Mr. Beryl D. Clinton, Dean of Clarendon College, has indicated that students electing to enroll in ROTC may substitute ROTC classes for required physical education and health classes. For those students wishing to enroll in the ROTC program, Captain Eugene D. Colgan of the WTSU ROTC faculty will be present at Clarendon College during registration for the Fall Semester.

Students enrolled in the Clarendon College ROTC program are eligible to compete for scholarships the same as ROTC students at four-year institutions. Scholarship students receive \$100 per month for approximately 10 months of each school year.

Courses to be offered at Clarendon College include military marksmanship/drill, land navigation, and military history. These courses are open to students of either sex as well as to veterans at a cost of only \$6.00 per semester hour.




