## Patriots Put It All Together To Take First Football Game



VALLEY HIGH CHEERLEADERS for Valley High this year are Von-Responsible for stirring up a lot of spirit and leading the cheers

A fired-up gang of Valley High Patriots, smarting from a 21-game losing streak, won the school's first football game ever last Friday night in defeating the Silverton Owls 31-0 on Vardy Field at Turkey. The game was the second game of the third season as a consolidated school.

The game was figured to be a close one by what happened last year, only in reverse, but did not turn out that way. Last year in the latter part of the season the Patriots and Owls met, both were winless to that point, but the Owls returned the opening kickoff for a touchdown and when the final whistle blew the Owls had routed the Patriots 46-0.

Friday night the Patriots kicked to the Owls, then recovered an Owl fumble on the first play from scrimmage on the Owl 40 yard line. The Patriots, aided by three penalties against the Owls, drove for a touchdown with Scotty Setliff carrying over from eight yards out. The try for extra point was missed.

On Silverton's second series of plays the Patriots again recovered a fumble by the Owls at midfield. Valley drove to the Owl 20 yard line where the drive stalled. The first quarter ended with Valley out ahead 6-0 after controlling the ball almost the entire first period.

Silverton picked up its first first down of the game in the early going of the second quarter, then fumbled and lost the ball away on its own 45 yard line. The Patriots promptly fumbled it right back to the Owls on the 45. The Owls were once again unable to move and had to kick. During this possession the Patriots scored their second touchdown with Brian Wheeler lugging it in from 30 yards out. Once again the try for extra point failed. There were 6:14 minutes left in the half.

Once again the Owls were unable to move the ball and had to kick to the Patriots who took over on their own 34. At this point the Patriot offense was working well. Brian Wheeler broke loose for a 36 yard run to the Owl 20, then Randy Green drove to the two yard line and once more Scotty Setliff stepped into the end zone from that point to make the count

18-0 and that was the way it remained as the extra point try was no good. That was the score at halftime a couple of minutes later.

The third quarter was scoreless. An Owl fumble once again

set the Patriots up for business again midway of the fourth quarter on the Owl 25 yard line. Scotty Setliff ran six yards for his third score of the night and the Patriots' kick try for extra point failed, making the score 24-0. Deep in the fourth period quarterback Ron Eudy turned in the longest run of the night and one of the longest ever for a Patriot, when it broke into the clear on a QB keeper play and raced for 55 yards before being hauled down from behind by an Owl defender. A couple of plays later Ron Eudy passed to Pepper Jones on a 10 yard play good for the final TD. Ernie Lucero kicked the extra point this time for the final score, 31-0.

Brightest spot in Friday's win was the 31 points recorded on the scoreboard. The Patriots have always played tough defense but have been unable to muster much offense. All four of the starters in the backfield, Eudy, Setliff, Green and Brian Wheeler, ran well with the ball, with Wheeler probably picking up the most yardage.

The offensive line did a pretty good job of blocking in this match.

### Valley Junior High Roll To Win Over Wheeler

The Valley Junior High Patriots, winners over Clarendon in their first game of the season, drove over to Wheeler last Thursday and came off a second straight winner, by a 22-0 margin.

The young Patriots wasted little time in getting on the scoreboard with a 15 yard pass from Kirk Proctor to Darrell Dowd. Following the TD Kenneth Helms plunged over for the two extra points to make the score 8-0 with 7:56 remaining in the first quarter.

Kenneth Helms scored the second TD on a three yard rushing play but the try for extra point was missed. The score was 14-0 at halftime.

In the third period Proctor passed to Dowd again for a 35 yard pass and run play good for another score, and Kenneth Helms ran for the two-point conversion to make the tally 22-0. With 6:22 left in the third period at this time, Coach Hulsey emptied the bench and the reserves played the remainder of the game except for the last three plays. The little boys could not score but did a good job keeping the much bigger Wheeler boys from scoring, also.

The Junior High team plays Silverton there tonight (Thursday) at 6 o'clock. The Valley Junior High will host the Kress Junior High team here Thursday night of next week at 6 p.m.

The defensive heroics of Mickey Smith, however, earned him the Amarillo Daily News selection as Class B Player of the Week. Mickey, 160 lb. senior, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Dale Smith of Quitaque.

The Tribune salutes the entire Patriot squad, Coaches Bill Hulsey, David Sanders and Rod Setliff. Everyone is real proud of that first win and we think there will be other victories.

This Friday night the Patriots drive out to Fanwell and will be out to add another win to the ledger.

Valley took the opening-game kickoff and worked the ball out to the 25 yard line, only to lose possession on a fumble. Wheeler took over and moved in for the TD for a 6-0 lead, missing the conversion attempt.

The Patriots took the kickoff on their own two yard line, could not move the ball and had to punt. The kick was a very short one and Wheeler was in business on Valley's 27 yard line. Wheeler went on to score and owned a 12-0 lead at the end of the first period.

In the second period of play Valley was again forced to punt and this time the kick was blocked and Wheeler took over on Valley's 43 yard line. On the third play the Mustangs scored on a 21 yard double reverse.

In the second half the Patriots took up some slack and held the Mustangs scoreless, but were unable to move in for a score themselves.

Although the JV Patriots were losers in their first outing, fans who saw the game agreed there are some promising prospects on the squad.

The JV Patriots will play at Silverton tonight (Thursday) and on Thursday night of next week will host the JV Kangaroos of Kress. The game will start at 7:30.

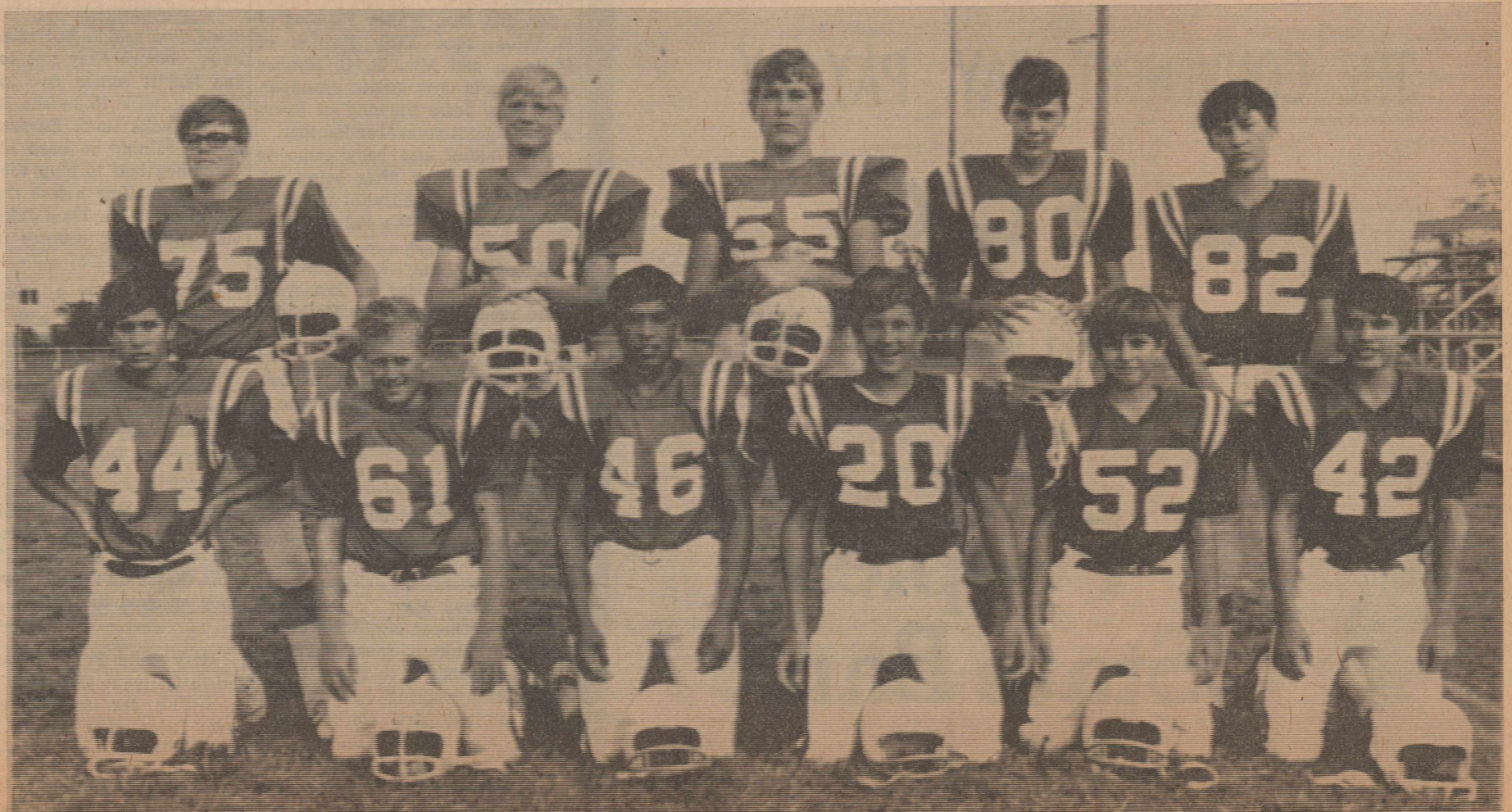
### Turkey Farmers Union To Meet

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**Hamilton To Receive New Maytag Washer**

LeRoy Hamilton of Quitaque will receive a new automatic washer as a result of his entry in a nationwide search conducted by the Maytag company.

Hamilton's entry was identified as the oldest Maytag automatic washer in the Amarillo area, one of 121 markets where the search was conducted. New Maytag automatic washers are being presented

to the winning entries in each of these markets.

The presentation of the new washer to Hamilton marks the final step in the appliance firm's search for the oldest working Maytag automatic for its historical museum in Newton, Ia. The oldest machine was found in Story City, Iowa, and was identified as the 12th the company had manufactured. Owners of that washer, Mr. and Mrs. Vern Hornbacher, received \$5,000 in cash in addition to a new washer.

The search was held by the company to observe the Silver An-

niversary of its automatic washer, first produced in 1949. Conducted earlier this year, the search resulted in more than 25,000 letters to the company.

It rained on us every day we were away.

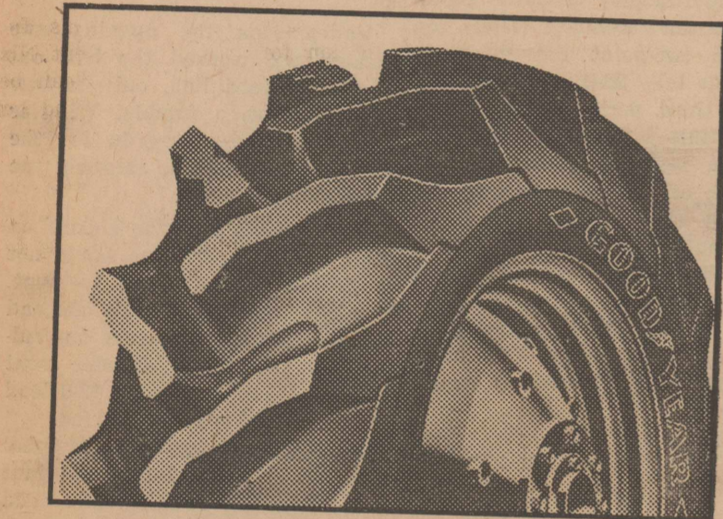
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### Cook Is New Lubbock Agent

### CONSTRUCTION ON SCHEDULE AT TELEPHONE EXCHANGE

J. H. Davis, district manager for General Telephone Company, announced today that all foundation work is complete and the contractors are presently raising the structural steel for the building addition of 40'x102' to the Memphis telephone exchange building. Construction began in July and is presently scheduled to complete in February 1975. All construction work is on schedule.

The addition is being made to house new equipment in connection with the project to furnish Direct Distance Dialing (DDD) next year in Memphis and all the towns toll centered on Memphis which are Wellington, Dodson, Clarendon, Hedley, Lakeview, Estelline, Turkey and Quitaque. Silverton's toll center will be changed from Lubbock to Memphis and DDD furnished on this same project, according to Davis.

New underground toll cables will be placed to Lakeview, Turkey, Quitaque, Silverton, Wellington and Dodson to replace existing open wire facilities in connection with this Direct Distance Dialing project.

### Hightower Comments On Pardon

Senator Jack Hightower, Democratic nominee for Congress, said today that President Ford's full pardon for former President Nixon "has wiped the slate clean before we had a chance to find out what was going to be written on the slate."

Hightower said he personally feels compassion for Mr. Nixon and has no interest in looking for ways to punish him.

"But for nearly 200 years this has been a nation of laws and not men," Hightower added. "Americans have a right to expect fair and equal treatment under the law for all citizens. I think the President's action poses real problems for Watergate defendants who have been convicted or who still face trial."

"When President Ford took office he said the long national nightmare of Watergate was over, and we all breathed a sigh of relief and rallied behind the new President. Now the nightmare has been revived, and I am afraid national unity will be severely affected."

"Perhaps President Ford had a reason for acting so prematurely to pardon a man who has not even been charged with a criminal offense, but it seems to me this action raises new questions and may prevent the people from ever knowing the full story of what happened in the Watergate affair."

"It seems to me the administration should be devoting its full attention at this time to the nation's economic ills rather than looking backward at Watergate."

"The President has said, and rightfully so, that inflation is public enemy number 1, but apparently there are some members of the administration who are more interested in dragging out the Watergate tragedy rather than attacking the problems of high interest rates, soaring food costs, and tight money," Hightower concluded.

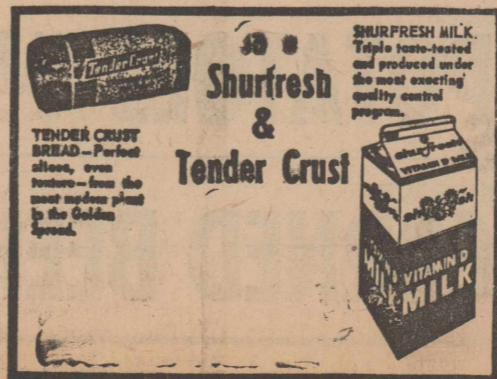
