Patriots Look A Bit Ragged In Scrimmage Against Kress

Coach Rick Dill, and most of the fans who saw the Patriots in their scrimmage against Kress here last Friday evening thought the Patriots looked ragged for the most part, which usually can be said of any team after the first scrimmage of the season. A team cannot give up about half of its starters from the year before and not look a bit ragged at the first scrimmage of the season. Too, several of this year's team are only sophomores and will take awhile to get into the groove and get the old confidence going good. But the potential is there and this team will jell and become tough to handle. A little experience playing together will do the job. Coach Dill was pretty well satisfied with the senior members of the team

last Friday night. He pointed out Barry Wheeler as playing well, along with Rex Fuston, Jeff Tiffin, and Doyle Proctor. Ron Eudy, senior quarterback, was also looking good until he twisted an ankle early in the scrimmage and did not play anymore. It was thought at first that Ron suffered a hair-line fracture of the ankle and it was placed in a cast. However, it was determined later that there was no fracture and the cast was removed Monday. Ron will probably be all set for the opening game of the season against Chilli-cothe on September 3. The Patriots will drive over to Crosbyton next Friday for a scrimmage against the Chiefs at 6:30. The following story and accompanying photo appeared in the Lubbock Avalanche - Journal a couple of weeks ago. It will be of interest to those who do not see the Lubbock paper.

It's already a year of looking for Dill, who was assistant to Bill Hulsey here last year. Hulsey was head football and head basketball coach last year as the Patriots went 9-1 and 22-8 in the respective sports, finishing second in both. Hulsey was to have been a grid aid this fall and head basketball, but resigned after coaching school to take the coaching job at Hobbs, Texas. So Dill is currently looking for another coach. He's not, however, having to look far to find Grade-A gridgers. Quarterback Ron Eudy threw for some 2,000 yards as a junior. "He's extremely smooth; he can throw the ball 55-60 yards in the air," Dill explained. Barry Wheeler, whose older brother played in the recent Greenbelt Bowl game, rushed for more than 1,200 yards last year. "We plan on using the T and the Wing T about 50 per cent each. We have pretty good-sized backs, but we'll throw as much out of the I as out of the T," Dill who was head man three years at Gallup earlier this decade, said. Two sophomores, 6-2 Kenny Chandler and 5-9 Jeff Crump, added 30 pounds over the summer. "Chandler's up to about 210 now," Dill beamed, "but he doesn't look it. He's a big kid and he'll play end both ways a lot. Crump also came in at 210, but I expect him to lose about 10 pounds or so before the season starts." Dill is also counting heavily on Kenneth Helms, Darrell Dowd and Kirk Proctor, another sophomore trio.

The new coach is Robert Dvorick, a recent graduate of New Mexico State University at Las Cruces, where he played basketball four years. He is a native of Las Alamos, New Mexico, and of course also played basketball in high school there.

Coach Dvorick will serve as head boys basketball coach, assistant football coach and will coach tennis. He will also teach science. Coach Dvorick comes to Valley well recommended, in fact his former coach in college came to Valley with him to extend his recommendation in person. Mr. Dvorick maintained a 3.78 grade average in high school and a 3.1 average in college.

The new coach is single, and is 80 inches high, or if you prefer, is 6 feet, 8 inches tall, which means that everyone in Quitaque and Turkey must look up to Mr. Dvorick.

Cowboy Reunion Held Near Channing

The wide open spaces west of Channing were as "western" as ever for about 15 veteran Matador Cowboys during their 17th reunion over the weekend.

The wagon boss Friday night and Saturday morning was Dick Shepherd, a former Turkey resident.

Shepherd, now 72, said he went to work for the Matadors in 1922 when he was 17. "Then ran two (chuck) wagons then I worked for them," he said.

Shepherd recalled that they "weaned the calves by cutting them off as yearlings" in those days.

He also recalls driving with his family from Turkey to Estelline about 1906 and "living right across from Bob Wills' place at Turkey in 1921 and 1922."

Shepherd has never missed any of the Matador cowboy reunions or Bob Wills Day Celebrations. "If I don't break a tongue or lose a whip," he said, "I'll be back next year."

A resident of Channing since 1944, Shepherd worked as a cowboy at Matador "part of two years — and I would go back occasionally and stay a while."

He worked for Bell, Clabber Hill and the Dan and Steve Trigg ranches, among others, over the years.

Married to the former Virginia Garner, daughter of the late Tom Garner of Turkey, they have three sons, two daughters and nine grandchildren. "My three boys have all been Matador cowboys at one time or other," he said.

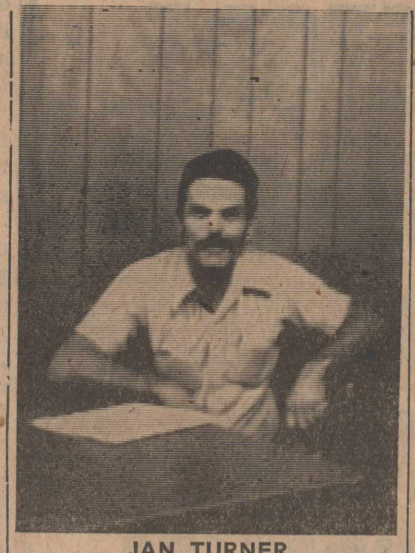

CROPS TO BE INTER-SEEDED WITH RYE AND WINTER PEAS

Many farmers in the Hall-Childress Soil and Water Conservation District are making plans to interseed covercrops of rye and winter peas to protect their land against blowing, according to Charles Wade, Range Conservationist, with the Soil Conservation Service in Memphis.

A good cover of rye or winter peas will protect the land from wind and water erosion as well as adding humus and organic matter to the soil. The organic matter and humus contain plant nutrients and will improve the soil's ability to absorb and hold water as well as increase the soil's capacity for aeration and increase porosity.

Windstorms in the spring of 1976 did moderate to severe damage to some 90,000 acres of land in Hall County. This damage was due to lack of cover. Not only did these sandstorms damage valuable farmland, damage was done to fences, roads and bar ditches.

Now is the time to take action to get cover crops planted. For further information, contact the Soil Conservation Service on planting cover crops.

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'Reddy's helpful tips for your Home Laundry

PLAN AHEAD
Sort clothes according to type of fabric, color-fastness, degree of soil and garment construction.
You'll save both hot water and electricity by doing similar items together.
Accumulate a full load before running your washer.

BE SELECTIVE
Choose the cycle that is precisely appropriate for the clothes you are washing. Is a "hot" temperature setting really necessary? Except for heavily soiled items, most loads will come clean in either a cold or warm wash. Look into cold wash detergents.

Use the least amount of detergent that will get your clothes clean — most loads require only an ounce or less!
Overloading causes extra strain and wear on your equipment; check the manufacturer's recommendations for load weight.
Balance your load by alternating small and large items.

FOR SAFETY SAKE
Be sure control is "off" before reaching into your washer.
If one is necessary, use only a heavy duty extension cord.
Be sure your washer is grounded.
Keep dry cleaning agents, color remover and Fibreglass out of your washer. It's a good idea not to wash clothes containing cleaning fluids in your washer.

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
