Patriots To Scrimmage At Wheeler Friday

The Valley High School Patriots, after a good showing in the first scrimmage of the season last Friday, will go to Wheeler Friday afternoon to have a go at the Wheeler Mustangs, starting at 4 o'clock Friday afternoon. The scrimmage was originally set to be held at Wellington but has been moved to Wheeler.

In last Friday's tussle with the Kress Kangaroos, which was held

at Turkey, it was pretty even as each team scored twice, but the Patriots had a third real good drive going toward a score but could not put it across.

Coach Bill Hulsey and assistants David Sanders and Rod Setliff all reported that they were very pleased with the showing of the Patriots, who showed a lot of spirit and hustle.

Coach Hulsey said he was especially pleased with the squad in the manner in which the squad executed assignments, both offensively and defensively, and that there were no mental lapses and dumb mistakes. He said that the boys only jumped offside perhaps a couple of times. He said that in spite of the fact that the team had only had a week's workouts behind

it, he thought things looked pretty good. Kress, a Class A team, is always pretty tough, so business will be picking up for the Patriots. "More in '74" might be a pretty good slogan for players and fans alike, for this year's team is mighty determined to bring a quick halt to the losing streak of the Patriots, whose first two years of

competition failed to chalk up a single win in football.

The Valley High boys also have a lot of respect and confidence in Coach Bill Hulsey for he took over the fortunes of the boys basketball team last year and made a winner out of a team that won only two games the year before. The Patriots won over every team in the district at least once and came within a whisker of winning the district championship.

The Patriots are prepping for the season-opener against Chillicothe at Chillicothe on Friday, September 6.

The Patriots have gone against Chillicothe the past two years in the first game of the season and on each occasion were definite underdogs and on both occasions apparently had the game won only to see it slip away in the fading minutes of the game. This, the third time, the Patriots are determined that this is not going to happen. They are going to be real fired up for this one and they are hoping that all fans are already making plans to go along with them and see win number one in football for Valley High. But they also do not plan to stop on win number one—they are planning on winning other games. In fact, just between us fans, they are planning on winning every game!

Joey Barefield became the year's first casualty, serious-wise, as he suffered a muscle separation in his hip and is out for the season. However, Joey is already planning on being well in time to play basketball. The doctor said it would take a couple of months for his injury to heal and basketball will be about ready to begin at that time.

Jesse Ferguson is presently the only other member of the squad with a very serious injury. He is suffering with an injury to his Achilles tendon but is hoping to be back in a couple of weeks. There are a few other assorted bumps and bruises but nothing believed to be serious.

Good Rains Fall Over Most of Valley Area

Crop prospects have brightened considerably in the past week for all of the valley area although some spots in the Turkey area still have not had enough rain. As far as can be learned from 2½ to near five inches have fallen in the Quitaque area. In the Turkey area at least an inch has been reported by almost everyone, although Jay Eudy reported Tuesday afternoon that his farm had received only .6. Showers have been falling intermittently all day Wednesday and hopefully some of those drier spots are wetter and it still looks rainy.

Wayne Farley Killed

The 29-year-old victim of a hit-and-run motorcycle-car accident died enroute to Albuquerque, New Mexico Sunday, August 18, where he was being flown to St. Joseph's Hospital for treatment of head injuries.

He was Louis Wayne Farley of 5209 Hubbard Road. Arrested following the accident and charged with traffic violations only at the present time was David Tom, 19, of Shiprock, Arizona.

City police said Farley, who was a gas well switcher for McDaniels Production Company, was approaching the Main-Industrial Avenue intersection on his cycle about 8:00 p.m. Saturday when he was struck by a car driven by Tom which reportedly ran through the stop light.

Tom, who authorities said left the scene, was later apprehended by State Police on US 550 near the Big Rock Trading Post after a description of his car was circulated. He has been initially charged with stop sign violation, no driver's license, failure to report an accident and leaving the scene of an accident involving injury or death.

Farley was admitted to San Juan Hospital following the accident and then died of massive head injuries while in the process of being flown to Albuquerque Sunday.

His death was the fourteenth on Farmington streets during 1974 as compared to six at the same time a year ago.

The victim is survived by his wife, Karren, and two daughters, Shauna and Karinda, all of the family home. Funeral services

Several of our Turkey students will soon be returning to their respective colleges and some will be entering as freshmen.

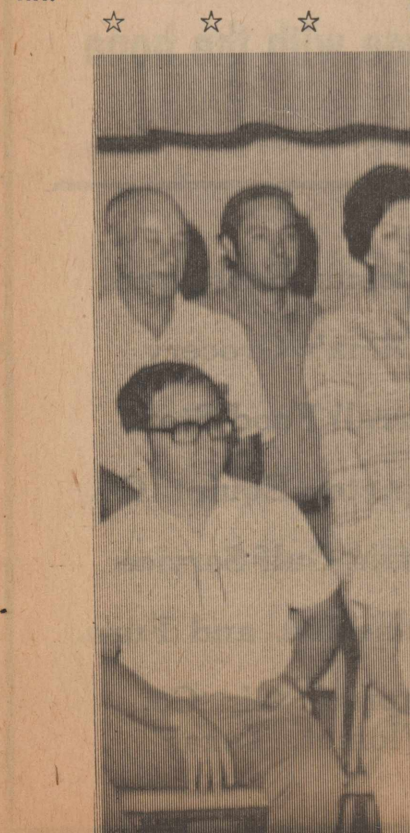

FmHA To Guarantee Emergency Loans

Financial assistance to livestock and poultry producers under the Emergency Livestock Credit Act will become available this week through a new loan guarantee authority of the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), a rural credit service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Mr. George H. James, jr., FmHA County Supervisor, said agency will be prepared to implement the recently-enacted law by guaranteeing up to 80 percent of possible loss on loans made by legally-organized lenders to livestock and poultry producers.

Under terms of the act, the loan guarantee program will be in effect through July 25, 1975. It may be extended for six months beyond that date if the Secretary of Agriculture determines that it is needed to help the livestock industry obtain sufficient credit.

The law calls for loans to be made by banks or other legally-organized lenders. Interested producers are urged to make applications to, and complete loan arrangements with lending institutions. The lender in turn will ask FmHA for a loan guarantee if one is required. The lender will process the application, close the loan and service it.

The maximum loan to any single borrower that can be assisted by an FmHA guarantee is \$250,000. Loans will be repayable from one to three years, although renewal for two years may be authorized. Interest rates are determined between borrower and lender.

Mr. James said the agency is authorized to guarantee up to 80 percent loss a lender may incur on loans to bonafide farmers and ranchers who breed, raise, fatten or market beef and dairy cattle, hogs, sheep, goats, chickens and turkeys. A majority of the borrower's income must come from the operation and a majority portion of the borrower's time must be devoted to the livestock or poultry production.

In the case of a corporation or partnership, assistance can be extended only when the majority partners or stockholders are primarily engaged in the livestock or poultry production.

FmHA guarantees will be made only when the bonafide farmer or rancher cannot obtain financing without a guarantee. Loans may not be used to expand operations.

Mr. James said the county FmHA office serving the area where the borrower's livestock or poultry operations are conducted will handle requests from lenders for guarantees, or supply information on the loan guarantee program.



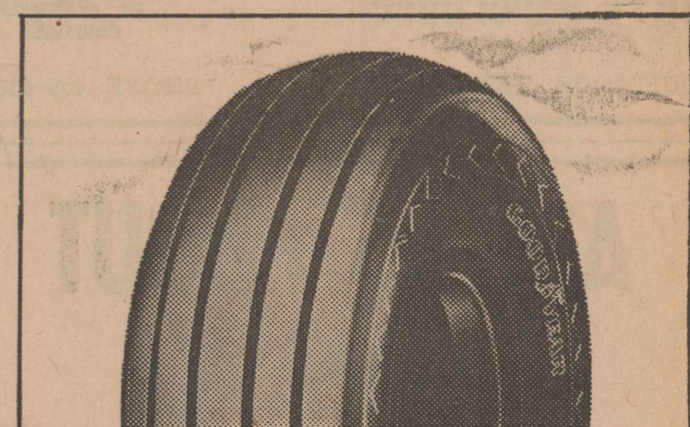

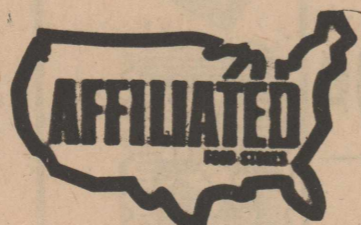
