Valley High Boys and Girls Are Champs Of Estelline Tourney

Valley High School boys and girls basketball teams took the first place trophies at the fourth annual Red River Invitational Tournament held last weekend at Estelline. Both teams won over Motley County in the finals Saturday night.

The Valley teams were scheduled to play Wellington B teams in the opening round of action but Wellington failed to show and Valley won by forfeit.

In second round action Friday afternoon both teams met and won over Samnorwood to win their way into the championship round.

The Valley girls won over the Eaglettes 62-32 with a very balanced scoring attack plus very good help on the guard end of the court. Sherice Price scored 18 points for Valley, Joanie Turner was next with 16, Jena Mullin tallied 14, Debra Parsley, who starts at guard, switched to forward and netted eight points, and Paula Lipscomb scored six points.

The Valley boys had a harder time with the Eagles, winning by only a 2-point margin, 38-36. Kenny Chandler scored 17 points in this one to lead the scoring attack, while Jesse Ferguson hit for nine points, and Ron Eudy and Darrell Dowd scored six points each.

In the championship finals the Valley girls overpowered the Motley County girls 67-20. Valley scored first and never trailed in the game. With the score 8-3 in the early part of the first period, Motley pulled within a single point, 8-7, but Valley moved to a 14-8 lead at the end of the first quarter. It was 26-12 at half-time. At the end of the third quarter, the score was 47-16.

Sherice Price scored 27 points. Joanie Turner hit 20 points, Jena Mullin and Debra Parsley scored eight points each, and Paula Lipscomb and Peggy Shannon each scored two points.

The boys championship game was a thriller all the way with the Valley boys winning it 54-47. Both teams were pretty tight in the opening minutes and almost half the first period was used up before either team could light up the scoreboard, and Motley scored first. About a half minute later the Patriots scored their first points, then went ahead of Motley 4-2 and at the end of the first period Valley led 13-10. Motley went ahead of Valley 18-17 at the midway point of the second period. Motley led the remainder of the second quarter but Ron Eudy put Valley ahead by a single point, 26-25 with a long jumper that was in the air when the halftime buzzer went off. The Patriots never lost the lead in the second half but could never pull away from the Matadors by more than 3-5 points. But the Patriots never panicked and kept the pressure on the more experienced Matadors to hang on and win.

It was a very satisfying win for Coach Dvorak and his young Patriots who are undefeated to date and almost surely will improve with every game under their belts. This team usually has one senior, one junior and three sophomores on the court. Ron Eudy is the lone senior of the team and he contributes the leadership, the steady influence on his younger teammates, plus usually a big scoring punch. According to this reporter's unofficial scorekeeping, Ron hit for 31 points in the game against Motley County. Darrell Dowd scored eight points, Kenny Chandler, five; Dave Patrick, four; Kirk Proctor, four; Jesse Ferguson, two points.

The Valley girls placed four players on the all-tournament team and the Valley boys had two selected. All tournament selections were Debra Parsley, Joanie Turner, Darlene Hendrix and Sherice Price.

Ron Eudy and Kenny Chandler were placed on the boys team.

Valley fans were very proud of the coaches and their teams for the wins.

The Valley teams were scheduled to meet Memphis Tuesday night in a four-game set but since the Cyclones are still involved in football playoffs the boys games were not played and the JV and varsity girls played a pair of games, both of which Valley won, the JV girls breaking up the JV Cyclones 59-30.

The varsity game was no contest either with the Valley girls, looking smoother with each outing, winning 70-23. The Patriots led 21-5 at the first stop, 41-7 at half-time, 62-17 at the end of three quarters. Coach Robert Phelps let his reserves play much of the final period.

Sherice Price led the scoring attack with 20 points, Joanie Turner hit 16, Jena Mullin scored 14 points, Debra Parsley, who starts at guard and then usually is switched to forward sometime during the game, scored 14 points, Peggy Shannon scored four points and Paula Lipscomb scored two points. This year's edition of the Valley girls is a quick group and really set after the opposing team.

On Monday night of this week the Valley Junior High teams swung into action for the first time this season, hosting the Junior High teams and giving fans a bit of a preview of what could be expected on Tuesday night.

The 7th grade girls started the night's activities by whomping the visitors 54-7 with Nadine Rice burning the nets for 29 points, Diana Martinez 16, and Rose Valdez scored seven points. Other team members are Jena Smith, DeLane Proctor, Mary Peery, Lisa Payne, Sharon Gaddis, Cindy Hawkins and Melissa Dudley.

The 7th grade boys continued the winning with a 40-4 win with Dane Parsley leading the blitz with 13 points. Kevin Hendrix hit for 11 points, Kirby Chandler scored eight points, Richie Fuston scored four and Tommy Morris four. Coach Robert Phelps said that the score would have been even more one-sided had not Ken Crump been out with the pox. Other team members are Robert Johnson and Brent Brown.

The 8th grade girls won 50-27 with Angie Eudy having a great night scoring 34 points. Jendy Turner scored eight points and Laura Fuston scored two points. Seventh grader Nadine also got in some licks in this game and scored six points. Other members of the team are Mary Ann McNary, Dana Ramsey, Debra Clinton, Paula Helms, Rebecca Purcell and Patti Ramsey.

In the most decent game of the evening the Valley 8th grade boys won over the Memphis 8th graders 39-30. Randy Clay scored 10 points to lead the scoring for Valley, closely followed by James McNary with nine. John Hunter scored six points, Dee Dowd, five, Michael Dowd, three, Johnny Cotten, two, and Barney Willborn, two. Other team members are Rusty Griffin, Brum Pinkerton, Lon Taylor, Ray Williams, Monte Seymour, Claude Brittain.

Monday night of next week the varsity boys and girls will host Lockney for three games with the JV boys also scheduled to play, the games beginning at 5:00. Tuesday night Quail will come to Valley for varsity boys and girls games starting at 6:30.

Thursday, Friday and Saturday of next week the Patriots are entered in the Kress Tournament, and at 1:00 p.m. the Valley girls are matched against Nazareth. The boys play Nazareth at 2:30. There are no Friday night games this week due to Thanksgiving.

Program Sponsored By Nuevo Study Club

The Baptist Church in Turkey was the setting for a Bicentennial program sponsored by the Nuevo Study Club November 11.

Mrs. Allo Reeve of Friona presented her White House brides with a narration which included sixteen weddings in the White House. For each bride Mrs. Reeve has dressed a tiny doll in a gown identical to the bride who wore it.

Her doll collection includes one groom, Algernon Charles Frederick Sators, who walked down the aisle carrying a bouquet of orange blossoms topped with a flag bearing the word Love. Miss Grant's \$5,000 gown was probably the most expensive worn in the White House, and she received wedding gifts valued at \$75,000.

Only one president was married in the White House. Grover Cleveland wed his ward, Frances Folsom, when he was 49 and she was 22. The president wrote the ceremony and omitted the word obey.

John Adams II was the only president's son to be married in the White House, and his bride was the niece of Mrs. John Quincy Adams.

Teddy Roosevelt's daughter, Alice, is one of the three White House brides still living. She wed Nicholas Longworth in 1906 before 1,000 guests.

The first bride was Lucy Payne Washington, 1812; the last, Tricia Nixon, 1976.

One marriage ended in divorce: Eleanor Wilson, daughter of Woodrow Wilson, and William McAddo, who was secretary of the treasury.

There have been seven Episcopal services, four Presbyterian, one Methodist, one Quaker, and three of unknown religion. Most of the brides wore white or ivory formal gowns.

Mrs. Reeve spent many months researching for her program and has traveled several thousand miles presenting it.

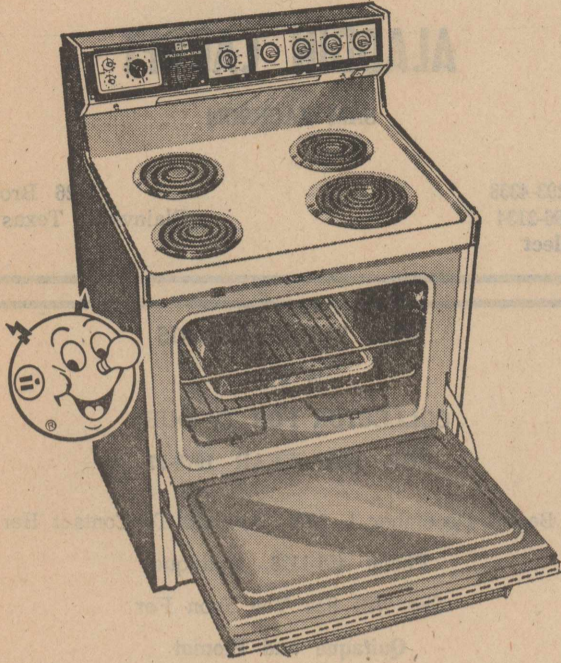
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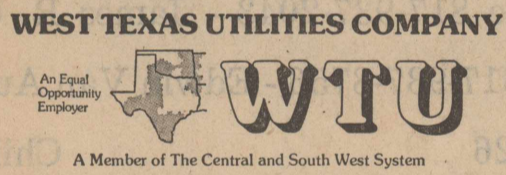
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ACROSS THE FENCE

A BICENTENNIAL
THANKSGIVING

In this bicentennial year of American heritage, a few interesting facts about "Turkey Day" may provide some extra meaning to the holiday.

Surprisingly, America was not the first country to celebrate some form of Thanksgiving. They also observed it in China, Greece, Russia, Norway, Poland and Lithuania.

When the Pilgrims first came to this country, they knew very little about farming, but an Indian named Squanto helped and they were able to harvest some corn and barley.

To celebrate their first success, Governor Bradford named a date in late 1621 as a day of thanks. Hunters scoured the woods and returned with turkeys, wood pigeons, partridges, geese and ducks, while the women prepared puddings and hockcakes. Because the Indians had been so helpful the Pilgrims invited them to join their celebration—and it was a good thing, for the Indians contributed five deer.

It was also the Indians who first introduced eating oysters to the settlers. During the three-day feast, they even set a precedent for our Thanksgiving holidays today—they participated in races and athletic events. Just think of how many big athletic events are held in the U. S. during Thanksgiving weekend today.

Thanksgiving in 1621 was largely a social occasion, but the second Thanksgiving in 1623 was probably the real start of our present holiday, for it was religious as well as social.

During the next 200 years, Thanksgiving was not celebrated on any one special day, until September 1863, when President Abraham Lincoln proclaimed that Thanksgiving be celebrated on the last Thursday in November. The menu of that day was much like the one used widely today—cranberry juice, roast turkey with dressing, sweet potatoes, creamed onions, cranberry sauce, squash, pumpkin pie, plum pudding, mince pie, milk and coffee.

Like Christmas, Thanksgiving brings out the altruism and generosity in people. For 200 years, Americans have helped the less fortunate by providing them with food, clothing and other necessary items. For many, it is also a time families reserve for being together. In a country where families are so geographically separated, it may be a hard thing to manage. But since traditions die hard, this is one family unifier well worth

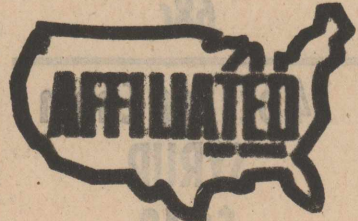
