulsey Named Head Football Coach



Valley High Football Coach and Mrs. Chalmers submitted their resignations as coach and teachers to the Valley School Board a few days ago, and Bill Hulsey, who served last year as assistant football coach and head boy's basketball coach, has been named athletic director, head football coach and head boys basketball coach at Valley High. Coach Hulsey had been named as athletic coordinator for the Valley School several weeks ago, but was named athletic director in the recent shuffle of duties.

A new girls coach, Davis Sanders, was named several weeks ago, so the Valley officials are now looking for an assistant to work with Coach Hulsey. Officials

report that they already have one prospect for that post and hope that the vacancy will be taken care of right away.

In addition to an assistant coach, the Board will hire two other teachers: one for the spot vacated by Mrs. Chalmers and one for the vacancy left when Mrs. Christine Williams submitted her resignation. It was thought that perhaps some of the duties of some of the other teachers could be reassigned to take care of that vacancy but that didn't prove feasible so another teacher will be hired in the lower grades.

Superintendent Wilburn Leeper and Principal Jerry Maupin have announced the following schedule for registration, which will take place on Thursday, August 16:

The elementary grades will enroll from 9:00 until 11:00 a.m. on Monday, August 19 which will be a full day of school and will begin at 8:30 a.m. A full assembly of the school will be held in the gym at 9:30 a.m.

The Teacher In-Service Training will be August 12-17.

Burning Crop Residues Is Costly Practice

Gaseous elements such as nitrogen will be completely lost by the burning. This amounts to about 30 pounds of nitrogen in a good irrigated crop which at current prices would be at least \$3.60 per acre. There would be a loss of soil organic matter, the acidic matter, a well s source of food for the various heterotrophs bacteria which depend on this organic matter as well as a source of food for specific interest are the Azotobacter and Clostridium which fix gaseous nitrogen into available nitrogen non-symbiotically at an annual rate of about 10-50 pounds an acre.

Burning residues causes the soil structure to gradually deteriorate as the soil organic matter is reduced. The soil intake rate, aeration, and porosity are lessened. Erosion and porosity are lessened. Erosion becomes a greater hazard due to the exposure of the soil to wind and rainfall.

Terraces Help To Control Erosion

Building terraces can help control erosion, at least for a while. But how terraces do their job depends on how they are farmed. So says Bob Rauch, district conservationist for the U. S. Soil Conservation Service at Silverton.

Unfortunately, too many farmers plow across their terraces or fail to maintain them properly, Rauch said. Gradually, the terraces lose their capacity to intercept runoff water. Then when heavy rain strikes, many terraces are broken.

Terraces that are properly maintained keep the water on the land and prevent erosion.

Rauch said SCS has published a new booklet, "Farming Terraced Land," which describes ways to farm terraces so that their original capacity is maintained. The illustrated publication gives step-by-step methods for plowing terraced land with a minimum number of trips.

DPS To Sell Equipment at Auction

The auction, which will be conducted in cooperation with the State Board of Control, will be held at DPS Headquarters at the intersection of Guadalupe and Koenig Lane in Austin.

According to DPS officials, many of the automobiles are air conditioned and fully equipped.

Office equipment items include adding machines, typewriters, tape recorders, a dictating machine and others. Several items found in shops will be auctioned by Nelson International of Dallas and include torches, drills, jacks, air compressor, frequency meters, tube checker and power plant.

The DPS plans to auction two way mobile radio units, station transceivers and base station cabinets in addition to other gear.

Miss Blackledge is a 1973 graduate of Monterey High School, and is employed at Methodist Hospital in the Radiology Department.

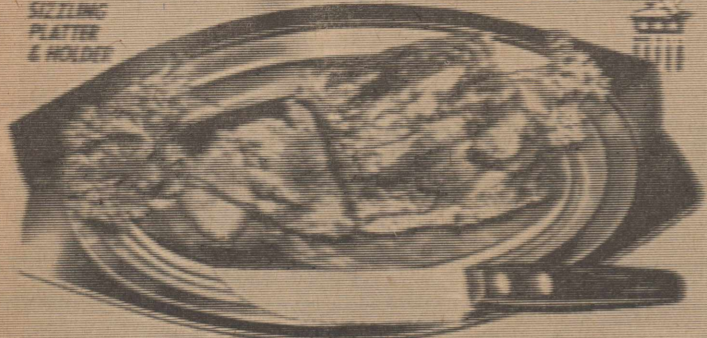
Her fiance graduated from Turkey High School and is a senior student of Radiologic Technology at Methodist.

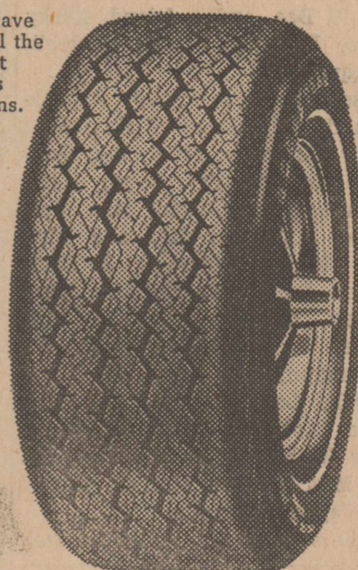

Hunting, Fishing Guides off The Press

Information on game and fish laws for coming seasons is contained in the new "Guide to Hunting and Freshwater Fishing Regulations, 1974-75" soon to be available wherever hunting and fishing licenses are sold.

The 20-page booklet from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department this year features a county-by-county listing of seasons and bag limits for popular game species along with fishing regulations.

More detailed information is listed for licenses, tags and permits, minnows, fur-bearing animals and general freshwater sport fishing and hunting rules.

Not included and yet to be established by the Parks and Wildlife Commission are regulations for migratory game birds and commercial and saltwater fishing.

The hunting and freshwater fishing regulations will be available around August 16 at all Parks and Wildlife offices and from all license deputies at sporting goods and tackle stores who are bonded for the 1974-75 fiscal year.

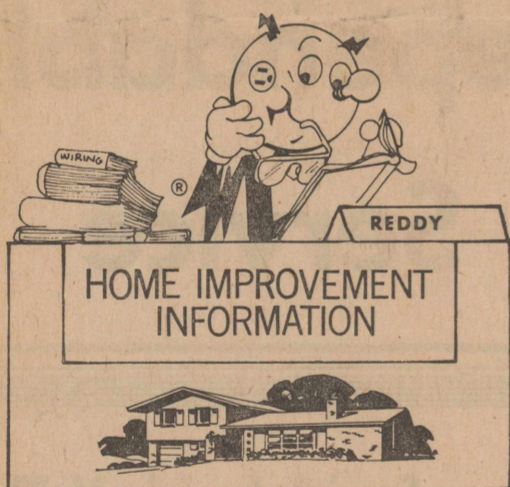
